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

You asked for advice on whether the Prime Minister should accept the invitation to speak on 2 July at the centenary celebrations of the Rhodes Trust, and whether Nelson Mandela would, as the Trustees hoped, also be present.

We have been advised by Mr Mandela's office that they would prefer that he did not attend the event on 2 July, as this would mean him making two trips to the UK in the space of ten days. He is already committed to go to Belfast on 11 July for the Special Olympics. He would not stay in the UK from 2-11 July. Mr Mandela's doctors are seriously concerned about the amount of travel he is doing. There is also the fact that he is preparing for his 85th birthday celebrations on 18 July.

If we advise the Prime Minister to speak on 2 July, Mr Mandela is likely to make the effort to attend. If the Prime Minister refuses the invitation, Mr Mandela will not attend either.

The launch of the Mandela Rhodes Foundation is a worthy event. The Foundation will support the disadvantaged in South Africa, principally in the field of education. But we do not judge this event worthy of the Prime Minister's attendance. The solution may be to offer a short message from the Prime Minister to be read out at the event.

Host governments have agreed in principle that a visit would be possible within this window, and we have consulted posts on the attached itinerary. The strategic objectives for the visit remain as in my letter of 13 February (copy enclosed).

Given the uncertainty over SARS, we agreed that we would submit two draft programmes: one (Plan A) which assumes that we are past the worst in Beijing and Shanghai and that a full range of public events is possible; and another (Plan B) with a slimmed down China leg taking in Beijing only, for a scenario in which large public events would be unwise. Our current assessment is that, by July, a trip along the lines set out in Plan A would be possible. For political and presentational reasons, it is important that a visit to the Far East should take in China if at all possible. Whatever the SARS situation, the Chinese have undertaken to do everything in their power to assure the success of the programme and the Prime Minister's health, as they did for French Prime Minister Raffarin. He paid a very successful visit to Beijing, albeit in a plan B type format, when uncertainties over SARS were at their height. Using a visit to demonstrate the Prime Minister's support for the Chinese leadership when their ability and reputation was tested by the SARS crisis, would bring him and the UK much credit.

As you requested, we have also included a third itinerary (plan C), which covers the possibility of an Australia leg to replace the China one, in the unlikely event that travel to China should be made completely impossible by SARS. An Australia visit would be a welcome and timely way to mark the particular closeness which has developed in the UK/Australia alliance against the background of Iraq and the post 11 September world. The Australia suggestions are at this stage illustrative only. We have not discussed timings or availability with our High Commission in Canberra, nor with the Australian Government. We would not propose to do so until an Australia leg looks like a real possibility.



For <u>Japan</u>, most of the proposals are as before: a meeting with Koizumi, followed by a joint press conference and dinner; a lunch time business reception, preceded by a short meeting with a select group of top investors; and a political speech (probably at the Diet, if it is extended as expected).

In addition, we propose an environment-themed event, which would bring together four important strands of the visit: the Environment, the Science and Technology Partnership, Inward Investment in the Automobile Industry and Innovation UK. This would take place in the Miraikan (the same venue that we had planned to use for the launch of Innovation UK) and feature demonstrations of the results of UK-Japan collaboration on climate change modelling, on the hydrogen economy, and on the technology for environmentally friendly vehicles (with possible practical demonstrations / rides). This replaces the previous proposal for the Prime Minister to launch Innovation UK (Lord Sainsbury will have done so on 14 May).

If the Prime Minister was able to spend more time in Japan, we have three other proposals:

- 1) A tourism-promotion event. Iraq and SARS have made a real negative impact on the numbers of Japanese travelling to the UK. The event might be linked to a competition to mark the anniversary of the World Cup in Japan (prize: signed Beckham shirt). The Japanese are also keen on signing a bilateral agreement on tourism promotion. (we have already prepared agreements on S & T, Environment and ICT);
- 2) An "Innovation in Business" round table, with a small but top-level group of UK business people. The Prime Minister would only need attend part of the event. The aim would be to identify ways of promoting innovation in business, and promoting the UK's strengths in this area. The Nikkei (FT equivalent) and FT are keen to cohost;
- 3) A young people's forum involving a televised discussion at the British Council (as previously proposed).

If preferred, we could offer proposals for weekend sightseeing in or outside of Tokyo.

In <u>South Korea</u>, we envisage a very short (5-hour) visit, in which the sole focus would be a meeting with President Roh, followed by a short press conference. There are various options for working up additional elements if time allowed. A dinner event would also allow the Prime Minister to meet key members of Roh's Government — notably those with an influence on our substantial trade and investment interests in Korea. The programme would be the same under plans A, B or C.



In China, our key objectives remain; for the Prime Minister to establish strong personal relations with China's new generation of leaders; for the Prime Minister to emphasise our support for Chinese engagement on international issues and for domestic reform; and to ensure a high profile for Think UK, a major initiative to raise awareness of the UK's creative and technological excellence among young Chinese professionals. The core of the programme – extended talks with the new Premier, Wen Jiabao, and new President Hu Jintao, and extensive media activity to give momentum to Think UK - therefore remains unchanged. But the nature of the Think UK activity will be determined by whether or not we are able to stage large public events. On Plan A, provided the SARS situation improves sufficiently soon, we would also aim to reschedule major public projects to coincide with the visit. These might include an exhibition on the story of DNA and contemporary UK excellence in genetic research, and Asian Field, Antony Gormley's sculpture of 200,000 figurines in the National History Museum close to Tiananmen Square. On the SARS-affected scenario (plan B), this element of the programme would revolve around interviews, on-line discussions, and the launch of a CD-based English learning game. We also hope that it may still be possible to sign an agreement on the mutual establishment of cultural centres.

The UK/China Forum will now not happen at the time of the visit. We propose instead that the Prime Minister open DFID's new China office. Over recent months the entire DFID China team has been relocated from London to Beijing and is now housed in attractive new premises outside the Embassy compound.

Under Plan A, we propose, as before, that the Prime Minister either delivers a speech in Beijing on a foreign policy theme, or calls on Jiang Zemin, who is second in pre-eminence in the Chinese leadership, and remains highly influential on foreign and military policy; and that he travels to Shanghai, where in addition to meeting the Party Secretary and/or Mayor, we hope he would attend the opening of a forum for British business and investors involving 100-120 British and Chinese entrepreneurs. On the SARS-affected scenario, neither a speech to a large audience nor a business leaders forum would be possible, and we recommend omitting Shanghai altogether.

In <u>Hong Kong</u>, both programme options include essential meetings with the Chief Executive and Legislative Council members. We remain keen for the Prime Minister to address the local business community. The programme also gives the Prime Minister private time to see family/friends. The Prime Minister could well be the first senior visitor to visit Hong Kong post-SARS: his visit would be seen as a strong vote of confidence in Hong Kong's future and would be very welcome to the community, including to the many British businesses based there.

On the proposed <u>business delegation</u>, for Japan we and TPUK do not now believe that there is a strong enough case to justify an accompanying business party. The visit will be short and the commercial element relatively small (a buffet reception). We will ensure however that trade and investment issues are covered within the



programme where possible and that the Prime Minister gets to meet key investors and business partners. If the Prime Minister's itinerary allows him to attend the Innovation in Business Round table, then it is likely that some companies would send top executives from the UK. For China, there continues to be a strong case for inviting a small party of top business leaders who have substantial China interests to accompany the Prime Minister. These would include the major Think UK sponsors. The group would attend Think UK events and some meetings with Chinese leaders, having a separate programme at other times. The commercial objectives remain as before. An additional objective would be to demonstrate continued top-level commitment to China from UK business despite SARS. We do not think an accompanying business delegation would be justified on Plan B.

As before, we would be grateful for guidance on whether <u>Mrs Blair</u> would accompany the Prime Minister on any part of the visit. We would be happy to put together programmes to suit her personal and/or professional interests.

We would welcome, as early as possible, suggested dates for a recce visit.

As a post-script you might like to note two other events in the region in July. John Howard, Australian Prime Minister, will be in Tokyo immediately before the Prime Minister's visit. Pacific Nuclear Transport Limited (a subsidiary of BNFL) will be arriving in Japan with a High Level Waste shipment on 20 July. This is part of regular commercial activity between the nuclear industries of the UK, France and Japan. There may be some protests by NGOs, particularly if the Prime Minister is still in Japan on 20 July. But we do not judge that this will have a significant impact on the visit.

Prime Minister's Visit to Japan, Korea, China and Hong Kong: Strategic Objectives, Core Programme Elements, Deliverables

As you know, we have been thinking further about the Prime Minister's visit of 22-28 April to East Asia. We have consulted posts and had informal meetings with you and other colleagues in No 10. Detailed below are our proposals on objectives and other factors affecting the programme overall. A draft itinerary and further details on programme elements and deliverables are contained in separate Annexes.

On strategic objectives, for Japan:

- To encourage Japan to be a full partner in global governance;
- To encourage structural reform in Japan and to profile the UK as a successful model;
- To re-confirm the UK as Japan's key partner in Europe, and Japan as the UK's key partner in Asia;
- To promote the interests of British business, in particular UK strengths in technological innovation; and to promote high value Japanese investment into the UK; to promote the UK as the preferred destination for Higher Education.

In Korea, the objectives would be:

- To build a strong relationship with the new South Korean President, an admirer of the Prime Minister; and
- To underline the strength of Britain's trade and investment interests in South Korea, and our commitment to supporting a peaceful resolution of the North Korean nuclear issue.

In China, there are three key objectives:

 To establish strong personal relations between the Prime Minister and China's new generation of leaders who will take power in March and are expected to dominate Chinese politics for the next decade, emphasising our desire to strengthen political, economic and commercial ties, and Britain's role as a partner for China;



- To emphasise our support for greater Chinese engagement on international issues, and our continued support for the reform process.
- To ensure a high-profile launch for Think UK, a public diplomacy initiative to raise awareness of the UK's creative and technological excellence among China's growing population of educated young professionals.

In Hong Kong, the objectives would be:

- To underline and renew HMG's political commitment to Hong Kong (and the Prime Minister's personal commitment) and its special status, reflecting our Joint-Declaration responsibilities, at a time when controversial national security legislation is being discussed;
- To encourage debate on further democratisation in Hong Kong
- To underline the continuing strength of the UK's commercial interests in, and through, Hong Kong
- To promote the UK as the preferred foreign destination for education and as a centre for creativity and innovation

An outline draft itinerary is contained in Annex 1. Details of the core events and deliverables for each leg of the visit are detailed in Annex 2. Both Sir David King and Lord Sainsbury will be making visits to the region prior to the Prime Minister's visit, which will prepare the grounds for substantial initiatives and deliverables.

In addition, there are a number of issues affecting the visit overall, which require some further explanation.

On major speeches, there are strong arguments for speeches in both Tokyo and Beijing, which would cover different themes. A speech to the Japanese Diet (National Parliament) would attract huge interest nationwide. It would deliver key messages on economic issues, the importance of reform, and the UK and Japan's roles in building an equitable international society (see detail in Annex 2). There would also be a strong case for a major foreign policy speech in Beijing, drawing on the fact of China's membership of the P5 and increasing international role. Besides topical references to eg Iraq it might focus on Asia, including Britain's active contribution to the region.

Hong Kong have made a strong bid for a speech by the Prime Minister to the business community. A large audience, probably several hundred, would be assured. The Prime Minister delivered a speech to a similar audience during his last visit. This time the subject matter of the speech could be a range of topics, but the Prime Minister could use the opportunity to restate the UK's (and his personal) commitment to Hong Kong.



On press handling, in Japan, the speech to the Diet, launch of Innovation UK, and Young People's Forum (see Annex for full details) will all attract media coverage. There would also be a small joint press conference to announce areas of agreement, following the talks with Prime Minister Koizumi. Ideally, we would also want to find time for an open-access press conference on wider issues. Alternatively, the Prime Minister could offer to brief Japanese journalists prior to departure. In China, all aspects of the visit will attract media coverage, with the focus on the official talks. We would expect these talks to be preceded by photocalls. We would also want the launch of Think UK to have a high media profile, and to ensure extensive coverage we would set aside time for interviews with the Chinese media while the Prime Minister is at Tsinghua University. We would develop a more detailed media strategy in the light of your reactions to our programme proposals.

We should be grateful for guidance on whether Mrs Blair will accompany the Prime Minister on any part of the visit. We will be happy to put together programmes in each country tailored around her personal and professional interests. These could include joint events with the Prime Minister or individual events, as she wishes.

There will be some other significant visitors to the region around the time.

President Chirac will be making one of his regular visits to Japan for a week in March at the time of the World Water Forum. But there is no intention on the French or Japanese side that Chirac should address the Diet or otherwise affect our proposals for the Prime Minister's visit.

A number of Heads of State and other senior political leaders (including Raffarin) are likely to be in <u>Beijing</u> during the time of the Prime Minister's visit, in order to attend the World Intellectual Property Organisation (WIPO) Summit. We are considering whether a joint event with Raffarin might be organised. We do not recommend that the Prime Minister get involved in the WIPO Summit. We have received assurances from the Chinese that their senior leaders will be available to meet the Prime Minister on the agreed dates.

The issue of an accompanying business delegation possibly led by Baroness Symons is being addressed separately by Trade Partners UK.

ANNEX 2: CORE EVENTS AND DELIVERABLES

JAPAN

(a) Core events

- Launch of Innovation UK: The venue is a spectacular high-tech museum (the Miraikan). There are two related elements. First would be the launch of Innovation UK, a joint FCO/TPUK/British Council initiative with private sponsorship projecting the UK as a leading innovator and promoting leading edge British technology business. The Prime Minister would need to make a short speech. The second element would be a demonstration of the results of UK/Japan collaboration in climate change modelling. The Miraikan features a huge computerised globe which depicts the earth as viewed from space. It can present the results of UK/Japan computer simulations of future global climatic patterns. This will create an opportunity for the Prime Minister to reinforce UK leadership on addressing climate change and serve as a backdrop to further agreements on environmental cooperation (see deliverables). On arrival or departure, the Prime Minister will also have the opportunity to look at Japan's fuel cell cars. (potential for future investment in the UK).
- Speech to the Diet: The Prime Minister would get a full house and nationwide coverage. It is the ideal platform to get across to decision makers and the wider public key messages on economic issues (structural reform, strengths of the UK and our place in Europe), creating opportunities (deregulation, community building, citizenship, government/busines/civil society partnerships) and how developed countries can promote and creating an equitable global society. Messages from a speech in the Diet will reach a wider Asian audience through the media.
- Reception for UK and Japanese Business Leaders: This would enable the Prime Minister to meet Japan's business leaders, top Japanese investors (including potential new investors) in the UK, British business active in Japan (possibly including some from an accompanying business delegation). Again, the Prime Minister would need to say a few words, including on the UK's position in Europe. We would create the opportunity for the Prime Minister to spend a few moments individually with those responsible for major contracts and investments.
- Young Peoples Forum: The British Council in Tokyo is a flagship operation focussed sharply on promoting education in the UK. 2003 is the fiftieth anniversary of the Council in Japan. The Prime Minister would mark this by taking part in a televised discussion at the Council with UK-educatedyoung leaders. Also an opportunity to promote the Chevening Programme which is expanding substantially in Japan.

- Talks and dinner with Prime Minister Koizumi: Koizumi will probably offer a short meeting followed by a working dinner. This will be an opportunity to enlist Koizumi's support for UK objectives on Iraq and other international security issues, to encourage greater Japanese contribution to the global agenda and to encourage Koizumi in his domestic reform programme. The meeting should also formally confirm agreements on ICT, and (if achieved) on environmental technology, and strategic S & T priorities. The two Prime Ministers' policy advisers will meet on 21 March, and will help prepare, as will visits to Japan by Sir David King and Lord Sainsbury.
- <u>Joint Press Statement</u> This will be a short joint press conference with Koizumi between talks and dinner, to announce areas of agreement. Koizumi's office would keep it brief. It would be open to accompanying media and international media accredited in Tokyo.

(b) Deliverables

Besides agreements on various areas of agreement on the bilateral/international agenda, we are working to agree endorsement by the two Prime Ministers on the following specifics:

- A Prime Ministerial agreement on ICT (building on Patricia Hewitt's earlier agreement with her Japanese opposite number) setting out the Prime Ministers' vision for developing the full potential of ICT.
- An agreement on collaboration in the field of environmental technology (especially
 environment friendly vehicles) pulling together current strands of activity and, if
 negotiable, including an endorsement of long term goals beyond 2010 to combat global
 warming. Also, commitment to tackle climate change at the G8 through new
 technologies; and a link up on UK / Japan emissions trading schemes.
- Agreement on a UK/Japan Joint Programme on Emerging Science and Technologies.
 This builds on the successful workshops launched in 2001 by Lord Sainsbury and the
 Japanese Chief Scientist and would launch a future programme of collaborative events
 bringing together top UK and Japanese scientists in strategic fields (including
 Bioinformatics, Tissue Engineering and Stem Cells, future Mobile Communications
 Technology and Renewable Energy).

KOREA

(a) Core events

- <u>Substantive meeting with President Roh</u>. An opportunity to build a personal relationship with Roh at a formative stage of his Administration (two months into a five-year term). He will probably offer a meeting followed by lunch. Key issues will be North Korea and trade/investment ties.



Meeting/photocall with UK veterans from the Korean War. The Prime Minister's visit coincides with the 50th Anniversary of the Armistice Agreement at the end of the Korean War.

(b) Deliverables

- Establishment of a good working relationship between the Prime Minister and the new President of Asia's third largest economy;
- Demonstration of UK concern and influence on the North Korean nuclear issue; and
- Presidential awareness of UK business interest and potential.

CHINA

(a) Core events

- Talks with the new generation of Chinese leaders. The Prime Minister will be among the first Western leaders to visit Beijing following the appointment of the new Chinese Government in March. The new Premier almost certainly Wen Jiabao, who the Prime Minister met in June 2000 is likely to offer a meal as well as talks. The Prime Minister's business delegation might be involved in the meal and/or part of the talks. The Prime Minister would also have a substantial session of talks with the new President, almost certainly Hu Jintao, who the Prime Minister met in October 2001.
- Launch of Think UK. Think UK is a major programme of events running from April to October 2003, aimed at bringing creative and innovative ideas from contemporary Britain to wider notice in China. It is intended to appeal to the growing, influential generation of young, educated professionals living in major cities. We recommend that the Prime Minister launch Think UK at the attractive campus of Tsinghua University, China's leading science and technology-oriented university. He would announce the launch of the initiative, and open one of the Think UK events, an exhibition on the UK's role in discovering the structure of DNA and in modern genetics. We would also recommend Tsinghua as the venue for interviews with leading Chinese media. The Prime Minister would also open a new BP Clean Energy Centre and profile extensive Sino-British cooperation in education. There would be the opportunity for a relaxed walk through the campus, and shirtsleeves contact with students.
- Attendance at the UK/China Forum. The Prime Minister and Premier Zhu Rongji launched the UK/China Forum on his last visit to China in 1998. This annual high-level event bringing together key influencers from the fields of business, culture, science and

the media will be held on 24/25 April, and involve members of the business delegation. We hope the Prime Minister would attend the closing session of the Forum, ideally in the company of the Chinese Premier, to show support for the Forum and endorse members' plans for its modernisation and future development.

• A speech on a foreign policy theme, perhaps with a focus on Asia, and Britain's active contribution to the region, as well as topical issues such as Iraq.

In Shanghai:

- Meeting with the Party Secretary and Mayor. To promote UK business interest in Shanghai
- <u>Major commercial event</u> with accompanying businessmen and the UK business community, the largest in China, and with Chinese business leaders.

In Sichuan:

- Brief meeting with Party Secretary and Governor of Sichuan. An opportunity to register our support for China's western development programme.
- Relaxed outing to <u>Leshan Giant Buddha</u> through pleasant scenery. The Buddha, an eighth century masterpiece, stands 71m tall, and can be reached by boat. We also recommend that the Prime Minister visit the DfID-supported restructuring project at <u>Yongfeng bamboo paper mill</u>, which supports the livelihoods of 250,000 people.

(b) Deliverables

The key to the visit is the contact with the new generation of top Chinese leaders. But we are working on a number of specific deliverables:

- Signature of agreement on mutual establishment of Cultural Centue, which we hope will enable the British Council to operate in China in their own right, and offer English language teaching services for the first time.
- Significant media exposure to get Think UK off to a strong start, and to provide momentum to carry it through the following six months.
- Announcement of new legal reform and environmental programmes under the Global Opportunities Fund.
- Announcement of a new visa service in Chongqing.
- Several companies hope that the Prime Minister's visit will help bring commercial negotiations to maturity: Shell and Rolls-Royce's interests in the West-East Natural Gas



Pipeline; Airbus A340 and A380 sales to China Southern; P&O's US\$600m contract for the next phase of Qingdao port.

HONG KONG

- a) core events
- Meeting and meal with CH Tung: the best format is likely to be a short meeting with the Chief Executive followed by a working dinner. This will be an opportunity to reflect on the day's events, to remind CH Tung of Britain's continuing interest in, and commitment to, Hong Kong and to probe on key political issues. Foremost of these is likely to be controversial national security legislation which will then have been in the Legislative Council for two months. At time of writing many of our initial concerns about this legislation have eased but there may still be sticking points that the Prime Minister could discuss with Tung. This will also be an opportunity to lobby for an increased pace of democratic reform.
- Reception with Hong Kong Legislative Council (LegCo) members: It would not go down well if the Prime Minister visited Hong Kong and did not spend some time meeting LegCo members, some of whom are well-known for strong views on Hong Kong issues and British links with Hong Kong. The best format would be a short reception where the Prime Minister could say a few words and then mingle with legislators.
 - Football Event: with local sports dignitaries and young/school teams. Might best be
 done in conjunction with Newcastle United who are currently trying to enter the
 Chinese Premiership via "Hong Kong United". Would allow good photo
 opportunities and appeal to the key youth market.
 - Launch of new Rolls Royce car: Rolls Royce are launching their new marque in April. The Prime Minister might travel between two venues in a new car, to mark the launch. Although Rolls Royce cars may conjure up a traditional image of Britain, the new model highlights UK creativity and design. TPUK are content with this proposal.
 - Business lunch: Our preference is for a small roundtable lunch for about 20 guests from the British and local business community. The Prime Minister would need to say a few words which would be followed by a round-table discussion. Alternatively a luncheon speech to the British/General Chambers of Commerce, which would guarantee a large audience. A trade policy/commercial theme would be appropriate but not obligatory. The Prime Minister did give a speech to a business audience during his last visit in 1998.

• Education event: The UK is the foreign destination of choice for Hong Kong students and we have met, with the help of Dr Li Ka-shing, the Prime Minister's goal of expanding the Chevening Scholarship scheme in Hong Kong and mainland China by a third. (We propose to arrange a short one-to-one meeting with Dr Li in the margins of this event). The British Council's English Language Teaching operation in Hong Kong is their largest in the world and the Council are celebrating their 50th anniversary in Hong Kong this year. With this in mind, we suggest a roundtable at the British Council with Education Secretary Arthur Li and two young practitioners, one British, one local, in front of an invited audience. This could be followed by a short Q&A session. The event could be filmed in order to reach a wider audience. This would give the Prime Minister the opportunity further to promote the British education system and develop closer UK/Hong Kong education links: both systems face similar problems and challenges.

b) deliverables

The most important element of the visit is the visible manifestation of the Prime Minister's commitment to Hong Kong (during his 1998 visit he said publicly that "the commitment of Britain to Hong Kong, and my own personal commitment to Hong Kong, remains and will never, ever disappear"). Hong Kong continues to value the close links with the UK but needs reassuring that we continue to take a close interest in their affairs. The timing of the visit is important: contentious national security legislation will be going through LegCo when the Prime Minister is there. We have discreetly led international efforts to get the SAR Government to water down some of the more controversial of their legislative proposals.

The draft programme would also allow the Prime Minister to:

 Promote British commercial interests (by launching the new Rolls Royce marque in a key market)

Promote Newcastle United FC's plans to enter the Chinese Premiership via "Hong Kong United"

SALLY MORGAN

As I said at this morning's diary meeting, I think there is a very strong case for the Prime Minister to go to Washington in June to receive the Medal.

I think this rests less on the risk that memories of Iraq will be dimming in September (though that is a factor) than on the need for a PM/Bush bilateral in June – for which this is the ideal excuse.

We shall want to talk to Bush about Iraq and the MEPP well before the summer break: St Petersburg and Evian will not be substitutes for the Camp David/Chequers dialogues, which is where the PM really moves the issues forward. And Iraq and the MEPP may well need care and attention by mid June. We must try to get them right, not least for domestic political reasons.

So I very strongly favour a mid June speech to Congress and then a session with Bush (taking in Kofi on the way back if possible). The Medal could wait. Iraq and the MEPP can't.

VISIT TO NEWCASTLE CITY TENNIS CLUB - FRIDAY MAY 9TH

You will be making your second visit as a City Tennis Clubs Ambassador after your constituency visits. This time, the club is the sole venue in the North East, Walbottle Technology School.

The school itself is of average academic standards and is a poor, 40 year old building. The courts are similarly old. The CTC, however, has been in operation for the last year and is proving very popular, drawing young people from 6 local primary and secondary schools. It illustrates how the standard of coaching has more impact on participation rates than the quality of facility! We anticipate about 40 kids this Friday.

The visit will be similar to your first visit in Hackney - the facility consists of 3 outdoor courts. On the first court you walk onto, a coach will be playing minitennis with young kids. You will chat to the coach and then move to the second court where a group of older kids will be having balls fed to them. The play will stop and you will have a chance to talk to the kids. You will then walk to the other side of the same court and feed easy balls to the kids you had been chatting to. The coach will offer you the opportunity to play a proper rally with a single young person: you can decide then whether you feel up for it or not.

I am attaching some information about City Tennis Clubs, some detail about the Newcastle Club and some general tennis news.

Tennis Current Issues

- Our two key players have not performed well of late. Tim Henman has
 recently returned to action after a lengthy shoulder injury which
 required two operations, but has only won two ATP Tour matches
 since. He missed the Aussie Open and GB's defeat away to Australia
 in the Davis Cup. Greg Rusedski has not played since losing to
 Sampras at the US Open last year after a foot injury put him out of
 action. While he is not yet back on the tour the word is that he has fully
 recovered.
- This week the women's tour is in action in Berlin and the men are in Rome. Henman lost his first round match to Coria (Argentina) 2-6 2-6.
- Next Grand Slam is the French Open which begins on May 26th. Prediction? Henin-Hardenne or Clijsters to shock the Williams sisters and bring the title to Belgium.
- This week the LTA announced it had scrapped the National Championships as it no longer has no international relevance in terms of world ranking points and does nothing to help the GB players improve their international rankings.

Wimbledon news...

- Money is on Lleyton Hewitt or perhaps Roger Federer to win this year Federer is an exciting player who is ready to make the breakthrough in a Grand Slam after his Davis Cup heroics for Switzerland.
- There has been speculation that a temporary £5m roof could be constructed for Wimbledon 2004. There are no definite plans at the moment as the All England Club are concerned at the micro climate that a roof may produce.
- The LTA announced last month that GB players will for the first time have to qualify to win their wild cards for Wimbledon rather than just receiving them. A tournament between the players will decide three of this years wild cards.







The Lawn Tennis Association launched the first City Tennis Clubs in June 2001, in Hackney, to give people the chance to play tennis, regardless of social background. The programme focuses on the regeneration of park or school courts in inner cities and deprived areas to ensure tennis can be played in a safe environment, at an affordable price and with qualified coaches on hand to help.

The programme provides access to courts from as little as £1 and has proved to be a fantastic success, with 23 Clubs up and running already and more than 50 local councils applying for accreditation. In London alone, the six CTCs are enabling 4,500 kids a week to play tennis in urban areas and enjoy regular weekly coaching sessions and events.

To date the City Tennis Club programme has awarded £270,000 to establish coaching activities throughout Great Britain and £250,000 to improve and upgrade poorly run down courts. In total half million pounds has been invested in deprived areas where there has been under provision of public tennis clubs.

The LTA works with local councils to ensure long-term use of the courts. Club membership includes lively adult and junior programmes and, in conjunction with other local clubs, access to indoor tennis courts. Most of the clubs also offer Mini-Tennis - the colourful, fun-packed game, specially designed to grow with kids as their skills develop.



The story here is that you may remember that I wanted to do this a year ago - but you demurred as it happened quite rightly because it was premature - However things moved on and the associate in my office Frank Tillotson who was looking at the issue for me - shown below - moved back to the Hill and is now because of staff changes one of the senior Counsel on the House Banking Committee. Its the House Banking Committee that runs with this issue because it has jurisdiction over the US Mint -because not only is there a Gold Medal but there are a number of gold coins struck to commemorate the event.

The second strand of this tale is that Allison Butera - the daughter of one of my partners is a v senior advisor to Libby Dole - she was attending a staff meeting a few weeks ago when the subject of the PM came up and she remembered that I had been keen on the medal the year before. She mentioned it at the meeting and was told to research the subject. She contacted Frank and they went ahead together. It will be over v quickly with unanimous approval by voice vote in each House. What amazes me that she to young people are barely 30 - it demonstrates the power of the Hill staffers.

I dont know what you think but I thinks its a geat opportunity for the PM to espouse the Blair Doctrine at the jt session where the medal is presented. I watched Mandela doing it and it was electrifying.

On the Senate signatures you have got all of the big names including Daschle so thats good. Its going to be a great event





SENATE EFFORTS TO RECOGNISE THE PRIME MINISTER

Senator Dole called me this morning to let me know that she would be introducing legislation to have the Prime Minister awarded the Congressional gold medal. This is a huge honour – it has only been awarded around 300 times in US history – and only 17 times to non-Americans (including Winston Churchill and Mother Theresa). The legislation should pass – if the Prime Minister accepted it, he would be expected to accept it in the Congressional Rotunda, and make a speech to members of Congress and the President.

Perhaps more problematically, Senator Nighthorse Campbell's office have also approached us to say that they want to introduce legislation to make the Prime Minister an honourary US citizen. You will doubtless have views about the desirability of this.

YOUR DIARY

PRIME MINISTER

You are right that there are 2 main problems: the predominance of international activity - (and I fear you will want more fixed) – and the lack of a significant domestic agenda and events up to the summer recess. This reflects the fear expressed to you by John Reid, Alan Milburn et al that all your time will be taken up with the post Iraq international order/Europe/Northern Ireland/Middle East and that there will not be a similar drive and coherence to the domestic scene.

You want to have more thinking time, and to concentrate on the significant areas. We need to change our decision making to help this process. I recommend that we move to a much tighter diary meeting, the results of which are cleared with you personally. (At present we have a large meeting in which proposals come forward from anyone and decisions are not structured enough. Added to which the usually junior policy people present earnestly believe that you really do want to do their speech/event because you said you did and they have already half committed you to these.)

Departmental stocktakes have carried on pretty well in your absence. I recommend that we continue with the new system and that you dip in and out occasionally otherwise the diary becomes cluttered with these - and though

they began as a useful innovation, they have lost their edge. It is often more useful for you to have a personal meeting with the relevant Cabinet Minister.

On the domestic front your top priorities are, I think:

- Education and health: access and excellence. We need a narrative to explain our public services ambitions and ethos, and we need to take any remaining significant policy decisions.
- Crime and asylum: you need to see through the drive on asylum and keep a
 close eye on the crime and ASB agenda. You also need to maintain personal
 contact with the police.
- Euro: needs to be sorted in the next couple of weeks.
- Civil Service Reform: an internal rather than a public agenda, but essential to give personal attention to this one.

If you agree with the above priorities we can attempt to tailor the diary to meet these. We will also give you more empty slots.

In addition we have to protect your political time. This means deciding what you want out of your old Monday and Thursday political and strategy meetings. Is the cast list right?

Pat also put to you recommendations for changing your contact time with MPs which are being taken forward. This will mean time on Mondays in the House of

Commons and we should evaluate the changes before the summer recess.

CRIME FOR SUN INTERVIEW

On <u>asylum</u> our relentless focus is on halving the number of asylum applications in Britain by September – as the most effective way of eradicating abuse in our asylum system.

We have turned the corner with applications falling by 25 per cent after the introduction of the Nationality, Immigration and Asylum Act (Dec 2002 compared to Oct 2002).

We've got tougher rules, tighter borders and a more efficient system than ever before. We are moving UK immigration controls to France. We have secured the Channel Tunnel and we're using high-tech x-ray and other detection equipment in Calais and other ports to search lorries coming to the UK. The number of clandestines getting through to Dover has more than halved. Removals of failed asylum seekers are at record levels.

But there's no room for complacency. We must keep up our defences. This month we've extended to seventeen the number of countries to which we will return failed applicants without a right of appeal in the UK and for other cases we are piloting a fast-track approach which will deal with cases end to end in 28 days with the applicant held in detention throughout.

On <u>crime</u>. We met our pledge to get street crime under control by last September. Sir John Stevens called it the most successful anti-crime initiative he'd ever known [check]. Robbery and snatch theft were down 17% in the 12 months to March compared to the year before and it's still falling – down x% in London last month. And burglary (down 11% since 2001) and vehicle crime (down 17%) are falling too – according to the BCS.

But what the street crime initiative has told us is that we need to do more than improve police performance. We need to get the whole CJS working together – on the side of the victim not the defendant. The CJ Bill currently going through Parliament will be the biggest overhaul of our CJS in a generation. We expect some tough debates in the Lords. Changing the rules on showing previous convictions to the jury and on double jeopardy; lowering the age at which we can drug test offenders; a presumption that drug addicted criminals should accept treatment or be remanded in custody. None of this will be easy. But we must send a clear signal that we are rebalancing the system.

On <u>anti-social behaviour</u> too, we are giving the police and local councils tough new powers to protect local communities from graffiti, noisy neighbours, drug dealers and harassment. New powers to board up crack dens; fixed penalty fines for parents who allow their children to truant; new controls on air guns. We have published our Bill and white paper. Soon we will be showing how we will deliver real change on the ground.

Police numbers: as of September 2002, have reached a new high of 131,548, far outstripping - by six months - the Home Secretary's target of 130,000 by the end of the month. These officers are being backed up by 1,281 community support officers for the first time.

The 12 months to September 2002 saw a rise of 4,337 officers (+3.4%) - the largest 12-monthly increase in police numbers since 1976. Since March 2000, police strength has increased by 7,378, a total increase of 6%.

POSSIBLE PM VISIT TO IRAQ

VISIT TO RAF LEUCHARS, 15 APRIL

PRIME MINISTER

You are due to visit RAF Leuchars from 1250 to 1400 tomorrow. The attached MoD brief gives background on the station, the Operational Welfare Package and general welfare issues.

Two RAF squadrons, No 43 and No 111, operate from Leuchars. Fourteen Tornado F3 aircraft (39 aircrew, 98 groundcrew) were deployed to Saudi Arabia on 4 March, initially to cover the Southern No Fly Zone, then in Operation TELIC. Between 18 March and 9 April they flew 159 sorties, totalling nearly 1000 flying hours. Six aircraft returned to Leuchars on 10 April, the remaining eight with return on 16 April. An additional 48 regular and 60 reservist personnel from the station are deployed in the Gulf.

Key points in the Operational Welfare Package are:

- Mail: free postal service for family to send packages up to 2kg from Thursday 17 April. Mail and "e-blueys" delivered throughout operational area.
- Telephones: ban on use of satellite phones (for operational security reasons) lifted on 8 April. Roll-out of internet and phone cabins to start in next 2-3 days.
- Forces radio and TV: short-wave radio available throughout Iraq, FM up to Basra, TV in southern Iraq.
- Mobile shops deployed.
- Concessionary travel arrangements (including for families) in place.

WELFARE INPUT FOR PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT TO RAF LEUCHARS

WELFARE ISSUES

General Policy

MOD recognises the important contribution Service families make to Defence. The aim is to manage the issues of dependent family members with care recognising the special circumstances of Service families, especially at this current time.

Operational Welfare Support

The primary aim of welfare support is to maintain and strengthen the morale of Service personnel by making fullest possible provision for their emotional and physical well being. Welfare support is provided in both the operational theatre and the home base. In the home base this is undertaken by unit rear parties and by stations and garrisons which also encompasses the provision of more specialist support.

The Army and the RAF both have web pages available on the internet giving up to date advice on matters connected with OP TELIC, including welfare support advice.

Operational Welfare Package

The Operational Welfare Package (OWP) has been implemented, although not all aspects of OWP can be delivered all the time and there will be some serials that will take time to come on line. Operational demands take priority and OWP will follow where time space and transport allows. The current situation is:

- Mail & e-blueys are being delivered throughout the operational area (e-blueys will be received by the BFPO terminal in Kuwait, up to 9600 a day, and then delivered forward). Note: the MOD will introduce a free postal service for letters and packets of up to 2kg to individuals serving in the Gulf from Thursday 17 April. This service is designed for close family and friends. However families have been urged to limit the number of packages they send so that the system works for all. They have also been advised not to send perishable goods, fragile items, heavy or bulky items, everyday essentials (all basic toiletries are provided in theatre), magazines containing pictures that might offend the cultural values of host nations. Post Offices have been advised not to accept packets or parcels above 2kg in weight as larger parcels could significantly impact on the delivery of essential equipment and supplies.
- Newspapers delivered, (approximately 2 –3 days although this will improve as more airports are opened up).
- Telephone There is extensive availability, throughout the operational area, of hand held satellite phones (The ban on the use of satellite phones for OPSEC reasons was lifted on 8 Apr). Last Thursday there were 200,000 connected minutes recorded.

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<u>Support for Regular Reserves</u> Regular reserves are affiliated to a local unit to provide immediate support for their family.

<u>Stress Counselling</u> All Service personnel receive briefings on stress and the signs to watch out for. Where signs of stress are observed then the individual is referred to the medical officer who will arrange for counselling as necessary.

<u>Dangerously III Forwarding of Relatives (DILFOR)</u> Up to two persons (one of whom must be a close relative) may be officially invited, on medical recommendation, to visit VSI and SI personnel in hospitals at public expense for up to 7 days extendable to 10 days on medical advice. (In exceptional circumstances this can be extended beyond 10 days and to support more than 2 people).

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accommodation, the length of the relationship and no legal spouse; the decision on eligibility would be based on a broad assessment of the substance of the relationship and not all of these criteria would need to be met for entitlement to exist.

Retention of Service Family Accommodation (SFA) after Bereavement. A Service family is automatically entitled to remain in SFA for 6 months after the death of a spouse in service. This can be extended to 9 months (and in some circumstance further extensions will be given). Each case is dealt with individually and sensitively. The needs of the family are paramount with discussions on future housing arrangements being raised at an appropriate time. Accommodation charges will continue to be raised at the same rate as before the death (i.e. the family will not be charged the market rate). Relocation costs are paid for by the MOD. The policy has been reviewed recently to ensure that it is still appropriate in light of experiences gained from OP TELIC.

Service Family Task Force Issues (non operational)

The Service Families Task Force was created in 1998 following the Strategic Defence Review. It was set up to address the problems caused by Service families' mobility that are not within the Ministry of Defence's control. Current situation on issues of concern to families:

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To give the Service Families the best accommodation that can be afforded, the DHE has an extensive ongoing Upgrade Programme. The Upgrade Programme target for the year to end on 31st March was 1200 upgrades, but DHE is on course to exceed this by 200 upgrades. As a result about half of the DHE's total long-term stock is now at Standard 1 for Condition, with some 90% at either Standard 1 or Standard 2.

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Station personnel currently on Op TELIC deployment number 328 with another 50 on other operational tours, of these there are some 107 home alone families where the serving spouse is away on duty.

THE SOVEREIGN'S PARADE, THE ROYAL MILITARY ACADEMY SANDHURST, FRIDAY 11 APRIL 2003

You have been asked by The Queen to represent her at this year's Sovereign's Parade at Sandhurst tomorrow. Not surprisingly there is a lot of interest in your visit; this is the first time during the Gulf War you have publicly addressed the military - 469 cadets will be on parade, 206 of which are passing out, some of whom will be deployed to the Gulf next week. Also although it is the norm for a representative of Her Majesty to act as the Reviewing Officer, (last year they had CDS and HRH The Duke of York) it is rare for a Prime Minister to fulfil the role (only Thatcher, Heath and Macmillan before you) (See Flag A).

The event itself is brilliantly organised and will run like clockwork. A couple of protocol issues

- it is fine to wear a lounge suit
- at certain points during the parade you will be saluted and will need to respond, the appropriate acknowledgement is to nod.

You will travel by car with David Manning (50 minutes with bikes), arriving at 1030 and departing at 1245. You will be met by the Commandant, General Andrew Ritchie who will escort you inside Sandhurst's Government House to have coffee for thirty minutes with fifty or so guests. They will include Mike Jackson's wife and sister, the great and the good of the military, some Ambassadors representing those overseas cadets passing out, and some parents (including the parents of overseas cadets who financially support Sandhurst. There are 46 overseas cadets from places such as Saudi, Yemen and Lithuania). (See Flag C). This will all be private.

Once all the guests have taken their seats at the parade, you and the Commandant will travel in your car to King's Walk, the line of route to the parade. You and the Commandant, flanked by the ADCs, will proceed up to the saluting dais (FULL PRESS). You should stand in the centre of the dais, with the Commandant next to you and the cadets in front. Guests, including David Manning, will be seated in stands either side of you and the press will be in a pen to your right. The cadets will make a General Salute, which you should acknowledge by a nod of the head. The Adjutant, on his horse, will start the Parade and ask your permission for the Junior Divisions to stand at ease – again you should nod. (See full programme at Flag D).

You will then be escorted by the Commandant to make your inspection of the Parade. You should stop and chat to the cadets, say at every other group, and try to include the whole group when you do. The inspection should take no more than 25 minutes (PRESS).

You return back to the dais and the cadets will march past saluting.

You will then give a speech from the dais for five minutes – there is no lectern so you shouldn't use your script. There are some **suggested words attached.**

Afterwards you will present The Sword of Honour and The Queen's Medal (literally a sword and a medal) to Damien Flanagan, aged 24. It is very unusual for one cadet to win both awards. You will also present the Overseas Sword to the best overseas cadet, Guintaras Statkauskas from Lithuania (see final page of brief).

You will then receive a final salute and the Adjutant will ride forward to ask your permission for some of the cadets to march off Parade. This is when the Adjutant rides up the steps of the Old College opposite with the cadets following. The remainder of the Parade will present arms and you should nod again. You will then be asked permission to march the remainder off Parade – again nod. Once the Parade is clear you can walk across the to the Grand Entrance of the Old College, and join a reception in the Wellington room.

You should stay here for thirty minutes and the Commandant will escort you at all times (See guest list at Flag G). You should be aware that you have had to pull out of the lunch after the parade due to your heavy schedule and although they understand they are disappointed. You should be back at No10 by 1345.

FURTHER DIARY REQUESTS

I have two more diary requests. We should get back as quickly as we can on the first.

Australian Prime Minister John Howard has asked to meet the Prime Minister on 5/6 May. Howard will be returning from seeing Bush at Crawford. On Iraq Australia is a key ally, both internationally and on the ground, and Howard has been very helpful on Zimbabwe. **I recommend a substantive meeting**. If the Prime Minister is at Chequers on Bank Holiday Monday (5 May) a meeting there, perhaps lunch, would go down well with the Aussis. Alternatively, perhaps breakfast on 6 May + press conference, as when they last met.

Shaikh Khalifa Bin Zayed (KBZ), Crown Prince of Abu Dhabi will be visiting the UK from 3-6 June. KBZ will succeed his father as Ruler of Abu Dhabi and will probably become the next President of the UAE. He rarely pays official visits abroad, so this is something of an opportunity. Apparently last September the Prime Minister agreed in principle to see KBZ should he decide to visit. I recommend a 15 minute drop-in, hosted by the Foreign Secretary.

PRIME MINISTER'S DIARY

It would be helpful to have decisions on the following diary requests.

Singapore Prime Minister Goh. Will be in London 9-11 May. Unlike regional neighbours, Singapore has been very supportive on Iraq. It is also important to tackling regional counter-terrorism. Eurofighter is bidding for the contract for Singapore's fighter fleet (long term up to £6 billion, 5,000 jobs). Goh last visited the UK in April 2002, when he met the Prime Minister. **Recommend 20 minute drop in**.

Global Launch of the 2003 Human Development Report. Independent report on meeting the Millennium Development Goals. Usually launched by a Head of State/Government (e.g. Fox, Chirac in recent years). Clare will be involved and would like the Prime Minister to do this. Recommend short speech to launch the report and open a seminar with Mark Malloch Brown (UNDP Administrator) and Sakiko Fukudo-Parr (Report author), developing country people and high profile figures e.g. Bono and Jeffrey Sachs. 1 hour total including travel to central London venue.

China-Britain Business Council Conference on Business. The PM spoke at a similar conference following his China visit and this would be a good chance to give the business community some attention before the July visit. It's at the QE2 centre. We owe Charles Powell an answer on this. Recommend short speech and then Q&A in the vein of the FCO leadership conference, 1 hour total.

There is also the proposed <u>Interview with Israeli Hebrew mass circulation daily Yediot Achronot</u> to tackle current Israeli briefing against the Prime Minister/UK and deliver messages on the Roadmap and peace process. You and David have already agreed the Prime Minister should do this. The Embassy in Tel Aviv

strongly recommend doing this for the Passover Holiday edition (which is read by up to two-thirds of the Israeli population). Katie, can you find a half hour slot between now and the morning of Monday 14 April?

BREAKFAST TO LAUNCH NEW RIGHTS FOR WORKING PARENTS: MONDAY 7th APRIL

On Monday morning (7:50) you and Patricia Hewitt are hosting a breakfast to launch new rights for working parents. The rights come into effect on Sunday but Monday is the first working day.

The new measures include:

- The right for parents of children under 6 and disabled children under 18 to apply to work flexibly.
- Increase to 26 weeks paid maternity leave and additional 26 weeks unpaid.
- Increase in statutory maternity pay to £100 per week.
- 2 weeks paid paternity leave.
- Adoption leave.

12 companies with good work-life balance initiatives have been invited. They will each bring an employee who will benefit, and their child. There will be a crèche for the children. Supporters such as CBI, TUC and Fathers Direct will also be represented.

You will be at the breakfast for 25 minutes, the first part of which will be taken up with photography and a clip for broadcast media. Afterwards you will have a short opportunity to mingle with the guests. Cherie will attend the end of the event.

What the Government is doing to promote work-life balance

New changes from 6 April:

- Flexible working parents have the right to apply to work flexibly. Employers have a duty to consider their requests seriously and will be able to refuse requests only where there is a clear business reason. Applies to children aged under 6 and disabled children under 18.
- Increase in statutory maternity pay to £100 per week (from £75).
- Increase in maternity leave from 18 to 26 weeks paid and an extra 26 available unpaid.
- 2 weeks paid paternity leave.
- Reforming the tax credit system
- Child Tax Credit (CTC) and childcare element of Working Tax Credit (WTC) will be paid to the main carer, usually the mother.
- 9 out of 10 families with children expected to be eligible for CTC which will combine with Child Benefit to deliver up to £54.10 a week in support for first child, compared to £27.70 a week in April 1997.
- A family with two children and a combined income of less than £50,000 are guaranteed £37.20 a week.

What we've already done:

- Parental leave parents have a right to take up to 13 weeks unpaid leave in the child's first 5 years.
- Time off for dependants all employees have the right to unpaid time off work to deal with an emergency involving a dependant.
- Free early education all 4 year olds and 70% of 3 year olds have access to free early education places (guaranteeing a place for every 3 year old by next April).
- Childcare places created new childcare places for over a million children (on target for places for 1.6 million children next year).
- Funding for out of school childcare including breakfast clubs, after school and all year round holiday provision.
- Sure Start childcare, education and health services for young children and their parents in deprived areas.

IRAQ: PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT TO ALDERSHOT AND RAF LYNEHAM

As you know, the Prime Minister visited the Army garrison at Aldershot and the RAF base at Lyneham this afternoon. He will be writing to the base commanders to thank them. Many thanks for the briefing.

The members of the Armed Forces and their families whom the Prime Minister met were extremely welcoming. He was able to have a few words with all of them, on the progress of the military campaign and the challenges ahead. Many of the RAF personnel at Lyneham had just returned from the Gulf. Most of the family members were strongly supportive, with many complaining about anti-war demonstrators and UK media coverage.

But a few family members – especially at Aldershot - had gripes. Many of these were about communications. The Prime Minister set out the forthcoming changes to the parcel service, which were universally welcomed, and the operational security constraints on phone calls etc. Many wives wanted to know when their husbands would be home. One or two complained about equipment and pay. The base commander will follow these up.

I am copying this letter to Kara Owen (FCO), John Scarlett and Desmond Bowen (Cabinet Office).

10 Transport Regiment (Royal Logistic Corps)

10 Transport Regiment is part of 102 Logistics Brigade but is assigned to 101 Logistics Brigade and is providing trucking support to transport supplies and equipment between Kuwait and deployed forces in Iraq.

9 Parachute Squadron (Royal Engineers)

9 Parachute Squadron is part of 16 Air Assault Brigade and is deployed in the Rumaylah Oilfields, maintaining security of the oilfields, and North West of Basra.

4 General Support Medical Regiment (Royal Army Medical Corps)

4 General Support Medical Regiment is part of 102 Logistic Brigade but is assigned to 101 Logistic Brigade. It transports patients from the initial basic surgical stations and dressing points to the Field Hospitals in Iraq and Kuwait.

22 Field Hospital

Equipment and supporting personnel (some 20 personnel) from 22 Field Hospital, necessary to establish a 25 Bed Military Facility, were deployed to Kuwait prior to the commencement of operations to ensure sufficient

medical capability in theatre prior to the arrival of 33 Field Hospital. This capability was absorbed into 33 Field Hospital which has become the in theatre reserve and which is due to return to the UK with effect from 5 April.

101 Logistics Brigade

Elements of 101 Logistics Brigade are already deployed into Iraq with 102 Logistics Brigade. See above. HQ 101 Logistics Brigade is due to roule with 102 Logistics Brigade in May and will then form the Headquarters element of the Joint Force Logistic Component (JFLogC). The JFLogC is based in Kuwait and co-ordinates all in theatre logistic support.

Military District Hospital (Frimley Park)

Personnel from the Military District Hospital are deployed as augmentees to various units in the Gulf.

VISIT TO SERVICE FAMILIES, ALDERSHOT GARRISON HQ AND RAF LYNEHAM, THURSDAY 3 APRIL 2003

Tomorrow afternoon you and Cherie are meeting with families of Army and RAF units taking part in operations in the Gulf. Both visits will be low key and informal, and the meetings with the families will be private. The MOD recommended Aldershot and Lyneham to complement visits already undertaken by members of the Royal Family. Hopefully you will be able to visit the Marines/Navy next week, giving a bit of a gap between their visits from the Royals. (Infact since this advice the Princess Royal has visited Lyneham and Prince Charles is due to visit Aldershot next week).

1400-1500 MEET FAMILIES, OFFICERS' MESS, ALDERSHOT GARRISON, HOSPITAL ROAD, ALDERSHOT

You will arrive at the Mess separately. Cherie will arrive by car with Kathryn, Angela and Angela's son Joseph and will be met by Lieutenant Colonel Jack Matthews and Captain Dougie Devlin, Welfare Support Officer. The PM will arrive by helicopter and be met by Colonel Stephen Oxlade, Garrison Commander (POOLED) and transferred by car to the Mess to meet the Lieutenant Colonel and the Captain (POOLED).

You will both be taken upstairs to have a relaxed cup of tea with between fifty and eighty family members of Army personnel, including children. You will have 50 minutes with them and the whole thing will be private. Dougie Devlin, the Welfare Officer will escort the PM and Colonel Stephen Oxlade will escort Cherie. Gerald Howarth, the local MP, will also be present.

Each group will be accompanied by a Unit Welfare Officer who will be able to introduce you to the family members. There will be families of frontline soldiers such as the Royal Horse Artillery out in Southern Iraq, as well as families of Engineers, Medical and Transport Regiments and MOD nurses and doctors. It seems the families' main concerns are communications/information related; they will express their concerns over the phone and postage systems – you can inform them of your announcement today at PMQs that when operational requirements permit, postage will be free.

You should also know there have been no major casualties from Aldershot.

You will depart together by helicopter. Angela will escort Kathryn and Joseph back to London.

1535-1635 MEET FAMILIES AND SERVICE PERSONNEL AT RAF LYNEHAM

You will be met by Station Commander Ray Lock and his wife Sarah and escorted briefly into a private room where you can freshen up and sign the visitors' book. You will then travel in cars to the 24 and 30 Squadrons' Crewroom Bar to meet around sixty service personnel.

NB. A Carlton camera crew, filming a documentary on Lyneham and Peter Stodhart and Nick Danziger will have some access throughout the visit, but only the arrival shots will be released.

You will spend 20 minutes with the service personnel; the PM escorted by Ray Lock and Cherie by Sarah Lock. You will meet aircrew who have flown Hercules to the Gulf delivering equipment, troops and missiles; you will also meet engineers, suppliers and ops and admin staff some of whom will have been to the Gulf, others are on stand by. There will also be NHS recruited auxiliaries who provide medical support for the injured in the Gulf, including Basra, and escort them via Cyprus to hospitals back home. James Gray, the local MP and leading campaigner of the Save Lyneham group, will be present.

You will then have another twenty minutes with the families in their community centre on the Lyneham site. This will be very relaxed and informal, and will not only include the families of the servicemen and women in the Gulf but also those RAF deployed in Kabul, Bosnia and the Falklands. Their concerns will be similar to the families at Aldershot.

Have done all we can to minimise risk of these sorts of tragedies. Will continue to look at ways of reducing the risks further. But cannot eliminate them from the heat of battle.

We will look after all the families of those bereaved.

When will our partners come home?

Will do all we can to make this operation as short as possible. Cannot give any guarantees.

ARMY UNITS - ALDERSHOT

Aldershot Garrison, often described as the 'Home of the British Army', is one of the larger garrisons within the UK. It is home to some 3,500 service personnel and some 4000 dependants, of which approximately 400 families are affected by current operations in the Gulf ("Op TELIC", the operation name which both service personnel and their families are likely use during the visit). Several formation Headquarters, including HQ 4 Division, and a number of logistic and mechanised infantry units are based at the Garrison. It also serves as the Army's Centre of Sporting Excellence. The area represents 28% of the land in Rushmoor Borough Council. The total employment level attributable to the presence of Aldershot Garrison is estimated to be in the order of 8,800 jobs, nearly 20% of total employment with the Borough. The unemployment rate with Aldershot and the immediate surrounding area is 1.5%.

In addition to barracks and technical accommodation there are also families quarters and other support infrastructure. Although the Garrison dates back to the 1850s much of it was rebuilt in the 1960s and early 1970s and redevelopment has continued throughout the Army's occupation. The most recent addition was Mons Barracks, opened by Mr Hoon in March 2003. A large number of new houses for service families have been built over the last few years. (See "housing" below)

The Ministry of Defence has recognised the poor quality of the accommodation within the Garrison and intend to progressively redevelop it under "Project Allenby/Connaught" (see below). Work (valued at £2.2M) has already been undertaken to address theworst of the failings of the single living accommodation and has improved some of the worst examples however it is unlikely that further improvements will be made prior to the Project Allenby/Connaught coming on-stream.

The following Aldershot-based units have deployed on operations in the Gulf:

- 7 Parachute Regiment Royal Horse Artillery; operating in S.Iraq
- 10 Transport Regiment Royal Logistic Corps, based in Kuwait, operating in S. Iraq
- 9 Parachute Squadron Royal Engineers, operating in S. Iraq
- 4 General Support Medical Regiment Royal Army Medical Corps
- 22 Field Hospital Royal Army Medical Corps (HQ only, now back in UK)
- 101 Brigade (elements of the logistic brigade deploying)
- Military District Hospital Unit Frimley Park, across the Gulf region

Their recent operational history is shown below:

7 Parachute Regiment: Bosnia 1996, 1997 Kosovo 1999 Sierra Leone 2000 Macedonia 2001 Afghanistan 2002

10 Transport Regiment RLC:Op Granby (1st Gulf War) Bosnia 1995, 1999

Kosovo 2001/2002 (this unit has a large Gurkha contingent, Queens Own Gurkha Logistic Regiment)

9 Parachute Squadron Bosnia 1998 Macedonia 2001 Afghanistan 2001, 2002

4 General Support Medical Regiment: Afghanistan 2002-ongoing (formed in 2000)

22 Field Hospital RAMC: Op Granby (1st Gulf War), Angola 1995 Bosnia 1995/1996 Kuwait 1998/1999 Kosovo 1999, 2002 and at present

Military District Hospital Unit: no specific deployments as a unit but staff have been detached to assist in all major operational deployments since formation (e.g. Sierra Leone, Former Republic of Yugoslavia.)

Project Allenby/Connaught

Under Project Allenby/Connaught it is intended to refurbish and redevelop Aldershot (Connaught) and around Salisbury Plain (the Tidworth, Bulford, Warminster and Netheravon conurbation) (Allenby). This 30 year, £4Bn, contract will encompass not only the design and building of new facilities but also the service element (catering, cleaning, facilities management). The Project is currently determining its Preferred Bidder and it is hoped to achieved financial close by the end of 2003. The Project is intending to deliver the first accommodation elements in mid 2005. Under the Project substantial areas of land in Aldershot (the southern part of the Garrison) will be sold.

Housing

At Aldershot approximately half of the properties are at Standard 1 for Condition. Whilst there are no Upgrades planned for Aldershot at present, requirements for upgrading have been identified so that advantage can be taken of any available funds to target work through the Property Management programme (Quick Hit money). At present there is some turnover of properties due to the Welsh Guards moving to St Athan and the Coldstream Guards moving into Aldershot to replace them. The movement of 7 RHA to Colchester has been delayed until September due to their deployment on Op TELIC. Over the next year 12 Mech Bde will move to Bulford/ Tidworth. Whilst there are a number of empty Service family houses (11%) the majority of these are either waiting for units which are to be deployed into Aldershot Garrison in the near future or are awaiting agreed disposal.

ROYAL AIR FORCE (RAF) LYNEHAM

RAF Lyneham was established in 1941. It has played an important part in operations around the world since then. It is the home of four C130 transport aircraft squadrons: 24 and 30 Squadron operate the recently acquired C130J, while 47 and 70 Squadron operate the 35-year old C130K. 47 Squadron also has a small Flight of specialist crews and modified aircraft to support Special Forces.

Other units at Lyneham include: Headquarters Tactical Medical Wing (TMW), an Air Combat Service Support Unit; 47 Air Despatch Squadron, Royal Logistics Corps, which is an independent Army unit responsible for the preparation and despatch of all equipment, air delivered by the C130; and, the United Kingdom Mobile Air Movements Squadron (UKMAMS) which provides a range of facilities for the out-loading of aircraft from RAF Lyneham. All of these units are involved in current operations in the Gulf.

Lyneham's long-term future has been subject to a wider strategic review which includes Brize Norton and RAF St Mawgan. The outcome of the review has been postponed until the scale of current operations has reduced significantly (the Station has been told that "an announcement is likely in the New Year"). **Not for disclosure**: Lyneham is likely to be closed in around 2010, reflecting wider priorities with the introduction of new aircraft into service; personnel and aircraft would be relocated elsewhere. The Prime Minister should not be drawn on Lyneham's future. Additional material on the review is included below.

OPERATIONS UPDATE - SECRET

RETAINED UNDER SECTION 3 (4)

Major current deployments are shown on the attached map UBLIC RECORDS ACT

Elsewhere, one C130 is normally deployed at the Falkland Islands, but returned for higher priority tasks relating to the Gulf in January 2003; it will redeploy to the Falkland Islands when current operations allow. Other aircraft are undertaking training and support flight

Around 550 personnel are deployed on operations, with a further 140 engaged in providing emergency fire-fighting cover in the UK.

Housing

At Lyneham, there are 764 SFA; 629 of these units (82%) are Standard 2 for Condition, the remainder being Standard 3. The Upgrade programme for Lyneham has been delayed due to the uncertainty of the future of the base. DHE Lyneham enjoys a good working relationship with the Host RAF Unit. The DHE team at Lyneham includes 3 ex-Service personnel, the Lady Mayoress of the local town of Calne and a Special Constable, giving us a good perspective of all the Estates and Families needs. Lyneham is a 'Mixed Estate' with a number of privately owned properties abutting the main Estate. This arrangement is deemed a success - there is little or no dispute between the DHE occupants or the private

homeowners. Lyneham has a relatively few empty Service families houses (68 of 764 SFA or 9%). The requirement to retain supporting estates at Wroughton and Compton Bassett is currently under discussion with the Host unit, given that some Service personnel based at Lyneham are housed on these estates. Postings into and out of Lyneham are 'trickle' postings, therefore, not subject to block moves.

STRATEGIC REVIEW OF RAF BRIZE NORTON, RAF LYNEHAM AND RAF ST MAWGAN

Understand outcome of the review of Lyneham, Brize Norton and St Mawgan has yet to be announced. Recognise your frustration, but inappropriate to make such decisions at a time when personnel are engaged in operations in the Gulf.

Background

On 9 November 2001 the Minister for the Armed Forces, announced a Strategic Review of RAF Brize Norton, RAF Lyneham and the airfield (i.e. runway) at RAF St Mawgan. The Study was needed because the introduction of new more capable Air Transport (AT) and Air-to-Air Refuelling (AAR) aircraft will mean that fewer aircraft and support personnel are required. The new aircraft are planned to include the A400M, which will replace the C130K aircraft currently based at RAF Lyneham. The remainder of the AT/AAR fleet is based at RAF Brize Norton. St Mawgan airfield was included in the Review as this currently has spare capacity.

As far as RAF Lyneham was concerned the options considered were: additional military use, commercialisation and closure as a Strike Command station.

The review is complete but has yet to be presented to Ministers because of current operations in the Gulf. It had been previously indicated that an announcement would be made "in the New Year".

Should Lyneham close without an alternative military use for the site, around 2790 MOD posts (approximately 2550 Service and 250 civilian) would be lost from the Lyneham area. Of these, some 830 will go in any event as a result of the introduction of the A400M, with the remaining 1960 MOD posts (1690 Service and 270 civilian) being attributable to the actual closure of the base. The earliest Lyneham would close is 2010.

WELFARE ISSUES

General Policy

MOD recognises the important contribution Service families make to Defence. The aim is to manage the issues of dependent family members with care recognising the special circumstances of Service families, especially at this current time.

Operational Welfare Support

The primary aim of welfare support is to maintain and strengthen the morale of Service personnel by making fullest possible provision for their emotional and physical well being. Welfare support is provided in both the operational theatre and the home base. In the home base this is undertaken by unit rear parties and by stations and garrisons which also encompasses the provision of more specialist support.

The Army and the RAF both have web pages available on the internet giving up to date advice on matters connected with current operations in the Gulf, including welfare support advice.

1. Operational Welfare Package

The Operational Welfare Package (OWP) has been implemented, although not all aspects of OWP can be delivered all the time and there will be some serials that will take time to come on line. Operational demands take priority and OWP will follow where time space and transport allows. Note: There are severe limitations on the services offered to the manoeuvre forces in Iraq. The full package will be rolled out as soon as the operational situation allows. The current situation is:

- Mail & e-blueys are being delivered throughout the operational area although delays may occur in the forward areas (e-blueys will be received by the BFPO terminal in Kuwait, up to 9600 a day, and then delivered forward). Parcels up to 2kgs can be sent at the concessionary rate (inland UK parcel rate).
- Examining the early introduction of a free postal service for parcels for Service Personnel deployed on the current operations in the Gulf region. We are reviewing the means of overcoming the practical difficulties associated with a such a considerable logistical enterprise – both in terms of capacity and operational priorities. We will only be able to introduce this sort of service once the operations moves to a sustained phase.
- Newspapers delivered (where possible) including Gurkali newspapers from Kathmandu to static locations.
- Telephone, e-mail and internet are not currently generally available for OPSEC reasons (this is a commander's decision on a case by case basis and for that reason this facility is not currently available to anyone in 1 UK Armd Div). Internet and telephone cabins are in

place in Kuwait ready for activation and move forward into Iraq when the operational situation allows.

- Radio and TV is available in most static HQ locations outside Iraq and on some RN ships. In the sustained phase it would also be made available to forces in Iraq.
- · Concessionary family travel arrangements available:
 - Started from day 1 of current operations.
 - Overseas include return flights/Eurostar to UK (commensurate with tour length).
 - In UK extra warrants (commensurate with tour length) and entitlements in accordance with the OWP.
 - UK Foreign Exchange personnel families also served by Concessionary Allowance policy.
- Expeditionary Forces Institute (EFI) available in most static locations in Kuwait and Mobile EFI shops ready to deploy to Iraq.

During the Defence Secretary's visit to Colchester last week the following additional issues were raised:

- Support for events organised for families during operations:
 Currently many of the events organised for families of service personnel on operations are being funded by Regimental/unit funds. The issue is being urgently reviewed by the MOD to try and extend the Operational Welfare package to include access to public funds for units to arrange support activities for families.
- Support for Regular Reserves: Regular reserves are affiliated to a local unit to provide immediate support for their family. Action is being taken by the Army to ensure that the system is affective.
- Stress Counselling: All Service personnel receive briefings on stress and the signs to watch out for. Where signs of stress are observed then the individual is referred to the medical officer who will arrange for counselling as necessary.

<u>Dangerously III Forwarding of Relatives (DILFOR)</u> Up to two persons (one of whom must be a close relative) may be officially invited, on medical recommendation, to visit VSI and SI personnel in hospitals at public expense for up to 7 days extendable to 10 days on medical advice. (In exceptional circumstances this can be extended beyond 10 days and to support more than 2 people).

Armed Forces Pension Scheme (AFPS) AFPS benefits have been extended to unmarried partners of personnel, where there is a substantial relationship, whose deaths are attributable to service related to conflict; this is on an ex gratia basis given that time has not allowed amendment to the relevant Statutory Instruments. awarded to their unmarried partner. Eligibility to such benefits will be assessed against a set of criteria which would include financial dependence or interdependence, shared commitments such as mortgage, children, prime beneficiary of a will, shared accommodation, the length of the relationship and no legal spouse; the decision on eligibility would be based on a broad assessment of the

substance of the relationship and not all of these criteria would need to be met for entitlement to exist.

Retention of Service Family Accommodation (SFA) after

Bereavement. A Service family is automatically entitled to remain in SFA for 6 months after the death of a spouse in service. This can be extended to 9 months (and in some circumstance further extensions will be given). Each case is dealt with individually and sensitively. The needs of the family are paramount with discussions on future housing arrangements being raised at an appropriate time. Accommodation charges will continue to be raised at the same rate as before the death (i.e. the family will not be charged the market rate). Relocation costs are paid for by the MOD.

Service Family Task Force Issues (not related to operational issues)

The Service Families Task Force was created in 1998 following the Strategic Defence Review. It was set up to address the problems caused by Service families' mobility that are not within the Ministry of Defence's control. Current situation on issues of concern to families:

School Admissions – remains a priority issue. New DfES code of practice on School Admissions specifically refers to Service families and gives clearer guidelines to LEAs on how to treat Service families applying for in year admission. New MOD school liaison policy currently being implemented, should produce a more coordinated approach to LEAs and schools and enable issues to be resolved at the local level.

Waiting Lists – general problems with waiting lists in the NHS however Service families faced increased problems when moving between trust areas and finding that they moved to the bottom of a new waiting list. New guidelines issued to NHS Trust require them to take account of time spent on another trust's waiting list. (Currently this only applies to England. Discussions with devolved administrations are taking place).

2. NHS Dentists - there is a general shortage of NHS dentists within the UK although this varies between locations and in time as dentists are independent and can choose whether to take on NHS patients. There is a DH action team tackling this problem for England and dental appointments are available through NHS Direct who work to specific performance criteria. There is no simple solution to this problem although we are trying to seek improvement through local liaison, however this is not appropriate for all areas.

3. Housing

To give the Service Families the best accommodation that can be afforded, the Defence Housing Executive (DHE) has an extensive ongoing Upgrade Programme. The Upgrade Programme target for the year to end on 31st March was 1200 upgrades, but DHE is on course to exceed this by 200 upgrades. As a result about half of the DHE's total long-term stock is now at Standard 1 for Condition, with some 90% at either Standard 1 or Standard 2.

And there is an outstanding invitation to Koizumi to visit Chequers - he was scheduled to visit in the Autumn, but this was postponed. It would be awkward to turn him down.



Recommend Prime Minister visits RAF Lyneham and Army units in Aldershot in the next week or so. Visit to Royal Navy families at a later date.

You asked for advice on possible locations for the Prime Minister to visit the families of units taking part in operations in the Gulf.

We would recommend that the Prime Minister visit:

- the families of three Army units in Aldershot: 7 Royal Horse Artillery, 4 General Support Medical Regiment, and 10 Transport Regiment (Royal Logistic Corps), who are involved in providing essential support to combat units in the Gulf; and
- the families at RAF Lyneham, Wiltshire, where C130 transport aircraft are normally based. The aircrews themselves also provide support to operations around the world, such as Afghanistan.

The visits would also allow the Prime Minister to meet service personnel who have not deployed but are undertaking supporting roles in the UK. Depending on the Prime Minister's diary constraints, both locations could be visited in a single afternoon.

The units have been chosen to complement visits that have been undertaken by members of the Royal Family or Defence Ministers since the start of operations. The Prime Minister could undertake a separate visit to Royal Navy families at a later date.

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The Defence Secretary recommends that the Prime Minister adopt a very low-key approach to these visits. This approach would allow the Prime Minister to maximise his time with the families (who on balance are likely to favour minimal media intrusion). You might find it helpful to know that Mr Hoon was accompanied only by his Private Secretary and Protection Officer when he visited the families of 16 Air Assault Brigade in Colchester last week; no media took part in the visit.

If the Prime Minister is content with these proposals, we would be happy to provide contact details and briefing material to support the visits.

Reception to celebrate Jack Jones' 90th birthday

We are holding a reception here at No 10 on Monday 31 March, 5.30 - 7.00 pm, to celebrate the 90^{th} birthday of Jack Jones. You are attending at 6.00 pm and will be asked to say a few words.

Following the reception, Granada TV, Rodney Bickerstaffe and Ian McCartney are hosting a celebration dinner; the same guests will be at both events.

Jack Jones - biographical details

PRIME MINISTER

James Larkin Jones was born on 29 March 1913 in Garston, South Liverpool; his father was a docker. He left school at 14, taking his first job as an engineering apprenticeship at 5 shillings a week, but quickly followed his father into the docks.

That is where he cut his political teeth, **joining the T&G in 1927** – the year he first heard Ernie Bevin speak to a dockers' meeting.

Jack was elected a docks' shop steward in Liverpool in 1930 – by 1934 he was helping to organise a Merseyside contingent of the Hunger Marchers on London. By 1936 when he was elected a Labour City Councillor in Liverpool he had already been earmarked by Bevin as a potential future officer.

That same year he began organising to support the Republican forces in Spain; by 1937 he had volunteered to fight with the International Brigades. He was in the front line against Franco's fascists and was badly injured in the battle of Elbro in 1938; many of his friends were killed in the battle.

When Jack returned to England he visited the widow of one friend, George Brown; later that **year he and Evelyn married**. Their marriage sustained Jack throughout his working life and was a true partnership – Evelyn was a remarkable women in her own right. They shared the same political dedication and modest personal desires, remaining in the same small council flat in South London, in Ruskin House, where Jack still lives.

In 1939 Jack was appointed to his first full-time job as district organiser in Coventry – a city that was in the front line during the war and a pivotal centre of industrial production. Jack was a tireless organiser, establishing himself as a man of the shop floor. He even led a strike in one car plant – against the views of the T&G nationally.

Consequently, he was viewed as a dangerous left winger by the new T&G Secretary Arthur Deakin (Bevin remained in the 1945 Cabinet); it was not until Frank Cousins became GS in 1956 that Jack's fortunes improved - to such an extent that he was to **succeed Cousins as GS in 1969.**

Jack put the T&G in the forefront of the battles against the Heath Government in its early years; then came the **Tory volte-face in 1972** when the Tories sought a deal with the TUC. Jack almost persuaded the PM to sign an unprecedented deal with the unions – he did persuade him to play the Red Flag on the piano during one of the breaks in the discussions, although apparently Heath's performance failed to impress Jack.

Jack was the crucial factor in the development of the **Social Contract** which formed the cornerstone of the incoming Labour Government's policy in 1974. It was Jack and the T&G who persuaded a reluctant union movement to accept the flat-rate £6 a week rise in 1975; Jack remained loyal to the concept of the social contract to the end. The Winter of Discontent occurred after he retired in 1978 – and against his advice.

His outstanding **achievement as General Secretary** was to build up the T&G into the single most powerful trade union in the non-Communist world, under his leadership the T&G became the first British trade union with a membership of over two million.

Since his retirement he has been one of the **most articulate spokespeople on behalf of Britain's pensioners**. His appetite for campaigning and his total commitment to the labour movement remain undimmed.

Evelyn passed away in December 1998 at the age of 85.

Der Rutten,

I enclose a letter to the Prime Minister from the National Committee on American Foreign Policy inviting him to be the recipient of the Hans J. Morgenthau Award at a dinner in New York next Autumn. I have warned the President, George Schwab, that the Prime Minister has received a number of similar approaches from other organisations and that, in current international circumstances, he is unlikely to receive an early substantive reply. Past recipients of the award are indicated on the letter heading. The most recent was Colin Powell who is being lobbied to write in support of the bid.

You will recall that we come across the NCAFP most frequently in the context of Northern Irish affairs. The organisation is bankrolled by William Flynn of Mutual of America (the same Flynn who has already approached us over the Al Smith dinner in New York). The NCAFP recently issued a substantive report on the peace process which was reasonably helpful but any constructive impact it may have had was rather spoilt by comments at the press conference in Belfast which launched the report which were highly critical of David Trimble.

While we would certainly encourage senior Ministers from the NIO and other Northern Irish political leaders to engage with the NCAFP, I do not



believe it would be appropriate for the Prime Minister to accept this particular award when there are so many other organisations in New York, and elsewhere in the USA who have already submitted bids.

Dear Prime Minister Blair:

It is our privilege and honor as the chairman and the president of the National Committee on American Foreign Policy to invite you to be the recipient of the Committee's Hans J. Morgenthau Award. The award commemorates the seminal contributions made by Professor Morgenthau to the theory and practice of American foreign policy and to the craft of international relations. It is presented by the National Committee from time to time to honor an individual whose intellectual attainments and practical contributions to U.S. foreign policy interests have been judged so exemplary in the tradition of Professor Morgenthau that he or she merits this singular award. Although award recipients have primarily been prominent American practitioners of statecraft, exceptions have been made for Lady Thatcher, King Hussein of Jordan, and you.

In seeking to honor you, the National Committee's Executive Committee wishes to pay tribute to your keen understanding of Britain's national security interests that converge with those of the United States in Europe, the Middle East, and elsewhere, as well as your enlightened political leadership in dealing with intractable issues in Northern Ireland and in promoting the peace process there. Your ability, courage, and willingness to take risks, challenge the establishment, and be a reforming and modernizing prime minister have enabled you to play an extraordinary leadership role in formulating, articulating, and implementing British foreign policy and in wielding influence in international councils as well. First among European leaders, you have understood not only the dangers to national security posed by rogue elements and rogue states that possess weapons of mass destruction but also the need to maintain levels of economic and military power necessary to respond to numerous challenges, resist asymmetrical threats, and remove impediments to

prosperity and stability throughout the world. You have been a forceful and forthright ally in exercising intellectual and moral leadership in NATO and in European councils and at the UN and in leading the people of Britain as they carry out international responsibilities and assume risks in common with the people of the United States and other countries. As a political realist, humanist, and practitioner of the art of statecraft who has demonstrated his ability and willingness to lead Britain in the pursuit of its national interests, you would be an honoree of whom Hans J. Morgenthau would have been most proud.

The presentation is made at the Waldorf-Astoria in New York City at a formal dinner attended by leaders from the worlds of politics, finance, communications, and the professions. The event is well covered by the media and affords an outstanding opportunity for a major foreign policy speech. We suggest a date in September or October 2003 (except on October 6), Monday through Thursday.

We look forward to receiving your positive response at your earliest convenience.

I am writing to ask you to launch the new Leadership College for the learning and skills sector in September this year. Prime Minister's Travel to Central Europe

Thank you for your letter of 10 March requesting suggestions for the Prime Minister to visit Poland and a Baltic State on his way to St Petersburg for the tercentenary celebrations on 30-31 May.

The Prime Minister's visit to Poland will be greatly welcomed. But we will need to confirm with the Poles that they are still interested in a speech venue elsewhere than Warsaw. If they are - both Miller and Kwasniewski may in the end plump for the capital - then we agree that Gdansk would be one serious candidate. Its location makes it suitable for a stopover and there are strong symbolic associations with the birth of Solidarity. But it is a stronghold of anti-SLD forces, and Miller may resist. Other options would be Poznan or Wrocław. We suggest that the Prime Minister plans to leave London on the afternoon of 29 May to attend an early evening event and dinner in whichever Polish city is agreed.

Any of the three Baltic States would welcome a visit by the Prime Minister. They are prospective EU and NATO members and have provided firm support on Iraq. We suggest Riga. The Lithuanian referendum will be over, and the Estonian government will be new (it is not yet formed). The President of Latvia would be a capable host. I suggest that the Prime Minister leaves Poland on the morning of 30 May and stops in Riga for around three hours to meet the Prime Ministers from Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania and discuss common themes such as EU, NATO, and Wider Europe issues. Our Posts believe that the other two Prime Ministers would want to take part.

The Hungarians will note that the Prime Minister is making his third visit to Poland before visiting them. They feel some resentment that Poland's position as the most important country in Central Europe is acknowledged by us to such a degree. There is no referendum case for a visit to Hungary (it is on 12 April and success is assured). But there is a strong case for a visit to thank the Hungarians for their help over Iraq - nearly all our troops and supplies have been carried through Hungarian airspace. Iraq has not been easy for the Hungarian government. Public opinion is against the war and the opposition has sought to take advantage of their difficulties. Furthermore, there has not been a visit by a Prime Minister since 1992.

It is possible that Slovak Prime Minister Mikulas Dzurinda will renew his invitation for the Prime Minister to attend a V4 summit in late June (he is running the London Marathon and we have recommended that the Prime Minister sees him on 14 April). Not least for Iraq reasons there would be a good case for going to the V4 summit. This could be combined with a short visit to Budapest.

SCHRÖDER VISIT (JOB CENTRE PLUS)

There is a proposal for you to go on a visit to Job Centre Plus (in Kilburn) with Schröder as part of your programme with him on Wednesday. If you decide you want to go ahead with Jobcentre Plus visit there are two options:

- a) a short visit of around half an hour mainly for photo opportunities (but with a handful of experts on hand to answer questions)
- b) visit plus short seminar at the Jobcentre to discuss welfare reform and employment policy in the UK and Germany.

The Germans are undertaking some radical reforms to their employment service and unemployment benefit system which share many of the features of reforms we have had in play for some time.

They are bringing in legislation right now (based on proposals from the Hartz Commission) to bring in:

- Job Centre Plus offices all over Germany (combining job centres and benefit administration)
- performance related pay for Personal Advisors

- new obligations on unemployed register with Jobcentres and to seek work
- new temporary work scheme using private temporary agencies to place unemployed people on temporary contracts at first on unemployment benefit rates and then paid at comparable wage rates
- helping unemployed to become self-employed

In Germany there is now a growing recognition that *how* you engage with unemployed (ie administration and the benefit regime) has a crucial impact on levels and duration of unemployment. So it would be possible to draw out the common broader themes of a modernising European labour market and welfare reform from the event.

I have attached a) background on Jobcentre Plus and the Kilburn office and b) possible names for the seminar which include Jobcentre Plus managers, DWP policy people, Amelia Fawcett (Europe, Morgan Stanley) and Jeremy Anderson, Chief Executive, Alos KMPG.

Do you still want to do a visit to Jobcentre Plus next Wednesday?

If so, do you want to host a short seminar as part of the visit to give it more substance?

Welfare to Work and Jobcentre Plus

Top line briefing

- The government's welfare to work programme has several key elements: improving work incentives through tax credits, investment in the New Deal employment programmes, an increase in work obligations for unemployed people and the creation of Jobcentre Plus. It is the combination of these reforms with a strong economy that has increased employment levels and brought down long-term unemployment.
- Jobcentre Plus is a new business, designed to help meet the Government's aim of promoting work as the best form of welfare, while providing appropriate help and support for those without jobs. Jobcentre Plus is a £2 billion investment in improving public services and in cutting the future costs of welfare and benefit dependency. Jobcentre Plus, which is part of the Department of Work and Pensions, has brought together over 80,000 staff from the former Employment Service and former Benefits Agency. The organisation runs all of the country's Jobcentres and Social Security offices some 1,500 in total. It is the biggest Government agency.
- Jobcentre Plus has been created to provide a better customer service to employers, jobseekers and people who are currently inactive in the labour market. It aims to extend support and job opportunities to a wider range people without work than ever before, particularly people who may have been left out in the past, including people with disabilities, lone parents and older people. Everybody has to go through a work-focused interview in order to claim benefit; failure to attend carries a financial sanction.
- Over the next four years, Jobcentre Plus will open a network of 1,000 completely remodelled offices. There are 95 of the new offices already in place. Kilburn office in London was one of the first, pathfinder Jobcentre Plus offices.
- Our new service aims to treat our customers far more as individuals. All new customers will have a specific member of staff (a personal

adviser) who will work with them to identify their needs, build their confidence and help overcome their individual barriers to work. Jobcentre Plus also delivers a range of programmes to support the hardest to help to find a job and stay in work. The New Deal programmes, delivered through Jobcentre Plus and our partners, have so far helped well over 800,000 people to find work.

- Employers are also the clients of Jobcentre Plus. It will encourage employers to open up more opportunities to jobless people, assist them to fill their vacancies quickly and help to address the skill needs of areas of the country and sectors of the economy.
- Jobseekers will be able to widen their jobsearch through a new national network of touch screen computer jobpoints, which are already in place, as well as searching for jobs through our internet site.
- Jobcentre Plus is already seeing success: we have already achieved a
 million job entries in this business year. Overall national job entry
 performance is 10% above the Government target and the new, fully
 integrated Jobcentre Plus offices are demonstrating a further 5%
 performance improvement compared to our old-style offices. We have
 also cut fraud in Income Support / Job Seekers Allowance by a quarter.

Local Office Brief: Kilburn Jobcentre Plus Office

- Kilburn Jobcentre Plus is in Brent Council in London. Brent has areas of high unemployment; there are approx 3000 Job Seekers Allowance customers in Kilburn. Brent has a diverse population with over 70 different languages spoken in the borough.
- The office delivers a range of services to customers claiming Jobseeker's Allowance, Income Support, Incapacity Benefit and Bereavement Benefits.
- Our customers are encouraged to contact us by telephone. When a customer phones a contact centre, an interactive Voice Response (VR) directs them to the most appropriate service.
- Customers have access to job vacancies through: touch screen
 Jobpoints in our offices; via our Internet site at
 www.jobcentreplus.gov.uk; a telephone service Employment Service
 Direct.

Successes

- Kilburn Jobcentre Plus understands the diversity of our client group and prioritises those customers in receipt of Incapacity Benefit and Income Support. This client group is relatively new to the Labour Market process and advisers have developed a much better understanding of their needs and concerns.
- Kilburn Jobcentre Plus has a wider impact locally with New Deal in the Community project where we have an outreach worker who establishes links with other partner organisations. New Deal in the community aims to include those people who may not have used a Jobcentre Plus office previously for a variety of reasons.
- Kilburn has successfully implemented an enhanced fortnightly review for jobseekers. Jobseekers are now used to being given a tailor made job search every two weeks.

Service to local employers

- The Brent cluster of offices works closely with local partners and providers across the Borough. These include the local Council Chambers of Commerce and Employer groups. The local Account Manager acts for large employers within Brent, including organisations such as Ikea, Asda, Homebase, Tesco, Christian Salvesen, Hilton Hotels and Premier Lodge.
- The Local Account Manager promotes the new Jobcentre Plus service to employers, such as conference/interviewing facilities and arranging open days. Employers are also informed of services provided by our local partners and through the Government's Modern Apprenticeships programme. Currently, there are negotiations with London Employer's Coalition and Metropolitan Police around their recruitment needs.

Prime Minister's Visit to the Far East

Thank you for your letter of 25 February in response to mine of 13 February. You raised a number of issues.

Japan

The 1130-1215 slot for the Diet speech in my earlier letter was an illustrative timing. We were not able to engage formally with the Japanese until we had your green light to do so. Consultations between the MFA and the Diet are now underway. Besides coordination with the parliamentary diary, they need to decide whether the invitation should issue from the Lower House or Upper House (We have suggested the Lower House). The Japanese are fully aware of the overall schedule on 23 April and we will make sure that the timing of the speech allows sufficient time both between events and for domestic business.

China

Timing for talks with new Premier

Our Ambassador in Beijing handed over a copy of our proposed programme to the Chinese MFA on 25 February. Their initial reaction was that our proposals looked realistic. Three hours would allow for a short (10-minute) honour guard on arrival, talks and lunch with the new Premier. We have no reason to believe that the Chinese will demand more time than this. The only other ceremonial aspect of the Prime Minister's visit would be on arrival at the airport, but this is likely to be very brief: in 1998 the Prime Minister was out of the airport in 10 minutes.

Possible joint event with Raffarin

We have investigated the options of a possible joint event with Raffarin. The Quai could not give us a precise read-out of Raffarin's itinerary, which is subject to a

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recce visit at the end of this month. The Embassy in Paris has suggested a joint meeting with businessmen on the realities of doing business in China, but there would be little real add-on value for businessmen (who can make use of briefings organised by the respective trade ministries). Another suggestion is a possible joint scientific event, to coincide with the Prime Minister's opening of the DNA exhibition. But there is no particular French link to the DNA discovery and the exhibition opening takes place under the banner of 'Think UK', a major campaign highlighting uniquely British scientific and creative excellence. We think the most promising option would be an Airbus contract signing ceremony. Airbus have agreed a contract with the Chinese for 17 A300 aircraft, which, according to our most recent contacts with Airbus in Beijing, is ready for signature. A signing ceremony might be arranged in Beijing or Shanghai (Raffarin will also visit Shanghai). Airbus are enthusiastic about the idea of an event to coincide with the visits and, subject to your views we shall explore this further, including possible timings, with the French. If necessary, a signature ceremony could be combined with a private bilateral meeting. I yes.

Possible attendance at the WIPO Summit

Most countries participating in the WIPO Summit have not yet made a firm decision on representation. Some, including Spain, Switzerland, Australia and Canada are likely to be represented at Director General level. Only a few countries have indicated that they intend to send someone more senior: France (Prime Minister); Greece (President and Secretary of Technical Ministry); Italy (Vice Minister or Minister); Germany (Minister of Justice) and the US (Deputy Trade Secretary).

We have received no specific Chinese assurances about the WIPO Summit, but do not expect them to react badly if the Prime Minister did not attend. We understand they see the event as a meeting of senior experts on intellectual property and it has only been WIPO itself which has talked of a high-level political meeting. The Chinese have put no pressure on us for the Prime Minister to attend the Summit (the MFA did not mention it at all when Sir Christopher Hum handed over the proposed itinerary last week). On the few occasions when we have been asked about participation, we have been non-committal, but have indicated that the Prime Minister is unlikely to attend. This line was recommended by the Patent Office on 20 February in their draft reply to a letter of invitation to the Prime Minister from the WIPO Director General.

If the pressure builds for Prime Ministerial participation, we see three possibilities which would not take up too much time or detract from the main objectives of the visit:

- Brief attendance by the Prime Minister at the Chinese Government's reception for Summit participants at 1800 hrs on Thursday 24 April, or



- similar at the reception hosted by WIPO at 1900 hrs on Friday 25 April, or
- attendance at the presentation of the Chairman's conclusions at 0930 hrs on Saturday 26 April.

On balance, we recommend that the first of these looks the best option.

Possible contract signings

On current plans, the following contracts are likely to be ready for signature during the Prime Minister's visit (we will need to discuss with the parties involved whether Shanghai or Beijing would be the most appropriate venue):

- Airbus (see above)
- P & O (Qingdao port)
- Standard Life (new office in China)
- Rolls-Royce (pump stations for the West-East Gas Pipeline less likely)

TPUK are in touch with you separately about arranging a meeting to discuss trade aspects of the visit.

Weekend programme in Shanghai and Sichuan

Since my earlier letter we have given further thought to the Shanghai leg of the visit. This would focus on our commercial and financial engagement with China. At the meeting with the Mayor, we would want to push UK interest in several key business opportunities such as the Deepwater Port, EXPO 2010 and Formula 1. This would then be followed by a major commercial event drawing in the resident British business community and senior Chinese entrepreneurs. If time allowed there would be an opportunity for the Prime Minister to launch the British Council's 'Writer's Train' project (a train which will travel throughout China carrying UK and British writers), which is part of the Think UK campaign. He could also attend an event to mark the formal handover to the Shanghai government of the DfID-sponsored Care for Children project, which has placed several hundred youngsters with Chinese foster parents and is now being replicated throughout the country.

A recce team from the Embassy in Beijing has now visited <u>Sichuan</u> in Western China and concluded that the proposed programme we submitted earlier would involve too much arduous travelling time for the Prime Minister. The DfID-supported bamboo paper mill is not as attractive or photogenic as first thought, and the visit would involve lengthy travel on poor quality roads. If you remain interested in a visit to the region we would be happy to explore other options – although long travel times are likely to be a problem. But the Embassy has recommended a less strenuous



option, which would be to visit one of the picturesque cities of Hangzhou or Suzhou, some two/three hours' drive from Shanghai.

Speeches

We would welcome your early guidance on the question of possible speeches by the Prime Minister in Beijing and Hong Kong. In Beijing we envisage this would take place on the morning of Saturday 26 April; probably at the prestigious Beijing University to a mixed audience of academics, government officials and the media on a foreign policy theme. In Hong Kong this would be a lunchtime speech to the business community. A large audience, perhaps several hundred, would be assured. The subject matter of the speech could be a range of topics, but the Prime Minister could use the speech to restate the UK's (and his personal) commitment to Hong Kong. In both cases of course where we were by then on Iraq would have a major impact on the themes and content of the speeches.

Hong Kong

You mentioned in your letter that several of the Hong Kong ideas looked worth exploring. We and Hong Kong have started to make tentative soundings of key players who might be involved in the programme. We understand that most decisions on the final programme will be left to the recce visit but we do need an earlier steer on the question of a speech in Hong Kong (see above).

Finally, can I put in a strong plea for an as early visit as possible to the Far East by the No 10 recce team? The complexities of the Prime Minister's proposed programme (particularly in China) mean that our posts need as much time as possible to make the necessary arrangements. We are already proceeding with some arrangements which must be made before the recce, including preparing invitations to the business event in Tokyo and putting down a deposit on the hotel in Beijing.



PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT TO THE FAR EAST

Thank you for your letter of 13 February on strategic objectives, core programme elements and deliverables for the Prime Minister's visit to Japan, Korea, China and Hong Kong.

Your proposals for the visit were very helpful. These will be used as the basis for the recce visit by the No. 10 visits team, due to take place in March. I will inform you as soon as we have dates for this. The recce team, in consultation with people on the ground, will look in detail at content, venues and logistics for each of the proposals. Until their report we will not be able to firm up the schedule, including the overnight stops.

On a general level we will be looking at ways to focus on the key events for the Prime Minister as well as finding time for domestic business, for which around 2 hours will be needed, best at the end of each afternoon. The format for each of the press events will need careful consideration. It is likely that they will not be finalised until much nearer the time.

I am sure you will welcome some feedback on the specifics.

In <u>Japan</u> the talks/dinner with Koizumi are essential and the speech in the Diet looks promising. However, we may want to move the Diet speech within the programme for the day. <u>I should welcome advice on how flexible the timing is on this</u>. The recce team will look closely at the detail on the proposed Innovation UK event and the event with the business leaders. We do not expect to proceed with the other proposed events.

In Korea I understand the intention for the UK war veterans event was to do this with the President, hence the short time involved. However, we are

looking at making this more substantive. The recce team will look into the practicalities.

For <u>China</u>, talks with the new Premier, President and Jiang Zemin look essential. <u>Can you confirm that the 3 hours of talks with the new Premier will include all the necessary protocol</u>, allowing the Prime Minister to get on with business for the rest of the visit?

We want to take the opportunity to do something with <u>Raffarin</u>. I should be grateful if FCO could investigate ideas, including with Raffarin's office and provide advice. There is also the <u>WIPO summit</u>. I should be grateful for advice on which other leaders are expected to be there. We doubt that the Chinese will be content for the Prime Minister to be in town and not attend. Have you had any assurance on this?

The recce team will look at the other proposals for Beijing, Shanghai, Chengdu and Hong Kong. Pending their visit I should be grateful for more details on the contracts expected to be signed in Shanghai. It would be helpful if we could meet your officials and BTI to discuss trade aspects, including handling the trade delegation, before the recce visit. Several of the Hong Kong ideas look worth exploring.

2002 Benchmarking: 'Creating Business Value'

Race for Opportunity launched its 2nd benchmarking report "Race: Creating Business Value" with a programme of briefings for business champions and practitioners hosted by Deutsche Bank in July.

ahid Khan, Chief Information Officer for Infrastructure and Cross Product Services, Deutsche Bank, speaking at the power breakfast for business champions, reaffirmed his organisation's commitment to being a leading organisation on diversity, as a driver for business advantage and growth. He said that this commitment was endorsed at the very highest levels within the Bank, recognising that investment banking is a fast moving highly competitive and innovative environment, and that therefore it is crucial to tap into and develop all available resources.

Zahid was very positive in stating that Deutsche Bank would improve on its performance on this year's benchmarking, and, as in other business areas, wanted to achieve excellence in diversity. However, he noted that that there was still a lot of work to be done, particularly across the middle management strata in gaining their ownership of the issues. The need to recognise potential and fully utilise everyone's contribution would help in achieving business success in this area, according to Zahid, but it would not occur in isolation and needed a critical mass in organisations to make this a reality.

RfO Chairman Allan Leighton reaffirmed his view that making sustainable progress on race is about leadership and measurement, which were 2 of the key report findings. He noted that business however needs to understand that working on race is not a sprint but a marathon, and that the business case needs to be developed in a hard-hitting and business-focused way.

Mike Fairey, RfO Deputy Chairman and Deputy Group Chief Executive of LloydsTSB agreed, saying that organisations need to build on the existing momentum and embrace the business case for diversity as the right approach. It is still important to plan for the next phase of activity however he said, as there is a long road ahead.

99 RfO organisations participated in this year's benchmarking. Key trends emerging from this year's report include:

- Huge levels of investment in race-related activity, but little evaluation.
- Lots of initiatives underway, and a focus on quick wins at the expense of a longer term strategic approach.
- Clear signs of progress in a number of areas, but lots more to do.
- HR is still in the driving seat, and is still working in isolation from other parts of the business.

- 1. There are definitely not enough black and Asian managers at any level of UK plc.
- The 99 organisations surveyed account for approximately 2.75million employees across the UK, or nearly 10% of the current workforce.
- There are only 44 ethnic minority individuals operating at the most senior level of these organisations, and there are still no black or other ethnic minority Chief Executives, Permanent Secretaries or their equivalents in any of the organisations surveyed.
- 2. More organisations need to get involved in looking at the whole issue of race in a business context.

- Nearly half (49%) of the organisations surveyed admitted that line managers do not submit regular reports on progress against their race objectives.
- 5. Some organisations have woken up to the customer dimension.
- Particularly the banks and building societies, and the retailers.
- 62% of respondents said that they were successfully targeting ethnic minority customers locally and overseas, up from 42% last year.
- 6. Action planning is fundamental.
- The majority have an action plan on race just like any other part of their business activity. 75% sign off their plan and overall strategy at Board level.
- 7. So is communication.
- 74% of the organisations surveyed have a communications strategy to support their objectives on race.
- 8. And people are getting results.
- 62% of the organisations surveyed feel that their race equality programme has made a measurable impact, up from 42% in 2001.

Viewed within the industry as a groundbreaking programme, the aim is to provide these students with important information and experience

at a critical point in their academic lives as they begin to formulate ideas around the careers they want to pursue after study.

It is widely acknowledged that students from these groups have traditionally been underrepresented within investment banking. The programme seeks to provide a pipeline of talent that Deutsche Bank can track, support and encourage to pursue careers within the sector.

"I have a dream..." aims to provide the students with a holistic experience through a balanced but intensive 4-week work and education programme.

The programme is also designed to equip the students with additional skills and confidence that will assist

them in completing their A-Level's. This is a real opportunity to gain experience similar to that previously reserved for undergraduates.

Critical aspects of the programme include:

- Hands on experience within a business environment
- Videoconference with participating students in Germany and America
- 1 day workshop on financial markets and products
- 1 day intermediate and advanced Excel workshop
- 1/2 day training on Bloomberg
 Financial Information Terminals
- Community volunteer day
- Individual team projects
- Final presentation to senior business people

The programme, championed internally by Dipak Patel has been very well received and supported by managers and has generated considerable interest from other investment banks. The fact that the programme has grown from 10 to 16 students since 2001 is a testimony to the value that Deutsche Bank places on diversity and nurturing talent.

The enthusiasm and support was clearly evident when the students came to giving their final presentations at the close of the programme. The event hosted by Mitchel Lenson, Global Head of Technology and Operations and Chief Information Officer for Deutsche Bank was attended by an audience of close to 100 people, including many of the students' parents and other senior business people from the bank.

In his address Mitchel mentioned that Deutsche Bank recognises and values the influence that parents have in the final choice of careers the "dreamers" decide to pursue. By providing parents with an opportunity

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Evaluation is integral

Evaluation has been integrated into each element of the diversity strategy for the West Bromwich Building Society, according to Eve Matthews, Diversity Manager.

Leve was facilitating a workshop discussion for practitioners at the launch of the benchmarking report in July. She said that the key aims for the WBBS in developing its diversity strategy were to improve the diversity of its workforce to reflect the communities that it serves; to develop and retain quality people; to motivate and reward staff fairly and appropriately; and to improve customer satisfaction. She said that their approach was very much to 'begin with the end in mind', and to focus on what they want to achieve, as well as identifying key indicators for success.

Eve pointed out that the WBBS has a very clear business case for its programme on race as part of diversity:

- 10 years ago the Census showed that ethnic minorities made up 14.6% of the West Midlands population. That official figure is expected to shift dramatically when the Census 2001 figures are made available.
- A third of graduates locally are black and other ethnic minority people.
- 20% of the workforce locally will be from ethnic minorities by 2020.

The WBBS Diversity Manager explained that the Society takes an integrated approach to evaluating its Diversity programme through

- Gauging the reaction level to and following up on their induction programme for all staff to introduce some of the key concepts around diversity.
- Identifying key performance indicators as part of standard performance management.
- Monitoring customer feedback and satisfaction levels through surveys.
- Gauging reaction to their cultural awareness training.

 Setting key performance indicators for their recruitment and selection training, measured in terms of the recruitment and retention of black and minority ethnic staff.

In terms of results, Eve reported that the induction slots are consistently rated as excellent, and that many staff follow up with requests for more information. Performance management is measured in terms of the demographics of top performers, as well as the number of complaints on racial grounds.

Although the WBBS is serious about its commitment to creating a diverse workforce, Eve stressed that entry was strictly on the basis of merit, and that no positive action is taken. The focus is very much on widening their attraction for a broad base of recruits, in part through a programme of activities which engage with the diverse communities served by the Society.

To ensure accountability and broader ownership of their diversity programme, Eve reported that the WBBS had deliberately set out to get diversity out of HR by:

- Making it the responsibility of all line managers
- Setting SMART targets for their activity
- Relating any activity to business goals
- Integrating diversity into normal business activity
- Measuring progress consistently, and addressing shortfalls.

Eve also noted that their diversity activity had made a genuine business impact, contributing to growth up by 19% on the previous year, customer satisfaction levels of 98%, profits being up by 30%, and staff satisfaction at 14% more than the Investors in People (IIP) average.

to see their sons and daughters present on real business issues and meet bank staff, it was hoped that they in turn would have a better understanding of investment banking. Mitchel also commented that Deutsche Bank's most important asset is its people. In order to continue being successful the bank needs to hire, develop and retain the best people. It is these people who will bring ideas, innovation and performance that will increase

Deutsche Bank's value and reputation.

"The "I have a dream..." programme helps us to tap into talented young individuals from groups that have in the past not had a major presence in the city. It allows us the opportunity to invest in their futures, and in turn we hope they will invest in ours".

In closing the programme, Dipak Patel congratulated all the students on their success and said: "We hope that they have enjoyed their time on the "I have a

dream..." programme and have found the learning of real value. We know that they will all go away and share their experiences with colleagues, friends, and other members of their families and that's great. More important though, is that they remember the opportunity they have had and encourage somebody else (perhaps a younger sister or brother or a friend) to seize these types of opportunities."

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Solutions 8 "The landscape is changing"

The legislative landscape is currently constantly shifting, according to Makbool Javaid, Head of Discrimination Law at DLA, who spoke about the future direction of discrimination legislation. He said that there is a genuine thrust to base EU anti-discrimination work on a new social model for the labour market. The changing political situation and demographics in Europe continue to focus attention on some of the emerging issues, as well as potential solutions.

akbool highlighted some of the key points contained in the Race Directive 2000/43/EC, which could have a significant impact on the **UK workplace:**

- Indirect discrimination, which normally requires supporting data. In some EU countries however it is an offence to monitor the ethnicity of individuals. In the future it may be possible to bring claims which do not require supporting information or evidence.
- The EU definition of harassment is currently subject to a more stringent test than here in the UK, although there may be some new developments in UK case law.
- Up until now only the Commission for Racial Equality (CRE) could bring a case of discrimination by

instruction, but the Directive allows for individuals to bring a claim in this regard. The use of third parties in recruitment could open up the possibility of discrimination by instruction.

- The burden of proof has shifted towards the respondent having to establish that they did not discriminate.
- There is also a possibility of the scope of victimisation being extended to include discrimination cases brought post-employment. This is already possible under the Sex Discrimination Act, and there is currently no statute of limitations.

Makbool also noted that an area of growing debate concerns religion and belief, and he highlighted some aspects of the Employment Framework Directive, namely,

- There is currently no definition of religion or belief.
- The current Directive incorporates belief as being akin to religion, whilst excluding political belief.

The DLA expert referred to a Home Office study which suggested that religious and racial discrimination are

inseparable. There are obvious close links between religions, beliefs, cultural values and ethnic background. Accordingly, related issues such as dress, working patterns, social interaction and the provision of the appropriate workplace facilities will move higher up the agenda in the workplace of the future. Also appearing on the horizon is strengthened legislation with respect to age (age discrimination legislation expected by 2006 with no upper age limit) and race.

According to Makbool, the biggest question being asked about the Race Relations Amendment Act (RRAA) is whether it will be extended to include a private sector dimension in the future. The reality is, he said, that there is already a broad statement about, "Any person whose functions are of a public nature, for example private companies such as utilities.' He noted that those contracts tendered by public authorities to private companies are also subject to the Act.

Bringing coherence to the new legislation

Roger Dennison of the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI) outlined the background to the ongoing consultation exercise with employers across the country around proposals for new equality legislation. He said that with the range of new legislation and Directives appearing, some coherence across government is clearly needed. The DTI is therefore undertaking an ongoing consultation around the initial implementation phase of the Directives.

Roger highlighted 2 of the key new proposals:

 Changing existing legislation impacting on the Race Relations and Disability Discrimination Acts.

Solutions 8 Introducing a Diversity

Strategy at RBS

Alan Richardson, Group Resourcing Manager with the Royal Bank of Scotland Group traced the development of their Diversity strategy, of which their race programme is a significant strand. RBS brands include Direct Line, Coutts, Natwest, Virgin Direct, Ulster Bank and TESCO Personal Finance. He said that RBS's work on race was integral to the success of the overall plan.

lan outlined the Aapproach taken in developing the new strategy, which is based on an analysis of where they started from, defining where they wanted to be, and identifying the steps to get them to the vision. He stressed that one of the most important aspects of developing a sustainable programme was getting diversity firmly on the Board agenda, not only to provide the leadership from the top, but as a key driver to get things done across the organisation. The RBS Group is a comparitively young organisation, with an average employee age of 26, compared with the

national UK average of 36 years old (and rising). 6% of the current workforce across the RBS Group are ethnic minorities, compared with a UK average of 8%. They do better on women, who make up 63% of their workforce compared with approximately half of the national figure of 50%. 12% of their senior managers are women, as well as 33% of the management team as a whole.

Alan noted that effective communication will also be vital to the success of the strategy, and they have been looking at using a number of formal and informal channels, including their employee opinion survey which has

around a 75% return rate from 100,000 people segmented across diversity. He said that the RBS Diversity team will also be working closely with their media relations people and promoting successful examples of activity internally and externally.

"Diversity for us is a long journey," Alan said, "although we're already 300 years old as a Group." Implementing the strategy called 'Merit matters' involves a 5 year plan with 5 phases:

- Strengthening their management information systems and ensuring legal compliance.
- Raising the awareness of the organisation and providing related training.
- Adding value to the business and the customer proposition.
- Delivering best practice across the Group.
- Celebrating diversity in action and gaining internal as well as external recognition, eg awards.

Work is already underway in developing a 'UK Diversity data footprint' based on the Census. A strategic research partner has also been identified to probe how diversity is being perceived internally and externally. Alan noted that one critical challenge is the existence of 20 payroll systems in 3 continents, all with missing data, and not fully integrated yet at this point.

One immediate win has been in recruiting minority ethnic graduates. Alan noted that the entire recruitment process is entirely Internet based. 32% of the applications earlier this year were from ethnic minority people.

 Implementing new legislation outlawing discrimination at work for age, religion and sexual orientation. The aim is to complete this process by 2006.

lan Cheeseman from the Home Office noted in his presentation that the implementation of the Race Directive would support the Race Relations (Amendment) Act and that Article 13 complements the Employment Directive. He said that it was hoped that by 2003 there would be a common minimum standard across the EU, including on main points like:

- Placing the burden of proof on respondents.
- Retaining the scope for positive action.
- Widening the scope of current legislation to include indirect discrimination and harassment.

lan stressed that government's aim is to balance enhanced individual rights with the burdens being placed on businesses. The main impacts on business are likely to be:

- New arrangements for age, sexual orientation and religion.
- New legislation widening some areas of race with the potential for more damages and increasing awards at employment tribunal.
- No exemptions for small businesses who fail to comply.
- Focusing on prevention, rather than dealing with claims later on in the legal process.

The Home Office representative said that the idea of a single equality commission was still under discussion at that point, but it was likely that a unified entity would be in place within the next 5 years. This was in fact subsequently announced by Minister Barbara Roche MP.

Another conclusion arising from the consultation is that there is a need for greater clarity around the operation of employment tribunals. Proposals have been put forward for improved legislation in this regard, including more guidance on the actual design and content of supporting materials, and follow-up support.

"This recruitment fair was born in part out of my own frustration in not being able to fully tap into the diversity of talent in the Nottingham area, and a genuine desire for action. I really believe that there are lots of ethnic minority people with huge potential who are totally unaware of the range of opportunities on offer in organisations like my own."

The HSBC Area Manager went on to say, "From a selfish point of view I want to get more ethnic minority recruits and raise the level of awareness of the opportunities within HSBC, and I am delighted with the fact that through this Careers Fair we have had several applications and have actually already recruited one management

trainee as a direct result."

Tanweer Munir, who now has a chance for a management career with HSBC agrees. "I do believe that had we not met (at the Careers Fair), that my chances of gaining employment with HSBC would have been slim, but the Careers Fair enabled me to show some of my personality and abilities on a level playing field."

Chandran Owen, Services Manager at Nottingham City Council, who were also heavily involved in organising the event said, "This Careers Fair gave us an opportunity to put some action into our rhetoric. The City Council was very pleased to offer the

use of its facilities to help RfO organisations in this city to make an impact on their recruitment of black and other ethnic minority people. I hope that there will be many more such Fairs, and I also hope to come across many individuals in the future working in RfO organisations who gained their jobs as a result of events like this."

21 local employers including the Army, Inland Revenue, Powergen, Portland College, New College Nottingham and Marks & Spencer mounted exhibition stands on the day. Friendly staff were on hand to provide advice and information about job opportunities, backed up with careers advice from local organisations like Jobcentre Plus (formerly known as the Employment Service). The Army even brought along a tank, although they had to leave it outside of the Council House in the market square.

The day's excitement also included a chance to win valuable prizes including a mountain bike, Sony Playstation, CD player, and a football signed by Nottingham Forest Football Club. The RfO Steering Group is already planning to run the Careers Fair again next year.

The ground-breaking event was organised by the DfES' Equality and Diversity Unit (EDU) in partnership with colleagues from the Home Office and Department of Work and Pensions based on the site. The objective was to raise awareness and understanding among staff of a range of issues relating to race, different cultures and religions, disability, age and sexual orientation.

The Diversity Day was an unqualified success, surpassing

Local schoolchildren, some of whom have come to Britain originally as asylum seekers, gave moving presentations. External organisations active in the diversity arena, including Stonewall and the Commission for Racial Equality (CRE) offered advice and information. Colleagues from the Disability Advisory Network and the Sheffield Ethnic Minority Network mounted interactive displays on helpful IT applications such as voice recognition. Connexions, the Government's new support service for 13-19 year olds,



<u>Prime Minister's Visit to Japan, Korea, China and Hong Kong:</u> <u>Strategic Objectives, Core Programme Elements, Deliverables</u>

As you know, we have been thinking further about the Prime Minister's visit of 22-28 April to East Asia. We have consulted posts and had informal meetings with you and other colleagues in No 10. Detailed below are our proposals on objectives and other factors affecting the programme overall. A draft itinerary and further details on programme elements and deliverables are contained in separate Annexes.

On strategic objectives, for Japan:

- To encourage Japan to be a full partner in global governance;
- To encourage structural reform in Japan and to profile the UK as a successful model;
- To re-confirm the UK as Japan's key partner in Europe, and Japan as the UK's key partner in Asia;
- To promote the interests of British business, in particular UK strengths in technological innovation; and to promote high value Japanese investment into the UK; to promote the UK as the preferred destination for Higher Education.

In Korea, the objectives would be:

- To build a strong relationship with the new South Korean President, an admirer of the Prime Minister; and
- To underline the strength of Britain's trade and investment interests in South Korea, and our commitment to supporting a peaceful resolution of the North Korean nuclear issue.

In China, there are three key objectives:

• To establish strong personal relations between the Prime Minister and China's new generation of leaders who will take power in March and are expected to dominate Chinese politics for the next decade, emphasising our desire to strengthen political, economic and commercial ties, and Britain's role as a partner for China;

- To emphasise our support for greater Chinese engagement on international issues, and our continued support for the reform process.
- To ensure a high-profile launch for Think UK, a public diplomacy initiative to raise awareness of the UK's creative and technological excellence among China's growing population of educated young professionals.

In Hong Kong, the objectives would be:

- To underline and renew HMG's political commitment to Hong Kong (and the Prime Minister's personal commitment) and its special status, reflecting our Joint-Declaration responsibilities, at a time when controversial national security legislation is being discussed;
- To encourage debate on further democratisation in Hong Kong
- To underline the continuing strength of the UK's commercial interests in, and through, Hong Kong
- To promote the UK as the preferred foreign destination for education and as a centre for creativity and innovation

An outline **draft itinerary** is contained in Annex 1. **Details of the core events** and **deliverables** for each leg of the visit are detailed in Annex 2. Both Sir David King and Lord Sainsbury will be making visits to the region prior to the Prime Minister's visit, which will prepare the grounds for substantial initiatives and deliverables.

In addition, there are a number of issues affecting the visit overall, which require some further explanation.

On **major speeches**, there are strong arguments for speeches in both Tokyo and Beijing, which would cover different themes. A speech to the Japanese Diet (National Parliament) would attract huge interest nationwide. It would deliver key messages on economic issues, the importance of reform, and the UK and Japan's roles in building an equitable international society (see detail in Annex 2). There would also be a strong case for a major foreign policy speech in Beijing, drawing on the fact of China's membership of the P5 and increasing international role. Besides topical references to eg Iraq it might focus on Asia, including Britain's active contribution to the region.

Hong Kong have made a strong bid for a speech by the Prime Minister to the business community. A large audience, probably several hundred, would be assured. The Prime Minister delivered a speech to a similar audience during his last visit. This time the subject matter of the speech could be a range of topics, but the Prime Minister could use the opportunity to restate the UK's (and his personal) commitment to Hong Kong.



On press handling, in Japan, the speech to the Diet, launch of Innovation UK, and Young People's Forum (see Annex for full details) will all attract media coverage. There would also be a small joint press conference to announce areas of agreement, following the talks with Prime Minister Koizumi. Ideally, we would also want to find time for an open-access press conference on wider issues. Alternatively, the Prime Minister could offer to brief Japanese journalists prior to departure. In China, all aspects of the visit will attract media coverage, with the focus on the official talks. We would expect these talks to be preceded by photocalls. We would also want the launch of Think UK to have a high media profile, and to ensure extensive coverage we would set aside time for interviews with the Chinese media while the Prime Minister is at Tsinghua University. We would develop a more detailed media strategy in the light of your reactions to our programme proposals.

We should be grateful for guidance on whether **Mrs Blair** will accompany the Prime Minister on any part of the visit. We will be happy to put together programmes in each country tailored around her personal and professional interests. These could include joint events with the Prime Minister or individual events, as she wishes.

There will be some other significant visitors to the region around the time. President Chirac will be making one of his regular visits to Japan for a week in March at the time of the World Water Forum. But there is no intention on the French or Japanese side that Chirac should address the Diet or otherwise affect our proposals for the Prime Minister's visit.

A number of Heads of State and other senior political leaders (including Raffarin) are likely to be in <u>Beijing</u> during the time of the Prime Minister's visit, in order to attend the World Intellectual Property Organisation (WIPO) Summit. We are considering whether a joint event with Raffarin might be organised. We do not recommend that the Prime Minister get involved in the WIPO Summit. We have received assurances from the Chinese that their senior leaders will be available to meet the Prime Minister on the agreed dates.

The issue of an accompanying business delegation possibly led by Baroness Symons is being addressed separately by Trade Partners UK.

ANNEX 2: CORE EVENTS AND DELIVERABLES

JAPAN

(a) Core events

- Launch of Innovation UK: The venue is a spectacular high-tech museum (the Miraikan). There are two related elements. First would be the launch of Innovation UK, a joint FCO/TPUK/British Council initiative with private sponsorship projecting the UK as a leading innovator and promoting leading edge British technology business. The Prime Minister would need to make a short speech. The second element would be a demonstration of the results of UK/Japan collaboration in climate change modelling. The Miraikan features a huge computerised globe which depicts the earth as viewed from space. It can present the results of UK/Japan computer simulations of future global climatic patterns. This will create an opportunity for the Prime Minister to reinforce UK leadership on addressing climate change and serve as a backdrop to further agreements on environmental cooperation (see deliverables). On arrival or departure, the Prime Minister will also have the opportunity to look at Japan's fuel cell cars. (potential for future investment in the UK).
- <u>Speech to the Diet:</u> The Prime Minister would get a full house and nationwide coverage. It is the ideal platform to get across to decision makers and the wider public key messages on economic issues (structural reform, strengths of the UK and our place in Europe), creating opportunities (deregulation, community building, citizenship, government/busines/civil society partnerships) and how developed countries can promote and creating an equitable global society. Messages from a speech in the Diet will reach a wider Asian audience through the media.
- Reception for UK and Japanese Business Leaders: This would enable the Prime Minister to meet Japan's business leaders, top Japanese investors (including potential new investors) in the UK, British business active in Japan (possibly including some from an accompanying business delegation). Again, the Prime Minister would need to say a few words, including on the UK's position in Europe. We would create the opportunity for the Prime Minister to spend a few moments individually with those responsible for major contracts and investments.
- Young Peoples Forum: The British Council in Tokyo is a flagship operation focussed sharply on promoting education in the UK. 2003 is the fiftieth anniversary of the Council in Japan. The Prime Minister would mark this by taking part in a televised discussion at the Council with UK-educatedyoung leaders. Also an opportunity to promote the Chevening Programme which is expanding substantially in Japan.

- Talks and dinner with Prime Minister Koizumi: Koizumi will probably offer a short meeting followed by a working dinner. This will be an opportunity to enlist Koizumi's support for UK objectives on Iraq and other international security issues, to encourage greater Japanese contribution to the global agenda and to encourage Koizumi in his domestic reform programme. The meeting should also formally confirm agreements on ICT, and (if achieved) on environmental technology, and strategic S & T priorities. The two Prime Ministers' policy advisers will meet on 21 March, and will help prepare, as will visits to Japan by Sir David King and Lord Sainsbury.
- <u>Joint Press Statement</u> This will be a short joint press conference with Koizumi between talks and dinner, to announce areas of agreement. Koizumi's office would keep it brief. It would be open to accompanying media and international media accredited in Tokyo.

(b) Deliverables

Besides agreements on various areas of agreement on the bilateral/international agenda, we are working to agree endorsement by the two Prime Ministers on the following specifics:

- A Prime Ministerial agreement on ICT (building on Patricia Hewitt's earlier agreement with her Japanese opposite number) setting out the Prime Ministers' vision for developing the full potential of ICT.
- An agreement on collaboration in the field of environmental technology (especially
 environment friendly vehicles) pulling together current strands of activity and, if
 negotiable, including an endorsement of long term goals beyond 2010 to combat global
 warming. Also, commitment to tackle climate change at the G8 through new
 technologies; and a link up on UK / Japan emissions trading schemes.
- Agreement on a UK/Japan Joint Programme on Emerging Science and Technologies.
 This builds on the successful workshops launched in 2001 by Lord Sainsbury and the
 Japanese Chief Scientist and would launch a future programme of collaborative events
 bringing together top UK and Japanese scientists in strategic fields (including
 Bioinformatics, Tissue Engineering and Stem Cells, future Mobile Communications
 Technology and Renewable Energy).

KOREA

(a) Core events

- <u>Substantive meeting with President Roh</u>. An opportunity to build a personal relationship with Roh at a formative stage of his Administration (two months into a five-year term). He will probably offer a meeting followed by lunch. Key issues will be North Korea and trade/investment ties.

- Meeting/photocall with UK veterans from the Korean War. The Prime Minister's visit coincides with the 50th Anniversary of the Armistice Agreement at the end of the Korean War.

(b) Deliverables

- Establishment of a good working relationship between the Prime Minister and the new President of Asia's third largest economy;
- Demonstration of UK concern and influence on the North Korean nuclear issue; and
- Presidential awareness of UK business interest and potential.

CHINA

(a) Core events

- Talks with the new generation of Chinese leaders. The Prime Minister will be among the first Western leaders to visit Beijing following the appointment of the new Chinese Government in March. The new Premier almost certainly Wen Jiabao, who the Prime Minister met in June 2000 is likely to offer a meal as well as talks. The Prime Minister's business delegation might be involved in the meal and/or part of the talks. The Prime Minister would also have a substantial session of talks with the new President, almost certainly Hu Jintao, who the Prime Minister met in October 2001.
- Launch of Think UK. Think UK is a major programme of events running from April to October 2003, aimed at bringing creative and innovative ideas from contemporary Britain to wider notice in China. It is intended to appeal to the growing, influential generation of young, educated professionals living in major cities. We recommend that the Prime Minister launch Think UK at the attractive campus of Tsinghua University, China's leading science and technology-oriented university. He would announce the launch of the initiative, and open one of the Think UK events, an exhibition on the UK's role in discovering the structure of DNA and in modern genetics. We would also recommend Tsinghua as the venue for interviews with leading Chinese media. The Prime Minister would also open a new BP Clean Energy Centre and profile extensive Sino-British cooperation in education. There would be the opportunity for a relaxed walk through the campus, and shirtsleeves contact with students.
- Attendance at the UK/China Forum. The Prime Minister and Premier Zhu Rongji launched the UK/China Forum on his last visit to China in 1998. This annual high-level event bringing together key influencers from the fields of business, culture, science and

the media will be held on 24/25 April, and involve members of the business delegation. We hope the Prime Minister would attend the closing session of the Forum, ideally in the company of the Chinese Premier, to show support for the Forum and endorse members' plans for its modernisation and future development.

• A speech on a foreign policy theme, perhaps with a focus on Asia, and Britain's active contribution to the region, as well as topical issues such as Iraq.

In Shanghai:

- Meeting with the Party Secretary and Mayor. To promote UK business interest in Shanghai
- <u>Major commercial event</u> with accompanying businessmen and the UK business community, the largest in China, and with Chinese business leaders.

In Sichuan:

- Brief meeting with Party Secretary and Governor of Sichuan. An opportunity to register our support for China's western development programme.
- Relaxed outing to <u>Leshan Giant Buddha</u> through pleasant scenery. The Buddha, an eighth century masterpiece, stands 71m tall, and can be reached by boat. We also recommend that the Prime Minister visit the DfID-supported restructuring project at **Yongfeng bamboo paper mill**, which supports the livelihoods of 250,000 people.

(b) Deliverables

The key to the visit is the contact with the new generation of top Chinese leaders. But we are working on a number of specific deliverables:

- Signature of agreement on mutual establishment of Cultural Centres, which we hope will enable the British Council to operate in China in their own right, and offer English language teaching services for the first time.
- Significant media exposure to get Think UK off to a strong start, and to provide momentum to carry it through the following six months.
- Announcement of new legal reform and environmental programmes under the Global Opportunities Fund.
- Announcement of a new visa service in Chongqing.
- Several companies hope that the Prime Minister's visit will help bring commercial negotiations to maturity: Shell and Rolls-Royce's interests in the West-East Natural Gas

Pipeline; Airbus A340 and A380 sales to China Southern; P&O's US\$600m contract for the next phase of Qingdao port.

HONG KONG

- a) core events
- Meeting and meal with CH Tung: the best format is likely to be a short meeting with the Chief Executive followed by a working dinner. This will be an opportunity to reflect on the day's events, to remind CH Tung of Britain's continuing interest in, and commitment to, Hong Kong and to probe on key political issues. Foremost of these is likely to be controversial national security legislation which will then have been in the Legislative Council for two months. At time of writing many of our initial concerns about this legislation have eased but there may still be sticking points that the Prime Minister could discuss with Tung. This will also be an opportunity to lobby for an increased pace of democratic reform.
- Reception with Hong Kong Legislative Council (LegCo) members: It would not go down well if the Prime Minister visited Hong Kong and did not spend some time meeting LegCo members, some of whom are well-known for strong views on Hong Kong issues and British links with Hong Kong. The best format would be a short reception where the Prime Minister could say a few words and then mingle with legislators.
 - <u>Football Event</u>: with local sports dignitaries and young/school teams. Might best be done in conjunction with Newcastle United who are currently trying to enter the Chinese Premiership via "Hong Kong United". Would allow good photo opportunities and appeal to the key youth market.
 - <u>Launch of new Rolls Royce car</u>: Rolls Royce are launching their new marque in April. The Prime Minister might travel between two venues in a new car, to mark the launch. Although Rolls Royce cars may conjure up a traditional image of Britain, the new model highlights UK creativity and design. TPUK are content with this proposal.
 - Business lunch: Our preference is for a small roundtable lunch for about 20 guests from the British and local business community. The Prime Minister would need to say a few words which would be followed by a round-table discussion. Alternatively a luncheon speech to the British/General Chambers of Commerce, which would guarantee a large audience. A trade policy/commercial theme would be appropriate but not obligatory. The Prime Minister did give a speech to a business audience during his last visit in 1998.

• Education event: The UK is the foreign destination of choice for Hong Kong students and we have met, with the help of Dr Li Ka-shing, the Prime Minister's goal of expanding the Chevening Scholarship scheme in Hong Kong and mainland China by a third. (We propose to arrange a short one-to-one meeting with Dr Li in the margins of this event). The British Council's English Language Teaching operation in Hong Kong is their largest in the world and the Council are celebrating their 50th anniversary in Hong Kong this year. With this in mind, we suggest a roundtable at the British Council with Education Secretary Arthur Li and two young practitioners, one British, one local, in front of an invited audience. This could be followed by a short Q&A session. The event could be filmed in order to reach a wider audience. This would give the Prime Minister the opportunity further to promote the British education system and develop closer UK/Hong Kong education links: both systems face similar problems and challenges.

b) deliverables

The most important element of the visit is the visible manifestation of the Prime Minister's commitment to Hong Kong (during his 1998 visit he said publicly that "the commitment of Britain to Hong Kong, and my own personal commitment to Hong Kong, remains and will never, ever disappear"). Hong Kong continues to value the close links with the UK but needs reassuring that we continue to take a close interest in their affairs. The timing of the visit is important: contentious national security legislation will be going through LegCo when the Prime Minister is there. We have discreetly led international efforts to get the SAR Government to water down some of the more controversial of their legislative proposals.

The draft programme would also allow the Prime Minister to:

- Promote British commercial interests (by launching the new Rolls Royce marque in a key market)
- Promote Newcastle United FC's plans to enter the Chinese Premiership via "Hong Kong United"

PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT TO THE FAR EAST

The FCO have put together a draft itinerary for the Prime Minister's visit to the far east, which is planned for the week after Easter. Before putting ideas to the Prime Minister I should be grateful for your and copy recipients' comments, by Monday 17th February. The key bit of the paper is the annotated itinerary in Annex 1.

To get the ball rolling, my initial thoughts are:

• The itinerary looks tight, travelling every day. If we were to drop something I would be inclined to go for Shanghai, which looks weak day. I quite like Western China – not for the giant Buddah, but because this would be a good way to see economic transformation in real, poor China (i.e. not the coast).

• Good opportunities for major speeches – on reform (which would resonate here and in Japan) and on Foreign policy. Not so sure about a business speech in Hong Kong.

• But are there enough domestic handles to justify the Prime Minister's time?

• We should look for foreign policy deliverables in both China and Japan – notably on North Korea.

• Is there enough downtime, and is it at the right times (mostly evening, but we could create some time during the day in Tokyo by dropping the British Council).

• Raffarin will be in China at the same time. I think it would be really good to do a joint event with him – grateful for any ideas.

FCO have proposed that business delegations (one for Japan, one for China) should accompany the Prime Minister, along with Liz Symons to look after them.

VISIT TO EDINBURGH ROYAL INFIRMARY

You are visiting the new £200 million Edinburgh Royal Infirmary for the second time in 18 months on Friday at lunchtime. You will be able to see how the hospital has changed from a shell to a working building well on the way to moving into its second phase. It is the biggest PPP project in Scotland and has been on target and on budget throughout. The first phase of the hospital was opened in January 2002 and the second phase is on track to become operational in the spring of this year. 1200 staff are already working on site dealing with patients using the first 200 of the 869 beds planned for the hospital. When fully operational the hospital, which will also have a medical school, will have 5,000 staff.

You will travel from the airport with Jack McConnell and will be met at the hospital by Helen Liddell, the Chairman of the Hospital Trust Professor Patricia Peattie and the Chief Executive, Stuart Gray. Around 50 members of staff will also be at the entrance of the hospital to greet you. (You will be able to spend more time with that group during the second part of the visit.) From the entrance you will go straight to the X ray department where the Superintendent Radiographer Kathryn Stewart will take you to meet a patient being x –rayed

using the state of the art equipment they have on site. You will then rejoin the others in the party to see how the x-ray is processed. A small media pool will be present.

You will then walk to the education suite where you will have an opportunity to meet the staff who greeted you at the front door. They will include consultants, doctors, nurses, lab technicians, domestics and porters as will the Chairman of NHS Lothian, Brian Cavanagh; the Chief Executive of NHS Lothian, James Barbour; Contractor Bob Anderson; Chief Executive of Consort Healthcare (who own the building) Mike Archbold. A media pool will come into the education suite for the last few minutes of your meeting with staff. The visit will last around 35 minutes and you will then travel to the Caledonian Hotel where you will be met by the General Manager Dagmar Muhle.

Dear David,

I am writing to you regarding the letter dated 22 May 2002 from Mr Tom Williams, Managing Director and General Manager of Airbus UK, inviting the Prime Minister to open the new Manufacturing Centre at Broughton, Wales.

Airbus hope that the Prime Minister will be able to open formally the new factory in late May or June. German Chancellor Gerhard Schroeder will be opening the Airbus factory in Hamburg where much of the fuselage for the A380 will be manufactured on 21 May. My Secretary of State, Patricia Hewitt, supports Airbus's request.

Airbus UK manufactures the wings for all types of Airbus aircraft. Wings for the new A380 "superjumbo" are currently being designed and developed, with the support of government launch investment to the tune of £530m. The new West Factory, with a floor space of 84,000 square metres, is where the wings for the Airbus A380 will be manufactured, prior to onward transportation to the final assembly line in Toulouse, France. The total UK content of the wing production is around 70 per cent by Airbus UK and other suppliers.

Airbus UK currently employs around 9,000 people, but estimates that it supports 68,000 jobs, through indirect and induced employment throughout the supply chain. The A380 programme will create and support another 23,000 jobs. Airbus UK is also the largest private-sector employer in Flintshire, where wage levels are higher than elsewhere in Wales. The company is also the biggest employer of apprentices in Wales, with a total of currently 590 in apprenticeships and graduate trainee programmes at Broughton and its other manufacturing facility in Filton.

What the Government is doing to promote work-life balance

New changes from 6 April:

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- Increase in statutory maternity pay to £100 per week (from £75).
- Increase in maternity leave from 18 to 26 weeks paid and an extra 26 available unpaid.
- 2 weeks paid paternity leave.
- Reforming the tax credit system
- Child Tax Credit (CTC) and childcare element of Working Tax Credit (WTC) will be paid to the main carer, usually the mother.
- 9 out of 10 families with children expected to be eligible for CTC which will combine with Child Benefit to deliver up to £54.10 a week in support for first child, compared to £27.70 a week in April 1997.
- A family with two children and a combined income of less than £50,000 are guaranteed £37.20 a week.

What we've already done:

- Parental leave parents have a right to take up to 13 weeks unpaid leave in the child's first 5 years.
- Time off for dependants all employees have the right to unpaid time off work to deal with an emergency involving a dependant.
- Free early education all 4 year olds and 70% of 3 year olds have access to free early education places (guaranteeing a place for every 3 year old by next April).
- Childcare places created new childcare places for over a million children (on target for places for 1.6 million children next year).
- Funding for out of school childcare including breakfast clubs, after school and all year round holiday provision.
- Sure Start childcare, education and health services for young children and their parents in deprived areas.

Policy questions

- Q. Lots of the new measures/new legislation sound good, plus new children's tax and working tax credits are also great for many. But what about going the whole hog and making all childcare (including nannies) tax deductible? Many women don't want to leave a child at a nursery, or find the hours for a child minder difficult when working.
- We understand the costs parents face bringing up children and we're on their side working to give them extra security and support. We want every parent to be able to access good quality, affordable childcare. But making all childcare tax deductible would be costly and our priority has been to target resources on those groups most in need of Govt support.
- We have created over 600,000 new childcare places benefiting nearly 1.1 million children and will have places to help 1.6 million children by March 2004 (in England).
- We are helping families through the Child Tax Credit 9 out of 10 families with children are expected to be eligible which will combine with Child Benefit to deliver up to £54.10 a week in support for the first child.
- Childcare tax credit is already available for parents on low to medium incomes and is worth up to £140 per week on childcare costs of £200 per week.
- From April this year parents who use registered childcare [Note: this
 does not include nannies] in the parents' home will for the first time be
 eligible for childcare tax credit. These changes will benefit families who
 need home-based care, such as those with disabled children or
 shiftworkers.
- Currently only existing registered childminders will be eligible to apply
 to become approved homecarers but we are considering how to widen
 entry to the scheme.

Q. What are the greatest achievements of your Government as far as the work/life balance issue goes?

- One key achievement is the new legal right for parents to request to work flexibly. We estimate that 3.8 million parents will be eligible and employers will have a legal duty to consider the request seriously. They will only be able to refuse when there are clear business reasons for doing so. (Applies to parents of children under 6 and disabled children under 18).
- And that is just one of a whole package of measures coming into force in April to give parents more choice and support than ever before about

how they balance work and family life including:
Increase in maternity leave (26 weeks paid, 26 weeks unpaid) and
maternity pay (£100 pw)
For the first time fathers have a right to two weeks paid paternity leave
Introduced comparable rights for adoptive parents

Q. In the UK, we have the longest working hours in Europe. Do you plan to do anything to address the hours we work here? This question is aimed at the work/life balance of everyone, not just those with

children.

 We're introducing a right specifically for parents of young and disabled children because they face some of the greatest challenges in balancing work and home life. But we also recognise that work-life balance is important for all employees, a concept we promote through our worklife balance campaign.

- Companies offering flexibility have seen real business benefits, eg in retention of staff and increased profitability. Many businesses have already adapted, as traditional 9-5 working practices are no longer suitable for all employers or their staff. While the new legislation sets a minimum standard, I believe the best companies will recognise the benefits of offering flexibility across the workforce.
- I want to congratulate the many companies who are leading the way in introducing flexible working. Asda, for example, provides all staff with a range of flexible working practices, including shift swapping and job share. Older staff can take a three month unpaid winter holiday while parents can stop work for short periods during the summer holidays. The popularity of these policies was recognised when staff voted Asda the best employer to work for in a Sunday Times survey.
- The Government too is committed to ensuring staff achieve a good work-life balance and excessive hours are minimised. Over 75,000 civil servants now work part-time including more than 100 top civil servants.
 Departments also offer a range of flexible working options for staff and support for parents including subsidised childcare (eg nursery vouchers or for after-school clubs).
- I'm also pleased that, as part of a package of reforms, the working day of the House of Commons has been altered to fit more closely to the hours that most other people work.
- Q. In a culture where we do work the longest hours in Europe and there are fears for job security, how can we bring about a sea change in attitude to allow for better work life balance?

- We're moving in the right direction but we do need a culture change to combat long hours working. To help achieve a true spread of flexible working we need to encourage more men to work flexibly. This is particularly important given that UK fathers work the longest hours, on average 46.1 hours a week. And, we need to get rid of the perception that flexible working is being perceived as a barrier to career progression we need more flexible working senior managers. I'd like to see that in Government and elsewhere.
- And, work-life balance is a key tool in retaining staff with many employees now seeing flexibility as the top job benefit. Companies have told us that they use work life balance measures as a way of keeping their best staff and as a tool to motivate their teams.

VISIT TO THE NORTH EAST – FRIDAY FEBRUARY 7

You are opening two community centres and presenting an award at a school on Friday morning. You also have some private meetings at Myrobella (constituents, the Chief Constable and the Bishop of Durham) about which you will receive separate notes.

Bellevue Sports, Youth and Community Centre, Hartlepool, 0920-0945

Thanks to £1.7 million funding from New Deal for the Communities, the Centre has been extended and the existing parts of the centre refurbishment. It has quickly become a hub of activity, used by local people of all ages and backgrounds, while a number of local charities and support groups have office space in the building. The centre is helping local people gain access to education and training, employment and benefits opportunities, and improve their health and fitness levels. It also provides young people and children with more exciting educational and productive alternatives to criminal and anti-social behaviour and encourages good citizenship.

You will be met by Bob Farrow, Centre manager, who will take you on a quick tour of the centre. Peter Mandelson will accompany you.

- You will start in the new dance studio where some of the older users will be playing carpet bowls, they will almost certainly invite you to have a go, it looked fairly straightforward to me but I haven't played (media pool present).
- You will then see the fitness studio in use by local people, you shouldn't accept any invitation to use the equipment (media pool present).
- You will then pop into one of the centre's two gyms. Here you will see students from the local FE college doing circuit training as well as young people from a local centre for people with learning difficulties doing some king of PE again resist any temptation to participate (media pool present).
- Finally you will go to the main reception area for the unveiling ceremony.
 There will be a short introduction from Bob Farrow and Malcolm Walker NDC co-ordinator. You will then be invited to speak and unveil a plaque. You are expected to speak for just a couple of minutes. There will be an audience of about 100 (open media access).

South Hetton Community Centre (Robin Todd Centre), Easington, 1015-1040

The community centre was established in 1983, although it has its roots in the Miners' Reading Room. The centre has recently moved to a new £750,000 site having received around funding from amongst others the Community Fund, the Coalfields Regeneration Fund, One North East, and the Northern Rock Foundation. It opened for use in September. Along with the 300 members, the centre is used by the wider community including the village primary school who use the hall for PE, Easington PCT who use it for board meetings and the FE college who run courses there.

You will be met by Robin Todd, after whom the centre is named. Robin has been a (Labour) district councillor for the past 40 years. He will take you on a brief tour of the centre, dropping into the games room with the decades-old snooker table, a rehearsal of the awarding-winning Broughton Brass Band and finally the IT suite (media pool present for entire tour). You will then go into the hall, with Robin introducing you to representatives of the funding bodies on your way to the platform. The rest of the audience will be a mixture of residents and local dignitaries. Robin will speak first then invite you to speak and unveil a plaque. He will then ask you to make four presentations to people who have been key to the rebuilding project (open media access).

Return to Myrobella.

Hurworth School, 1310-1340

The school, in your constituency, has been transformed under the leadership of head teacher Eamonn Farrar who joined in 1995. It is among the top ten most improved schools in the country after increasing the number of A* to C grades at GCSE in the past four years from 38% to 66%. It has done particularly well in ICT (you opened their first ICT suite in 1996), with a remarkable 40% of pupils gaining an A or A* in last year's computing GCSEs and 87% of all pupils achieving a GCSE pass in the subject. Not surprisingly, the school has applied for Specialist School status in Maths and Computing. At some point during the visit you should tell the head that the application has been **successful** and that he will get formal notification from the department later in the day.

The actual purpose of your visit is the present the school with a National Healthy School Award. This is a joint DoH/DfES initiative designed to give practical support for schools to create an enjoyable, safe, productive learning environment and minimise health risks. This means specific work on issues like drug use, sex and relationships education, physical exercise, safety, bullying and healthy eating. The school is one of first three in the region to receive an award.

You will be met by Eammon Farrar who will take you straight into one of the ICT suites. Here you will have an opportunity to mingle with guests including John Williams, Leader of the Council, a small number of governors, the two deputy heads, two newly qualified teachers as well as a few pupils (members of the school council, the head boy and girl etc). Eammon will then make a short introduction and invite you to speak. (**media pool throughout**). We have to leave there promptly at 13.40 in order to catch the train from Darlington station.
