



H.O.W. no. PS 13205 on Mrs Lizy HONTGMANN @ PHILBY is due for the December review. The reason for the imposition of the H.O.W. was that Mrs HONIGHANN is known to have been a Russian spy and may well still be in contact with the Russian Intelligence Service. From our coverage we have established that Mrs HONTGMANN is still in contact with a circle of suspected R.I.S. agents in this country. The H.O.W. has not produced a great deal of correspondence. The few letters intercepted so far, however, have proved to be of interest and have confirmed the current contact between Mrs HONTGMANN and the R.I.S. suspects in U.K.

We are continuing our programme of interviews of these suspects and are therefore anxious to cover any reactions to these interviews. I should, accordingly, be grateful if the H.O.W. could be revalidated for a further period of six months under Category B.

Coverage taken up again as the DISCARDS came in GERDA asked "what's this big parcel? Yes no - that's LITZI's thing and I have to - on the chair in PETER's room are all LITZI's things". She told EDWARD to take 'the big parcel' in there and put it with the other things. EDWARD left the room and GERDA humming to herself. (HITCHMAN) When EDWARD came back GERDA spoke of HANS having asked her where she had got the Austrian Cockery Book' from as he wanted it for JOAN's birthday. JOAN had seen it on GERDA's windowsill and thought it was lovely because it had 'a lot of chatter' with book - sorry to interrupt you - on your windowsill is KIM PHILBY's book". Incoming call from ILONA to GERDA. nice ILONA had no special news. GERDA went on to say - I had a/letter from LITZI who sonds you lots of love'. ILONA-'I wrote to work her'. 'GERDA:-'Yes, well, she hasn't said that in the letter because her-' ILONA:-'Well, I suppose she hasn't had it yet'. GERDA: -'Her letter is about a week old and she sends you lots of love and hopes you are well and so on'. TLOHA:-'Is she ok?' GERDA:-'Yes, she says she's ok. She's had a few days in Budapest'. 4. BLUNT said that he did not know d'ANTAL and had not known him at Cambridge. He asked whether he was a Hungarian and I said that he was. He said that any Central European who was a friend of PHILBY would be worth our attention. Before the war, owing to the influence of Lizy, Central Europeans were of special significance in the PHILBY world. He, PHILBY, trusted and admired them, regarded them as the salt of the earth. If d'ANTAL had Communist associations and was a good ideological bet, PHILBY would almost certainly have put him up for possible recruitment. At this stage BLUNT elaborated at great length about Austrians in England, emphasising what a dynamic character Lizy was and how close she was to Guy, particularly in the late thirties and early forties. I took this opportunity to remind him that he had said, in discussing the events of the fifties, that the only

non-Russian with whom he had had contact over "the game" was Lizy. How could he reconcile this with his earlier statement to Arthur Martin that when he was out of touch in 1939-40 he re-established contact through Bob STEWART? I had been under the impression that he had met Bob. BLUNT claimed that in that case he had misled us: he had not met Bob - he certainly would not have risked doing such a thing when he was He insisted that Lizy had been in the office! the intermediary. I asked him to tell me the mechanics of this. (He does not like having to describe the mechanics of any episode). BLUNT said that when he and BURGESS were out of touch they became rather desperate, wanting to pass all the good material they had and not being able to. Guy discussed the problem with Lizy, Lizy with Edith TUDOR-HART, Edith with Bob STEWART, and this formed the chain of contact: Guy to Lizy to Edith to Bob. It was Edith who could meet Bob STEWART. I then asked BLUNT if all the people in "the game" known to Guy were using this channel or if any of them was in touch with the Russians. said he did not know the answer to this but common sense would suggest that Guy would have asked everyone he knew "in the game" if they were in contact, and the fact that Guy remained out of touch proved that the others he knew were in the same position.

She did not complete the sentence but later implied that Lizy was probably unable to get away because of her film-dubbing work. 2. We know that Gerda had not heard from Lizy for some considerable time and, having had no reply to her letter to Lizy of ... August 1968 proposing the DISCARDS' plans for their current visit, eventually telephoned Lizy in East Berlin on 27 August 1968. In the course of that conversation Lizy made no mention of Vienna whatsoever. 3. We think it is reasonable to assume from this that Gerda can only have heard of Lizy's change of plans with regard to her Vienna visit from Paul and Ala LOW-BEER at Champex. It further seems likely that Lizy changed her plans on hearing about our SMOLKA interviews from the LOW-BEERs at Budapest at end May 1968 (my letter of even number dated 12 June 1968 refers.) It is of course also possible that the SMOLKAS wrote direct to Lizy after those interviews to say that they could not have her to stay this year. Extract from report of interview of Mrs Anita KAUFMANN nee JAECKEL on the 15th August 1968 at Room 055. The interview was conducted by D1/Inv/M.L.B. Williams

I told her that I was an officer of M.I.5. and that we had for long been engaged in the investigation of the PHILBY/BURGESS espionage circle. Many people had talked freely to us on this subject, including defectors from the K.G.B., and, as she might be aware, PHILBY himself had confessed to being a Russian spy before his own defection. Anita said that she did not know this. She added, "I am still in touch with Lizy who was his first wife and whom I loved dearly. She is a very nice person. When I met him they were just good friends and no more".

ll. Anita then said that she thought she knew of Lizy, while she was still in Vienna. She would have heard about her from her sister Lotte and might even have met her once. Kim PHILBY's sister, Pat or Diana or possibly both of them once came to Vienna and stayed with the SMOLKA parents in order to learn German.

19. Anita said that she did not ever stay with the SMOLKAs when they were living with Lizy; she was "out of the picture then and very hurt at the time". This was in July/August 1939. Anita had been helping Lotte with the two SMOLKA children and Peter and Anita did not see eye to eye, although this was not on politics. When the war was obviously coming the SMOLKAs sent their children with Anita to the country. This was to Wallingford to stay with Ferdinand KUNE (or KUHN) of the 'New York Times', a friend of SMOLKA with a wife named Delia or Diana or something similar. Anita and the children stayed with these people until war broke out. They then returned to London. At this point I asked Anita why, on the 29th August 1939, she had applied for a travel permit. She said that she did not remember and had no idea, and she seemed genuinely very surprised. Anita continued to speculate as to why she should have wanted this travel permit. She said that her father had put her down for a U.S. Immigration affidavit but this was before he left Vienna which was at Easter 1939. She wondered if perhaps it was because she was so unhappy at the time that she wanted to get out of England. She was madly in love at the time with someone in America who had gone there in 1938. His His name was John KLAUBER and she said he was as anti-Socialist as he could be. He was an ex-Viennese but now a U.S. citizen and a surgeon in New York and was very happily married. He and Anita had been just friends in Vienna but had had an affaire in London. Anita advanced this as a possible explanation for her application for a travel permit but she still did not remember it.

/20. When....

20. When Anita and the SMOLKA children returned to London at the beginning of the war Lotte told her that they had decided to put the children in a home; Peter had much less money than before and they thought that for economy's sake it was cheaper to go to Lizy. Anita would have to go to the Jewish Aid Committee. Anita was "kicked around and did not care". She only visited the flat which the SMOLKAs and Lizy shared two or three times a year. As she understood it Lizy shared the cost of the flat fifty-fifty. Anita repeated that this was where she met Kim PHILBY, at the Downing Court flat. Anita came to help instal them when they moved into this flat but Kim only came as a visitor and did not move in with them. He and Lizy were only friends then and Anita thought that Lizy was, by that time, in love with Georg HONIGMANN. Until all the later publicity, Anita was under the impression that Lizy divorced Kim because he was a Fascist. When she mentioned the publicity to Gerda, Gerda seemed equally surprised, at least that was what Anita thought at the time but "now I see it through your eyes, I don't know". She added, "I said, 'Does Lizy know?' like a damn fool:" Had she ever talked it all over with Gerda since? "No, not really, somehow we always by-pass it. Gerda's house is always full of people and often young people." Anita said that the occasions when she met Kim PHILBY were not parties but merely when she came to the flat for tea for an hour or two.

30. Later when she was called by the Labour Exchange to obtain essential warwork she asked Lotte what she should do. Lotte said that she would ask Lizy who had a good job at a factory (Multitone Electric Co.). Lizy had been employed at Multitone for at least a year before Anita went there in August 1943. She said that she did not know how Lizy got into Multitone in the first place. She only knew the POLIAKOFFs as the bosses and not at all closely. She did not think that they could be political; she remembered young POLIAKOFF was generally called a weed. He was a very bloodless young man. Lizy did not know him well as far as she knew.

31. Anita said that during her work at Multitone she was not really a Communist herself but preferred to help them rather than "the other lot". She mentioned that there was no middle of the road in the factory; it was necessary to be either Left or Right. She herself sold the 'Daily Worker' in the factory having picked copies up at Edgware Road Underground Station. This was all organised by Lizy. She said that there were other Multitone employees engaged in this activity. There was a girl called Trilby and another called Ann GREY who was a shop steward. Anita told me that Lizy was living with George HONIGMANN at that time. I asked her if Lizy was still having other flirtations. She replied "Not real ones, she was a very lively girl but no affaires, definitely not." She did not know if Lizy was friendly with any young Englishmen at that time. Although she used to see her every day at the factory, socially they only met very occasionally and there were no more parties. Anita herself was already living with George KAUFMANN "which was scorned upon by one and all". I askedif he had anything to do with the Circle. She said "he laughed himself silly when I talked about it. He had the best angle to cure Communism: he thought it was terribly funny and I resented it so much that I gradually stopped seeing them all."

34. In 1944 Anita was dismissed from Multitone because she took time off to attend a Jewish Passover festival against instructions. Lizy was still there at the time and as far as Anita could remember was still there until nearly the end of the war. Afterwards Lizy obtained a job as a shorthand typist with Anita's friend George KAUFMANN.

35. Anita claimed to have no idea whether Lizy was in contact at all with Kim PHILBY during this period. There was "some odd reason" why they could not get a divorce. "Either they did not have the money or something", she said. Lizy was always very short of cash. (I showed Anita the photograph of Anatoli GORSKY GROMOV. Her comment was "seems familiar" but she could not put a name to the face. She said she might have seen him.) Anita said that she never saw Kim PHILBY at that time. She seemed to remember there was talk of him living somewhere in the South of England and having four or five children. I said that that was in fact much later — in the 1950s, and asked her who would have told her this. She said she thought that this was in the time Kim could not get a divorce but was living with someone who changed her name to his. I confirmed that this was correct. Anita said that in the 1950s she definitely knew nothing of the PHILBYs any more. Very occasionally she wrote to Lizy and sent her a compact or a pullover or something. She had no idea what job Kim was doing during the war; Lizy never talked about him.

36. Anita said that she definitely had the impression that Lizy was divorcing Kim because he was such a Fascist - "right up until now."

.

39. We reverted to the subject of Lizy. Anita said, "HONIGMANN disappeared before Lizy in 1946 and she was worried out of her wits because she thought he was dead for some reason. She stayed a night in our flat crying her eyes out - me as her mother-confessor HONIGMANN left for West Germany and then disappeared to East Germany but Lizy had no news of him for some time. She added, "Lizy also disappeared. I don't think she even said goodbye".

40. I asked if she had herself ever been behind the Iron Curtain

She said never, but she had been wanting to, mainly in order to see Lizy "but I think I won't now, I have had enough". She was also interested in looking into business prospects with East European countries. They had sent some products to Prague. She said that she had not met Lizy in Vienna on any of Lizy's recent trips there and she had in fact never seen her again since 1946. Their very occasional letters were purely personal, never political. She thought that Lizy had been in Vienna two or three times at the most but she added, "I think she goes to Hungary quite often". I asked her if she knew why. "No idea", she replied. Did she regard Lizy as a close friend of Paul and Ala LÖW-BEER? "She probably would be but not as close as Gerda." Anita had never met Beatrice SPITZ but thought that she lived with the LÖW-BEERs. She said, "All I know about the LÖW-BEERs is that they have a fantastic household where no hours are kept, where anybody can eat at any time; they are very wealthy, very kind, helping left, right and centre. Ala is a very good doctor and works very hard. Paul, I thought, was a very kind man. This is why I am so surprised that he should be a spy of all things". She said that she knew of the SOBLE case but had never met them. She had never talked politics to the LOW-BEERs at all and only knew them very superficially.

46. Anita said that her friendship with Gerda is on a very private basis. Edward is one of seven. The family is enormous but "our relationship is such that if the whole house is full I still have room under the kitchen table. It is a sort of second home and it has been like that ever since I came to England. I admire her enormously for her freshness and her positiveness. She is incredibly capable. Probably a bit like Lizy who is also extremely capable. Weaker characters are impressed by them." With regard to the relationship between Gerda and Lizy, Anita said, "They have always been very close but I should not think it is political but rather very personal".

Either I go to Berlin or she comes to Leipzig which is not yet decided because we have not yet decided if we go as we usually do or if we go earlier."

They usually like to go to the second half of the Autumn fair. I asked Gerda if she was still quite unworried by the prospect of going to East Germany. She replied, "I have made up my mind not to say a word about all this to Lizy. I have not told anyone else and I will not tell Lizy, so why should I be werried?" I reminded her that she was going to East Berlin to see a Russian spy. I asked her if she was now anti-Communist. She replied, "I think anti-Communist as Communism stays now not anti-Socialist because one has had one's ideals and these stay". She added, "I have told you absolutely everything. Private things more than I have told anyone else. I will not give up my friends. I feel absolutely without any guilt. Otherwise I would be frightened to go anywhere and if I can't convince you I will see you again but with my husband".

enquiries if only because they had agents amongst her circle. They might not know that we had been questioning her but they would certainly suspect that she would be questioned during the course of our enquiries. She was between the devil and the deep blue see and things could never again be quite the same for her. As usual Gerds constantly interrupted this statement. She said that she had to chance the possibility that the Russians knew that she had been interviewed by us. If they asked her she would say no. She did not want to be involved. I told her that she was involved whether she liked it or not. I asked her which side she was on. Was she with us or not in our efforts to clear up the PHILBY/BURGESS espionage complex? She said yes. I said that in that case we would expect to be able to consult her when we wished. I then asked her if she would be prepared to take a verbal message from me to Lizy suggesting a meeting in Vienna. She said promptly. "No. I want only to be out of it all. You can send any courier you like, I do not want to be involved in any spy business". I said that I quite accepted that she should not want to take the message.

18. Gerda then asked me to confirm that these interviews were between her and me only. I did so but said that of course I only represented my organisation. I asked her to confirm that she had not breathed a word of it to anyone else apart from her husband. She replied, "No one whatsoever. I made up my mind after the first interview and my husband agreed. You only start a horrible lot of upset if you say to someone you have been with M.I.5. and they asked about you". I reminded her that I had in any case told her that the interviews came under the C.S.A. She agreed, saying "I stick to this". (Comment: The technical coverage in Champex reveals beyond reasonable doubt that Gerda and Edward discussed the interviews in detail with Paul Löw-BEER and may even have written a report for them.)

19. I told Gerda that we would like to feel that we could call on her to come and see us, for instance, after her visit to East Germany. She said she would but together with her husband because "I feel I cannot get very far with you, you suspect me. You either believe me or you don't. I said to my husband that as you had asked for my passport you do not believe a word I say. He said, 'This is his business'". At my request Gerda agreed to check with her husband the date of her visit to Budapest when they met Lizy and the LÖW-BEERs and also the year when they changedy their routine from going to the Leipsig Spring Fair to attending the Autumn one. On this point Gerda said that they used to go on to the Leipzig Fair after the Nuremburg Spring Fair but then there started to be a gap between the two Fairs. The last time they went to both Spring Fairs everything was completely snowed-up, both in Europedand in England. (Comment: This would seem to place it in the exceptionally cold Winter of 1962/63.)

21. I saked Gerda to confirm that we could count on her as an ally and that British national security meant as much to her as it meant to us. She replied, "Yes, certainly as much". I suggested to her that she was taking a risk in visiting East Berlin and we expected that she might well be questioned. She interjected, "But why?" I said because she was involved. She said, "This is the whole point really, the whole point. For some reason I might have been involved and I can see how you can think that. May could easily have involved me but for some odd reason she did not. We were friends from the beginning and politics in the sense of doing anything just did not exist and therefore I do not think for a minute that Liny would say, "Talk to her", why should she?"

22. In the course of a discussion which followed concerning the relative methods of interrogation by us and by the Communist police Gorda referred to having seen the East Berlin police showelling snow "that year when we decided we would never go in the winter again". (Comment: This further suggests that they visited Lisy in East Berlin early in 1965.) I told her that we should not have been surprised if she decided never to see Lizy again. She replied, "My husband and I have discussed the possibility of not seeing Lisy again but if we decide we suddenly would not she might come to Leipsig and surely it might need some explanation. It is much the best to carry on as we always carry on. I do not wish to give any explanation to Lizy because if it is correct what you say about her, and I think it is correct because of having seen all the evidence, then if I tell her anything at all why I am not seeing her then I as in danger". Garda added, "Why are you so interested that I do not go there?" I said that I did not mind in the least whether she did go there or not but she would have to choose which side ahe was on. She said, "If I do not go to the Fairs any more I would have to drop my business eltogather". I asked her if all her business was then in the East? She replied, "No, only that side of my business. If I do not go and see my suppliers it just drops, because I have the sole agency for England, little carved figures etc.". She repeated, "If the Russians call me in and ask me if I had been questioned by M.I.5. I would say 'no'. I told her that there would be no great damage to our interest if she said yes. She said, "My loyalty is not to them. Why should I say yos?" I said that that would be between her and them. There was nothing we could do to protect her.

23. Finally we agreed that if I had semething very important to see her about before her departure for East Germany I would telephone her, otherwise we would drop her passport and photographs in at her husband's shop. I said I would like to see her after she came back from Leipzig. She said all right but she would come with her husband. I said I thought it would be better if I saw them separately. She said that she had asked her husband whether he would be prepared to help her if I still did not seem to believe her. He had said he would.

The interviews were conducted by D1/Inv/M.L.B.W. I enclose reports on my interviews of Gerda "DISCARD" on 18 and 24 me 1968. You heard these interviews, but it may be useful to you to we these reports which I have prepared after a careful listening to the tapes. This has confirmed that Gerda has unquestionably been lying and withholding information on a number of points. The areas on which Gerda is withholding the truth seem to me to be as follows: c) Her knowledge of Guy BURGESS and his R.I.S. association with Lizy PHILBY. (Here, as you know, we have some collateral from our coverage.) d) Her knowledge of FOXY and Lizy's Mediterranean tour in summer 1937 and of the circumstances of Lizy's move to Paris in September 1937. e) Her claimed ignorance of FOXY's visit to Lizy in 1945 g) Her knowledge of Stefan KAUFMANN's association with Lizy PHILBY and travels behind the Iron Curtain. Here we know from our coverage that she is lying. This suggests that KAUFMANN may be a more significant figure than we had hitherto appreciated, and we are now making further enquiries concerning his visit to London 12-15 May.

h) Her knowledge of Lizy's meeting with the LOW-BEERs in Budapest at the end of May 1968. The fact that she suppressed her knowledge of that meeting tends to confirm the significance which we had already attributed to it (see my letter of even number dated 12 June 1968.) i) Her knowledge of Lizy's use of John PEET's address in East Berlin as an accommodation address. The new information elicited from Gerda that strikes me as of most interest is: c) The Lizy/HONIGMANN menage in East Berlin (para 29 of the second report). d) The two-day meeting between the DISCARDs, the LOW-BEERs and Lizy in Budapest in 1963 or 1964 (para 32 of the second report). It is tempting to think that this may have occurred at the time of the DISCARDs' first visit to Europe after the PHILBY defection. It would be relevant too that about the same time the DISCARDs changed their routine from attending the Spring Leipzig Fair to attending the Autumn one (para 30 of the second report). Gerda said that she had not met Lizy FHILDY before cobing to England. The first met her at a party at her Bostor's house. This was a Dr. LINARN who was also SHOLKA's doctor. He was later killed in a motor accident in Switzerland. Kim PHILDY was not at the party and she never haw much of him, although "I have met Kim several times in my life". He had Lizy occasionally lived together in the same flat but their marriage had started to break up. Gerda took an immediate liking to Lizy and they were soon close friends. She said, "I stayed memorous times with Lizy and shared her bedroom. Kim stayed in the other rece whenever he was there, which was very seldom". Gerda said, "Kim, I always felt, was hostils to me and to Lizy's friends and I thought of him as following in the footsteps of his father". When I asked her what explanation Lizy have her for Kim's going to the Franco side in Spain, she claimed that Lizy said to her, "Oh, Kim's a pig".

10. Cords them proceeded to tell me about a visit with May to the PHILBY's notings in Wales. 12. Gerda agreed that she say Lisy in Paris after May had moved there in the outumn of 1937. She claimed that Lisy gave her no special reason for moving to Peris, expect that her marriage was breaking up.

The end Edward spent a few nights at Lisy's studio flat in Montparnasse of Christmas 1937. Lisy had a big party there in the course of their lay. Afterwards Edward returned to the U.K. while: Gorda took the LLBY girls (Helens and ?Diana) from Paris to Vienna where they were to learn Gorman. Gerda wanted to return to Austria to see her family but Lisy did not want to go back to Austria herself. Half Gerda's reil fare was paid for her but she did not know who arranged this trip.

- 13. Gerda said that she and Edward stayed for a week or so with Lizy at Grosrouvre outside Paris in 1938. Lizy rented what Gerda described as a little country cottage there. An old woman cooked for her but Gerda did not remember anybody else being there. I asked her if the names de BUISSON and Alex, an artist, rang any bells with here. She said no, but she remembered an artist called Feter connected with Lizy in Paris. (Comment: This is presumably the Butch artist, Peter DAMSTE.)
- 14. Then the DISCARDs were in France on holiday just before the war started Edward returned to London whilst Gerda stayed a week longer in France visiting a cousin and an aunt. She got a letter from Edward saying that she must come homein view of the international situation. In the letter was a message from Lizy asking her to bring over her teddy bear. Gerda spent a night at Lizy's second flat in Paris and brought Lizy's teddy bear to London from there.
- in Spain as a journalist for The Times. She explained that in 1940 she and Edward moved out of London to the country (Tring) and she then saw much less of her old friends, although Lizy used to come to visit them occasionally during the war. She remembered one occasion when Lizy came out with Dr. and Mrs. ALTHANN (see paragraph 9 above). In answer to my question, she at first professed not to know that Lizy had any employment during the war but when I said that she must surely remember that Lizy was engaged in war work, she suddenly remembered that Lizy worked in a war factory somewhere near the Angel, Islington, together with Anita JAECKEL.

- 17. In answer to my question, she said "I did not really know Guy BURGESS, I heard the name no doubt. When all this blow up I thought it must have been the one who was always drunk. I may have met him and indeed I probably did because I remember a drunk friend but perhaps Kim had other drunk friends". Again in answer to my question, "I didn't associate him with Lizy at all, not in the least". With regard to the PHELBYS' other friends, she said "I remember distinctly one or two other men belonging strictly to Kim's side and I didn't even know their names, although I am sure we were introduced. One of them helped us to buy the car but I don't know who that was, he was tall and thin".
- kept away from the Austrian Centre because it smelt of onions. She mentioned a Mr and Mrs KRISS but promptly added that they did not belong to that Circle. She also mentioned a couple by the name of JOSS. He was the Cartoonist for the Star. She believed that he had committed suicide. With regard to Anita JAECKEL, she described her as "a nice person but very stupid". Gerda said that SMOLKA had visited them at Tring "a few years back". She described him as an extraordinary person, asking me "Have you seen him recently?" and adding that if I had I would know that he was paralysed. She said that "He made use of his friends and if they were no use to him any more he dropped them. He dropped us after we were married. He collects celebritles".

20. Gerda told me that every year for a long time she and Edward see Lisy on account of their business dealings in East Germany. "To often ask her if she has neard anything from Rim" and "She always answers, no". The said that she and her friends were sorry for Lisy who had to live among the Germans in East Berlin. Asking me whether I ever visited East Germany, she described the sad conditions there pointing to the contrast between the theory and practice of Communism.

Second Interview

11. I then confirmed with Gords that the period when she used frequently to stay with Lisy must have been between January and May 1937. I then ran through with her the dates of Lisy's travels at this time, (referring to the dates that we have from Lizy's passport). She said that she could remember nothing about lisy's trip to algiers in Merch 1957 and her return to W.K. with PHILEY from Gibralte. She confirmed knowing that Liny and lot of each other after the holiday in Wales. At the same time she herself saw less of Lisy. As I continued with the dates of Lizy's movements Serda interrupted, saking me to excuse her using her lipstick as her mouth was She explained that her equals had given her helf a glass of sine for her lunch and she readily accepted some water when I offered it. (Commont: These questions were based on our knowledge from Ligy's sarlier letter to Gerda in German from Budapest, in which she told Gerda that she had had a three day meeting with Paul and Ala LÖW-BERR in Hungary Gerda's fencing in answer to these questions is typical.)

that she had said at the first interview that Lizy was a very nice person and they were all very sorry for her having to live in East Germany. I asked why in that case did she not visit Gerds when her daughter Babu visited Gerds at Tring some years ago. Gerds replied that she did not think that Lizy would ever have got permission from the East Germans.

Lizy could go to Austria because she was born thore but she would have to get a visa to come to U.K. as an East German. Gerds added, "We had to apply for Babu when she came". When I mentioned that Lizy appeared to travel a great deal on holiday Gerds replied that Lizy only worked parttime because she has something wrong with her hears. She added that all intellectuals get very well paid. Lizy could be classified as an intellectual because she did film dubbing. Gerds continued, "Ferhaps I can find you a letter which she has written from semewhere else but I usually throw them away but all her letters are like that, I assure you". She had always thought that Lizy was unable to have children and they had thought it a miracle when Babu was born.

then reverted to Gerda's knowledge of Guy BURGESS, saying that we knew that Guy used to visit Lizy at the Kilburn flat at the time that she used to stay there. Gerda answered, "When I read afterwards in the papers about Guy BURGESS always being drunk I remembered someone who was drunk coming to the flat but whether it was him or not I don't know. I don't remember what they talked about - certainly nothing I shouldn't hear in front of me. I have always had a horror of people who are drunk". In order to prove to her Guy's close association with Lizy I showed Gerda a photocopy of Lizy's letter to Guy from Paris in October 1937 and asked if she still did not associate Guy with Lizy. She replied, "I don't associate him with Lizy and me". On the subject of Lizy's move to Paris Gerda reiterated that Lizy gave the impression that her marriage was breaking up at that time. She did not know what Lizy was doing in Paris. When she and Edward visited her there they were just newly married. Lizy did not attend their wedding. They had a private wedding at a Registry Office. In answer to my question Gerda said that if she corresponded with Lizy at that time it would have been only very little since she herself had always been a bad letter writer.

on the subject of Kim PHILBY's family Gords said that she loved his Grandmother, "a sweet old lady" whom they visited once or twice in Camberley. She only met PHILBY's mother, Dora, once. I then quoted to Gorda Dora PHILBY's letter to Guy BURGESS concerning Lisy's meeting with Kim at Hendaye about letter to Guy BURGESS concerning Lisy's meeting with Kim at Hendaye about september 1937. 16. Gerds evidently felt at this point that she was called upon to give me some explanation of why she kept up her friendship with Lizy and she launched into an account of why she had started to work again after the war which was obviously intended to lead up to her reasons for regular trips to East Germany and seeing Lizy there.

19. I then questioned Cerda further on Nex EDNL. On this occasion she said that she could not remember quite how she met him. She continued, "We were attracted to each other for a very short time, a week or two. He had a wife who was ill (I never met her). He said that he did not want to have enother women altogether - very sentimental. His wife had T.B. and died. It would have been a little while before I left for England, 1935 or 1936, at a time when my affairs with Hans LÖN-BERR was going badly". Gerda repeated that EDEL was a Communist and she associated him with Anita JAECARL but she just could not remember how she met him. She saw him again once in Paris but did not know whether it was accidentally or not. There was a colony of Austrians in Paris. In answer to my question she said that it might have been through him Paris. In answer to my question she said that it might have been through him Paris but she did not know. She also could not remember where in Paris she met EDEL but she did remember that he had an American girlfriend and she asked me, "He later went to the U.S.A. didn't he?" He was a medical doctor but she did not know what he was doing in Paris. She said, "We used to call him the ugliest men".

(At this point I showed Gerds a number of photographs of Arnold DEUTECH, Paul HARDT and other known R.I.S. Illegals in Paris in the 1930s. She evinced no recognition except when looking at the photograph of Paul HARDT, she asked, "Is that George HONIGHARMY", adding that HONIGHARM elso had a little moustache and was very ugly.)

29. Gerda confirmed that she visits Lizy at her home in Karlhorst, Wildensteinerstrasse. Lizy has a four roomed flat in a large former villa. Gerda explained that, according to normal practice in Eastern Europe, she had to pay something to the police every time she stayed in private accommedation at the time when she obtained her visa. She normally flies either direct to Leipzig or via Berlin, Zurich or Prague. If she goes to Berlin she has to report to the police within twenty-four hours and show them her Leipzig trade card. She said that the police make any necessary hotel bookings for her. She usually stays one or two nights with Lizy and may have stayed for three nights on one occasion. Whenever she stays with Lizy, Lizy's former husband Georg HONIGMANN and his newwife are there. The new Frau HONIGMANN is a German girl called Lola, aged about thirty. She is an Art Historian who has written a book but has never been to England. Their child Anna is also usually there. Others whom Gerda has met at Lizy's are a Spanish couple called EANCHO and the KNEPPLER's son, Johnny. Gerda confirmed that she had known Georg ENSPPLER because he was friendly with Edith TUDOR-HART. In

Aswer to my question she said that she had never met any of her Vienna riends at Lizy's and doesn't know whether they ever see Lizy in Berlin. I was referring in perticular to the LOW-BEERS and Stefan KAUFWANN.) She knew that Georg HONIGMANN had had some trouble with the East German police because he was too critical of the Regime. Gerda denied that she had ever met any British people in East Berlin and said that she did not think that Lizy had any British contacts there. (Comment: I was giving her a further opportunity to mention John PEST but she clearly did not wish to do so.)

- 30. Gerde claimed, "Lisy knows that I want to be out of politics and have been for thirty years". She would never discuss politics with Lisy because she knew they would fight. She then said that they actually did so last year over Israel. Gerde was incensed about the Arab/Israeli war and Lisy's standpoint was that the Israelis were wrong to annex Arab territory. Gerde felt that the Jews were fighting for their existence. In the end they agreed not to talk any further about the subject. (Gerde helped herself to more water.) Gerde said that for years she had gone on to the Leipzig Spring Trade Fair after visiting the Nuremberg Fair at the end of February or the beginning of March. Then about three or four years ago they had decided to go to the Leipzig Autumn Fair in September instead end have been doing on since.
- 31. I again asked Gerda what Lizy had to say about him PHILBY's defection when they first visited her after the publicity. She said that Lizy merely told them that she never heard from him. She never discussed him with them and they got no replies out of hor. Gerda them said, "I don't want to get involved. If you get comments, you get involved" and added, "I docided when I got your letter that I would come and tell you enything I can because I don't want to be involved in anything".
- She told me that their forthcoming holiday with the LOW-BEERS was to be at Champer above Montroux. They had chosen this place because Ilona INCUE was very miserable after the death of her husband and could come up from Geneva and see them at the weekends. On the subject of their previous joint holidays with Paul and Ala LÖW-BEER Gerds said that they had been to Italy (twice to Elba) Yugoslavie and a number of times to Austria which was the cheapest. They were going to Switzerland this time because Gerda's doctor had told her to go somewhere high. I asked her if they had ever been to Bulgaria and she said no. Had they been to Hungary? She replied, "Hungary we went to once but not for a holiday. It was after we had been to Muremburg. In connection with that we usually go on somewhere. I had been to Budapest before the war and wanted to see it again". When was this? She said she didn't know. It was a few years ago. Perhaps about 1963 or 1964. Gorda fenced in her usual way about this trip and volunteered as little as possible but I eventually established from her that they had met Paul and Ala LÖW-BEER in Budapest, had stayed two days with them at the Hotel Royal and had been visited there by Ilona DOMAT's sister, whom she did not like because she meaned and grouned about how bad the times were. asked her if she met Lizy FHILBY there on that occasion she said, "Was Lizy in Budapest then? Yes, I think Lizy and Babu came to Budapest and I think this is probably why I decided I wanted to go to Budapest at that time." She thought that she and Edward obtained Hungarian visas through a travel agent whom they paid for their hotel in Budapest. She asked maively, "Is there a Hungarian Embassy here in London?" In answer to my question she said that she did not see Lejos JANOSSY in Budapest. She did not know him personally but knew he was a friend of Ilona. Ilona herself did not come on this trip but Gerda took a pullover for her to Ilona's sister. In answer to my question she said that she thought they had seen Lizy in Vienna on one occasion but they were not usually there at the time that Lisy was. Lisy had never been to Russia as far as she knew. I point out to her that Lizy appeared to have travelled around Eastern Europe with no trouble. replied that anybody who had any money had no difficulty in getting around Eastern Europe. Lizy would love to travel in the West, e.g. a holiday in Italy but she was unable to do so. The had once explained to Gerda that enyone up to the age of sixty could visit their birth place ones a year, i.e. Vienna in her case, but that was all they could do. I asked Gerda if she would continue visiting Eastern Europe and she replied, "of course". would need to continue her business trips.
