"Vesey first met BURGESS at a cocktail party given by Anthony BLUNT (presumably at Bentinck Street) in the autumn of 1941. From that time on, Vesey saw Guy BURGESS occasionally at parties when he, Vesey, came to London. (At that time, of course, Vesey was stationed at Oxford). The parties were in the Tom WYLLIE entourage, and at that time, according to Vesey, as far as he knew BURGESS's other friends were John LEHMANN, Brian HOWARD, Harold NICHOLSON and his son, Ben, and a girl "Pat", surname unknown, who lived at Bentinck Street, and, he believes, married Francis NOEL-BAKER."

Note of Further Action to be taken.

It is recognised that the existing lists of contacts of BURGESS and MACLEAN are by no means comprehensive. For this reason one of the principal matters to be decided is that of the further measures (including interrogation) which have now to be taken, in order in due course to obtain as complete information as possible about the whole range of the significant contacts of both men.

LLEWELLYN-DAVIES, Mrs. Pat.

Member of Bentinck Street group in early war years. Then living with RAWDON-SMITH a known Communist (see own file)

Vetted N.R.A. for C.R.O. in 1949 after two years as Assistant Private Secretary to Secretary of State (under name of LLEWELLYN-DAVIES).

Not now thought to be in Government employment, subject to check by B.2.a.

Extent of association with BURGESS unclear. Further enquiries to be made about Bentinck Street habitues. This to be included in BLUNT interview.

LLEWELLYN-DAVIES, Richard. (P.F. 604604).

Member with BURGESS of Cambridge Conversazione Society, and may have been associated since Cambridge days. Reported to have been a member of the Bentinck Street circle of friends. Present friend of BLUNT.

Profession architect. No evidence of present secret employment.

Employed Allied Control Commission for Germany 1945.

Candidate for eventual interrogation, as possible source of information about BURGESS since Cambridge period.

I have received the following information from a man I know well, but who has asked me not to disclose his name, unless it is absolutely necessary. I can neither corroborate nor deny the allegations made, though I have no reason to suppose that my informant would have made them unless he believed them to be true.

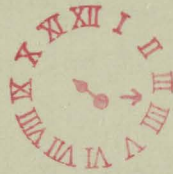

I am in a serious difficulty over the related questions of interchange of information with America and Australian Security.

There is in operation a scheme under which 40 young trained scientists are to be sent at half yearly intervals from Australia to work for a period of 3 years in our Defence Research Establishments. The object of the scheme is to provide us with badly needed staff of good quality and at the same time to contribute to the building up in the Dominion of a body of scientists trained in the many problems arising in connection with Defence Research. In particular these trainees on their return to Australia will form a nucleus for the staff ultimately needed in connection with the Long Range Weapons Establishment in that country.

At the moment we have over here 21 Australian scientists mostly employed at the R.A.D. Parkborough. It is quite impossible there to deny them access to classified information of American origin. In addition to the scientists there are about 80 Australian Officers either serving with the Ministry of Supply or Service Ministries or undergoing a Service course. These officers also to a varying extent come in contact with research and development information of U.S. origin.

A further batch of about 30 young scientists was due to leave Australia about 3 months ago, but, in view of the present delicate position vis-a-vis America, we

were forced to arrange for their departure to be postponed. This has caused personal inconvenience to many of the individuals and was the subject of strong representations to Tizard from the more important aspect of Commonwealth co-operation when he was recently in Australia.

It would be most unfortunate if we had to bring the whole arrangement to an end and on Tizard's suggestion we have gone into the question whether these trainees could be employed in establishments which are not in possession of information of U.S. origin. I am advised that, although a few could be provided for under the D.S.I.R. it is not possible to select any Defence Research establishments where the American difficulty would not arise to some extent. Moreover the political difficulties would probably not be much eased if we deliberately limited the employment of the trainees to civil research, and an arrangement of this character is clearly out of the question in the case of Service personnel.

We are all hoping that as a result of the recent Conference of Prime Ministers we shall get a real improvement in Commonwealth Defence Co-operation and drastic action at this stage might well set the clock back considerably.

However the U.S. Chief of Naval Intelligence has now told us bluntly that, unless we are prepared to give a written undertaking that American reports containing classified information on guided weapons will be positively excluded from Australian personnel

working in the United Kingdom, no further reports will be made available, that we shall be asked to return the reports we already hold, and that the embargo may be extended beyond the field of guided weapons.

I have discussed the matter with Dr. Wansbrough-Jones who has recently been in Canada and the United States. So far as the U.S., U.K., and Canada are concerned he felt that the position, though not all we should like, was improving and that, if we could avoid any set-backs, there was good hope that in the not too distant future we should have little cause for complaint. The prospects for standardisation of weapons are good, and much that is really valuable and concrete is being done in this field: that must not be delayed.

On the other hand, as regards Australia, American opinion is, if anything, hardening and Dr. Wansbrough-Jones' view, formed after discussion with our representatives on the spot, is that the Americans will be adamant, at least until they are satisfied as to Australian security. In imposing a ban on the transmission of U.S. information to a third party, even a Dominion, they are within the terms of our agreement with them on the interchange of information. Moreover on merits we can hardly argue that their attitude is unreasonable; it may even be said that they have exercised some forbearance, technically at least, in so far as confining the issue to Guided Weapons.

There are two other matters which have some relevance to the general question. The Americans want to develop a Guided Missiles range in Florida, using an

area in the Bahamas for recording purposes. Australia has been consulted and has raised no objection so long as the scheme does not prejudice the developments in her own country. If the supply of U.S. information is stopped, or if it cannot be passed on by U.K. to Australia, the development of the Long Range project in that country is bound to suffer.

The other matter relates to a Commonwealth Conference on Defence Science which it was proposed on the invitation of Canada to hold in Ottawa in February following up the work of the successful one held here in 1947. The following cable has just been received.

"Defence Research Board regrets that it has been found impracticable to hold the proposed meeting on Defence Science in Ottawa in February 1949. It is hoped that the late announcement of the postponement of the Conference will not cause serious inconvenience to any delegates."

As the Conference was specially arranged to be of an informal character in order to avoid raising just at this moment the problem of the new Dominions and was at the invitation of Canada, there is nothing we can do. We have good grounds for believing that the postponement is due to doubts about Australian security. Steps would have been taken, at the cost of impairing the value of the Conference, to restrict the issues to be discussed to those which did not raise the U.S. question. But Canada is very close in more ways than one to the U.S. and probably feels that her present good relations in the sphere of interchange of information and otherwise might

be affected if at the present time she organized a Research and Development Conference in which Australia participated.

We are faced with a real difficulty. A complete stoppage of the flow of information from the U.S. would be disastrous. On the other hand we must try to avoid giving offence to Australia. I believe that you and Chifley have been in touch on this question of Australian security but I am not aware what is the latest position. It is for this reason that most reluctantly I feel compelled to ask for your advice and guidance.
