

We shall now have to consider whether or not Mrs. FHILBY ought to be seen. My own view is that she should be.

Against seeing her are these considerations: -

- (a) Being in a very nervous state, and having a doubtful respect for the truth, it is likely to prove very difficult to determine how much of anything she tells us is reliable.
- (b) If we interview her, PHILBY himself is likely to become aware of the fact, whether or not she tells him herself. If, whether accurately or not, he obtains the impression that she had volunteered information to us about him, this would finally remove all hope of a reconciliation between him and her. This would be unfortunate, and it has always been our policy so far as is possible to avoid any action which might further increase PHILBY's personal and family difficulties.

In favour of our interviewing her are these points:-

- (a) We have been told that she wishes to be interviewed by us.
- (b) We have been told that she is convinced of PHILEY's "guilt", and given to understand that she may have some information bearing on this. I think we ought to know of what she thinks PHILEY guilty, why she thinks in this way, and whether she in fact has any information whatever bearing on PHILEY's guilt or innocence.

If Mrs. PHILBY is seen at all, I suggest that she should be seen

You asked for a summary of the PHILBY case for the information of the Home Secretary. D.1's note at 390a, which I think sets out the position with as much clarity and brevity as is possible, is submitted.

At minute 389 is canvassed the advisability of interviewing Mrs. PHILBY. I think that the arguments against seeing her should include this: that if, as is probable, PHILBY himself becomes aware that such an interview is to be or has been held, that knowledge might possibly turn the scale in favour of his fleeing the country as well as contribute to the break-up of his marriage. However, we are at present in no position to assess with any precision the likelihood of his departing. Mrs. PHILBY's fears, as described on page 1 of 388a, seem to be based on wholly insubstantial grounds. They are intuitive, not logical. She is in a highly neurotic or hysterical state and she is undergoing treatment from a psychiatrist who, as far as I can see, himself tends to encourage her apprehensions.

The basic facts, in my opinion, are put in (a) and (b) at the end of minute 389. PHILBY, though we cannot prove it, must be presumed to have been a Russian His wife represents that she has information for us which bears on that. An interview with her affords some hope of taking this very important case a stage further. No other step that I can see affords such a hope. We should therefore see her, accepting such risks as may be involved. I should be ready to undertake the interview jointly with D.1, as he proposes.

I have considered the proposition put up, that we should take advantage of Mrs. PHILBY's offer to provide information, and you ask for my advice as to whether there is any objection to our seeing her, from the legal angle. My answer to this is clearly that there is none. In fact I think it is our constitutional duty to see her if we think she is in a position to furnish any information. In fact in an important case like this, I think we should see her even though I see the difficulties which are very clearly put in the preceding Minutes.

I share strongly the views expressed by you at (a) in Min. 394, namely, that before seeing Mrs. PHILBY we should ascertain whether there are any medical reasons why she should not be interviewed. I should like if possible Mrs. PHILBY's medical adviser to give an opinion as to whether her mental state is such that she is likely to speak the truth.

It should be explained that in our interview with on 16 December, which had had to be postponed until then because of absence abroad, D.1 and I did our utmost to give him a clear and concise brief, in accordance with (a) of minute 394, to ask whether in his opinion there were objections on medical grounds to Mrs. PHILBY being interviewed by the Security Service. The answer is covered by paragraph 2 of 402a; but I am not satisfied that in such a way that Elliott put the question to the latter realised that that was our sole purpose in inviting to see him or that he was being asked for a formal medical opinion. You will wish to see Miss McBarnet's comment at 411a on Aileen PHIIBY's story

I think there can now be little doubt that the story of the telegram is a figment of Mrs. PHILBY's imagination. I am inclined myself to think that the reason for her having invented this story is that it is a reflection of some still greater fear - or possibly knowledge - which is worrying her. If our hypothesis about PHILBY is right, I find it very difficult to believe that Mrs. PHILBY knows nothing about it, and this I think may well go some way to explain the deterioration in her mental condition.

I am therefore even more in favour of arranging for her to be seen by a Security Service officer, if the medical objections can be overcome.

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Note. With reference to Mr. Robertson's note of 4.1.1954. I can make the following comments: -On the 1 September, 1953 Aileen FHILBY left Rickmansworth to go to stay with Lady FFOULKS, Elmsley, Yoxford, Suffolk. Before leaving she asked the Rickmansworth Police to keep an eye on the house while she was away. She took the younger children with her and Josephine was staying with her grandmother Mrs. ALLEYNE in London. From the 1 September, 1953 until 7 September, 1953 there was nothing to report on the Chorley Wood telephone line. At 19.16 hours on the 7 September, 1953, the child Josephine rang up and spoke to her mother at Rickmansworth and at 20.18 hours Kim PHILBY rang up to ask Aileen about the holiday and about everyone's health. It would appear from this last conversation that although Kim PHILBY was away from his office during the time Aileen was staying in Suffolk, they were not together. is thought, but cannot be positively stated, that Kim PHILBY was away on a motoring holiday with Constance ASHLEY JONES. There is no record whatsoever of the telegram which Aileen PHILBY has alleged that she received on the telephone on the evening of the 6 September and there is no doubt that had such a call been received it would have been recorded. It appears to me that this whole story is a figment of Aileen PHILBY's imagination. It may be worth recording that not very long after this, in fact on the 20 September, 1953., Aileen PHILBY told her mother that she had been bothered by the press on the subject of Melinda MACLEAN's disappearance. She told her mother a complicated story about receiving two press telephone calls and trying to get in touch with Kim at the Athenaeum and at his mother's flat. None of these alleged calls are recorded either on the cylinders or in the notes of the precedding week and it would seem that the whole story was a fantasy. Copied for Di/Mr. Martin 8/164.

According to her, she and RHILBY were staying in the first week of September with some friends in Suffolk (whose name Elliott did not know). On 6 September she and PHILBY separated and she herself returned to her home at Rickmansworth. She did not know where PHILBY went. On the evening of 6 September, between 6 and 6.30 p.m., she received a telephone call apparently from the local exchange, informing her that there was a telegram for her, which they then read out. Its text was: -"SOURPUSS BE GOOD. LOOK AFTER THE CHILDREN. WILL LET YOU KNOW NEWS LATER BUT DON'T LET LADS KNOW YET. ANGEL." This Mrs. PHILBY interpreted at the time as an announcement by her husband that he was fleeing abroad or had already done so. the terms "SOURFUSS" and "ANGEL" were intimate nicknemes used by herself and IHILBY for each other. She had added that the operator, having read out the text of the telegram, asked whether written confirmation was required. No such confirmation arrived. So far as she could recollect the voice and manner of the speaker on the telephone were characteristic of any ordinary exchange operator. Eileen HIIBY, shortly after PHIIBY's removal from M.I.6, had tried to get a job for PHILBY in MARKS & SPENCERS through a senior member of that firm whom she knew. She had been more or less promised a job for him, but had later been told that the person she had first appreached had since talked to Flora SOLOMONS, the outcome being that no vacancy could be found for FHILBY. NOTE ON THE CASE OF H.A.R. PHILBY.

H.A.R. PHILBY was the M.I.6 representative in Washington when MACLEAN and BURGESS disappeared on 25 May 1951.

While on Foreign Service duty in Washington in 1950/51, BURGESS had been staying with PHILBY, whom he had known intimately since the time when both men were at Cambridge in 1930/33.

It will be remembered that MACLEAN was under investigation on suspicion of espionage at the time of his disappearance, which took place shortly before he was to have been interrogated. Since information received shortly after the disappearance gave ground for strong suspicion that BURGESS had himself been a spy, early attention was given to the possibility that a leakage might have taken place while he was staying with PHILEY in Washington, and that PHILEY might have been responsible for it.

The examination of PHILBY's career which followed led to suspicion that he had been consciously responsible for the leakage. The suspicion rested on the following facts among others:-

- 1. Though probably not a member of the Communist Party, PHILBY was nevertheless a Communist by conviction while at Cambridge.
- 2. He married in 1934 a certain Alice FRIEDMANN, an Austrian Communist.
- 3. PHILBY was a partner in 1934 with a certain Peter SMOLLETT @ SMOLKA, a Communist journalist later discovered to have been closely associated with BURGESS in circumstances suggesting that he was a party to the latter's espionage.
- 4. In 1936 PHILBY joined the Anglo-German Fellowship and in so doing went through a form of renouncing his former Communist beliefs. This coincided with a similar outward (and certainly not genuine) disillusionment with Communism on the part of BURGESS and MACLEAN.
- 5. In 1937 PHILBY went to Spain, where he attached himself to the headquarters of General FRANCO and obtained the appointment of "Times" correspondent.

According to information supplied by the Soviet intelligence defector KRIVITSKY, the Russians recruited in 1937 a young British journalist, to whom was to be given the task of proceeding to Spain with the ultimate object of assassinating General FRANCO.

KRIVITSKY's evidence fitted PHILBY very closely, and it has so far been possible to find no other candidate whom it so fits.

- 6. In the same year, PHILBY separated from his first wife, the former Alice FRIEDMANN. There are however strong grounds for supposing that the separation was an outward one only and was designed to coincide with the other deliberately contrived evidence of PHILBY having renounced Communist sympathies.
- 7. In September 1945 a certain Constantin VOLKOV, a cipher clerk in the Soviet Consulate at Istanbul, offered to defect. He produced a sample of information which he would supply in return for a large money payment. This included the assertion that the "Departmental Head of the British Counter-espionage Directorate in London" was a Soviet spy.

PHILBY was at this time head of Section IX of M.I.6, the section charged with the investigation of Soviet espionage. PHILBY was one of a very small number of persons informed of the VOLKOV affair, and was selected to travel immediately to Istanbul to investigate. He arrived there on 28.9.45, but on 26.9.45 VOLKOV had been removed from Istanbul in a Soviet military aircraft.

OLUNE ! 390A VOLKOV's removal must have been due to a leakage, and PHILBY must come under strong suspicion of responsibility for it. MACLEAN and BURGESS disappeared at a time when, according to the information available in Washington in a very small circle including FHILBY, MACLEAN was due to be interrogated on 24 or 25 May 1951. The disappearance was on 25 May. It appeared probable therefore that MACLEAN was warned at the last moment and at short notice. The Washington information was however not up to date, in that by 24 May it had been decided in London to postpone the interrogation of MACIEAN until 18 - 25 June. These facts suggested that if a leakage in fact took place, it took place more probably in Washington than in London. PHILBY should be interrogated by a barrister of standing formerly employed by the Security Service during the war, but who at the time in question was not connected with either this Service or M.I.6. On 12 December 1951 PHILBY was accordingly questioned on the whole of the evidence against him. The conclusion reached by the interrogator was:-"That PHILBY is and has for many years been a Soviet agent and that he was directly and deliberately responsible for the leakage which in fact occurred." This finding was not and still is not susceptible of definite proof. Since his interrogation, however, PHILEY has given us no information to offset the evidence against him; nor have continued enquiries into the circumstances of the disappearance of BURGESS and MACLEAN led to the discovery of any new facts tending either to prove or to disprove the case. In July 1951 FHIIBY was asked to resign from M.I.6, his position there having become untenable because of his close association with BURGESS immediately before the latter's disappearance. Since that time, although PHILBY has had some financial support from his father, H. St. John PHILBY, found it difficult to obtain continuous or sufficiently well-paid employment. It is also known that he had had matrimonial difficulties. The possibility must therefore be recognised that, his M.I.6 career being ended and his prospects in other directions being uncertain, he might decide to depart to the Soviet Union or other Iron Curtain territory, with or without the assistance of the Russian Intelligence Service. Should PHIIBY decide to take this step, nothing could be done legally to prevent him going. The circumstantial evidence against him is far from being sufficient to form the basis of a charge under the Official Secrets Acts, and no powers exist whereby he could be detained. To issue general instructions to Immigration Officers and Police at the ports to report should he seek to leave would do no more than ensure early news of his departure, and would considerably increase the likelihood that the security interest in him would become public knowledge. This latter risk would be increased still further should the security authorities of European countries be asked to assist in finding him. It is suggested that, should the suspicions against him coupled with his past association with BURGESS be publicised in the press, this would do serious harm by reviving the misgivings expressed on both sides of the Atlantic in consequence of the BURGESS and MACLEAN affair. Our conclusion therefore is that PHILBY may at any time seek asylum in an Iron Curtain country, that no legal powers exist to prevent him doing this, and that to seek the aid of the police or immigration authorities or of the security authorities of other countries would not only serve no useful purpose, but would invite widespread and undesirable publicity. - 4. Mrs. PHILBY said that she had been in the habit of keeping PHILBY's passport "under the mattress". It was not there now, and she did not know where it was. Elliott thought that by this obscure
- 5. Mrs. PHILBY considered that PHILBY was a man who could not live without adulation. He was unlikely to get it here, and might therefore seek it in the Soviet Union.

These were, as I understood the position, the principal grounds for Mrs. PHILBY's fears.

I consulted A.2.A. at the office and Miss McBarnet. It was established that the telephone check on Miss Constance ASHLEY JONES (PHILBY's mistress) showed that she had recently been enquiring about trains to Nottingham (it was also established this morning from the same source, that Miss ASHLEY JONES had told friends that she had seen PHILBY off to Nottingham on the morning of 22 November 1953).

After I had discussed the position with D and with Mr. Skardon, D and I agreed that no action should be taken beyond what I had already done in the office, which was to reimpose telephone checks on all members of the PHILBY family in London, and to arrange for them to be monitored over the weekend. Dear Thank you very much for your letter of 12th October, 1953. The possibility that there may be some connection between Mrs. MACLEAN's visit to Majorca and her subsequent disappearance is an idea that has already occurred to both of us. In this connection it is thought that Tomas HARRIS returned to the United Kingdom from Majorca shortly before 14th August, 1953. Mrs. DINBAR and Mrs. MACLEAN went to Majorca at the end of July and returned to Geneva on 7.9.1953. It is possible that they might have met HARRIS in Majorca although we have no information that this is the case. This is a matter which we may be able to pursue when Mrs. DUNBAR returns to this country later this year. We have no information that BURGESS ever stayed in Majorca with HARRIS although he may well have done so as they were certainly friends. It is, I think, important that we should know what means by the story about PHILBY. I think it would be better that the question should not be taken up with by correspondence but that he should be approached direct in New York. Our representative is very shortly leaving Washington to return to the United Kingdom and it may not be possible for him in the time available to arrange a visit to New York for this purpose. If you agree perhaps you will telephone to me and I will write to our representative to let him know how the matter stands. COLLINS of GOYA, Ltd. is Douglas R. COLLINS known to us as a friend of BURGESS' and who, since he happened to be in New York at the time, was interviewed in this connection by the F.B.I. in June, 1951. In the course of the interview he said that he believed BURGESS' closest friend was David FOOTMAN. COLLINS and his wife are known to be close friends of the FHILBYS. Please refer to my letter of September 16, 1953, your reference PF.604584/B.2.B/RTR.

Alexander ORLOV was reinterviewed on August 27, 1953, at which time a photograph of H. A. R. (Kim) Philby, along with a number of other unlabeled photographs, was shown to him. He failed to recognize the photograph of Philby as that of an individual known to him, and no information was provided to him concerning Philby.

ORLOV was able to provide little further information concerning the individual KRAL, with alias Krum. He stated he had never seen KRAL and for that reason was unable to provide any physical description, or to describe any unusual characteristics or mannerisms of this individual.

He stated, however, that he remembers having seen a dark Latvian in the Russian Embassy in Paris in about 1936 and 1937. He said that since KRAL was reported to have been a Latvian, it is possible this individual whom he saw in Paris was KRAL. He described this person as probably in his thirties, height 6' 1", build slender, characteristics narrow, long and sharp face. He said the individual was a high-strung, nervous type, said he wore no glasses and dressed in dark clothing.

ORLOV noted that KRAL, who was also known under the name of KRUM, was the same individual that Walter Krivitsky claimed was sent to assassinate him in France. This incident is described by Krivitsky in his book "In Stalin's Secret Service". ORLOV noted KRAL was a Latvian, but had formerly been a professional safecracker and was reported to look like a Spaniard. He said KRAL planned to gain an audience with Franco under the pretext of being an inventor who had a special type of gas mask to sell. However, shortly after he entered Franco's territory, he was thrown out of the country for some reason ORLOV was not aware of.

ORLOW said that toward the end of 1937, but prior to November of that year, KISLOV, the chief resident NKVD agent in Paris, personally brought an individual to ORLOV in Spain under very secret conditions and requested ORLOV to put this individual in touch with Spanish anarchist leaders. ORLOV complied with this request by introducing the unknown individual to Garcia OLIVER, one of the anarchist leaders. After about one month, the individual

left Spain and it was not until sometime later when ORLOV again saw KISLOV in Paris that KISLOV told him the individual had been sent by YEZHOV of the NKVD to make arrangements to assassinate Franco. ORLOV did not know what happened to change the plans of this man but did know he did not make any attempt on Franco's life. He described this man as follows: Age - about 12 in 1937; height - 5'9"; weight - 180 pounds; hair - black, wavy; eyes - dark brown; wore glasses; complexion - dark; build - very erect posture; broad shoulders; descriptive date - spoke Russian with a slight accent, appeared to be a Bulgarian and reputed to belong to the terrorist sect of Georgi DIMITROV.

ORLOV again repeated the information he previously furnished concerning the agent who was so close to Franco, that he saw him practically every day and could have easily killed him at any time it was desired. ORLOV did not know who this man was, but that either SLUTSKY or KISLOV of the NKVD had told him about him, and that he was a foreigner and not a Russian. ORLOV observed further evidence of the fact that the Soviets had a man close to Franco which became apparent to him when he received pieces of information that could have come from no other source. ORLOV speculated this man was probably too valuable to risk in an attempt on the life of Franco.

We have now been briefly advised that ORLOV was unable to identify PHILBY's photograph. He could also provide little additional information to that previously furnished concerning KRAL or the others he had mentioned.
