<p>On the 19th June received a Warrant of Appointment as Surgeon & Superintendent of the <i>Eliza</i>, Male Convict Ship - On the same day proceeded to Deptford, and joined the Ship - Found the Guard, only, had embarked. Took charge of the medicines and necessaries placed under my care & then being no sick on Board - returned again to Town - Continued to visit the Ship daily until the 30th when she sailed for Sheerness, after which I remained constantly on Board -</p> <p>Provisions &c. <p>Tuesday 2nd July 1822</p>	<p>This afternoon embarked fifty convicts from the <i>Garrymore</i> - After searching their persons, Trunks, Bags, &c. and removing from them every article wherewith they could either effect their escape or injure the Ship, divided them into Messes of six men and appointed one of them as Captain of the Mess to maintain order & regularity therein - Permitted them to come on deck during the day and locked them down at Sunset</p>	
<p>Wednesday 3rd July 1822</p>	<p>This forenoon embarked fifty five convicts from the <i>Bellerophon</i> and the same number from the <i>Retribution</i> hulks at Sheerness - Selected sixteen Boats for the Prison allotted to them and appointed Mr. White and Jeremy Garfield to superintend them -</p>	

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	<p>Searched all their persons and Baggage - divided them into messes as yesterday - gave the Captain of each mess instructions to maintain strict order and regularity and that he would be made responsible for any misdemeanors unless he produced the offenders - The Chief Mate of the Ship took charge of such sums of money as were delivered to him as also of the Knives, Tapers, Razors &c which were removed from their persons or baggage - all hands permitted to be upon deck until 8 P.M. when they are locked down for the night - A Centinel placed in the Hatchways with a Lantern & candle to give notice of any disturbances occurring in the night - Opened Cask of Pork - Cont. 80 pieces -</p>	
Thursday 4 July	<p>Convicts all upon deck during the day - Left the lower boards of the Sleeping Berths and sprinkled & scrubbed the whole of the Prison and Hospital - Appointed Joseph Morbee and James Edrop to be Captains of the Prison deck and Laban White and J^r. Matthewson to attend the sick and wait in the Hospital - Four men complaining to day - Fine weather - Th^r. at noon 76° F⁺ - Opened Cask of Flour Contents 336 lbs - Just 4. 206 Contents 180 lbs -</p>

Sunday 7 th July	Prisoners still upon deck during the day - whereby their Sleeping Berths are rendered more cool & comfortable during the night - Some noise and disturbance in the Prison in the early part of the night - admonished the Prisoners that in future such conduct would not be tolerated - Sick as yesterday - Th ^o 72° - Atmosphere fine and dry - Lower deck cleaned as usual - Convicts visited by their friends and Relations, therefore did not perform Divine Service on account of the numerous boats going to and fro -	
Monday 8 th July	Convicts all upon deck - Decks sprinkled & scrubbed and the Boards of the Sleeping Berths lifted & inspected daily - Sick - fine - Thermometer 78° F ^o -	
Tuesday 9 th July	All hands still upon deck during the day - Prisons and Hospital cleaned as usual - Sick - fine chiefly General Complaints amongst the Guard - & getting one case of Epilepsy all complaints amongst the Prisoners appearing trivial - Th ^o 78° F ^o -	
Wednesday 10 th July	Prisoners all upon deck during the day - Some fighting amongst them in the evening - Opened the Prison but was unable to find out the offenders - Threatened Confinement to the whole if it again occurred - Prison and Hospital cleaned as usual - Sick the same Thermometer 76° -	
Thursday 11 th July	Going on as usual - All hands upon deck during the day when they are frequently visited by their friends and relations - as the most of them only embarked with the clothes they stood in, therefore ordered them to be supplied with one shirt and one pair of trousers each in order that they may always have a clean suit to shift themselves - Sick - fine - Th ^o 76° - 160 Shirts & 160 pair of Trousers -	

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Friday 12 th July 1822	No occurrences worthy of Remarking Sick & the same as yesterday.	
Saturday 13 th July	Prisoners all upon deck until 8 P.M. when they were locked down for the night - Occasional noise & disturbance with some petty acts of theft; but as usual upon opening the Prison all is quiet against the offenders not to be found - Prison & Hospital cleaned as usual - Sick fine - Th ^o 78° - Opened Cask of Pease - Contents 5 Bushels.	
Sunday 14 th July	Convicts as usual upon deck and continue to be visited daily by their friends and relations from a distance - From this circumstance the boats going to and fro and also from the absence of some of the officers and not perform Divine Service - Sent a Return of Sickness to the Navy Board - Th ^o 78° - Prison & Hospital cleaned as usual.	
Monday 15 th July	Convicts all upon deck and this morning notwithstanding the many faults and transgressions which had been looked over - Two of them viz Michael Gardin and Edward Gardiner commenced a regular Pugilistic match upon deck as it were in open defiance of all authority - Being determined to check any growing riot in it and therefore punished the offenders with one dozen of lashes each - Whereupon they expressed sincere contrition tho' previously they were not willing to acknowledge themselves guilty of any offence - Prison & Hospital cleaned as usual - Sick fine Th ^o 69° F.	
Tuesday 16 th July	Convicts all upon deck - This morning Jacob Bates was accused by Richard Childs of having stolen from him during the night six pounds of Sugar and a quantity of Pipe clay - Made search for said articles and found the Sugar in Bates's Bed and part	

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	<p>of the Pipe clay in his pockets - as this crime is likely to be such a cause of evil and disturbance during the voyage, therefore punished the offender with one dozen and a half lashes and held him out as an example to others if found guilty of similar offence. Received a Packet & Bag of Despatches for the Governor of New South Wales with instructions to inform the Master of the Ship thereof in order that she might proceed on her voyage. Complied with said instructions by informing the Mate thereof in the Master's absence - Prison cleaned as usual - Sick - fine - Th^o 67° - Cask of oatmeal sticks - contents 7 lbs - Cask of Rum - 65 Gallons -</p>	
Wednesday 17 th July	<p>Convicts all upon deck during the day - Prison and Hospital sprinkled and scrubbed - Ship preparing for sea - Sick - fine Th^o 70° - F.</p>

Friday 19 th July	<p>Convicts all upon deck and many of them taking a last farewell of their friends and relations - Some few seem to feel much but the majority appear to be callous and behave with that stolidism and indifference which can only be seen upon such interesting and painful occasions, amongst men inured to villainy and hardened with vice - Prison and Hospital cleaned as usual - Winds westerly and Ship preparing for sea - Sick - fine Th^o 76° -</p>	
Saturday 20 th July	<p>This morning weighed anchor and sailed for the Downs strong westerly winds and several of the convicts and passengers sea sick - Part of the former only upon deck to prevent confusion in working the ship down the River at dusk anchored in the Downs - Sick - fine Th^o 65° - F.</p>	

Signed a Certificate to the Master for 779½ pounds of fresh Beef as being good in quality and at the market price viz 38/6 per Cwt.

Thursday 25 July	Weather still mist and squally but more calm towards the evening - Wind westerly - Converts upon deck as usual and upon the whole more orderly - Some deck Sprinkle and Scrubbed - Sick - Eight Th ^r 67° - Ordered Soap Wax - - Opened cask of flour. Cont 336 lbs -

It may now be asked of me - Why have you not inserted
some sick cases in your journal? - My reply is this -
That my particular care and attention was directed
to the maintenance of health and prevention of sickness,

was confined to bed during the voyage, and scarcely
a single case has occurred worthy of insertion -
I shall now, however, select one or two from my

This case and the preceding one are the only two Medical Cases of any importance which have occurred and of the numerous cases of Catarrh which were incurred by the cold and fluctuating state of the atmosphere this last was the only one of any severity and even it readily gave way to the Remedies employed - No surgical cases of any consequence happened and I have only to remark on this head - The efficacy of Galvanism in discharging two or three cases of Sympathetic Pustules which would not readily yield to any other means such as Mercurial frictions, Blisters, Cupping, Embracations, Sea water or Detergent lotions - The pain attending it, however, was so considerable particularly of the cuticle was in the least abraded by previous applications that once or twice I had to desist altogether even when the Trough of fifty, four inch, blaster was moderately charged with a solution of the Mur. Doree only - Its efficacy however was very apparent whenever it could possibly be made use of -

About forty six cases altogether, inclusive of women and children have appeared on the Sick list, but as I have said before all of too trivial a nature to mention - Verborescitur, or prolixity upon cases altogether uninteresting can answer no useful purpose whatever, and, I trust, therefore, that I shall stand acquitted for not inserting more than I have done -

In my letter of the 26th ult^o I have given a general account of the Voyage and its occurrences, little, therefore, for me now to particularize. With respect to the victualling Scheme, I would beg leave to suggest that the allowance of Pease should be diminished and that of the oatmeal increased - The former not many of the Prisoners would make use of whereas they seem fond of the latter and if a quantity was issued daily it would always, with a little sugar or Molasses, afford them a nutritious and

The Soap furnished at present is of little use with Sea Water and I would, humbly, propose that a small quantity should be issued to the Hospital only - and that from the attraction which Pipe Clay has for urinous substances, a quantity of it and Scrubbing Brushes should be supplied in lieu of Soap - Those Prisoners who had provided themselves with these articles were always the cleanest men both in their persons and Apparel -

From the cold and variable weather which we experienced the most of the voyage, and the numerous Catarrhal Affections which occurred; a pair of Woollen trousers or Drawers in addition to the present clothing would be of very beneficial importance. The Duck Trowsers alone are too thin and cold for such a climate.

The number of Chests and packages in the Prison belonging to the Prisoners offer a constant excitement to Theft and Robbery - I would propose, therefore, that they should all be put under hatches and that each man should be furnished with one bag to contain his necessary clothing during the voyage -

The Locks of the Prison were frequently going wrong and the Keys having been lost when the 2^d Mate was unfortunately drowned. A spare set would therefore, be very desirable in case of accident. For on that occasion the Pad Locks of the Medicine Chests were our only resource and without them the Prison would have been insecure. I may here observe also that some small part of the ship, where most convenient, should be allotted for a Prison for solitary confinement which would often prevent the necessity of resorting to harsher modes of Punishment -

The Religious and moral conduct of the Prisoners was, in general, good, and, with a few exceptions, exemplary. - Cooped up in a ship and withdrawn from the noise and bustle of the world and, from the society, perhaps, of more wicked & dissipated associates, Reflection awakened many of them to a lively sense of their guilt, the Unpleasantness of their situation and the dark prospects before them. But when sickness overtook them and they beheld the ample comforts, nay,

General Orders -

The following Orders and Regulations for the maintenance of good order and Regularity during the Voyage are to be strictly attended to by all the Prisoners and duly enforced by those placed in situations of Trust and Responsibility -

Art: I.

The Main Prison will be placed under the immediate charge of two Captains who will be attentive at all times, to maintain order and regularity therein - They will take care that the Prison deck & sleeping Berths are cleaned daily - that no nuisance or filth is committed by any of the prisoners - that no swearing, or bad language is made use of, and no improper songs sung. They will endeavor to check every tendency to vice, and any placed in authority failing to point out Delinquents to me will not only incur my grace but such other punishment as circumstances may require -

II.

The Prison allotted to the Boys will be under the charge of their two masters, who will not only attend to the foregoing Article with respect to the internal regulation of the Prison; but they will also attend strictly to the Religious instruction, useful learning and moral behaviour of the youths committed to their care, for which purpose the necessary Essentials will be put into their hands - The negligent will be punished and the Diligent encouraged and rewarded -

III.

When all hands are permitted to be upon deck - Two Captains will be appointed to take charge there, to see that no filth or nuisance is committed and that every one conducts himself with propriety and decorum, shewing himself worthy of the Liberty granted to him - By a contrary behaviour future Indulgence will be forfeited -

IV.

The whole of the Prisoners, Boys excepted, will be put into three Divisions each under the superintendence of a Captain who will muster them upon deck every morning at 10 o'clock and report them to me when all clean & ready for inspection - The wearing apparel, Beds, Blankets &c supplied from Gov^t. Stores will be inspected once a week by these Captains, and all persons

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who have torn, sold, erased the number from or carelessly lost their clothing will incur exemplary punishment - This article is also applicable to the boys who will be mustered by one of their masters -

V.

At five o'clock in the morning the Beds will be rolled up singly in as neat a manner as possible in order that they may occupy little space in the Nettings, and in half an hour afterwards the Prison will be opened and two men in rotation from each sleeping Berth, will take them upon deck and see them stowed away by a Captain of the upper deck - who will attend, previously, if wanted by the officers of the ship, with two mops to assist in cleaning the upper deck.

VI.

Breakfast will be served at eight, Dinner at Twelve and Supper at Four o'clock daily -

VII.

After Breakfast all hands will be upon deck when the weather will permit, excepting the members of one mess who will attend in regular routine to the cleaning of the Prison, and also of the Hospital when ordered by me, under the superintendence of the Captains of the Prison - Sprinkling and scrubbing when the weather is fine & dry, and scraping or dry mopping when cold or damp & assisting the drying by firing stoves or such other means as may be placed in their hands. When the Prison is clean and fit for inspection it is to be reported to the chief officer of the ship and after his inspection all hands will be permitted to go up and down until the evening unless particular circumstances or misconduct should cause me to do away with this indulgence -

VIII.

Half an hour before sun-set all hands will be upon Deck when the bed bottoms will be turned up and the Prison swept & inspected. After wards all hands will be mustered down for the night -

IX.

Two men will be chosen by a majority of the Prisoners to see the Provisions served and that every one receives his allowance - One man will attend from each mess to receive the mess allowance
