
Thanks for getting back to us.

Whitehall, September 2, 1919.

The KING has been pleased to issue a Warrant under His Majesty's Royal Sign Manual to the following effect:—

GEORGE R.I.

GEORGE The FIFTH, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India, to all to whom these Presents shall come, Greeting!

Whereas We, have taken into Our Royal consideration of the faithful and devoted service rendered by members of the Special Constabulary during the War:

And whereas we are desirous of distinguishing such service by some mark of His Royal Favour, and also of providing a means of recognizing continued and efficient service which might be rendered in the future by members of any Special Constabulary Reserve hereafter constituted:

We do by these Presents for Us, Our Heirs and Successors, institute and create a new Medal to be awarded for such service as aforesaid.

I. It is ordained that the Medal shall be designated and styled "The Special Constabulary Medal."

II. It is ordained that the Special Constabulary Medal shall consist of a circular Medal of Silver with Our Effigy on the obverse and on the reverse an appropriate design or inscription, and shall bear on the rim the name of the person to whom the Medal is awarded.

III. It is ordained that the Medal shall only be awarded to those of Our faithful subjects who being or having been members of the Special Constabulary during the War or any Special Constabulary Reserve shall satisfy the following conditions, namely:-

- (1) Shall have served as a Special Constable without pay during the War for not less than three years, and shall during that period have performed not less than 150 police duties; or
- (2) Shall have served in a Special Constabulary Reserve for not less than nine years and shall have (a) taken an approved course of training in Police duty, (b) voluntarily performed such actual police duty as may be required by the Chief Officer f Police in accordance with any general regulations made by Our Principal Secretary of state for the Home Department (c) been annually certified as efficient by the Chief Officer of Police.

Provided that in the case of a man who has served both in the Special Constabulary during the War and in a Special Constabulary Reserve, one year of service during the War (with not less than 50 police duties in such year) shall be reckoned as equivalent to three years' efficient service in the Reserve, and les periods in the same proportion.

IV. It is ordained that the Medal shall be awarded only on a recommendation to Us by Our Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, and that the names of the persons to be so recommended to Us shall be submitted to Our said Secretary of State by the Chief Officer of Police under whom such persons have served.

V. It is ordained that the Medal shall be worn on the left breast suspended from a riband of an inch and three-eighths in width, of which the central part (one-third of the whole) shall be red, while the remaining parts shall each have three longitudinal stripes of equal width, the central stripe being black and the other two white; and further, that in the case of those to whom the Medal is awarded for service during the War a bar or clasp shall be attached to the riband, bearing the words "The Great War, 1914-1918."

VI. It is ordained that if any person to whom this Medal is awarded shall be guilty of any crime or disgraceful conduct which in Our judgement disqualified him for the same, his Medal shall, by an Order of Our Principle Secretary of State for the Home Department, be forfeited and the name of such person shall be erased from the record of those to whom the Medal shall have been awarded. It is hereby further declared that We, Our Heirs and Successors, shall be the sole judges of the circumstances demanding such forfeiture, and that every person whose Medal shall be so forfeited shall on being required so to do by Our said Secretary of State deliver up his Medal to such person as Our said Secretary of State may direct.

VII. Our Principle Secretary of State for the Home Department is hereby authorized to make such regulations as may be necessary for the better carrying out of this Our Warrant.

Given at Our Court at Balmoral, this Thirtieth day of August, One thousand nine hundred and nineteen, in the Tenth year of our Reign.

The first book is about the Special Constabulary Long Service Medal and I think I have found all of the Warrants associated with this medal. I am concerned however that there has been nothing since 1982 - have I got them all?

I also want to include the Warrant for the Royal Ulster Constabulary Service Medal which apparently came out in a Gazette on 27/07/1982 but none of my searches pull this gazette up - even just on date. Clearly I am doing something wrong but I don't know what it is!

I have the same problem when searching for Warrants associated with the Colonial Police Long Service Medal or Colonial Police Meritorious Service Medal (my second book is about these awards to the British South Africa Police - BSAP).

A Summary of Some of the Other Orders and Awards

The **Royal Victorian Order** (RVO) was established to recognise those who have served the monarch with distinction, each being appointed to one of the five grades and granted the right to use the according prefixes and/or post-nominal letters

- Knight or Dame Grand Cross (prefix: Sir or Dame, post-nominal: GCVO)
- Knight or Dame Commander (prefix: Sir or Dame, post-nominal: KCVO or DCVO)
- <u>Commander</u> (post-nominal: CVO)
- Lieutenant (post-nominal: LVO)
- <u>Member</u> (post-nominal: MVO)

Individuals may also be awarded the Royal Victorian Medal, which entitles them to the post-nominal letters RVM. Further, prior to 1984, the grades of Lieutenant and Member were classified as Members (fourth class) and Members (fifth class), respectively, but both with the post-nominals MVO.

The Most Excellent Order of the British Empire is a British order of chivalry established on 4 June 1917 by King George V. The Order includes five classes in civil and





military divisions; in decreasing order of seniority, these are:

- Knight Grand Cross (GBE) or Dame Grand Cross (GBE)
- Knight Commander (KBE) or Dame Commander (DBE)
- Commander (<u>CBE</u>)
- Officer (OBE)
- Member (<u>MBE</u>)

Only the two highest ranks entail admission into knighthood.

The Most Venerable Order of St John of Jerusalem is usually known as the Order of St John and recognises services rendered to the charitable works of the Order. In addition to being an order of chivalry but is not a State Order and membership does not confer rank or title. Notices of these awards are published in the London Gazette.

The Queen's Award for Voluntary Service

The Queen's Award for Voluntary Service is a UK wide Honour dedicated to recognising voluntary groups from all age groups, backgrounds and abilities who regularly devote their time to helping others in the community. Announced from Buckingham Palace by Her Majesty the Queen on 2 June each year, it is the most prestigious award in its field, the equivalent in status to the MBE and the highest UK Honour specifically rewarding the work of volunteer groups.
