There has been a temporary lull in the series of interviews, but there is every intention of continuing with them in the future and the telephone check produces useful information about BLUNT's contacts and movements in connection with the interviews. I should be grateful, therefore, if the Warrant could be revalidated for a further six months under Category 'B'.

2. D.1/Inv. and myself have discussed the proposition that WATSON and BLUNT be confronted, with the D.G. who is in general agreement.

3. When I saw BLUNT for ten minutes shortly after the WATSON interrogation started, I told him that it was in everybody's interest that he, BLUNT, should now tell us anything he knew about the case, so that I could control any possible scandal involving him, BLUNT. BLUNT contented himself with saying that "I did not recruit Allie". I explained to BLUNT that

WATSON was having great difficulty with his memory. BLUNT volunteered to see him himself to try to help. I asked him to ~~write~~ <sup>write</sup>. I asked BLUNT whether he would be willing to tell Allie about himself. He said that, with some reluctance and embarrassment, he would, subject to the Security Service agreeing.

4. If WATSON is telling any part of the truth, then BLUNT has withheld from us. Please see the attachment to 413z of PF.47,496.

5. BLUNT will undoubtedly ask if we intend to prosecute anybody as a result of the proposed meeting. I would like to use the same formula as Shipp used with WATSON, i.e.:-

"Nothing you say to me now will be used in evidence in a prosecution. My primary aim is to gain intelligence."

6. The D.G. is content that we use this formula but wishes your agreement.

7. I need not tell you that the stakes are very high, both in regard to the WATSON and the BLUNT case.

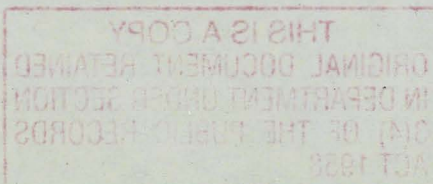

Extract from Report by F2/URG/GBK of Interview with George Michael WICKENS in Toronto on 15th February, 1967.

WICKENS - a co-operative but not wholly reliable source - was at Trinity, Cambridge 1936-39 and a Communist 1934-37.

.....

8. Anthony BLUNT and homosexuals. WICKENS said that he regarded Anthony BLUNT as a Communist sympathiser. He was effete and "a corrupter of youth". Asked whom he thought BLUNT might have corrupted, WICKENS said that he would have suspected that these might have included the two THOMPSON brothers, Richard SYNGE and Hugh GORDON. When reminded that GORDON had shared rooms with Michael STRAIGHT, WICKENS said that, although he could not be sure, he would not be at all surprised if STRAIGHT had also been homosexual. It was unusual at that time for undergraduates to share rooms in college and he recalled that there had been some trouble about the sharing of this room: the Trinity College authorities had frowned upon the arrangement and in the end they had put a stop to it. WICKENS said that he thought STRAIGHT would have retained some remnants of his Marxism. Reverting to BLUNT, WICKENS said that he had always regarded him as a dangerous man: he was so assured and his background was such that, taken together with his homosexual inclinations, he was in a position to exert considerable influence over a particular type of circle, i.e. one of impressionable undergraduates.

Note of Meeting between Sir Anthony BLUNT  
and Mr. Wright on 10.7.67.

On July 10th 1967 I went to see Sir Anthony BLUNT for half an hour to establish the dates of his movements. These were:-

- Tuesday July 11th: BLUNT leaves for Sicily.
- Saturday August 5th: returns from Sicily.
- Until Monday September 25th: BLUNT in London.
- Monday September 25th: BLUNT leaves for Canada (Toronto).
- Friday October 6th: BLUNT returns.
- Saturday October 7th: BLUNT leaves for Rome until the end of the year.

We fixed the conference with Alister to take place in the week beginning Tuesday 5th September and I have arranged to see BLUNT on Thursday August 10th at 6.30 p.m. to confirm date and place. I asked him if he would see me in Rome in the autumn if necessary. He said that of course he would. I commented that John CAIRNCROSS was in Rome and suggested we both might meet him. I said I saw no necessity for BLUNT to tell him his own part in "the game"; he could appear as an ex M.I.5 officer helping to try and probe into the happenings of the past. BLUNT was delighted at this suggestion. He said he liked John very much.

2. BLUNT made the comment that he had seen Brian SIMON the previous evening. Over a drink he had been able to ask him if he were still a Communist. Brian had said, in effect, "Well, what else is there to belong to?" He could not see himself as a member of the Labour Party. It was far too wishy-washy. He had written a paper setting out some political thoughts and he would let BLUNT have a copy of it. BLUNT thought we must assume that Brian was still a dedicated Communist and that we should get nowhere with him if we tried to talk to him. He said that Tess ROTHSCHILD had also planned to sound out Brian SIMON and he wondered if she had and, if so, what reaction she had obtained. I said that BLUNT had now better tell Tess not to broach the subject with him after all.

I called to see Lady ROTHSCHILD at 23 St. James's Place this morn

2. Lady ROTHSCHILD said that she had wanted to see someone because she saw BLUNT recently (Monday, 26th June) he had suggested that she meet and talk to Brian SIMON with a view to finding out what are his views about Communism. I asked if she had any reason to suppose th SIMON had changed his views, and she said that she had an idea that SIMON might have left the Party. She said she had felt that she sh do anything about this without reference to us, and I told her that like to think about it and get in touch with her again. She said s wondered why BLUNT did not talk to Brian SIMON himself. I said I t this was probably because he was afraid of the possible consequences letting an active Communist know that he had confessed to spying fo Russians, and presumably thought that if she talked to SIMON and wa to tell BLUNT as a result that she believed that SIMON had given up allegiance to the Party this would open the door for BLUNT himself to talk about his espionage and the part which SIMON himself had played in it.

3. Lady ROTHSCHILD showed no sign of raising any other point so I said that I understood from Lord ROTHSCHILD that something had been said about Alister WATSON, and she immediately agreed that this was so. She said that BLUNT was extremely agitated about the information Peter Wright had given him about Alister WATSON, and felt sure that if Alister was really implicat in espionage then there could be little doubt that others in his circle, particularly Richard LLEWELLYN-DAVIES, were also involved. I asked Lady ROTHSCHILD if in her view LLEWELLYN-DAVIES could be a spy, and she that she had to admit - although with great reluctance - that she felt he could. She thought that he was an exceedingly tough character, and it was most unlikely that we should get any information out of him. However, if such an attempt was to be made she thought it would be e to deal with him in the absence of his wife. She said that LLEWELLYN is very much a realist, and if he did decide to talk would do so witho inhibitions. However, Pat LLEWELLYN-DAVIES had sentimental attachment old friends, and might well influence her husband against talking about I asked Lady ROTHSCHILD if she could confirm what was my own impression Pat LLEWELLYN-DAVIES enjoyed moving in political circles, and perhaps eve exaggerated the close social contact she had with certain left-wing polit leaders. Lady ROTHSCHILD said she thought this was the case. She said there was no doubt that Pat LLEWELLYN-DAVIES knew some political figures and had known them for many years. Such people as Dick FREEMAN, Jenny and Richard CROSSMAN and continued to see them, and was delighted that th had risen in the political world. She added that Pat LLEWELLYN-DAVIES wa not on particularly friendly terms with the WILSONS and never had been.

4. I told Lady ROTHSCHILD that Peter Wright thought that BLUNT was in rather bad shape when he last saw him, and asked if she would agree with this. She said she certainly would; he was twitching very badly and looked very worn, but added that at this time of year at the end of term this was not uncommon.

5. Just before I left Lady ROTHSCHILD recalled that BLUNT had told her that at a time when Brian SIMON was living at Richmond we were operating SF on him and BLUNT, having discovered this, had told SIMON about it. She thought that this must have been at some time towards the end of the war, and perhaps indicated that BLUNT had continued to be in fairly close touch with SIMON at that time.

6. I promised to telephone to Lady ROTHSCHILD at Cambridge 50488 in due course when a further meeting could be arranged after we had considered the implications of her talking to Brian SIMON.

Note of Meeting between Sir Anthony BLUNT  
and Mr. Wright on 22.6.67.

On 22.6.67 I had a long session with Sir Anthony BLUNT in his flat in the evening. BLUNT was in a very nervous state. He had already drunk a lot, but did not drink any gin while I was talking to him, confining himself to a dark vermouth which he took diluted with water - not sweet Martini, something else - drinking most of a bottle in the course of the evening.

2. I discussed fully with BLUNT the whole question of his and Kim PHILBY's reaction to the defection of PETROV. Were they not worried when PETROV defected? He said that they were indeed worried and that they knew that PETROV's successor knew about them. (Comment: They did not know the identity of the successor. He was of course KISLITSYN, who succeeded PETROV in Australia, had been GORSKIY's cypher clerk in London during the war and would indeed have known about them. When PETROV asked KISLITSYN during the handover period for any inside information he might have about BURGESS and MACLEAN, KISLITSYN told him that he had indeed known about the two latter but refused to talk any further.)

3. BLUNT could not remember whether it emerged in the public record of the case at the time that PETROV's successor had known about BURGESS and MACLEAN and whether he might have learnt it from that. But he thought it possible that he learnt it from Kim PHILBY. He knew nothing about the PETROV defection until it took place and he did not know whether Kim was in any way in the picture beforehand or not. He was certain that Kim discussed the PETROV affair with the Russians after the defection had taken place and that he was assured by them that all was well.

4. I returned to the subject of Peter ASTBURY, wishing to discover how it was that BLUNT knew about him, as distinct from all the others. He met ASTBURY when the latter was an open Party member at Cambridge before the war. He was introduced to him by Brian SIMON, who was a close friend of ASTBURY's. He did not think that Peter ASTBURY was a homosexual. He clearly remembered meeting him at the Paris International Exhibition of 1937. He got to know ASTBURY fairly well. He met him also in Leo LONG's company, before the war. I pressed BLUNT to give me an indication of how he came to know about ASTBURY's recruitment. He said he thought the recruitment must have been in the summer of 1939 - war was imminent and he associated ASTBURY's recruitment in his mind with the whole subject of the war that was approaching at that time. He said that although he himself was not aware that the recruitment had taken place until later, 1940 or 1941, Tess ROTHSCHILD knew Peter well and might be able to tell us more. I said that I was sure Tess would have told us had she known anything on a subject such as this. He thought that Peter ASTBURY must have been recruited into the G.R.U. straight away. I expressed surprise that KLUGMAN had never attempted to involve him but BLUNT did not think ASTBURY had ever been recruited for the K.G.B.

5. I asked BLUNT what he knew about Julian TREVELYAN. He admitted knowing him and described him as enthusiastic and naive, and "intellectually wrong-headed", by which he meant that he had not got his Marxism straight! He asked me if TREVELYAN had been a Party member and was surprised when I told him that he had. I asked if Guy BURGESS had been a friend of TREVELYAN and he said not. I also asked if he was relevant to our problem and BLUNT said that he had no evidence that he was although he would have made a useful talent-spotter as he had many friends in influential places. He commented that Claud COCKBURN was a close friend of Julian TREVELYAN during the war. BLUNT thought it would be worth our while to talk to TREVELYAN. I had heard that his speech was very bad after a stroke but BLUNT thought that he had possibly greatly improved. Patrick Stewart, who knows TREVELYAN, says that about four years ago he had, not a stroke but some strange bug which left him more or less completely paralysed. He made a wonderful recovery and regained his speech by dint of more or less learning to speak all over again. He now teaches art again, so must use his voice to a certain extent. It would probably be possible to interview him but the interviewer would have to be prepared for his speech to be very slow indeed.

6. I raised with BLUNT the subject of GIMPEL FILS. He commented that he knew them all well. He tutored all three brothers as boys in Italy. This was when he first met them and they were a-political then! He had no political contact with them at any time but he had heard, for example, from Guy, that they had been in "the game". They would have had wonderful cover and access to many influential friends. He thought the one in France the most interesting. He could not tell me why he should say this but thought it must be because of something he had heard.

7. I introduced the subject of the INWARD case. I showed BLUNT two photographs, one of INWARD when young, and one of him when older. He definitely recognised the face, particularly the younger one, but could not put a name to it. I asked him with whom he associated this person and he said, rather surprisingly, Tommy HARRIS and possibly Kim PHILBY but definitely not Guy BURGESS. He thought he might have met him again at Hilda HARRIS's house since Tommy's death but he still could not offer any suggestion for the man's name. I then told BLUNT who he was. He said the name rang a bell but that was all. He was quite certain that he had seen him with Tommy HARRIS in some connection. I told him how Kim PHILBY, after visiting the Middle East, had put INWARD's name up for employment with M.I.6, although he had not seen him. BLUNT asked what he was doing and whether KLUGMAN would have known him. I told BLUNT that KLUGMAN would have known him. He asked if KLUGMAN would have been in the Middle East at the time of PHILBY's trip. When I said "Yes" he then asked if Kim and KLUGMAN had met on the trip. 8. Coming on to the subject of Alister WATSON, I explained to BLUNT that we were at an impasse in our interrogation of WATSON. He seemed to be suffering from a genuine mental blockage. He could not remember what he had done in the past but felt he was involved in some way or another. It was now necessary to convince him that it was in everybody's interests for him to talk. The only solution of the problem was to have a conference between Alister, the officer responsible for his case, Anthony and myself at which we would tell Alister BLUNT's story and put it to him that we could control the situation only if we knew the full facts and could elicit them by general discussion together. BLUNT did not like this proposition and asked me if we intended to prosecute Alister WATSON. I told him that nothing which was said either by himself or Alister to me would be used by me in a prosecution case. I went on to add that if on the other hand independent collateral evidence appeared which was legally admissible then there would be nothing to prevent a prosecution. In this event, the whole lurid story might emerge publicly at the Old Bailey. The best way to prevent this happening was for us to know the whole story now. BLUNT asked why we thought Alister WATSON was a spy. I said I would not go into details there and then; it would be best to do that when Alister himself was present; but I could tell him that Alister had recognised from a spread of photographs both George (GORSKIY) and Peter (MODIN) as Russians he had known and that he had also known Guy BURGESS's Otto. This shook BLUNT very considerably and he hereupon agreed to my proposition and to the idea that it was very necessary to sort out the truth. He thought we should be prepared to arrange for several interviews as he knew Alister to be a stubborn character. He offered to see him by himself. I asked him not to, at least to start with, and he assured me he would not. He suggested the confrontation should take place after his return from Sicily at the beginning of August and we fixed to meet again after his return from Rome in the middle of July.

BLUNT became deeply involved with Communism (Marxism, but not Party membership) at Cambridge from about October 1934, and continued to be so involved until he left Cambridge in June 1937.

2. In 1936 Guy BURGESS, who had left Cambridge in 1935, came down from London to see BLUNT and told him that he was leaving the Party (he had been a Communist Party member). BURGESS gradually enlarged on this by saying that he had left the Party "on orders" to join the Third International and then suggested that BLUNT should join him, and BLUNT immediately agreed to do so. It was then intended that BLUNT should remain at Cambridge and work as a talent-spotter of undergraduates who were potentially valuable spies being intended for the Civil Service. BLUNT was introduced by BURGESS to his first Russian controller at this time. His plans were changed, however, because he failed to obtain a Fellowship at King's of which he had hopes and when he was offered a job at the Warburg Institute he decided to accept it and left Cambridge for London. Before he left Cambridge BURGESS had revealed to him that Kim PHILBY and Donald MACLEAN were both in the conspiracy (only Donald MACLEAN had access at that time). Also at Cambridge BLUNT recruited Michael STRAIGHT, Leo LONG and Brian SIMON, and talent-spotted John CAIRNCROSS.

3. In London from June 1937 until the summer of 1939 BLUNT's usefulness to the R.I.S. as a talent-spotter was much diminished if non-existent. Such work as he did for them was mainly in support of BURGESS.

4. In September 1939 BLUNT joined the Army and, after training at Minley Manor, was commissioned and posted to the Intelligence Corps, Field Security Police. In September 1939 he was sent to France and when returning to the U.K. shortly before the fall of France ran into PHILBY at Arras. PHILBY was then "Times" correspondent with the B.E.F. BLUNT revealed to PHILBY, for the first time, that he was aware that PHILBY was also a spy and because he himself was out of touch gave PHILBY the F.S.S. suspect list to pass to the R.I.S.

5. Shortly after his arrival in the U.K. BLUNT met Victor ROTHSCHILD whom he had known since Cambridge days and was introduced to Guy LIDDELL and was so recruited into the Security Service in July 1940. He was first posted as P.A. to Brigadier Allen (C.&D.), and had little access to information of interest to the R.I.S. In about September 1940 he became P.A. to Captain LIDDELL (D.B.), and very shortly afterwards was moved to more general work in B Division as Head of B.I.B. Throughout the entire time he worked in the Security Service, i.e. July 1940 to October 1945, BLUNT handed over to the R.I.S. everything that came to his hand that could be of interest to them. His access from October 1940 to the end of his service was considerable. He handled:-

- C/E material about the Axis Intelligence Services;
- Distribution of G.C. & C.S. diplomatic material, including ISOS and ISBA;
- S.I.S. Special Material;
- XXX Material;
- Liaison with S.I.S. in certain of their operations;
- Distribution of OO Material (diplomatic waste paper);
- Operations against diplomatic premises;
- Deception - being a member of a committee set up for this purpose

In addition BLUNT received copies of all the B.6 (Watchers) reports. He was fully aware of the activities against the Spaniards dealt with by Brooman White and Harris; was involved in D/A operations against the Germans; took part in the investigation of leakages about S.O.E. operations; certainly handled some Russian PF's and could have called for any of these without arousing comment. He also passed over information about his colleagues and,

in particular, suggested the recruitment of Kemball JOHNSTON which, he said, the R.I.S. turned down. During this period he was in direct contact with his R.I.S. controller except for a brief period (not accurately dated but probably the summer or autumn of 1940) when his contact was absent and he handed his material to Lizy PHILBY who passed it to Bob STEWART of the B.C.P. for onward passage to the R.I.S.

6. In about 1943 BLUNT's controller asked him if he would be prepared to remain in the Security Service and make it his career after the war. He replied that he was not prepared to do so and only wanted to return to his own world of art. The R.I.S. made no attempt to persuade or suborn him to stay in M.I.5, and he duly left in October 1945 without further argument.

7. BLUNT has admitted that he met his last controller on several occasions after 1945 acting as a go-between for Guy BURGESS, but it must be borne in mind that he remained in touch with the Office and Security Service work until at least 1948 and probably 1949 in addition to his continued social contact with serving members of the Service.

8. When Guy BURGESS arrived in the U.K. on 7th May, 1951, he was met at the station by BLUNT and immediately confided in him that Donald MACLEAN was in danger from the authorities and enlisted his help. For this purpose BURGESS introduced him to "Peter" (Yuri MODIN). In fact according to BLUNT he was never actually called upon to help. After MACLEAN and BURGESS left the country BLUNT continued to see "Peter" who tried to persuade him that he too was in danger and that he should flee. This he refused to do and they finally parted leaving BLUNT with a schedule of long-term instructions for future meetings.

9. At some time between 1952 and 1956, at a date which we have not been able to establish accurately, BLUNT was re-contacted by "Peter" apparently in connection with Kim PHILBY who was "in a panic". BLUNT arranged a meeting between PHILBY and "Peter" which PHILBY told him "Peter" did not attend.

10. In the spring of 1962, probably April or May, BLUNT went to Beirut to stay with the Ambassador, his old friend Sir Ponsonby Moore CROSTHWAITE. In Beirut he met PHILBY who told him that he had been instructed by his own controller to ask BLUNT if he would be prepared to work for them again. BLUNT refused, and PHILBY said that he had told his controller that he was sure that this would be his reaction, and this - according to BLUNT - was the very last time he had any contact with the R.I.S.

11. It is not possible to gauge the truth and lies in BLUNT's admissions, but it is certainly true that BLUNT is very sincerely dedicated to his art work and it is easy to believe that he has little or no time to spare for the idiot manoeuvres of the conventional talent-spotting spy. There is no doubt, however, that he is vulnerable to blackmail in respect of his personal habits as well as his espionage past. He holds a high position in the art world, and he enjoys the people he meets there from Royalty downwards and has, therefore, a lot to lose.



At 23a in PF.854,556 (Gilbert Walter MORGAN) there is an interview report by Mr. Ruxton/F2 dated 17th March, 1967. At the interview which took place on 8th February, 1967, MORGAN recognised the name of Anthony BLUNT which had been included in a list of his contemporaries at Cambridge. The recognition arose because MORGAN had had correspondence with BLUNT in the mid-1950s about a medieval herbal. Originally BLUNT had written to the chief crypto-analyst at G.C.H.Q. for help in elucidating the code in which the herbal was composed. To help in the process the crypto-analyst had shown the herbal to MORGAN who is a keen botanist.

I went and saw Sir Anthony BLUNT on 21.2.67 in the afternoon in his office to tell him that we were in the process of interviewing Alister WATSON and to ask him whether he had anything further to contribute. I showed him the transcript of the previous discussion with him about Alister. BLUNT asked me whether I thought Alister had been in "the game". I said I thought it was likely but that Alister was having psychological difficulties in remembering certain things. BLUNT confined himself to saying "Well - I didn't recruit Allie". He offered to talk to Alister to see whether he could help resolve his mental difficulties. I asked him not to see Alister at this time and said that we would come back and discuss it later. BLUNT was extremely agitated about this matter and clearly knew something that he has not told us.



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Note of Interview by Mr. P.M. Wright  
with Sir Anthony BLUNT on 20.12.66.

I went to see Sir Anthony BLUNT in his flat on 20.12.66. to discuss a number of topics.

2. Firstly, I wanted to talk about Leo LONG, in view of our anxiety that LONG had not told the truth. (I am not of course satisfied that what BLUNT has to say on this is yet the truth - but I wanted nevertheless to go over the ground again, particularly over certain points which were not at all clear.) BLUNT maintained that he went to Cambridge at the beginning of October 1939 to meet Leo LONG to make arrangements about future contact as he, BLUNT, was about to go into the Army. (For the 1939/40 period Leo went back to Cambridge - BLUNT was not quite certain why or what he was doing - and was living in Trinity.) I asked BLUNT how he had got to know Leo at all. He said he had first been introduced to him by KLUGMAN and that in his mind he associated LONG with the John CAIRNCROSS circle in Cambridge. He threw out the comment that LONG was an unsatisfactory spy (!!). BLUNT described again how he had met Leo in the War Office accidentally in 1941, there having been no dealings with him since October 1939. BLUNT had had a lot of trouble from HENRY (GORSKIY) who had complained of lack of product. He began to meet Leo once a month - usually in the Reform Club quite openly over a drink at lunch time. Leo would produce his information in a little roll of white paper about 6 inches by 1 inch:- general information about troop movements, strategic intentions of the German Army etc. I asked BLUNT if Leo had given him information about the German attack on Russia, BARBAROSSA. He replied that Leo had not, although Henry had asked him at least once before the attack whether there was any information. BLUNT was very puzzled about this and asked me whether Leo would have had access to it. I said that I thought he would have had. How did he interpret Leo's poor performance, I asked. Did he ascribe it to lack of heart? His immediate reaction was - "Oh, no - Leo was always a tough little Communist." He suggested the possibility that Leo was perhaps involved with the other side (i.e. the G.R.U.). I probed this question of LONG and the G.R.U. at some length. I asked BLUNT whether Peter ASTBURY could have picked Leo up between October 1939 and the first few months of 1941. BLUNT thought that if Peter had been with Leo in the Army at any point, for long enough, that is, for him to have assessed him, then he possibly could have picked him up (in the same way as he picked up Brian SIMON). It is for us therefore to establish whether there was a period in both their careers when they could have been together for a sufficiently long time for a recruitment to have taken place.

3. In view of BLUNT's previous statement that Peter ASTBURY worked for the Soviet Military Attache (i.e. the G.R.U.) I asked him how he came to know this. He said it was through Brian SIMON who placed ASTBURY's recruitment as taking place in the summer of 1939.

4. Going back to LONG, I asked BLUNT whether he "gave up" Communism after his recruitment. This was of particular interest as it would have a bearing on

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the possibility of ASTBURY having picked him up: ASTBURY would hardly have recruited him unless his communism had still been in evidence. BLUNT said that yes, he had become a renegade, and "given up" under Russian instructions. There were those who knew the truth, however, e.g. BURGESS, who was the one who had obtained the Russians' approval for Leo's recruitment. Brian SIMON did not know.

5. I asked BLUNT whether he had seen Leo LONG again after he went to Europe. He said he had met him in Germany in 1945/46. They had discussed various things. Leo thought he should go into politics and get out of Intelligence. I asked BLUNT if this discussion had been in terms of "the Cause" and he said yes, that it had. Leo thought he could do more "good" in politics.

6. I asked BLUNT about the matter of the M.I.5 job for Leo. BLUNT had been instructed by the Russians to try and get Leo into M.I.5. He discussed this with Leo on one of his trips.

7. I told BLUNT that Leo had said that he had given up spying when he went to Germany. BLUNT did not believe this. He volunteered that it was far more likely that by the early 1950's Leo changed his mind. At about this time he acquired a new wife. BLUNT felt that the move from Intelligence in Germany to television was possibly a positive step on Leo's part to get out of things that could be of interest to the Russians - to get off the hook. BLUNT emphasised that he did not know this, that he was speculating. His dealings with Leo LONG finished when the latter left the country.

8. In an early de-briefing of BLUNT by Arthur MARTIN the name POPE-HENNESSY had been given to him and had aroused no comment. I decided to raise it again at this point. BLUNT first said "Oh - John - Director of the V. & A. - I know him well." And he continued to describe him as very reactionary, a careerist, inhuman, dedicated to his job, but a queer. I hammered on and insisted that there was a brother, what about him? BLUNT was obviously highly embarrassed and had to admit "Oh yes, he is one of us." He described him as highly neurotic, more brilliant than his brother John. He said that he kept very bad company (!!) and was a masochist. BLUNT met him through Harold NICHOLSON. He was at drinks with NICHOLSON and James POPE-HENNESSY was there. When BLUNT was going off to get himself dinner Harold asked him to take James along with him as he, Harold, had a dinner party and James wouldn't go! So BLUNT took James POPE-HENNESSY to the Reform. There they were joined by Guy BURGESS who fell for POPE-HENNESSY in a big way and disappeared with him for the night. A violent affair ensued in the course of which Guy twisted James's tail and extracted information from him. (James was then in Military Intelligence and was a valuable source to Guy.) On one occasion James threatened to shoot himself in Bentinck Street. BLUNT recalled that he and Guy had discussed James and decided he was too unstable a character to recruit (!!).

9. BLUNT said that James at about this time was having an affair with Clarissa CHURCHILL who was working at G.C. & C.S. Guy got to know Clarissa through James. When the Russians discovered that Guy was in touch with Clarissa they ordered him to try to marry her. He did try, but eventually found he could not stomach it (BLUNT offered no comment on her reactions) and the matter faded out. They remained very good friends with Clarissa for years.



10. As by this time it was rather late we decided to call it a day. Before I left I asked BLUNT how Kim PHILBY got to know Tommy HARRIS, and whether they had known one another pre-war. BLUNT's first reaction was that they must have done. He himself got to know Tommy in about 1934 when he was still at Cambridge. He was giving lectures at the Courtauld Institute and in the course of one of them described a certain picture to illustrate his point and said it was one of the most beautiful in the world but unfortunately he had never seen it. After his lecture, he was approached by one of the audience, Henriquetta, Tommy's sister, who told him the picture was in her brother's possession and that she could arrange for him to see it. He jumped at the offer, went round to Tommy's place for the first time and saw the picture. They became close friends. He introduced Guy BURGESS to Tommy and they also became close friends. This was in about 1936. BLUNT certainly did not introduce Kim to Tommy but thought Guy would have done, probably at the time Kim was going to Spain and would find Tommy's Spanish connections useful. However, BLUNT was not sure of this. He was almost sure, however, that Kim and Tommy were close friends well before the war. I told him that Tommy had said he had not met Kim until he, Tommy, went to Section X (i.e. Section D) in 1940. BLUNT said perhaps this was true but he personally did not believe it. He could not think, however, why Tommy should have said this. He did not believe Tommy was involved in "the game".

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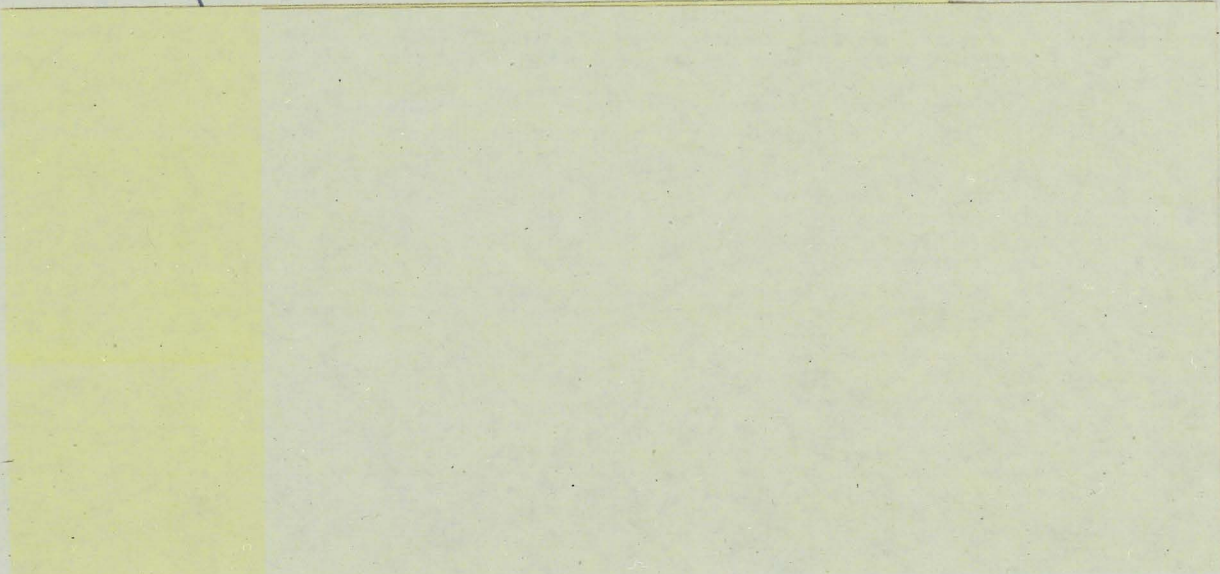


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Brief for interview with Sir Anthony BLUNT

James POPE-HENNESSY

Author - very successful and well known. In the years 1941-1942 when POPE-HENNESSY was a serving soldier and employed in the War Office he had a violent love affair with Guy BURGESS which ended in his attempting - or threatening to shoot Guy and/or himself. POPE-HENNESSY is a Roman Catholic and Clarissa CHURCHILL weighed in to the rescue with one or more priests and saved POPE-HENNESSY - or possibly Guy BURGESS. There is no doubt that Sir Anthony BLUNT knew him well and continued to do so at least until 1961.
