

Dear Professor Morgan,

Thank you for your letter of 20 May. As I said when we met I was grateful for your help in passing my draft letter to Lord Callaghan but, alas, neither you nor I can make him send it if he has decided not to do so.

It is not, I assure you, as a result of that impasse that I find myself unable to send you a favourable response to your request for access to the official papers relating to Lord Callaghan's period of office which, when we spoke last year, I hoped might be possible given your position as his official biographer. Long-standing rules preclude access by anyone other than former Prime Ministers personally to records issued to them when in office, and to the official papers which they are know to have handled at the time, before they become publicly available under the provision of the Public Records Acts. For the reasons indicated below, I have had to conclude that I cannot make an exception to those rules for you.

My predecessors and I have been willing to agree to former Prime Ministers being allowed to bring with them some-one who also had access to the papers when in Government in order to help them refresh their memories, but I fear that even this concession would not apply as you have not had such prior access.

What I could perhaps suggest is that if and when there are specific points you wish to have checked and if Lord Callaghan is not able or willing to check them himself I would be happy to have the papers checked for that purpose, provided that such requests were not too extensive. I realise that it will be no comfort to you but you may be interested to know that I had to reply similarly to a request from Phillip Ziegler when he began work on his biography of Lord Wilson.

PRIME MINISTERS' PAPERS: PROFESSOR KENNETH MORGAN'S REQUEST FOR ACCESS

In his letter of 20 May Professor Kenneth Morgan refers to a conversation he had with you last year when you met to discuss Lord Callaghan's papers. He asks whether he may look at public records from October 1964 onwards relating to Lord Callaghan's period in office on the grounds that as the official biographer of Lord Callaghan he may be regarded as his representative.

As you will recall we had a similar request from Philip Ziegler during 1991 when he was preparing the biography of Lord Wilson which we have recently cleared for publication. Although I initially thought that we may be able to waive the rules for Mr Ziegler on the grounds of Lord Wilson's illhealth, in the event, we decided that we could not breach the rule that access to papers must be restricted to former Ministers themselves; if we did and it became known we would not be able to hold the line against any Minister who wanted his biographer or research assistant to have such access.

The rules on access to official papers before they become publicly available, which were introduced in 1972, say:-

"By convention, former Ministers are allowed reasonable access to the papers of the period when they were in office. They may have access in the Cabinet Office to copies of Cabinet or Cabinet Committee papers which were issued to them when in office, and access in the department concerned to other official papers which they are known to have handled at the time.

It is a firm rule that access to official papers must be limited without exception, to former Ministers personally. To allow access to, for example, their research assistants would breach the conventions about confidentiality of exchanges between Ministers and of civil servants' advice to Ministers. It would also give to those concerned exceptional privileges; others normally have to wait until the papers are released in accordance with the Public Records Acts."

There is no provision for special treatment of former Prime Ministers under these rules although you offered to stretch the rules for Lady Thatcher by allowing her to have the help of someone who had been within Government during her period of office, had had access to the papers, and was adequately vetted. Lord Armstrong recorded in 1981 that he was prepared to make a similar offer to allow Lord Donoghue to see Lord Callaghan's papers but that offer was, so far as I can tell, never made. Professor Morgan does not fall into the same category as Mr Robin Harris or Lord Donoghue in this respect.

The precedent I cited when Mr Ziegler sought access to the Wilson papers was that of Professor Dilks' access to the Macmillan papers. This pre-dated the 1972 rules and access was granted on the grounds of the former Prime Minister's illhealth. On that occasion the serving Prime Minister's consent was sought and access granted on the understanding that it was a breach of precedent and on condition that:-

- a) the researcher was security vetted
- b) an undertaking was given that the information acquired would not be used for any other purpose
- . c) that unlimited access would not be granted. The papers would be scrutinised and any withheld if we adjudged it necessary
 - d) the papers could only be seen on official premises.

I am not sure what you had in mind if, as Professor Morgan says, you referred to him being regarded as Lord Callaghan's representative. The rules as they stand at present seem quite firmly to preclude him. I should be grateful if you would let me know whether you would be prepared to reply as to Mr Ziegler, if so I shall produce a draft.



As you will recall, we met last autumn and I also had the pleasure of meeting you briefly at the Gaudy at Merton in March. As I mentioned then, I did indeed pass your points on to Lord Callaghan and I am sorry that he appears not to have responded. I am afraid I do not know the reason.

When we met at the Cabinet Office you very kindly mentioned that it would be possible for me to look at public records for the period from October 1964 onwards relating to Lord Callaghan's period in office. I believe you mentioned that it might be possible to regard me as a representative of the former Prime Minister since I am his official biographer. I would be most grateful if an opportunity could be found some time between the middle of July and the middle of September for looking at some of this material before I start a new range of shores in the most of this material, before I start a new range of chores in the next academic year. If, at the very least, I could look at the Cabinet minutes and perhaps associated Cabinet papers (they would presumably be listed as CAB 128-129 in the Public Records Office) for the period of Harold Wilson's Government of 1964-70, they would be enormously helpful. Naturally, I would most scrupulously observe any conditions about their use, showing any extracts I wish to use to you, etc. If it would be possible to look at some of the 'T' papers also for that period, perhaps on the devaluation crisis of 1967, that would also be an enormous help, but really anything that you felt able to do would be enormously appreciated. In spite of my many labours here, I am finding some time to get on with my work on Lord Callaghan again as the impact of my wife's death gradually recedes. Perhaps you could kindly let me know about these matters in due course. about these matters in due course.

Professor Kenneth Morgan: Lord Callaghan's Papers

Sir Robin Butler had a meeting with Professor Kenneth Morgan on Wednesday 25 November to discuss Lord Callaghan's papers. Sir Robin Butler explained that he was attempting to put in order the arrangements for Prime Ministers who wished to keep personal archives of papers which had been issued to them while Prime Minister.

- 2. Sir Robin Butler explained that he was required, as Cabinet Secretary, to satisfy himself that adequate arrangements for the safe custody and proper treatment of official papers retained as personal archives had been made. He was therefore seeking assurances from former Prime Ministers on four points:
 - a. That the papers were safely stored. He understood that the papers were currently in the Victoria Tower in the House of Lords where they would remain until 1995, when they might be moved to the London School of Economics (LSE). He required an assurance that he would be informed when any such transfer of the papers took place.
 - b. That the papers would be treated in the same way as the original documents still retained by the Crown ie that access to them should not be granted without consent, and that those papers which, because of their continuing sensitivity, were not released by the

Government to the Public Record Office should not be made available from Lord Callaghan's collection.

- c. That The Queen's Private Secretary should be consulted about any proposal to make public correspondence with The Queen or other members of the Royal Family.
- d. That Lord Callaghan should give an assurance on these matters that was binding on himself and his heirs.
- 3. Professor Morgan said that, in his view, Lord Callaghan was serious about the papers in his possession, he considered them to be a serious and valuable historical record and that they should be looked after in a manner commensurate with this. He had not seen any correspondence with The Queen and only very few secret documents, for example there were no papers on disarmament or nuclear issues. He did not think that the undertakings that Sir Robin was requiring were at all unreasonable and could not see that Lord Callaghan would be likely to refuse to give them. Sir Robin Butler asked whether, if he was provided with a suitable draft, Professor Morgan would be prepared to suggest that Lord Callaghan wrote to Sir Robin giving the undertakings. Professor Morgan agreed to do this.
- 4. Professor Morgan asked whether it would be possible for him, as Researcher to Lord Callaghan, to see copies of Cabinet and Cabinet Committee papers that were not available in the Public Record Office. Sir Robin Butler said that he did not expect there to be any difficulties with this, but Professor Morgan should contact him in due course. He also said that if there was any help that he personally could give, as he had known Lord Callaghan quite well, he would be happy to give it.

PRIME MINISTERS' PAPERS

The meeting with Professor Kenneth Morgan to discuss Lord Callaghan's papers has now been arranged for noon on Monday 6 July.

Our concerns about Lord Callaghan's papers which were sent by No 10 to the House of Lords in May 1990 are set out in your letter of 16 October 1991 (copy attached) and are:-

- (i) that the papers, although not now covered by the Public Records Act, are copies of public records and contain the same information as the originals which remain on official files,
- (ii) the Government therefore retains an interest in the papers; the Official Secrets Act applies where relevant and will continue to do so after Lord Callaghan's lifetime; Copyright remains vested in the Crown

We need therefore:-

- a) to know when the papers leave the House of Lords so that we can satisfy ourselves that they are securely stored by the LSE or whichever institution provides a home for them.
- b) to reach an agreement that the papers will be treated in the same way as the originals ie access to them not to be granted without our consent and the papers to be reviewed before any access is granted so that any which are not releasable at 30 years can be held back.
- c) to ensure that The Queen's Private Secretary is consulted about any proposal to use letters from the Sovereign to the Prime Minister or from the Prime Minister to the Sovereign (by way of publication, use in lectures etc)

Lord Callaghan has given the assurance sought in respect of himself, that he has no intention of transferring the papers out of the country (his letter of 21 November 1991, also attached, refers), but he has not bound his heirs to this assurance.

Professor Morgan will presumably not be in a position to give undertakings on behalf of Lord Callaghan but he may be able to advise on his progress with use of the papers for the biography and perhaps on how Lord Callaghan may be persuaded to give the undertakings sought.

Dear Jim,

May I write to you about your No. 10 papers which were sent over to the House of Lords Records Office in May last year. I have been trying with all former PMs to get some agreed arrangements on this unruly subject.

You will recall that the papers which, as a former Prime Minister, you were allowed by convention to take away, were in the following categories:-

- 1. Copies of outgoing Personal Minutes to Ministerial colleagues (those signed by yourself) excluding those marked TOP SECRET.
- Copies of all personal telegrams and messages sent to or received from overseas, again excluding those marked TOP SECRET.
- Copies of any letters you sent to The Queen, excluding those marked TOP SECRET.
- 4. Copies of all other letters signed by you.
- 5. Personal correspondence relating to Ministerial appointments.
- 6. Speeches.
- 7. Copies of the typed daily diary for the whole of your Administration.
- 8. Files held in the Private Office which are personal rather than official.

As you will appreciate, a large proportion of the papers in the acategories are copies of public records and, whilst they are now themselves covered by the Public Records Act, the Government retains an interest in them. For example the Official Secrets Act applies where relevant, and will continue to do so after your lifetime, and copyright remains vested in the Crown. Perhaps therefore you would kindly let me know when the papers are removed from the House of Lords so that I can satisfy myself that they are securely stored.

Because the information contained in your 'personal' papers is the same as that in the originals which remain on official files I should be most grateful if you, and your heirs, would agree to treat the papers in the same way as the originals, which are subject to the Public Records Act. This would mean first that third parties should not be granted access to them, without the consent of the Cabinet Office, for 30 years and secondly that before any such access is granted the papers would be reviewed so that we can ensure that any which are copies of public records being held back from public release for longer than 30 years would similarly be held back among your papers. I should also be grateful for an assurance that you and your heirs will not transfer the papers out of this country and that if you or they should wish to dispose of the papers at any time assurances in the terms of this paragraph would be sought from anyone to whom they are transferred.

Your papers may include correspondence with The Queen and I have recently undertaken to the Palace to ensure that former Prime Ministers and/or their Trustees are aware of the policy regarding such correspondence. The general policy, to which there have been few exceptions, is that the publication of such correspondence is not permitted. Any proposal for letters from the Sovereign to the Prime Minister to be used in any way - publication, lectures etc, - must first be referred to the Sovereign's Private Secretary as ex officio Keeper of The Queen's Archives. The Private Secretary should also be consulted regarding any proposed use of letters from a Prime Minister to the Sovereign. These rules apply however old the papers are since The Queen's papers are not subject to the 30 year rule and not automatically available for use after a given period.

If you would like to discuss any of this, I am of course at your service. But if you are content to do so, I should be grateful if you would confirm that these arrangements are acceptable to you.

I have agreed arrangements on these lines with Margaset Thatcher and Harold Wilson, and I hope that they will be a cuptilled to you.

May I suggest that you should have a talk with Professor Morgan in order to clear up any difficulties. If you would like to get in touch with him directly, please do so.


