

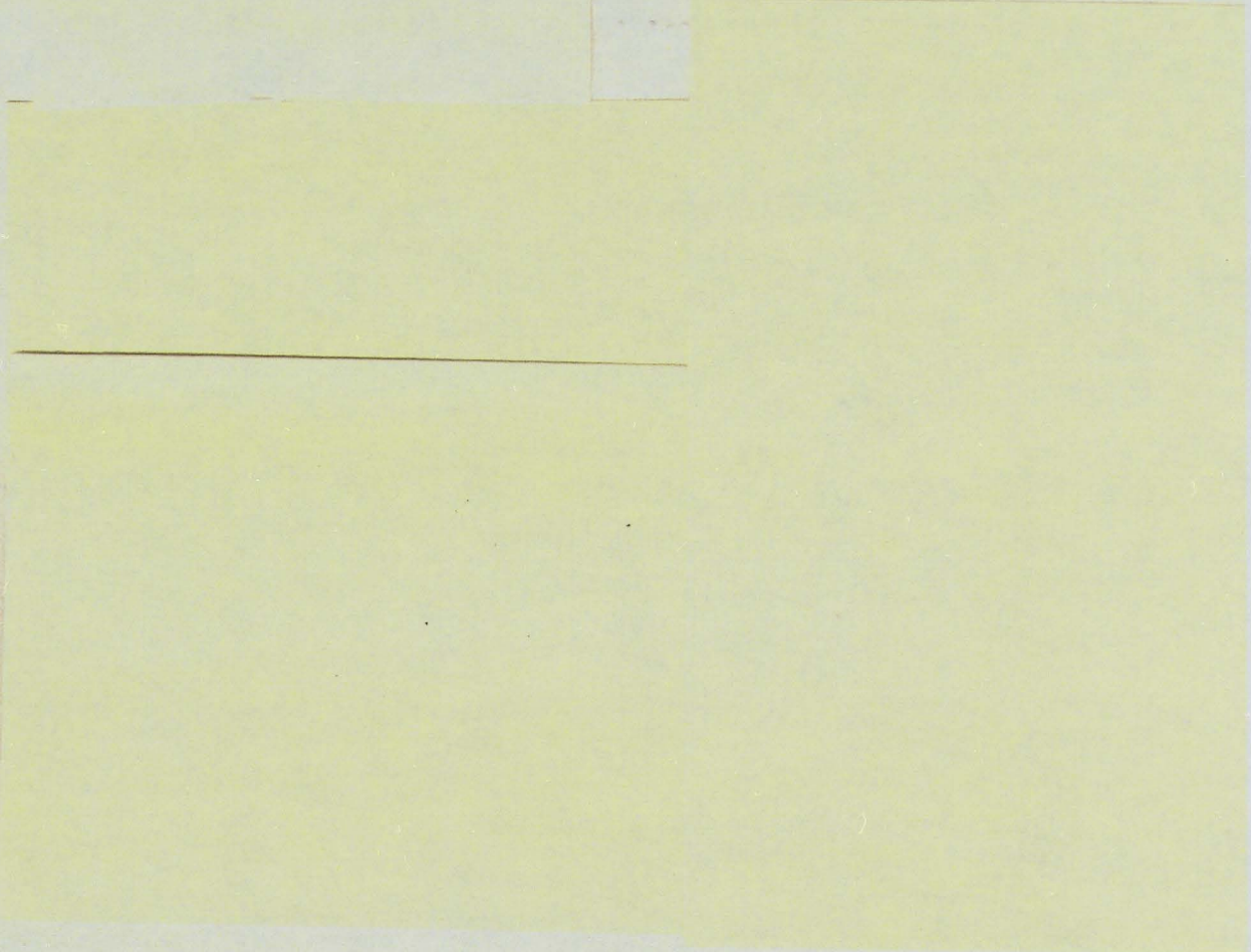

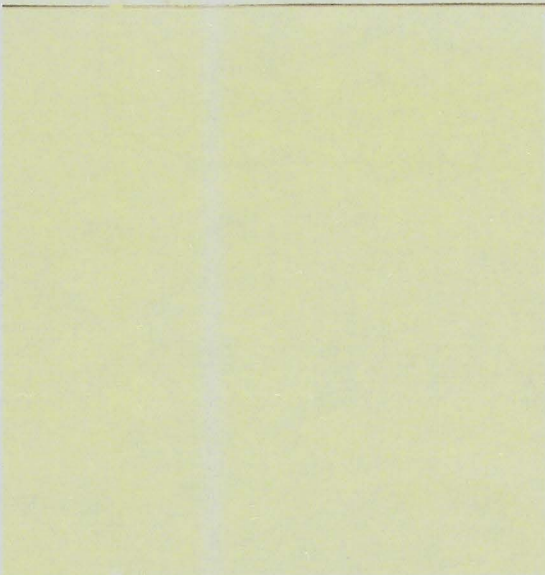

Since I asked for the address 52 Abbey House, N.W.8. to be added to the existing warrant on Mrs. PHILBY, I have learned that there is no doubt that she has given this address to PHILBY and there is a high probability that letters from him will be sent direct to this address. It has occurred to me that, in these circumstances, she is not likely to use Mrs. MILNE's name and may well use either the name CURRAN, the name under which she travelled when she went to America, or DUNN see serial 945z. In the circumstances I should like to include these names on the warrant and, therefore, I apply for a Home Office Warrant letter check on letters addressed to and emanating from Mrs. Eleanor PHILBY @ Mrs. CURRAN @ Mrs. DUNN at 18 Carrick Court, Kennington Park Road, S.E.11. and at 52 Abbey House, London, N.W.8.

If any letters arrive for Mrs. PHILBY from PHILBY, they should be picked up on the emanating warrant P.S/12792 already in existence for PHILBY in Moscow. I have consulted Mr. Saunders, G.P.O., who agrees that this is so, and in case a delayed letter from PHILBY should arrive for her, he would add the address 52 Abbey House, N.W.8. temporarily to the list of addresses already given to him in this connection (see serial 924a).

2. Please refer to your letter of 25th January, 1963, attached to which you sent us some photographs of Alexander ORLOV. These were very welcome and I apologise for not writing to thank you, but we originally wanted them to show to Kim PHILBY and that plan was overtaken by events.

2. I believe you have a copy of the PHILBY confession, i.e. the document he typed himself and handed over on 11th January, 1963 and will know that he said in it that ORLOV (Big Bill) was his controller at certain stages of his work for the R.I.S. (page 2 paragraphs 12, 13, 14, 17, 25 of the confession). He had previously said, during the conversation in which he made his first confession on 9th January, 1963, that he saw ORLOV's photographs "in the Archives in the States".
3. This remark of PHILBY's seems strange to me because, as far as I know, the F.B.I. were not aware of the existence of ORLOV (except for the reference to him made by KAVITSKY) until he published articles in the Press in 1953. I suppose it is just possible that PHILBY may have seen photographs of him in Naturalisation and Immigration Records where I believe they existed from 1938 onwards - or he may have been lying, but if he was speaking the truth and "Big Bill" is identical with the Alexander ORLOV in the U.S.A. then ORLOV has lied in saying that he had no connection with espionage in the U.K., for he must have known of the recruitment of Donald MACLEAN and of Guy BURGESS as well as of PHILBY, and presumably much more.
4. All these things are of course problematical because I have a very strong feeling that, while much of PHILBY's confession is true, it is nothing like the whole truth. However, I am sure that ORLOV should be tackled again on the basis of PHILBY's confession.
5. I know, of course, that ORLOV is a sick man but we must try to test the truth of PHILBY's statements as far as possible, and I hope the Bureau may be willing to question ORLOV again. Obviously his knowledge of the recruitment of PHILBY, MACLEAN and BURGESS is now of somewhat academic interest. What is much more important is what he may know of other recruitments.

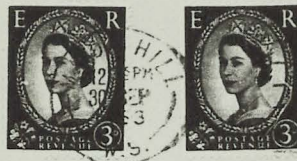



Mr. Richardson, P.R., Home Office, rang me this afternoon and asked what briefing I had to give him regarding the departure of Mrs. Philby to Moscow.

2. I spoke with Mr. Symonds of D.1. who told me that Mrs. Philby had in fact left London Airport for Moscow this afternoon and that there was no security interest in her case.

3. I rang Richardson and told him that he should take the line with the press that Mrs. Philby did in fact take a plane from London Airport, presumably to join her husband, that there was no security interest in her case and that she was perfectly free to enter and leave this country as she wished.

4. I told Richardson that it would, in my view, be unwise for the Home Office to have too great detail about her departure as we did not want to give the press the impression, or say anything to the press from which they could infer, that the Security Service had Mrs. Philby under investigation. I pointed out that such a statement would be inconsistent with the official line that Mrs. Philby was not a security risk. We might well be asked if we knew that she was going, and if the press infer that she was under investigation, why we did not stop her.

When Mr. Richardson, P.R., Home Office, called to see me this morning, he told me that he had been in touch with the news department of the Foreign Office who had been briefed by the Lord Privy Seal to tell the press that the authorities knew that Mrs Philby was leaving for Russia. Mr. Richardson said that he had told the Foreign Office news department that he was briefing the press along the lines of our discussion yesterday, and if the Foreign Office news department want to take the matter further they should get the Lord Privy Seal to see the Permanent Secretary, Home Office, or the Home Secretary.

Richardson said it was perfectly easy to play the matter with the press by indicating to them that they had ascertained from the Immigration Officer at London Airport that Mrs. Philby had in fact left.

At 12.30 this morning Mr. Lamport, A.I.A., telephoned to say he had just heard from London Airport that Mrs. PHILBY had boarded the Soviet plane. It would take off in ten minutes time.

2. Mr. Lamport let me know later that Mrs. PHILBY was shepherded throughout by Aeroflot to such an extent that no-one had a sight of her papers. He was not, therefore, able to say whether she had a Russian visa or whether she was travelling under her own name. In fact this information must be available and will no doubt be produced later.

On receipt of information from A.2.A. which suggested that Mrs. PHILBY was leaving from London Airport shortly after 11.00 this morning,

I later telephoned to Mr. Lamport, A.1.A., and asked him to discover what flights were leaving from London Airport on which Mrs. PHILBY might be travelling. Mr. Lamport later let me know that it was necessary for passengers to be at London Airport at least half an hour before the scheduled timing of departure. Therefore Mrs. PHILBY could not possibly be leaving before 11.30. The planes leaving after that time were as follows:

11.35	Turin
11.40	Basle
11.50	Nice
11.50	Brussels
11.55	Athens
12.00	Paris
12.30	Moscow

This last was a Soviet plane. Mr. Lamport's contact at London Airport will look out for Mrs. PHILBY and hopes to be able to tell us later which plane she travels on.

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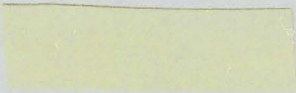

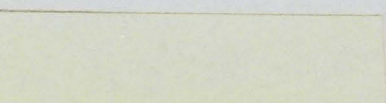
2. I do not think there is any mystery about SCICLUNA @ SHACKLETON of whom we have no trace, being in possession of PHILBY's various addresses.

3. When, in June 1952, PHILBY got a job through Jack IVENS, he worked in the office of Gargour & Fife which is one of several export firms all affiliated and connected with the IVENS family. "SHACKLETON" was working in the same office.

4. Having failed to get in touch with Miss Coates who was away, I eventually spoke to Mr. Davy who works in Miss Coates' Department, and put to him the enquiry as to what would be their reaction if we were to invite them to Refuse Leave to Land to Mrs. PHILBY on her possible return to this country after a possible stay in Moscow with PHILBY, a known spy. Mr. Davy's reply was that they would naturally give careful consideration to any such request. They would, however, be extremely reluctant to agree to Refuse Leave to Land, because it was obviously the kind of case which would create much and probably bad publicity. Mr. Davy added that although Mrs. PHILBY remains an American citizen, she is presumably entitled to apply for British citizenship, and the fact that PHILBY is alleged to have taken Soviet citizenship would make no difference to this. Mr. Davy mentioned this because he said if she is eligible to apply for British nationality, it would be particularly difficult to refuse her leave to land as an alien. He said that he would check this point with the Nationality Division.

2. Mr. Davy telephoned me later to say that he had checked the point raised above and he found that it was believed that PHILBY, who was born in India of a father born in Ceylon, had never troubled to register as a full British subject. In these circumstances, Mrs. PHILBY is not eligible to apply for British nationality.

Philby 'panic', say Russians

By Richard Hughes

The Sunday Times representative in the Far East, who has just visited Moscow

H. R. (Kim) Philby, now identified as "the third man" who warned Guy Burgess and Donald Maclean of their impending arrest for espionage and treason 12 years ago, is "recuperating" in a Soviet sanatorium in the Black Sea area.

His sudden disappearance from the Middle East at the beginning of the year, it is now evident, surprised and embarrassed the Soviet authorities, who still do not believe that there was any real need for his flight.

The words "unjustifiable panic" were privately used to me by a highly placed Russian contact in Moscow last week.

From conversations with senior Soviet officials it is clear that Philby is regarded by the Soviet

authorities as a figure of no great importance. It may be safely assumed that any services he was fulfilling for them in recent years in the Middle East, after his resignation from the Foreign Office, had little significance.

Up to Philby

When I pressed Soviet officials and senior party members that the Philby affair should be "tidied up" by a statement from him, or an interview, it was conceded that this would "make sense," but was dependent on Philby's consent.

No decision had been reached before I left Moscow, and I was left with the strong impression that either Philby withheld his consent, or the Soviet authorities cannot yet agree whether or how to close the affair formally.

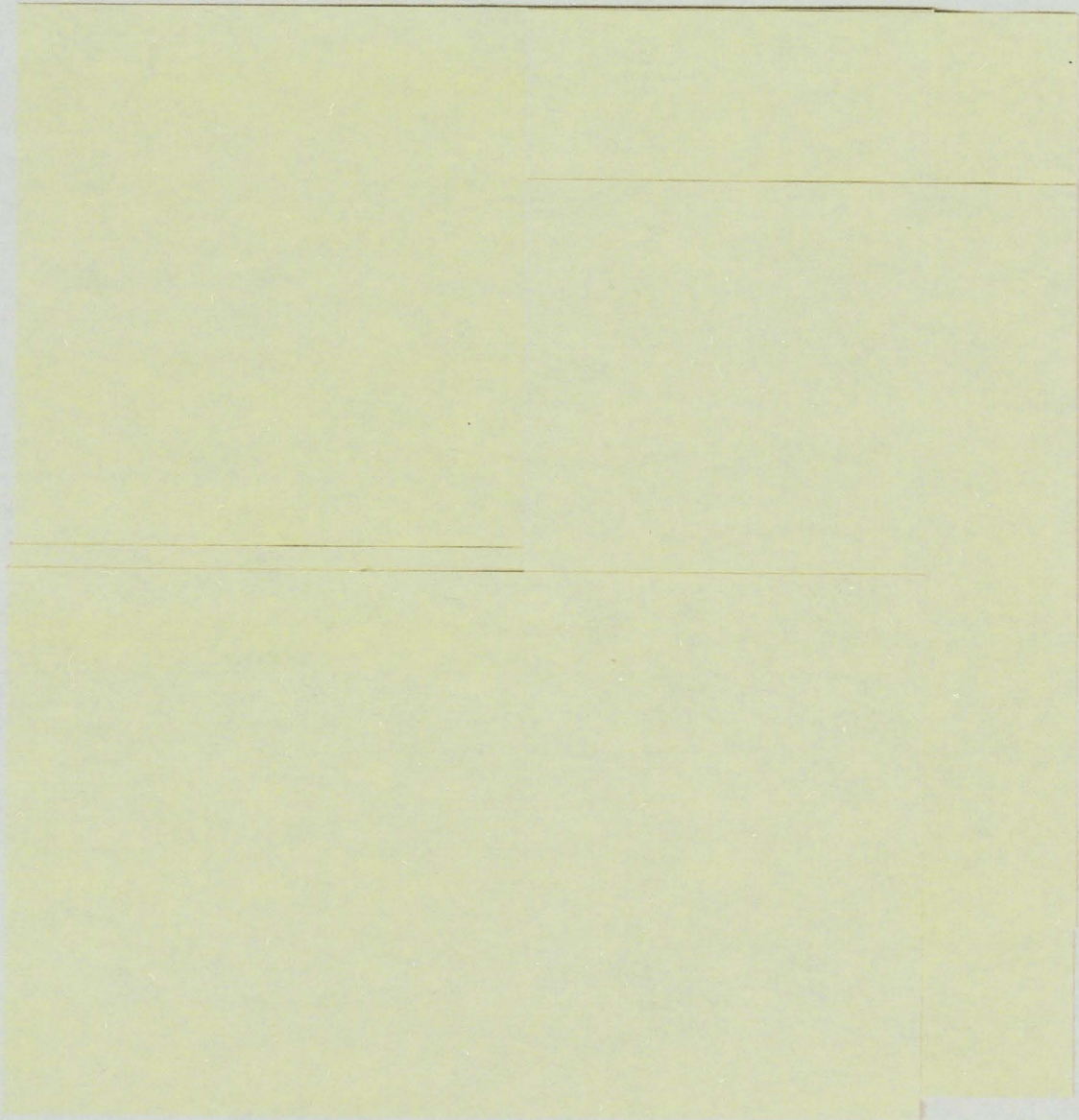

BURGESS CREMATED IN MOSCOW

Moscow, Sept. 4.—Guy Burgess, the runaway diplomatist, was cremated here today as a Soviet brass band crashed out the *Internationale*. His ashes will probably be taken to England by his brother, Mr. Nigel Burgess, who was present at a short ceremony in the city's crematorium.

Burgess died last Friday. His body was carried into the crematorium by Mr. Donald Maclean, who fled to Russia with him, Mr. Nigel Burgess, three Russians and a British correspondent.

In one of two brief funeral orations to the 15 people present, Mr. Maclean said that Burgess was a "gifted and courageous man who devoted his life to the cause of making a better world." A Russian colleague of Burgess's delivered the other oration.

Mr. H. A. R. Philby, the former British diplomatist who defected to the Soviet Union earlier this year and who tipped off Burgess and Maclean that British security was moving in on them, was not present at the funeral. Mr. Maclean declined to answer questions about him.—*Reuter*.

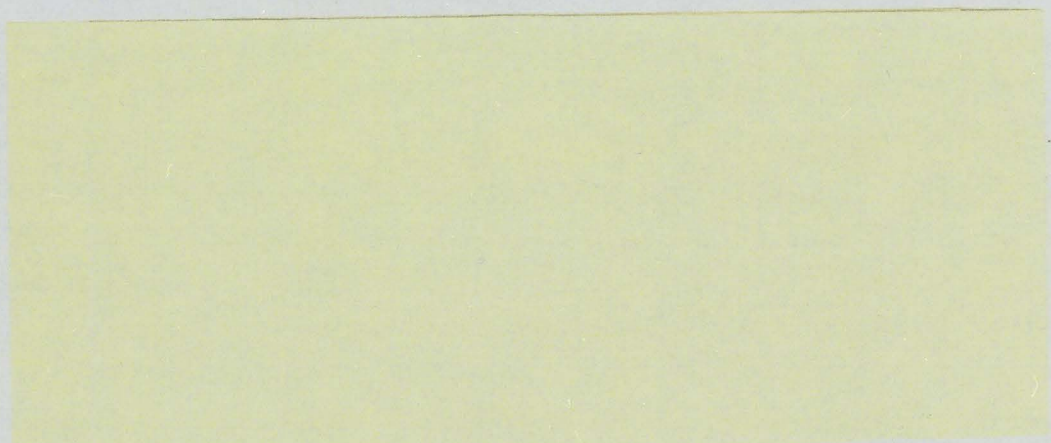

The secret Philby took with him

From RENE MacCOLL

WASHINGTON, Friday.

KIM PHILBY, "third man" in the Burgess and Maclean affair, took a big secret with him when he went to Russia in January.

The Russians removed him from Beirut because they feared he was about to reveal to British Intelligence the name of a master-spy who is STILL working in a British Government agency.

I learned about this angle in the Philby case on absolutely impeccable authority today.

QUESTIONS

The story starts with Russian defector Anatoli Dolnytsin, the man who gave Philby away.

Dolnytsin, who spent 18 months in America being questioned by Intelligence men and was then later sent to Britain, told British Intelligence that Philby was a Soviet agent—and a very useful one in his "cover" job as correspondent for The Observer in Beirut.

My informant tells me that at first British Intelligence refused to believe Dolnytsin.

But finally a leading Intelligence operative, who had known Philby for 10 years and who was extremely reluctant to accept the fact of his treason, was himself sent to Beirut to grill Philby.

Philby's intimation that he was in trouble came in mid-September of last year.

Soon after that the British Intelligence chief arrived in Beirut and finally succeeded in breaking Philby down.

CONFESSION

By last year, Philby, a former Foreign Office man, was drinking heavily and had lost much of his old talents.

His confession that he was indeed the "third man" who had tipped off Burgess and Maclean 12 years ago in time for them to escape to Moscow was a trivial matter compared with the hint of the really big discovery which now became apparent.

Philby, said my informant, immediately told Russian agents in the Middle East that the heat was on.

The Russians were greatly alarmed that their now compromised agent would completely collapse and tell British Intelligence the identity of the master spy still at work in London.

They arranged for him to be "lifted" without further delay and Philby accordingly left Beirut in a conveniently waiting Russian trawler and was taken to a Black Sea port.

I am told that he has been in the Black Sea area of Russia ever since, being "debriefed" by the KJB (Russian Security).

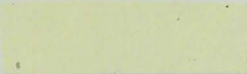

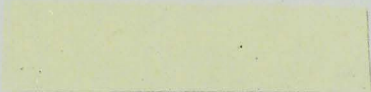

He gave me the following information: When Mrs. PHILBY visited the Passport Office at the Embassy on 8th August, she presented a U.S. Passport No. 221805 issued in Beirut on 22nd October, 1959. This passport had been renewed in Beirut, but no date was given for the renewal. Mrs. PHILBY said that she believed that it was renewed shortly after the original validity expired in about October 1962. The American Passport Office noted that there were no limitations on the passport and that it is now valid until 22nd October, 1964.

2. I telephoned [redacted] and passed on this information, which seemed to do away with the theory that Mrs. PHILBY's passport might be obsolete shortly after 15th September.

7. Turning next to the subject of Kim PHILBY, PURDY told me he had met him. During his career as a journalist, however, he had made a friend of a Swiss named ?NORMAND (I did not catch this name clearly), who was living in Beirut when PURDY was writing his book. He therefore wrote to the Swiss enclosing a questionnaire which he asked him to put to PHILBY. His questions were simple and direct and had the sole aim of establishing the sequence of events in the BURGESS and MCLEAN affair and PHILBY's part in it. In due course the questionnaire was returned to PURDY, completed in PHILBY's own hand. Subsequently PURDY wished PHILBY to provide answers to further questions and, as he needed the replies quickly, he asked PHILBY to reply by wire. In the event PHILBY telephoned him in London and they had a conversation lasting some twenty minutes. PURDY's opinion was that PHILBY had in some respects been shabbily treated over the BURGESS and MCLEAN affair. Both he and his Swiss friend thought PHILBY's story, as told to them, was plausible. PURDY remained convinced

that although PHILBY might have done some of the things which have been attributed to him, he was not as bad as he had been painted. For example, PURDY felt quite sure that PHILBY was not the sort of man to have become involved in espionage for the Russians. Certainly, if the Russians did in fact establish contact with PHILBY in Beirut it must have been only shortly before he disappeared behind the Iron Curtain. Both PURDY and his Swiss friend were of the opinion that the Russians must have established some hold over PHILBY which they used to blackmail him. I remarked that I would be interested to know what kind of blackmail he, PURDY, had in mind. He was stamped for an answer but rather lamely suggested that PHILBY could not afford to lose his job, and his life in Beirut was sufficiently dissolute to have involved him in actions which would have ensured his dismissal by the Economist or the Observer had they known of them.

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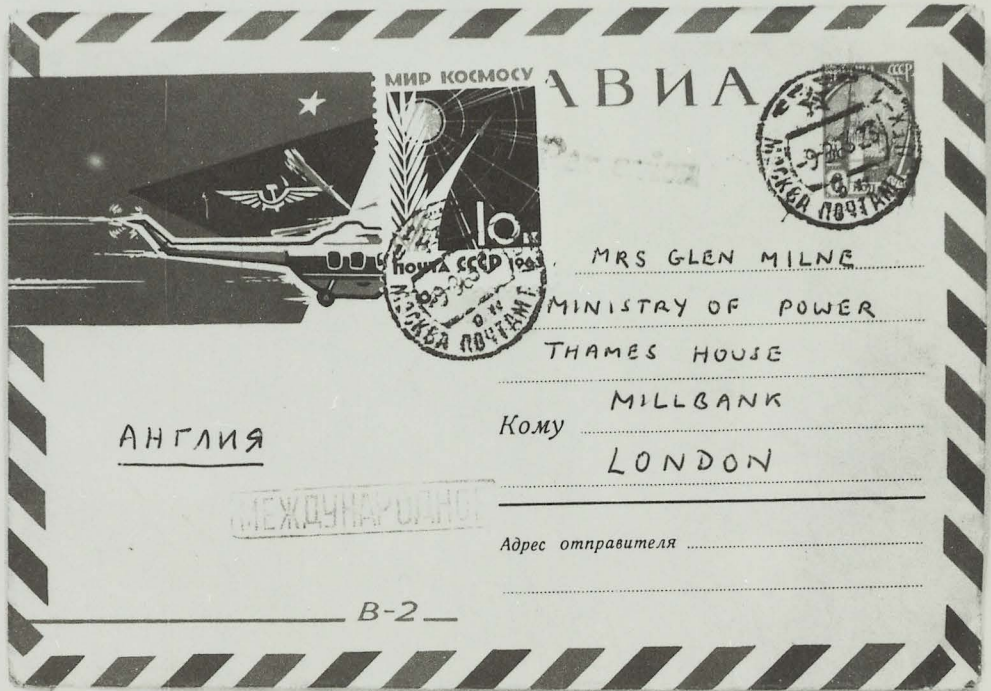

My darling beloved,

As I told you in my last letter, I hoped to let you have an address some time ago. Then the storm broke, and it seemed best to let it blow itself out, while I was also delayed by other events en route. But I am now settled, so I am giving you the above address which will always reach me. I am longing to hear from you, my darling.

I have masses to tell you, and thousands of questions to ask. But, to hasten matters, I will make this a short sharp business letter.

First, I would like to know (now that the situation is somewhat clearer) whether there is any legal impediment to your applying for a Soviet visa at the Soviet Consulate in London; then booking on a scheduled flight to Moscow by BEA or Aeroflot. There is no law against your travelling to Moscow, and, as you are completely in the clear as regards my own position, there is no conceivable charge on which you could be detained. That is precisely why I did not warn you before my departure, though I knew it would be a cruel blow.

I see from the newspapers that you are under some form of protective surveillance -- or is that as untrue as everything that has been said about me? If it is true, the same gentlemen might think it advisable to help you through without publicity. Or perhaps not. It doesn't matter anyway.

Second, if there is no legal impediment, is there any official obstruction at work? If so, we must break through it. The people concerned must know that I have been at pains to keep this thing quiet and decent. But any attempt on their part to interfere with my family's freedom of movement (this goes, for the future, for the kids as well as you) would certainly make me lose my manners.

Third, if we can ignore legal impediment and official obstruction, is there any other obstacle? Are you being frightened of being held here against your will? What interest could the Soviet Government have in capturing you, or I in holding by force an unwilling, unhappy and angry wife? I don't want such a wife.

I can only repeat previous assurances that you come here as an absolutely free agent, free to go whenever you please. Even if you have decided that you cannot come here for good, I do think that you should come for perhaps a month or two, to talk things over and make arrangements for the future. And I do so want to see you.

Please do not make my address available to the press or (as yet) to the family. With the latter, I will communicate in due course, but I would like first to settle the business side of the question. Please tell Melanie that I shall soon have the financial side sorted out; it is simply a question of

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deciding the most convenient method of transfer. I will almost certainly be sending the dough to her account at the Westminster.

Well, my beloved girl, I have just moved into my new flat. There are still one or two things to be done, but by the end of the week we should be through with it. Needless to say, your shadow falls in every corner, and in my old way I pace the floor, this time looking for you. Otherwise, I am feeling a great deal fitter than at any time in the past ten years or so. Come and see for yourself. Please try to make it by September. 12, or by the 15th at the latest.

I will be writing again soon on more personal matters, Please be of the best courage, and steel yourself to carry this thing through, so that you can live with me in honour, happiness, peace and security. As I have said in a previous letter, we have overcome many difficulties in the past, and this is the supreme and final one. That is the challenge!

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P.S. I have been following press speculation about my whereabouts, activity and all. It is a matter for stupefaction how consistently wrong it has been, in every respect. The only true statement was about my Soviet citizenship, and that they got straight from Izvestia. The story that I came here against my will is, of course, utterly preposterous.

Please, darling, give me your surest address -- the one that is most certain to reach you.

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NOTE FOR FILE

I telephoned to John Minnich, F.B.I., in the absence of Charles Bates to tell him of Mrs. PHILBY's imminent departure for the United States. He said that they had had the information from their Passport Office, which she had visited on 10th August, but at that time she was not certain when she was going. I said that of course the exact date was still not certain, but she expected to leave on Wednesday or Thursday, 14th or 15th August, provided she could get a passage by that date. I told him that in our view Mrs. PHILBY had been co-operative and was quite innocent of any knowledge of PHILBY's espionage, and added that she was in a very bad nervous state and extremely alarmed at the prospect of the Press reception she would receive on arrival in the U.S.A.



I am writing to let you know that Mrs. Eleanor PHILBY is about to leave for the U.S.A. She hopes to obtain an air passage on Wednesday or Thursday next (14th or 15th). You may wish to inform the Bureau. I am sorry not to have let you have this information earlier, but it has only just reached me and indeed I believe Mrs. PHILBY has only just made up her mind to go. I have no information as yet about the flight or her address on arrival, though I believe she intends to go to New York. If I get this information I will let you have it by telegram.

2. We believe that Mrs. PHILBY was totally unaware that PHILBY was a spy and the whole business has been a profound shock to her. She has behaved well and has been co-operative to the best of her ability. Within the last few weeks she has suffered greatly in trying to avoid the attentions of the Press, who having discovered her whereabouts surrounded the flat for days on end. As a result she has been nearly in a state of nervous collapse. She is greatly dreading a similar press reception in America.

3. As far as I am aware Mrs. PHILBY's present plans are to visit the States for about a month in order to see her daughter by her first husband, Annie BREWER, and to discuss the girl's future with Sam BREWER. She then proposes to return to this country some time in September.
