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

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

Mr. Skardon and I accodingly saw him at the Treasury on March 28th. Winnifrith said that Sir Edward Bridges thought that CAIRNCROSS must be got rid of in one way or another, and asked what developments we expected to follow the forthcoming interrogation. We replied that our objective was to obtain a confession and the largest possible intelligence dividend. The D.P.P. had said that he thought a prosecution under Section III for a comparatively minor offence committed twelve years ago was unlikely, but if CAIRNCROSS confessed to espionage activities of a more recent date, the question might stand differently. The D.P.P. had left it to Mr. Skardon to use his judgement about administering any necessary caution. We thought there was a fair chance of getting some kind of admission from CATRIVCROSS about his association with BURGESS, but we could not put it higher than this. The way forward was therefore by no means clear, but we did not think that we could put ourselves or the Treasury in a better position by continuing the investigation. CAIRNCROSS had already been thoroughly alerted about our interest in him. Winnifrith said he agreed that we should go ahead on this footing. Mr. Skardon will report the result of the interrogation to him on Monday. Hest 194 MAA PF.72493 (CAIRNCROSS) Mr. Skardon, B.2.a., and Mr. Hill, S.L.B., saw the Director of Public Prosecutions on 26.3.52. We discussed with the Director the case of John CAIRNCROSS. I stated that we had reason to believe, though no evidence to prove, that CAIRNCROSS in 1939 at least was operating as an agent for the Russians, he being a member of the BURGESS group. I told the Director in particular that CAIRNCROSS had met MACLEAN a few days before MACLEAN's disappearance, and further that search of BURGESS' effects had disclosed, amongst other things, the memorandum filed at 112b, which we were in a position to prove was in CAIRNCROSS. handwriting. I showed him, and the Director glanced at, the memorandum. I indicated that we were unable to fix with any certainty the date when this memorandum was prepared, but from the context of the memorandum it would appear to have been sometime during 1939, at which time CATRNCROSS was employed as an official at the Treasury. At this time BURGESS was not in any form of Government employ. I further indicated to the Director that, enquiries which we had subsequently made merely proved that CAIRNCROSS, during his Cambridge days, was known to be a Communist, and we had reason to believe that the document at 112b was not the only communication he had made to BURGESS. I indicated to the Director that we were seeing him because prima facie the case had been established to show CAIRNCROSS had committed an offence against Section 2 (1) (c) in that he had failed to take reasonable care of the information he had obtained in Government employ. I submitted to the Director that the fact that the document had been found in BURGESS' possession was not conclusive evidence that he had communicated that document to BURGESS contrary to the provisions of Section 2 (1) (a). I further told the Director that Sir Edward Bridges had been acquainted with the facts of the case and had expressed the view that CAIRNCROSS was not a fit person to remain in Government employ. I indicated to the Director that the course we now wished to pursue was that Mr. Skardon should interrogate GAIRNCROSS with a view to obtaining intelligence information from him about the part he played in the BURGESS network, but I did not want to take this course without the Director's approval, particularly as it was necessary in this case for Mr. Skardon to have a free hand in the interrogation, which might conceivably result in no caution being made when there was evidence that an offence had been committed under Section 2(1) (a). The Director stated that in his view the Security Service would be perfectly justified in going ahead with this interrogation, and that he was confident that an experienced officer like Mr. Skardon would have no difficulty in conducting the interrogation in such a manner as would not prejudice any prosecution for a minor offence. The Director went further and stated that he would want very strong persuasion and very clear evidence before he would think of instituting a prosecution for a minor offence which took place so many years ago, and even before he would consider a prosecution he would insist...

- 2 insist upon CAIRNCROSS being seen and his explanation sought as to the document being found in BURGESS' possession. We further indicated to the Director that it had been suggested that we should apply for a search warrant. I stated though, and Mr. Skardon concurred in my view it would be too early to apply for a search warrant in this case. The Director stated that he fully agreed with these views. The position thus is, to sum up, that as a result of this conference the Director has given his blessing for Mr. Skardon to interrogate CAIRNCROSS, and that Mr. Skardon should be given full discretion as to the manner in which this interrogation should be conducted; in particular it should be for Mr. Skardon to decide whether he should caution him or not in respect of the minor offence. The latter comprises a 15 page report on some seven conversations which CAIRNUROSS had apparently had with a number of well-placed members of Government Departments in the early part of 1939, and bears the appearance of an intelligence report.



In 1940 we had information (C.C. Glasgow) that he was interested in the Scottish Nationalist Movement. HENDRY was interviewed by the Security Service in Nevember 1951. This interview produced more detailed information about his earlier activities. He stated, amongst other things, that he had visited the Soviet Union in 1932 with a party of students and businessmen. He described his political views before the war as "left wing would-be intellectual" and admitted in 1942 or 1943 while in the Army he joined the Communist Party and received a Farty card. He did not renew this card and was never pressed to do so. In the interview he denied having written the anonymous intelligence report which was sent to CAIRNOROSS from Holland in 1958. HENDRY stated that he and CAIRNCROSS had been together at Glasgow University and had become friends when both were studying for the Foreign Office examination. HENDRY failed the examination but kept in touch with CAIRNCROSS by letter afterwards. They met again in 1939 at a party. HENDRY worked in the Inland Revenue Department between 1930 and 1938. after which time he worked as a free-lance journalist. He has apparently been married twice, first to an American woman of Italian extraction and later to a women of Tugoslavian origin. Mr. K. came here on 20th March 1952 and was interviewed by me and Mr. David Whyte with regard to his knowledge of John CAIRNCROSS.

After I had outlined the present position in the CAIRNCROSS case, K said that he had not a great deal to tell us. He ought to start by saying that the background of his knowledge was that he had himself been a member of the Communist Party from about December 1934 until April 1935. He remembers that at this time John CAIRNCROSS was also a member of the Communist Party at Cambridge. He made an impression on K because of his red head, his Glasgow accent and the fact that he was voluble at meetings of the C.U.S.S. He was then a freshman but was regarded as one of the Party's promising recruits.

After K had left the Party he continued to hear from time to time of CAIRNCROSS from a mutual friend, a German named Paul FROELICH whom K had met when studying at Bonn and who had come over to this country with his firancee at K is instigation. FROELICH knew CAIRNCROSS and regarded him as one of the more mature and promising of his undergraduate friends. K saw FROELICH (who returned to Germany) from time to time right up to the war and believes that FROELICH continued in touch with CAIRNCROSS. K is impression is that CAIRNCROSS continued in the Communist Party for the rest of his time at Cambridge, but he could not be sure of this nor could he speak as to the subsequent development of CAIRNCROSS's political views.

K stated that John CAIRNCROSS had an elder brother who was also up at Cambridge and a member of the Communist Party.

Via Cologne where FROELICH is now living and ask FROELICH some questions about CAIRNCROSS. K said that he was virtually certain that FROELICH was never a Communist. Indeed, he returned to Germany after a period at Cambridge because he did not want to forfeit his position as a schoolmaster and be reduced to the hand-to-mouth existence of a political refugee. He was here almost immediately before the outbreak of war and insisted again on returning to Germany. He was not fit for military service and continued his career as a schoolmaster, which he is still pursuing. K had seen him since the war when he had asked about CAIRNCROSS but K did not believe that these two have ever resumed contact.

K told us a good deal more about the developments of his own views and gave the names of other people whom he could remember as being Communists at the University. Guy BURGESS was one of these.

I am leaving it to Mr. Whyte to record the Communist angle of these discussions.

A meeting was held in B.2.a. to-day between Mr. Simkins, Mr. Stephens, Mr. Mann (A.L.O. Scotland) and Mr. Burbidge.

Mr. Mann was given a review of the CAIRNCROSS case of which he had already been given an outline in a recent letter. He was informed for the first time of the connection between CAIRNCROSS and HENDRY, of the BURGESS document and of the reason for the contact between CAIRNCROSS and QUINN.

He was asked to make enquiries in Scotland with a view to obtaining as much useful background information about the CAIRNCROSS family of Lesmahagow as possible, which would help us to prepare a comprehensive brief for a further interview with CAIRNCROSS which is to be arranged in the near future.

Mr. Mann stated that he was well placed to make these enquiries owing to his good liaison with the Chief Constable of Fife, whose home was in Lesmahagow and who had attended Hamilton Academy and Glasgow University at the same time as CAI RNCROSS. Mr. Mann felt that the CAIRNCROSS family would very probably be known to the Chief Constable of Fife, if the latter did not know John GAIRNCROSS personally. At the same time, Mr. Mann undertook to make enquiries through a source of Capt. Derbyshire, now employed as a lecturer in psychology at Glasgow University. This source, he thought, should be able to provide information about Alexander CAIRNCROSS who was also a lecturer at Glasgow University.

Mr. Mann fully appreciated that these enquiries had to be made with the utmost discretion, having been warned that the CAIRNCROSS family might be the kind of people to cause embarrassment should the Security Service enquiries about CAIRNCROSS become known to them.

In April 1936 CAIRNCROSS joined the Foreign Office after passing out at the top of the competitive Civil Service examination for that year.

Since the Foreign Office deemed him "unsuitable for representation", he was transferred in October 1938 to the Treasury. In September 1940 he became P.S. to Lord Hankey. In March 1942 he was loaned to the Ministerial Committee on Reconstruction Problems. From May 1942 to May 1943 he served with G.C.C.S. For one week in June 1943 he served in Section V of M.I.6. In June 1943 he returned to the Treasury where he worked until May 1951, when he was transferred to the Ministry of Supply. He was posted back to the Treasury in December 1951 where he is now employed as a Principal.

Despite his academic brilliance and early promise, CAIRNCROSS has not made much headway in the Civil Service, apparently owing to the lack of the necessary administrative ability.

CAIRNCROSS' name was found in Donald MACLEAN's office diary under the 20th April 1951 (MACLEAN disappeared on 25th May 1951). When the Security Service interviewed him on this matter he admitted that he had been a casual friend of MACLEAN, whom he had known as a colleague in the Foreign Office since about 1937. CAIRNCROSS also admitted knowing BURGESS vaguely since that year but had not counted him amongst his friends owing to the absence of mutual interests. Neither this nor a subsequent interview satisfactorily resolved the Security Service misgivings about CAIRNCROSS and his investigation was therefore continued.

Enquiries have disclosed that CAIRNCROSS held extremely left-wing views during his formative years at the University and have suggested that, shortly before the 1939 war, he was apparently engaged in some kind of intelligence activity. He is also known to be acquainted with a number of persons of the BURGESS and MACLEAN circle who are currently under investigation. Research into the papers found amongst Guy BURGESS' possessions after his disappearance resulted in the identification in February 1952 of a document in CAIRNCROSS' handwriting. The latter comprises a 15 page report on some seven conversations which CAIRNCROSS had apparently had with a number of well-placed members of Government Departments in/early part of 1939, and bears the appearance of an intelligence report.

Investigations into CAIRNCROSS are still proceeding and it is planned to interview him again in the near future.

Mr. Colville in the Prime Minister's office telephoned me yesterday. He it was who helped us to identify the originator of the documents found in BURGESS's possession as John CAIRNOROSS.

Mr. Colville explained that he had recently mentioned this fact to the Prime Minister who had shown considerable interest. The Prime Minister had asked him to obtain from this office a report on the CAIRNCROSS case, dealing particularly with his present employment and access to secret information. Colville asked whether I could let him have a short summary which he could have by him in case the Prime Minister tackled him on the subject again. He explained that he did not propose to raise the matter himself with the Prime Minister, but he wanted to ensure that he was informed in case of need.

I said that I would take the matter up this end.

I afterwards spoke to B.2 saying that in my view it would be more satisfactory if the report was made direct to the Prime Minister, and that in this case I would telephone Mr. Colville and explain what we were doing. B.2 said he would go into the matter and let me know how I should reply to Mr. Colville.

Today I gave Winnifrith an outline of the case against John CAIRNOROSS, with particular reference to the papers in his handwriting found among BURGESS's possessions. Winnifrith, naturally enough, took a very serious view of the case. He understood our need to investigate it a little further and subsequently to interview CAIRNCROSS again. He asked only that the delay before doing so should be as short as possible, partly because it might prove very embarrassing to the Treasury if they later had to defend keeping this viper in their bosom for an unnecessarily long time, and partly because CAIRNCROSS, although the work he is actually engaged on is not of a very secret nature, could perfectly well be maintaining departmental contacts of various kinds in the same way as he seems to have done in 1939. told Winnifrith we appreciated these points and would keep him in touch with any major developments in the case. said we would also let him know when we wanted to interview CAIRNCROSS again.



The handwriting of the letter is characterised by its overall smallness, lightness of touch, general uprightness with however frequent letters and words sloping strongly to the right and by unevenness of base line, particularly towards the ends where there is a strong tendency to drop.

A wide margin is maintained down the left-hand side and

words themselves are well spaced. This handwriting gives the impression of being freely and naturally written, although lacking any special emphasis.

The handwriting of the notes shows general features strongly coinciding with those of the letter, but noticeably with even greater variation of slope, particularly when veering to the right, probably as a result of more speedy action.

Also conspicious in this writing are the left-hand margin, uneveness of base line with the tendency to drop at the ends.

This handwriting also gives the impression of being free and uninhibited.

A comparison of the corresponding individual letter structures employed in the two writings furnishes further striking evidence of identity. For example, the capital "I" in both frequently occurs, usually standing alone, as a block form and written like a Roman numeral. A normally written form is however used when beginning a word.

This tendency to use block forms is also apparent in the use in both writings of a block form of capital "T".

The capitals "D" also show strong identity, particularly in respect of the form of small loop drawn at the conclusion of the letter before proceeding to the next letter.

The respective capitals "J" further show strong evidence of circles its continuous to the long curved initial upstroles.

The more striking and characteristic similarities are however to be found in the respective forms of small letters employed.

It is to be noted in both writings that certain letters such as the "p" and occasionally the "t" and "w" begin with

Again, the small "f" has no upper loop, the straight initial upstroke usually turning abruptly at a very sharp angle to form the main downstroke which continues to form in the usual manner an anticlockwise lower loop. I have been considering the question of whether there may have been a somewhat closer and more sunstantial association between CATRNCROSS and HAEFNER than has been thought in the past. The facts of their association as described by CATRNCROSS are as follows: -CAIRNCROSS first heard of HAEFNER through his friend M. Etienne TAMBOURI a French advocate who was also a friend of the HAEFNERs. In 1937, when CAIRNCROSS was at the Foreign Office, he received a letter from HAEFNER from Spain asking him to intervene to cause arms to be supplied to the Republicans. CAIRNCROSS ignored the letter. Early in 1939 CAIRNCROSS learned from TAMBOURI that HAEFNER had invented a device in connection with radar. He mentioned this to Watson WATT at the Air Ministry. As a result HAEFNER was brought to the United Kingdom and interviewed at the Air Ministry, where it was decided that his invention was valueless. Afterwards HAEFNER remained here because he had no passport and because he was persona non grata all over Western Europe. CAIRNCROSS admitted that he was aware of HARFNER's dubious background, but visited him socially for a time until he became bored with HAEFMER's endless pestering for assistance. CAIRNCROSS told this story to the police at an interview in August 1942, and repeated it substantilly during his interview with Mr. Martin in 1951, except that at the second interview he failed to mention HAEFNER's letter from Spain in 1937. It is recorded on the file that CATENCROSS tried to get into touch with HAEFNER by telephone shortly after HAEFNER had been arrested in September 1939. When HAEFNER was interrogated on 8.12.39, he mentioned CAIRNCROSS, and his story did not differ materially from CAIRNCROSS' own, No mention of the letter from Spain was ever made by HARFNER. HATENER was in touch in 1939 with a certain Antonius RAAB, the notorious arms dealer of German origin. At the time RAAB was established in Athens with a firm called AEKKEA. HAEFNER's association with RAAB seems to have dated from 1937 when both men were in Spain, engaged in providing arms for the Republican Forces. There is no doubt that HAEFNER was attempting to do business with certain arms dealers in London on RAAB's behalf in 1939. A letter check produced some correspondence between HAEFNER and RAAB, and one letter contains a reference to CAIRNCROSS which suggests that he had been in some way involved in their business activities. HAEFNER'S property, taken from him on arrest and now unfortunately destroyed, contained correspondence between HARFINER and RAAB and CAIRNCROSS' name was mentioned, again in such a way as would suggest that he was or had been doing business with both men. Our only record of this is in the notes made by the officer who was in charge of the property. Antonius RAAB is German by birth and is reported to have been the owner of an Aircraft Factory which was confiscated by the Nazis in 1933. RAAB escaped from Germany and in 1937 he was in Spain supplying arms to the Republican Forces. According to his own story, he was arrested by the O.G.P.U. in Spain but again managed to escape and somehow acquired a Costa Rican passport and settled in Greece, where he had an interest in the Aircraft firm of AEKKEA. RAAB was evacuated from Greece to Egypt, and in 1943 he arrived in India where he and his wife were interned. They were released from internment in 1946 on condition that they left the country within three months, they failed to do this and were eventually

deported in 1948. When last heard of in April 1950 he was living at 3, via Urbena Rattazzi, Torino, Italy.

He Sorbonne (1932/34); Trinity College, Cambridge (1934/36). He speaks a number of languages fluently and, both for interest and profit, undertakes translation of classical and other works for publication. From time to time he participates in B.B.C. broadcasts of a political and literary character. CAIRNCROSS joined the Civil Service in 1936 after passing out at the top of the competitive examination for that year. He joined the Foreign Office, but was subsequently transferred to the Treasury, whence he was lent to the Ministry of Supply. He is now back at the Treasury. SECRET CIARNOROSS first came/ PERSONAL

SECRET PERSONAL - 2 -CAIRNOROSS first came to notice between 1937 and 1939, when he was friendly with a German named HAMFNER, whose visit to this country in 1939 he sponsored. HAMFNER, who has a criminal record, appears to have engaged in espionage on behalf of various governments from 1923 onwards, but it is not possible to say what political views he held when associated with CAIRNCROSS. In December 1947 CAIRNCROSS was reported by a source of unknown reliability to belong to a group of near-communists and to hold fairly advanced left-wing views. In addition, CATRNCROSS is known to have been associated with both Donald MACLEAN and Guy BURGESS, the two missing Foreign Office officials. It is for this last reason that we are now examining his case, which will be explained in greater detail when you next visit Head Office. As a preliminary to any enquiries to be made in Scotland, we have thought it best to advise you of the case in this manner rather than to initiate action directly with the police in Glasgow, since the case is one of some delicacy. As we have reason to believe that CATRINCROSS's brothers, Andrew and Alexander, the latter a member of Glasgow University staff, are reasonably well-known Glasgow personalities, we are anxious that any enquiries concerning CAIRNCROSS's activities and background should not come to their attention. We should therefore be most grateful if you could make the following initial enquiries personally with the Glasgow Police:-(a) Have the Glasgow Police any up-to-date information on John QUINN ? It is just possible that at some future stage we may wish to interview him, and any information bearing upon his attitude to such an interview would be appreciated. (b) Have the Glasgow Police any records of John CAIRNCROSS or of Andrew and Alexander, his brothers ? The rent of the self contained flat she occupies is £84 per annum inclusive. She shares this with a Miss Yolande VEITCH, British born, who pays £1 per week towards the rent and cleaning expenses. Miss VEITCH appears to be a respectable person and nothing is recorded to her detriment by Metropolitan Police.

Applicant is well regarded at her place of employment. As far as can be ascertained she is free from debt and lives within her means.

Applicant attended the Girls High School at Frankfurt-on-Main until March, 1933, when she was obliged to leave owing to racial laws. She thereupon went to Italy where she continued her studies in modern languages, and remained there until she arrived in this country on 20-1-1934, being landed for one month on a no-employment condition. The landing condition-s were varied from time to time until they were finally cancelled vide Home Office letter 0.137 dated 9-2-1937.

Following her arrival here she studied English and underwent a course of secretarial training until February, 1936, when she obtained clerical work in the Emigration Department of the Jewish Refugees Committee, Bloomsbury House, W.C.L. She left there in December, 1937, and was then employed as a secretary and translator with commercial firms in London. In December, 1940, she returned to the Jewish Refugees Committee at Bloomsbury House, but stayed there for only a few months, when she again obtained work with a commercial firm in London. In March, 1943, she obtained clerical employment in the office of the "Fight For Freedom" Editorial and Publishing Services Limited, 39, Berkeley Court, Baker

Street, N.W.l. This organisation was formed in January, 1942, with the support of prominent Labour Members of Parliament, to promote world unity against aggression and the recourse to war to settle international disputes, but has been dormant since August, 1945. In that month applicant left, and obtained her present employment.

On 21-12-1939 she was granted exemption from internment and the special restrictions applicable to enemy aliens.

During the war she performed the usual firewatching duties, and also passed the Home Nursing Examination of the British Red Cross Society. In addition, she was a voluntary helper at the "Cornhill Kitchen" for City firewatchers and at the "Stage Door Canteen".

Applicant is a studious and serious minded person. In addition to pursuing her study of modern languages she is now attending evening classes at the London University with a view to obtaining the Diploma of Social Science. She has an adequate knowledge of the English language and appears to be of good character.

She expresses adherence to established forms of Government in this country, and declares that she has not made, and in the event of a certificate of British nationality being granted to her, does not intend to make, application to the competent German authority to retain her German nationality.

No information has been obtained to show that applicant has ever been a member of any foreign subversive of political organisation, or holds extreme political views.

Metropolitan Police records show that on 30-12-1936 she was verbally cautioned by police for late notification of change of address, and on 16-7-1941 was cautioned on behalf of the Bath City Police for a breach of Article 7 of the Aliens Order, 1920. The latter incident occurred when applicant described herself as "formerly German" when giving particulars of herself at a hotel during a visit to Bath.

An Interim Note on Current Activities and Associates of

John CAIRNCROSS

This report is intended to give an impression of CAIRNCROSS' activities as seen from a routine investigation of him conducted by B.2.a. since July 1951. Owing to the discovery amongst Guy BURGESS' effects of a document bearing every sign of being an intelligence report which has recently been identified as the work of CAIRNCROSS, a more detailed examination of some of his contacts, as revealed from the last few months' B.2.a. investigation, ie being made.

Character of CAIRNCROSS

CAIRNCROSS was born in 1913 in Scotland and comes from a relatively humble family. He has succeeded, through hard work and innate scholarliness, in securing for himself a first class education at Glasgow University, the Sorbonne and Cambridge. He is a person of high intelligence and well-developed intellectual powers. He is not, however, particularly well suited to the type of administrative work which he has been called upon to do in the various Government departments for which he has worked and, despite his extremely high academic qualifications and the fact that he passed out at the top of the Foreign Service Examinations for his year, he has made remarkably little headway in the Civil Service. He is now only a Principal in the Treasury.

It seems quite probable that this lack of promotion has affected his attitude towards his work. The telephone check has revealed that he boarders on the unscrupulous when it comes to taking time off for sickness and he has not hesitated to remain at home on the slightest excuse of ill-health.

It is reasonably clear that he regards his work as a necessary evil to secure for him a basic and steady income. His main interests lie in the cultural field and the greater part of his spare time is taken up with translating classical works from the Latin and French, partly for his own edification and partly for the financial reward involved. His translations have been published and he has achieved a minor reputation for this work. In addition, his fluency in German and French has put him in some small demand by the B.B.C., who have asked him on an ad hoc basis to take part in discussions in French on their overseas services. He has also broadcast in English programmes of a political nature. CATRNCROSS' interests also embrace the visual arts in which he is encouraged by his wife, a German Jewess, who was formerly an assistant at a Bond Street Art Gallery.

Financial Position

His Treasury salary, together with his income from publications, the B.B.C. and occasional assistance from his mother-in-law, have placed CATRNCROSS in reasonably comfortable surroundings. Until recently he has been able to run a car (and may still be doing so). During a recent illness he was able to go to several coastal resorts to recuperate, while towards the end of 1951 he took his wife for a holiday in Spain, spending some time in France during his return. He is contemplating going abroad again in the foreseeable future.

Honesty As mentioned above, CAIRNCROSS has few scruples about taking office time off. There are several instances recorded on the telephone check which show that he is not above sharp practice. For example, on the 29th November 1951, in discussing what appeared to be a publishing matter with James MACGIBBON, he asked the latter to make a sum of money due to him payable through a cheque to his (CAIRNCROSS') wife "for reasons which would be obvious" to MACGIBBON. From the context it was clear that CAIRNCROSS' object was to avoid paying income tax on the sum. Again, on 11th December, CAIRNCROSS and his wife appeared to have agreed to participate in a deal involving the fraudulent sale of a picture (possibly a faked Corot) for which the CAIRNCROSSs' commission was £50. CAIRNCROSS was anxious that this sum should not feature in his books and Mrs. CAIRNCROSS wished the amount to be paid in cash. Politics According to the B.4.b. Monitor, CAIRNCROSS gives the impression in telephonic discussions of deliberating carefully before voicing any opinions, especially political ones. Every word appears to be specially selected. It may be, therefore, that such indications as the telephone check has given of his political opinions, may not represent in any way his true state of mind. The following indications, however, have occurred:-

a) The CATRNCROSSs' holiday in Spain was not an unqualified success - in fact they do not appear to have enjoyed themselves for reasons which are not clear. CATRNCROSS, himself, however, on being asked by a friend stated that it was not connected with the regime and had "nothing at all to do with the political angle", though he proffered no further explanation for his dislike of Spain.

b) There is probably no significance, apart from a cultural one, to his request to a friend to buy a copy of Voltaire's "L'Histoire de la Russie" in Paris.

c) On 21st October 1951 CAIRNCROSS agreed to step in to a political debate broadcast by the B.B,C. to replace John Forster, a Conservative M.P. He appeared pleased to accept the offer.

d) On 27th November 1951 he was asked by an American friend to go to the Cinema. His reaction on learning that the film was called "My Favourite Spy" he remarked "Oh well, just my cup of tea". However, this can hardly be said to be significant and can scarcely be held against him.

e) CAIRNCROSS gives the impression that he is slightly favourably inclined towards the new Government. He assured his wife's uncle on the 5th January that "things were looking a lot better and that he himself was extremely optimistic for the first time since 1945". On 29th January he agreed that the Chancellor's broadcast concerning capital expenditure had been a good one and that Mr. Butler "was a good man for the job".

Significant Contacts A feature of the present examination of CAIRNCROSS has been the discovery that he associates with what is perhaps an unusually high percentage of current B.2.a. suspects. These, together with a number of other persons with Security Service records, are listed below: The present investigation of CAIRNCROSS was undertaken after his name had been found in Donald MACIEAN's desk diary, showing that they apparently had a non-official appointment on the 20th April 1951. CAIRNCROSS when interviewed admitted knowing MACLEAN as a former Foreign Office colleague. b) A document resembling an intelligence report identified as the work of CAIRNCROSS dating from early 1939 was found amongst the possessions of Guy BURGESS. CAIRNCROSS has not been questioned about this document but, when interviewed in another context, admitted that he had possibly met BURGESS on some occasion but that he was not the sort of person with whom he, CAIRNCROSS, would have associated. On 19th September 1951 CAIRNOROSS rang Goronwy REES. context suggested that REES was giving an opinion on some literary work which CAIRNCROSS had done and which he wished to pass on to ELIOT (? T.S. ELIOT). On 7 December 1951 in a conversation between BLUNDEN and HALPERN, BIUNDEN remarked that he was "terrified to see CAIRNCROSS in the audience" at a lecture which BIUNDEN had apparently given shortly before. BLUNDEN is given to talking in somewhat extravagant terms and it is difficult to assess the significance of this remark, except that it shows clearly that BIUNDEN knows CAIRNCROSS. BIUNDEN's name has also been mentioned, apparently innocently, in a conversation between Mrs. CAIRNCROSS and Mrs. MAISON (see below). CAIRNCROSS and his wife are intimates of Alexander and Salome HALPERN, with whom they are in frequent touch. On 20th November 1951 CATRNCROSS was in touch with Lucia MOHOLY-NAGY (CC.413,318), a photographer from Prague, who arrived in the U.K. in 1934. This woman is a microfilm expert by profession. She was in 1943 alleged to be a Communist and in 1945 was reported to be an associate of Edith TUDOR-HART. In December 1949 MOHOLY-NAGY succeeded in travelling to Czechoslovakia. It : perhaps significant that in January 1945 MOHOLY-NAGY wrote a It is letter couched in unusual terms to Herta WESCHER, then in Switzerland. The latter was an intimate friend of Simon GUTHMAN. reliably reported to be a G.P.U. agent. CAIRNCROSS has several times been in touch with James MACGIBBON. This contact is possibly significant since MACGIBBON, so far as is known, does not publish the kind of classical translations which CAIRNCROSS undertakes. However, there has been nothing in their conversations to suggest that their business is connected with anything but publishing. The first call on the first day of the telephone check disclosed that Mrs. CAIRNCROSS was in touch with the wife of George HOELLERING. This contact appears to be coincidental, since the evidence suggests that CAIRNCROSS and HOELLERING themselves only recently became acquainted but that their wives knew each other before the CAIRNCROSSs were married. - 3 -
