

There are three important issues at stake :-(a) Are the grounds for suspecting this to be a Russian "plant" sufficient to justify us in taking steps now to ensure through the Law Officers that there is no danger of a miscarriage of justice? (b) If they are, is there any means by which we can obtain MARTELLI's own story? That he desparately wants to tell his story to some unbiassed official is clear from the T.C. If his story is the true account of a Russian "plant" it is important that we should have it quickly for only we can assess it. I have considered the points raised in minutes 349 and 350 and the paper at 347a. I have the following comments to make:-

1. Once a criminal prosecution has been instituted, it must take its course and go for trial. After committal by a Magistrate, trial can only be stopped by a plea of nolle prosequi issued by the Attorney-General. In the last twenty-five years to my knowledge a plea of nolle prosequi has only once been issued: that is to say during the war when to proceed to trial would have blown a very secret source at Camp 020 which was then in use by the Security Service against the Germans on a very important case. This plea has never been issued on the ground that there might be a miscarriage of justice, because it is not for the Law Officers to decide whether a person is or is not guilty. This is a matter entirely for the jury and it is the task of the Crown to bring before the court all relevant evidence; not to secure a conviction. It is the task of the jury, and the jury alone, having weighed up all the evidence to decide on the facts before them and having seen the witnesses, and watched their demeanour, whether the accused is guilty or not guilty; it is not the function of the Crown to prejudge the case and usurp the functions of the jury. Only if the jury give a perverse verdict: that is to say a verdict against the weight of evidence, can there be said to be a miscarriage of justice and this is corrected by the exercise of the Royal Prerogative of Mercy where necessary. We can dismiss, therefore, altogether any question of there being a miscarriage of justice.

Reference PF. 790, 570 v.7. Min. 351 (contd.) Copy on PF.790,570 Supp.D. 2. MARTELLI is defended by a first-class firm of solicitors and by one of the leading Q.Cs at the Criminal Bar. We can rest assured, therefore, that his defence will be both adequately prepared and skilfully presented, and MARTELLI will be given a full chance of telling his story. Jeremy Hutchinson, Q.C., is seeing him on his return to London and I already have an arrangement with him that he can contact me, or in my absence the D.P.P., if MARTELLI wishes to talk. That is all we can do. We cannot arrange to see MARTELLI now, without the Attorney-General being prepared to issue a plea of nolle prosequi and I am not myself prepared on these facts to ask him to do so. Furthermore, if we do so and we are not satisfied with MARTELLI, that is the end of the prosecution and a spy goes scot-free. This trial takes place very soon after the 20th June when we shall hear, if not before, MARTELLI's full story. It would be advisable if an experienced D. Branch officer was in court when MARTELLI is giving his evidence so as to hear his story first-hand. I appreciate that if this in fact is a Russian plant, which no one can say but the jury, it is vital to the source owners that they should know this fact in order that they can accurately assess source's information, but they will not have to wait long before we know the full facts as we shall know them when the trial takes place, if not before. Attached is a copy of a report made by Major Wierdis of the Euratom Italian enquiry office in Rome. I had not bothered you with this before since the report contained a number of inaccuracies, obscurities and unsupported conclusions and contained nothing which could assist the prosecution. On second thoughts, it seems to me that you may wish to glance through these pages.

There are a number of points raised by the report which I shall wish to take up in due course but guided by the views you have expressed to me on previous occasions, I am leaving them until after the trial.


I have the following particular comments to make:-

- (1) MARTELLI's visits to Harwell, Aldermaston and R.R.E. Malvern, referred to in paragraphs 4 and 7(b), were not unknown to us and were all connected with his particular subject. The reference to the "many journeys" which he made from Culham to Malvern is a gross inaccuracy. As far as we know, he only visited Malvern twice.
- (2) The hypotheses in paragraph 4 are rather adventurous and are supported by no evidence.
- (3) It is not true, as suggested in paragraph 7(a), that we have shown an interest in Bruno TALLINI. This interest appears to have been manufactured by the press.
- (4) The implication in paragraph 7(c) that
 Professor PALUMBO is currently sus meted
 of pro-Communist sympathies is misleading.
 The Italian Security Service had earlier
 informed us that PALUMBO had a record which
 indicated possible Communist sympathies in
 1954 but not subsequently.
- (5) MARTELLI's financial arrangements, as described in paragraph 6, are of interest though I am fairly sure that the details given are not accurate (e.g. his Euratom salary and the amount of alimony he pays to his wife under the The financial position separation order.) since MARTELLI's arrival in the U.K. cannot be clearly seen gven with the assistance of Old Bones. His salary continues to be paid into the Banque de Bruxelles and transfers have been made to his Birmingham Bank from the latter and sometimes in the form of cash transfers on the occasion of MARTELLI's visits to Brussels. transfer to Culham produced a number of complications including a hold up in his salary and allowances.

SECRET - 2 -I would dearly like to know the contents of MARTELLI's accounts in the Banque de Bruxelles, the Banka at Toscana and Pisa and the State Bank Munich, (although MARTELLI is heavily in the red with his Birmingham Bank, he has assured his Italian wife that whatever happens to him after the trial, she will be financially safe) but, as you know, it is not possible to obtain statements from these banks through Interpol in. a case of this kind. You have told me that it is not proposed to call evidence on MARTELLI's financial position. NOTE FOR FILE - PF.790,570. Serials 332 and 34% refer. Roger Lees told me on the 11th June that he had paid a visit to Aldermaston and discussed thematter of MARTELLI's request for electric exploder heads with the people concerned with the result he was quite clear that there was no possibility of using this episode in the prosecution case. Exploder devices of this kind are very widely used in industry and one version is commercially marketed in the U.K. Of the exploder heads produced for Aldermaston, only one - the Mark III, which was the one MARTELLI had asked for - was classified and Roger Lees was inclined to think that the fact that it was classified sprang only from the failure of the classification policy to keep step with developments. MARTELLI would certainly be able to say that he required an exploder device of one type or another for his experiments, and the simple fact may be that someone at Culham or Aldermaston had told him about the switches he asked for. In the latter connection, there is some possibility that DANIELS and ALLEN - both at Culham - may have been guilty of some technical indiscretion in talking to MARTELLI, since the latter was quite clear that the Mark III device did have some classified aspects. Roger Lees said that this kind of incident tended to illustrate on a small scale the security problems involved in co-operation between an unclassified site and the highly classified ones such as Aldermaston. He had been thinking for some time that someone ought to look into these problems and he thought that if the Security Service could spare someone to do it, the recommendations that such a person might make would be more likely to command respect than recommendations made by a domestic enquiry team. I have told Roger Lees that such a project would be for C.1 to undertake although I doubted very much if they would be keen to take on the job. I subsequently spoke to C.1/Mr. Simkins who confirmed this and who said that a task of this nature should be well within the capability of a sophisticated service like that of U.K.A.E.A. Unless stronger grounds were to be forwarded, he felt he could not commit any of C.1's resources to the service of the Authority. I communicated the sense of this to Roger Lees. D.W. Bloomfield. 

- 2. The only information we possess which contradicts his version is the original source report. This says that MARTELLI has worked for the K.G.B. for 12 15 years and his file in Moscow runs into literally hundreds of pages.
- 3. If we accept the source as reliable then MARTELLI's story must be seen as an ingenious but not very convincing attempt to admit most of the Crown's evidence but to ascribe an innocent motive to it. If we dismiss source's evidence then there is nothing in MARTELLI's story which runs counter to our evidence derived from investigation or to what we know of R.I.S. methods of recruitment.
- 4. As you know I have doubts about the source's evidence and I am suspicious of the "map incident". I am therefore prepared to keep an open mind on MARTELLI's story and to join the jury in judging his sincerity.

D., through You may wish to see the attached translation of a letter from Pamela ROTHWELL to Giuseppe MARTELLI's brother, Vittore, which was picked up on the emanating H.O.W. As Pamela suggests, and there is other confirmation of this, MARTELLI's explanation of his association with KARPEKOV was more or less drafted by MARTELLI himself. It is quite possible that he may have thought there was quite a fair chance of the contents of this letter coming into our hands. If this is the basis of MARTELLI's defence, it would appear that he has no intention of pleading guilty, and indeed this is the impression one has from the T.C. material from which we recently learnt that Calderan, the Solicitor, spent the weekend studying "the statement". Dear Vittore,

I was so glad to have news of you and of your Mother, and my parents were pleased with your kind messages. It is true that they have given us a great deal of practical and moral support during this bad period - as your Mother did three years ago at the time of Susanna's birth.

You do not say very much, but I am certain that this period has been especially difficult for you - knowing so little, too, about this affair. Certainly you must not thank me - I am only doing what is natural in the circumstances. And this is not difficult because I know very well that Giuseppe is not and has never been and never would have been Giuseppe is not, and has never been, and never would have been a spy.

I have recently learnt from Giuseppe through the lawyer what really happened. This story is also his "defence" and therefore it is very important that for the time being nobody should know anything about what I am writing to you, However Giuseppe says that when you have finished reading this letter (the next part will be written more or less in his words) it would be useful for you to see Mussia and inform her of what you think suitable (and naturally, your Mother too).

The Russians have for many years tried in various ways to recruit Giuseppe - naturally with no success. 'extortion') of the Russians, and finally decided to pretend to play their game - and in the meantime to collect enough 'evidence' against them to denounce the whole thing to the police, and possibly to give the police material and indications which would support his statements and also harm the Russians. (From what I understand, he held on to the 'cigarette case' as the only proof he had, while he tried to solve the problem of how the Russian agents communicated with each other). He thought (lit. For the moment the newspapers are leaving us in peace, if one does not count something which happened a fortnight ago and which caused me some perturbation. A well-known weekly review came addressed to Sergio; it contained an extremely incorrect article about your case. Luckily I got hold of it first, and Sergio did not read it. Besides, in it, my supposed words were reported in inverted commas: "He left me after 16 years of married life, so I cannot/expected to give him moral support." I was indignant and wrote at once to the editors protesting at their conduct and because they attributed to me an attitude towards you which I have never expressed. I have now received a letter of apology in which they explain the reason and the coincidence in sending the paper to Sergio, and promise that next week they will publish the second part of my letter.

Mr. Symonds has discussed with me his Note for File at Serial 347a.

I agree that the thesis of a deception is a tenable one. however like to make the following observations if I may:

- 1) Paragraph 1(b): The absence of a short-wave radio is certainly puzzling. As far as a signal schedule is concerned, MARTELLI may not have had to commit this to paper if it were a simple one (compare STINGY).
 MARTELLI is controlled by a "legal" (at least until recently) it may seem superfluous for him to possess O.T.P.'s at all, but I suggest that it is arguable that they may have been supplied to him for use in an emergency or other circumstances. (In 1954/1955 ILLUSTRIOUS was supplied with O.T.P.'s which he was to use simply for encyphering material or comments which would blow his identity when leaving material in D.L.B. 's.)
- 2) Paragraph 2: We know that MARTELLI had an Exacta camera until it was damaged recently. It also seems possible that on the 9th March the sealed package in his desk drawer contained, as well as letters, a Minox camera later replaced by the cigarette package. If this is so, he thus had the basic means of photographing documents (and incidentally of making microdots) up to the 9th March. It is conceivable that:
 - (i) Since the damage to his Exacta, MARTELLI kept both the Minox and O.T.P.'s in his desk drawer.
 - (ii) On or around the 9th March, MARTELLI was exchanging old O.T.P.'s for new ones and they were therefore on his person.
 - (iii) He may have removed the Minox before his departure abroad. This, though ultimately less incriminating than O.T.P. 's, would appear superficially more sinister than a packet of cigarettes. Why he should have removed the camera and what he did with it, I do not know, but there could conceivably be explanations.

On the other hand, in support of the thesis of deception, it could be argued that MARTELLI tumbled to what was going on at his office on the 9th March at the time and that he told his controller. The latter may have withdrawn from MARTELLI the Minox camera and possibly a short-wave radio leaving us with O.T.P.'s in which circumstances, as Mr. Symonds suggests, the R.I.S. might have expected us to embark on an intensive investigation rather than arrest MARTELLI at the first opportunity.

3) Paragraph 4(b): The markings in BAGRICHEV's diary which relate to MARTELLI's R.V.'s are in all cases but one, I think, extremely faint and minute and are only apparent on quite detailed study. I find it hard to think that they might have been intended to lead us to MARTELLI or to corroborate evidence which the R.I.S. would not necessarily know that we would find in MARTELLI's diary.

4) Paragraphs 5 - 8: I feel that it is possible that MARTELLI shares the hypothesis put forward by PAMELA and Myrtle RAYNOR. On the other hand, if he was actually suspicious of surveillance in Brussels as early as February, he may have been led away from this theory. If his frantic desire to see Hugh YOUNG were explained by the realisation that he had been betrayed by the R.I.S., it seems to me that he would have persisted in trying to see YOUNG. It is arguable that his intention may simply have been to turn Queen's Evidence and thus to mitigate his punishment, an intention from which he was turned by his solicitors, to whom he may or may not have told the truth.

I promised to let you have a note on my conversation with W. B. Thompson. The attached is exactly as I dictated it shortly after he had left, and I have not had time to polish it up. It is, however, an accurate summary of the conversation.

- 1. On the 29th May, 1963, Mr. Denis Willson telephoned me from Culham to say that he had Mr. W. B. Thompson with him in his office. Mr. Thompson had recently returned from the States and was very perturbed about the Martelli case. He wished to see the defence solicitors but Mr. Willson had advised him before doing to so speak to me.
 - 2. I told Mr. Willson that I was quite prepared to see Mr. Thompson if he wished and Mr. Thompson then spoke to me on the 'phone and it was agreed that he would come to my office at 11 a.m. on 31st May.
 - 3. On 31st May Mr. Thompson called and our conversation opened by my congratulating him on obtaining a chair in plasma physics at St. Peter's College, Oxford. This led naturally to a discussion on science in Government and Universities in general, and in the course of this Mr. Thompson mentioned that the American Universities had a greater freedom to carry on the same sort of work as the Authority did, for example, Culham.
 - 4. I said that this was partly due to the fact that the A.E.C. did no scientific work itself but put everything out to contract and this eased the security problem considerably. In the U.K. the Authority did the majority of their work themselves and because of the rights of staff to obtain promotion or to move anywhere within the organisation, certain basic personnel security procedures had to be applied to everybody. This line of discussion gave me an opportunity to point out that we in Security in this country considered that we had a special obligation to ensure that a proper balance was kept between the rights of its citizens and the needs of Security. Mr. Thompson agreed that this appeared to be so and said that this was the main reason why he, a Canadian, obtained employment in this country, whereas he could have got a job at five times the salary in the States; because at the time when he was seeking employment he did not agree with the McCarthyism in America.
 - 5. I asked Mr. Thompson whether, as a scientist, who had had access to classified information, he considered that it was difficult for scientists, for example, those who had been at Aldermaston but worked in a Culham type of environment, to compartment their minds so that they did not inadvertently disclose classified information during discussions with unauthorised persons in the course of their work? He agreed that this was a difficulty but considered on the whole that the scientists were able to manage.
 - 6. Mr. Thompson then went on to mention the object of his visit and said that he had got to know Martelli well and had liked him and that he and his wife had known Pamela Rothwell for many years. They therefore felt that they had certain obligations to Martelli and Pamela as friends. For this reason he thought that he should contact the defence solicitors, although he had nothing specific to tell them which might help. He thought, however, that there might be some angle through which, unknown to him, he would be able to help the defence and should Martelli be innocent he felt that he would have an obligation to help him clear his name.
 - 7. I told Mr. Thompson that it was not for me to advise him on this matter but to a large extent it must depend upon what his own conscience told him. He then said that he did not wish to embarrass the Authority and I asked him whether he had consulted his Director, Dr. Adams. He said that he had and that Dr. Adams had not advised him against going to the solicitors. I said that if this were so, there was nothing

more that I could say. I mentioned, however, that I was entirely sympathetic to the position in which he found himself and I thought that the best way in which any friend of Martelli could help would be to do anything he could to console Pamela Rothwell at a time when she must be in need of the support of her friends. He said that he was glad to hear me say this as he had wanted to help Pamela as much as he could but he had not wanted to do anything which might have been frowned upon by the Authority.

8. Mr. Thompson thanked me for listening to him and said that he had an appointment to see Martelli's solicitors during the afternoon and would keep it.

Note: On the 30th May, 1963, I consulted Mr. Bloomfield Adviser and gave him the story about Mr. Thompson's visit. I was told that I should be very careful to maintain a neutral role, as otherwise I would lay myself open to accusations of trying to interfere with the course of justice. I was advised, however, that as Mr. Thompson wished to see me I should certainly not discourage the visit. The Box said that they would be interested to have a report on the conversation subsequently.

T.C. material of 5th June 1963 on William Bell THOMPSON (PF.140,721) records a conversation between THOMPSON and Dennis WILSON, the Secretary at Culham, after THOMPSON's visit to Roger Lees at Ormond Yard. Both WILSON and THOMPSON were pleased with the interview and both considered Lees most helpful.

THOMPSON told WILSON that he subsequently saw MARTELLI's solicitors and that he made a statement which the solicitors might wish to use in MARTELLI's defence. According to THOMPSON this statement was merely to the effect that MARTELLI was intelligent and active and had given THOMPSON no reason to question his loyalty. THOMPSON would say that MARTELLI did not appear to be secretive and in fact left both his office and his house unsecured.

Both WILSON and THOMPSON agreed that if MARTELLI were found guilty of the charge against him, then he would be a much more complex character than they took him for.

Roger Lees telephoned this morning having discussed with John Henry in his office the latter's enquiries about MARTELLI's request for electric exploder heads. Benry had reported that expert opinion at Aldermaston on the fact that MARTELLI requested a batch of these devices - about 100 of them - indicated an intelligence rather than an experimental interest in them. Lees said that he proposed to pay a visit to Aldermaston tomorrow, Friday 7th June, and in the course of this visit he would discuss the matter with the technical experts involved. He thus hoped to get a fair impression of: (a) whether MARTELLI in fact required these devices for his experiment and if so, at what stage of the experiment. (b) whether suitable alternatives to these devices were available to him. (c) whether it was in fact true that the request for a batch was in excess of MARTELLI's likely experimental needs. (d) whether there had been any indiscretion at Aldermaston or Culham in MARTELLI becoming aware of the fact that parts of the electric exploder heads were classified. I had earlier thought it strange that apart

from the O.T.P.'s we found no really incriminating spy material - in particular no apparatus for the photography or copying of documents. If such material had existed, why remove it and yet leave the most incriminating thing of all (i.e. the cigarette packet) which would have been far safer carried on MARTELLI's person?

I suggest that we should now re-examine this case in the light of the possibility that the information which started us on our investigation was deception material and that the R.I.S. meant us to identify MARTELLI as a spy if not to arrest him.

There are two things outside the MARTELLI case which indicate that this information may have been deception:

- a) analysis of all the information we have received from the source provides a total picture not inconsistent with a R.I.S. deception plan; it also discloses a possible motive for such a plan,

On the pages of the atlas various places and routes were marked. These included places which we know to have been used by Nicolai KARPEKOV for R.I.S. purposes. They also included places which feature in MARTELLI's diaries, evidently as R.V. There are two schools of thought concerning sites. the significance of this find. One school regards it as a genuine find, providing (inter alia) further confirmation of MARTELLI's activity as a spy under the control of KARPEKOV. Another school regards it as a plant, intended (inter alia) to convince us of MARTELLI's genuineness as a spy. I belong to the second school, principally because it is contrary to R.I.S. practice to leave marked maps in unattended cars.

Reference.... - 2 -Another thing that cannot be ignored is the telephone conversation between Pamela ROTHWELL and Myrtle RAYNER in which they discuss the possibility that MARTELLI was betrayed to us by the Russians. MARTELLI may share this suspicion and his almost frantic desire to see Hugh YOUNG immediately after his arrest may be connected with it. Why then should the Russians do this? I think the answer could be two-fold. a) First and foremost, by providing us with a really substantial piece of chicken-feed to convince us of the genuineness of the source that put us on to MARTELLI. b) As a secondary object, to tie up our resources in fruitless investigation. I think that on the second point they possibly mis-calculated and that they did not expect us to arrest MARTELLI when we did. I suspect that they did mean us to find the O.T.P.'s and therefore gave MARTELLI some plausible reason why he should leave the cigarette packet behind "for safety" when he went abroad. I also suspect that the O.T.P.'s were not in use and that MARTELLI has not been actively spying for some considerable time. On past experience the R.I.S. could reasonably have expected that our re-action to finding the O.T.P.'s would be to intensify our investigations and not to make an immediate arrest. If the R.I.S. was using MARTELLI in this way, I do not believe they would have given him any hint of their intentions. By now however he may have put two and two together. R. Chrisis. R.C. I saw Allen this morning and asked him whether he could enlighten me a little further as I had seen him on Friday last on the same subject about Martelli's dealings with the E.E.H's. I attach hereto correspondence which has passed between Adams and Martelli, Allen and Martelli, Martelli and Adams, Martelli and Allen, Palumbo and Willson, Palumbo and Allen, Allen and Palumbo, Palumbo. These papers are marked 1-9. At 10 is the file copy of a note from Allen to Niblett and 11 is the original of 10 from Allen to Niblett, together with Niblett's copy. 12 is a note typed by Allen's secretary, probably on the 3rd or 4th April, which is pretty well self-explanatory, and which inspired Allen's note to Niblett at 11. It is quite obvious to me that somebody at Culham, and it looks like Daniel, has been pretty indiscreet. If you read 12 carefully, Martelli obviously knows quite a bit about the E.E.H's, which form part of an Exploder Unit. Incidentally, I should perhaps explain that PETN is a combination of high explosives. During my interview with him this morning, Allen was extremly nervous. He talked away in an edgy, fluttery sort of way, reiterated his desire to get away from Culham and take up a chair in Nuclear Physics at Baliol College, Oxford, (He had already mentioned this to me on Friday) and added somewhat gratuitously that Culham had been a great disappointment to him. I have no idea what is making him nervous. Regarding the last typed paragraph of 12, I have spoken to Smith and he tells me that Daniel rang him about these E.E.H's, Smith got in touch with Jones, his boss, who said that under no circumstances could classified components go to Culham. Without, therefore, going any further into the matter, it seems t at the actual unit never got to Culham. Quite apart from the Security Service's interest in this matter, it seems that an inquest should take place as to how much Daniel gave away to Martelli about these Exploder Units. I should perhaps say that Moyce's view is that you could, if you got hold of an E.E.H., learn quite a bit; the composition of the explosive, the weight of the charge, and the density of the charge are all revealing and would, in Moyce's view, be of interest to anybody who was engaged in the construction of atomic war heads. The week beginning June 4th looks good on my side, but after that I am likely to get involved in a visit to Russia which is supposed to begin round about the middle of June. I am enclosing a draft copy of a paper which we plan to submit in the near future to get funds for PHOENIK. Please regard it as confidential and for your personal use only. The paper is more managerial than scientific but may give you an idea of how our thoughts are going. We have been having some discussions here recently about possible applications of LASERS in our plasma work. With PHOLEUR, the possibility of observing Thomson scattering looks interesting and this might become a useful diagnostic technique for electron density and temperatures This is outlined in the recent letter in Nature by No P. Hughes, but of course the idea is not particularly new. With present LASER powers, an electron density of at least 10%/co appears to be necessary. However we may be getting towards this in PHOENIX before too long. I have a feeling there may be other applications for LASERS. Perhaps one could use a LASERlike technique to increase the population of the higher excited states in neutrel beams, or perhaps make use of the high electric fields that can be generated by LASERS for Lorents dissociation. This is all very vague, but I nevertheless have the fealing that we ought to be thinking about all these things. Is this a line of work that appeals to you? However, it should be appreciated that, since he is an employee of the Authority, the Authority in a case like this would prefer that he should give evidence under subpoena. He should then ask the defence what evidence they want him to give. The joint programme was instituted by Nuclear Physics Division of Harwell in 1960 connected with syncroton work to be carried out at Birmingham University.

The original Harwell team were PARHAM, MANNING, SHERWOOD (who is nowwin Geneva) collaborating with ZACHARIDES (a Greek now in Brookhaven) and KEMP (now at the Rutherford).

In 1961 MARTELLI was working under the Group Leadership of VAN der RAAY (A South African). They asked a Harwell team to join up with them. This team consisted of GALBRAITH, B.T.PAINE, P.H. SHARPE, and A.C.SHERWOOD.

The whole experiment was written up as a report by D. L. ALLEN.

None of the work was classified nor did any of the team have access to classified information at that time, although they previously had had access.

All the work took place at Birmingham University or Culham.

Galbraith does not remember MARTELLI ever coming to Harwell in connection with his work.

On the 23rd May, under their reference CPS/0/3943 (SECURITY 1), the War Office forwarded to us the attached report submitted by Miss Florence Martha FRANCIS concerning MARTELLI and Wendula-Maria KONIETZKO or KONIETZKA (N/T in registry under both spellings). The War Office also sent to us some postcards and a letter which Miss FRANCIS had received from Miss KONIETZKO. These are not worth recording but they gave her address at that time (1958) as: Albergo Milano, Marina di Massa, Massa-Carrara, Italy. Miss KONIETZKO on being told of MARTELLI's rejection of the bottle of wine, wrote a letter to Miss FRANCIS which seems to indicate that she (Miss KONIETZKO) had had an affair with MARTELLI. She describes her distress on being thus rejected. It seems unlikely that there is anything of security interest in this connection (although the fact that Miss KONIETZKO was a courier for a travel agency seemed initially interesting). In 1958 Pamela ROTHWELL was living at 7 Wetherby Mews, Earls Court, S.W.5., and it is quite possible that this was the London address MARTELLI had given to Miss KONIETZKO. If so, it is likely that the woman who telephoned Miss FRANCIS was Pamela herself. D.W. Bloomfield. D.1. 30.5.63. Code 18-75

SECURITY 1.

In 1958 I spent a holiday in Marina di Massa near Viareggio in Italy. Whilst making a trip to Elba, I chatted to a girl who said she was German. She was living in Marina di Massa at that time, but it was only a temporary address. I believe she was a courier. She spoke English very well and I understand she had lived in Birmingham. When she learned that I lived in London, she asked me if I would take a bottle of wine to a good friend of hers, a Dr. MARTELLI; she said he was an Italian who lived in Birmingham but he also had an office in London.

As he was very homesick for Italy, she thought it would cheer him up to have a surprise (a bottle of his favourite wine). As I was not taking any wine home for myself, I agreed to take a bottle to her friend. She gave me an address to which I could write, I believe it was a London address but as it was some time ago I really cannot remember. I wrote to the address on two occasions before I received an acknowledgment. On the second occasion I gave my 'phone number. A woman rang me and said that Dr. MARTELLI did not want the wine and suggested that I kept it for myself, and furthermore, he did not wish to hear from the woman in Italy.

That was the end of the affair so far as I was concerned. I wrote to the woman in Italy because I felt that had I not done so I would keep receiving letters from her. I told her that it had been suggested that I should keep the wine.

The fact that the man concerned was a Dr. MARTELLI of Birmingham prompted me to mention the incident during my recent interview.

I am enclosing two post cards and a letter received from Italy.



On the afternoon of Monday, 20th May, I drew L.A.'s attention to the possible significance of the close questioning by the Defence of Stratton and the other police officers that morning at Southend about the dates on which they received instructions in the MARTELLI My concern was that MARTELLI had almost certainly in retrospect decided that there was something fishy about his encounter with me at Culham on Saturday, 9th March: that the Defence line of questioning might indicate that Defence were probing in this direction: and that such probing might possibly lead to Ken Bloomfield. If Bloomfield is approached by the Defence he might trot out a cover story which we had agreed he would use if necessary in the context of the clandestine operation on the 9th March. (This cover story was of course devised before a prosecution case was envisaged.) I am anxious that he should be in no doubt as to what line he should take now. On receipt of the T.C. material on ROTHWELL on the 20th May (the call timed 12.12 hours) which was made available at about 4.30 on the 21st (see Serial 325B) I discussed the matter further with L.A. A further discussion was held on the morning of the 22nd May involving L.A., D., D.l. and myself. It was agreed that Ken should be told that if he was approached he should indicate his willingness to give a statement but insist that he must seek the authorisation of his superiors first and that they might very well instruct him to give evidence only under sub poena. As instructed by Director D. I saw Peter Irwin at his office in Ormond Yard on the afternoon of the 22nd and asked him to get in touch with Ken as soon as possible in order to brief him. Irwin arranged to see Ken (who is once more in hospital) on the morning of Friday, 24th May, at the Churchill Hospital, Oxford. I have asked him to be sure to impress upon Ken that the likelihood of him being approached is extremely remote and that he is only being briefed in order to cover all eventualities. D.W. Bloomfield. I was telephoned on Thursday, 23rd May, by Arthur Hartley of U.K.A.E.A. who told me that John Henry, the Security Officer at Aldermaston, had been asked for an interview by Dr. Ken ALLEN at 5 o'clock that day. Henry wished to have guidance on the line he should take with ALLEN should he make reference to the MARTELLI case. (He had been given no advance indication of the purpose of ALLEN's request.)

- Having consulted L.A. I told Hartley that Henry should take a passive line in the interview and allow ALLEN to say what he wished. I told Hartley that we should be interested to know if ALLEN made any references to attempts on MARTELLI's part to obtain classified information, or opportunities which might have presented themselves to MARTELLI for the acquisition of classified material.
- Hartley telephoned me this morning with a report of the 3. Hartley telephoned me this morning with a report of the interview and I subsequently spoke to John Henry direct at Aldermaston.
- Henry told me that ALLEN came to see him "for a chat". He mentioned in the course of the interview that he was leaving the Authority very shortly in order to take a chair in nuclear physics at Oxford University. (Very few people know this at the moment.)
- At some time during the interview ALLEN referred to the MARTELLI case in rather an inconsequential way and said how grieved he was by the whole affair since it had done irreparable damage to Culham. He gave the impression that he had never approved of MARTELLI. He said that he was not a good scientist. inclined to be lazy and to let other people do the work. He (ALLEN) was not at all keen to have MARTELLI at Culham. Towards the end of the interview ALLEN said that on one occasion MARTELLI had tried to get a certain weapons component known as a "Firing Point" (in fact a Mark 3 electric exploder head) from Aldermaston for use at Culham where he had seen similar pieces of equipment. This equipment was classified "Confidential - Atomic".
- ALLEN made no other comments and the interview came to an Henry had the distinct impression that ALLEN had something on his mind which he wished to say but never got round to saying it. His manner was subdued and rather worried: he is normally buoyant and cheerful.
- Henry told me that ALLEN was a brilliant physicist and an immensely ambitious one. He was quite sure that where his personal ambition was concerned ALLEN would have few scruples and would not think dishonesty or betrayal beneath him. He was not a straightforward individual and as far as the intrigues of power politics within the Authority were concerned, Henry felt he could not be trusted. These remarks go some way to explaining why ALLEN in speaking to Henry was at pains to disassociate himself from MARTELLI as far as he could. We know from our own sources that he was extremely well disposed towards MARTELLI, thought highly of him and supported him in his contests with the Direction at Culham.
- Henry commented that it was interesting to note that while ALIEN had returned to Aldermaston some days ago, he had made no attempt to get in touch with the security people before as he mightbe expected

to do, to find out what was at the bottom of the MARTELLI affair. Henry interpreted the manner he adopted at the interview in a sinister light.

- 8. Henry conducted some enquiries this morning at Aldermaston about the electric exploder head. Jones of the Explosives Division had told him that fourteen days before MARTELLI's arrest he had received a request on the telephone from DANIEIS of C.Division at Culham for an electric exploder head for use at Culham. This was the first time that Culham had asked for the component. The request had been refused because the device was classified "Confidential Atomic". Jones confirmed that as far as he knew Culham had no exploder heads. (This contradicts what had been implied by ALLEN.)
- 9. Henry proposes to go back to ALIEN on Monday morning on this question acting entirely in his capacity as Security Officer at Aldermaston. This second interview may give ALIEN an opportunity to say what he might have been wanting to say on Thursday night.

Dr. Martelli visited me in KlO4 accompanied by Dr. J. B. Mullin in the late afternoon of 16th April 1962. The purpose of his visit was to plead on behalf of Professor Palumbo (of the Research General Management of EURATOM in Brussels) who wished to obtain, preferably from R.R.E., samples of InSb for sub-millimetre detectors. Professor Palumbo had been put in touch with us by W. A. Prichard, U.K.A.E.A., Overseas Relations 1, 11 Charles II Street, S.W.1. I have no idea what was the relationship between Palumbo and Martelli.

The discussions between Martelli, Mullin and myself were completely unclassified and there was nothing in Martelli's conduct or approach to the matter under discussion which aroused my suspicions.

Martelli was then at Birmingham University but stated that he would be joining EURATOM.

Dear Vittore,

Giuseppe has asked me to write you something about the British legal system - he is afraid that perhaps you may think that the charges against him have been proved, because at the Magistrates hearing he said nothing except "Not Guilty". Giuseppe has reserved his defence until the trial (probably the 14th June); so the prosecution will not know what his explanations will be, and will not have time to try to disprove them.

There is no question about it - Giuseppe has given nothing to the Russians. The only thing that the police have found, and which he had, was a cigarette case which contained Russian codes. And also he knew a certain KARPEKOV, who was First Secretary at the Russian Embassy until last September. (But he has known him for years, since K. was at the Russian Embassy in Rome - and then K. has frequently been present at scientific in Rome - and then K. has frequently been present at scientific Congresses, where I also met him, together with many other people).

All the rest of the affair is absurd - his summer shoes had not only hollow heels, but many holes in the leather to make them light - and one was still in the car since last summer. The camera has been broken since December - the photographic data

I go to see him every day, but we have been warned that there are microphones where we tak, and so we only discuss domestic details. The police has been very unfair; they questioned G. for 12 hours before warning him that he had the right to say nothing, and they ignored his request for the EURATOM lawyer. Defence Counsel obtained these admissions from the police officer himself. obtained these admissions from the police officer himself.

Susanna and I are here at Westerham with my parents - it is only 10 miles away from Giuseppe. The University has given me



PAM spoke to him about the Southend hearing, at which she was present, saying how upset and indignant she was because the man from Culham had given a quite incorrect and, she thought, badly slanted accounts of MARTELLI's career which were 'playing him down'.

He would, however, see that this was corrected. He added — 'well, you don't want any bricks of this kind in addition to the main one'. PAM went on to refer to the police 's inaccuracies on a lot of other things apart from this.

Brigadier Bell reported to Mr. Irwin that Dr. JELLY, P.S.O., Harwell, had told him that he had come into contact with Martelli on a number of occasions. They first met in Geneva in 1956 when Pamela Rothwell was there also. Jelly noticed that Martelli was a man with an original mind but apt to do unusual things. From a scientific point of view he was apt to flit about a bit. Jelly again met Martelli at Birmingham University about 1959 when he was working for Professor BURCHAM. Jelly next met Martelli at Birmingham in 1960/61 when Martelli was doing some original work on accelerators. When Martelli left Birmingham University he approached Jelly, saying that they had some rather fine equipment at Birmingham which Jelly might like to look over. Jelly was very pleased to do so as the equipment was very good. Jelly has a great respect for Pamela Rothwell's scientific ability and liked her as a friend. Jelly discussed the Martelli case with Brigadier Bell. He said he was at a loss to understand how Martelli could have become involved in such an affair. His only theory was that Pamela Rothwell, when in the United States on research work, probably obtained a fair amount of information. which she brought back with her to work on and to feed into computers. She probably kept this at home and some of the papers could have been sensitive. Jelly thinks that perhaps she lost some of these papers. She would have reported this loss to Professor Sayers at Birmingham who in turn would have reported to the Authority. It could have happened that investigators brought the Special Branch into the home and so Martelli came under suspicion. D. and D.1. consulted me this morning as to whether or not Mr. BLOOMFIELD of the Atomic Energy Authority should be briefed as to what he should say if he were approached by the Defence. I advised that if he were so approached, he should say he is of course quite willing to give any evidence if it is thought that his evidence would assist the Court, but as he is an employee of the Authority it would be appreciated that the Authority might in a case like this prefer that he give evidence under subpoena. He should then ask the Defence what evidence they want him to give, he pointing out that if it is only formal evidence as to MARTELLI's duties the Authority would probably not require a subpoena. 3. - 4. Detective Inspector Robert DENSHAM, attached to the Oxfordshire County Police, Oxford. This witness gave his evidence in accordance with his statement (page 17 of the Statements). He proved exhibit 1 which he said he had found in a locked drawer in MARTELLI's desk at Culham. He also proved exhibit 2 which he said similarly was found in the same locked drawer. He further proved exhibits 7 and 8. This witness was cross-examined by Jeremy Hutchinson and asked to produce the search warrant under which he made his search. This search warrant was made exhibit 19. He was asked what time he applied for the search warrant. He said at ten minutes to one on the 26th April. He was further asked under cross-examination to give the exact day when he received instructions to apply for the search warrant. He said he received these instructions from Chief Inspector STRATTON on Tuesday, 23rd April.
- 5. Detective Sergeant William Anthony INSELL of the Oxford County Police, stationed at Oxford. This witness gave evidence strictly in accordance with his statement (page 16 of the Statements). He was not cross-examined and was conditionally bound over.
- 6. Detective Superintendent Arthur Robert LAWSON of the Berkshire Constabulary, stationed at Sulhamstead. This witness gave evidence in accordance with his statement (page 25 of the Statements) and proved exhibits 14, 15 and 16. He also produced the search warrant which gave him authority to make the search, which search warrant was made exhibit 20. Detective Superintendent LAWSON was cross-examined by Jeremy Hutchinson only on one point: on what date did he receive instructions to apply for the search warrant. He said he received instructions to this effect from Chief Inspector STRATTON at 1.30 on Friday, 26th April. He was conditionally bound over.

I think that the Defence were hoping to be able to prove that instructions were given to the Oxford and Berkshire meeting of one Police to obtain their search warrants soon after MARTELLI's meeting referred to earlier. This would enable the Defence to make a suggestion that the one-time pads had been planted on him either by the Police or by the Security Service. As I see the position, however, the answers which the two Police Officers gave to Jeremy Hutchinson's questions did not help him on this point.

He was not asked by Mr. Cussen to testify in accordance with the last paragraph of his statement (as shown by enclosed brackets) as Cussen thought he could not strictly say this.

M. Van den Bosch said that the Belgian security authorities were pressing the Government to declare Agrafenine persona non grata. They were satisfied that A was engaged in espionage, but had so far no conclusive evidence with which to support such a charge: they knew, however, that he had had a meeting with Kerpanov in Brussels a few months ago.

KARPEKOU meant?

- The matter had not yet been put to M. Spaak, and before doing so M. Van den Bosch wished to know whether you thought it would be helpful if the Belgians were to expel A at this moment, or whether any action should be held up for the time being.
- M. Van den Bosch said that he was personally rather doubtful whether M. Spaak would wish to take drastic action, as he had recently received an invitation to visit Moscow later this year.
- In reply to enquiry, Secretary-General said that his Ministry would be willing to send us a Note certifying:
 - that Agrafenine had been officially on the staff of the Soviet Embassy since November 1959; and
 - that no notice of his withdrawal had been communicated to the Ministry. (It is the practice here that all appointments and transfers must be notified as soon as possible to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs).





L.A. has given as his opinion that, since MARTELLI is charged with committing an act preparatory at sometime between September 23rd 1960 and April 4th 1963, it may be necessary to call a D.Branch officer to testify that it is not unusual for the R.I.S. to recruit an agent and equip him with the means for clandestine communication some years in advance of his being required to provide information. The officer selected is Mr. Wagstaffe. He will be required to give evidence only when the trial itself takes place.

Mr. Wagstaffe, Mr. Stewart of D.3 and I have discussed what is known of R.I.S. practice in this respect. It has been agreed that Mr. Wagstaffe could give evidence in the sense required. Mr. Stewart was careful to point out that while it could be amply demonstrated from a number of sources that agents have been trained for years in the use of clandestine communications without actually passing classified information, it is only in the case of wireless spies that we can say that during that period they have not passed information of use to an enemy.

Ambassador in Brussels who had been approached by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs about the references to AGRAFENIN which had been made in Court on Wednesday last. The Ministry of Foreign Affairs were being pressed strongly by the Belgian Surete to have AGRAFENIN declared 'persona non grata' in Belgium. The Ministry of Foreign Affairs/indicated that the Surete had had its suspicions of AGRAFENIN's intelligence functions but had not so far received any decisive proof. Ministry of Foreign Affairs wished to know what views the British Authorities might have on the proposed step. I told Street that I was unable to consult our Legal Adviser since he was at Southend for the second day of the hearing. It seemed to me however that while we could say that we should be delighted if any of our friends kicked out persons whom we believed to be Russian Intelligence Officers, we could only confirm this view informally since the whole matter was sub judice and the significance of the references to AGRAFENIN from the legal point of view was not established. I commented to Street that it seemed to me that the Belgian Ministry of Foreign Affairs was moving rather fast and that I thought they would be on a much safer wicket if they waited until the conclusion of the case before deciding what to do about anything. Street said that he would take advice from the Foreign Office Legal

Advisers and in the light of that would probably reply to the Ambassador in the sense in which we spoke.

Lees told me that he had a distinct impression that Van der Valk's haste to come over to London to see him was inspired not so much by a desire to help the Atomic Energy Authority or the prosecution case, but by concern lest prosecution enquiries might produce facts embarrassing to EURATOM. Roger Lees felt that EURATOM had in effect been using their employees seconded to the U.K. in order to obtain information for their own purposes about the Atomic Energy Authority. He thought that MARTELLI's request for information from the Harwell Library on the 1st October 1962 and the rather curious enquiries made by MACIOTI himself (See Serial 2002) covering in part similar ground, could be part of an under-cover attempt by EURATOM itself to ferret out information to which it was not strictly entitled.

In the course of the first day of the hearing at Southend on Wednesday, 15th May, Defence Counsel objected to Chief Inspector Stratton submitting in evidence that it was within his knowledge as a Special Branch officer that KARPEKOV had been a Soviet diplomat in the U.K. This objection was sustained and as a result the Foreign Office have been asked by the police if they can produce an officer who knew KARPEKOV in his diplomatic capacity. This the Foreign Office are unable to do since they cannot find anyone at present in the Northern Department who knew him at that time. They have however pointed out that the C.I.D. had dealings with KARPEKOV on the occasion when his flat was burgled. This appears to have given the police what they want.

There is also, I understand, some difficulty in producing evidence to the effect that AGRAFENIN is the name of a Third Secretary in the Soviet Embassy in Brussels. The Foreign Office are unable to help on this point but they have suggested to the police that the "commission rogatoire" could be invoked in this case.

In the course of a visit to the Security Service to discuss counter-espionage techniques, M. Roger De Buck, Head of the Counter-Espionage Branch of the Belgian Surete, called on me

on the morning of Thursday, 16th May. De Buck said how sorry he was that the intervention of the Belgian Minister of Justice had prohibited the Surete from assisting us as they would have liked in the conduct of investigations into MARTELLI's background in Brussels, and in particular, in relation to the proposed interview of Christine ROEDIG, MARTELLI's secretary in EURATOM. He told me that he understood that Van der Walk, the Head of the EURATOM Security Office, would be interviewing Miss ROEDIG as a result of his visit to the U.K. during which he saw the Head of the Atomic Energy Authority Security Department. I told De Buck that I was aware of this and I undertook to let him know the result of Van der Valk's enquiries on a confidential basis when I knew what they were.

2. De Buck showed great interest in the fact that reference to AGRAFENIN had been made in the Magistrates Court hearing at Southend on Wednesday, 15th May. I told De Buck

that we were proposing to say at the hearing that AGRAFENIN's name appeared in MARTELLI's diary, that AGRAFENIN was a Third Secretary in the Soviet Embassy in Brussels, and that it was he who met KARPEKOV when the latter flew to Brussels on the 26th April 1962. (Although De Buck did not leave his office until the evening of Monday, 13th May, he was unaware of this.) I showed De Buck a photostat of the page in MARTELLI's diary where AGRAFENIN's name occurred. I also showed him a photostat of the sketch map of the presumed R.V. in Brussels which was also produced in Court on Wednesday. De Buck said that he was not aware that this place had ever been used by the R.I.S. for R.Vs. before. He explained that the entry "TRAM - N R ET W" beneath the name of the Chaussee de Waterloo referred to the tram services. Trams operating within the city area, he said, would carry numbers, but those serving the suburbs carried letters and the letter was usually that with which the name of the destination of the tram began. He interpreted the entry as meaning that trams numbers R and W would pass along the Chaussee de Waterloo in order to get to their termini, Rhode-St. Genese and Waterloo respectively. Both these trams would start out from the Place Rouppe near the Gare du De Buck also pointed out that the Magasin Delhaize a (misspelt in the plan as Magazine Delaise) was a large grocery store. It was much frequented by the staff of the Soviet Embassy in the Rue Robert Jones at Uccle since it was the nearest establishment of this kind to the Embassy.

Jalso showed to De Buck, on the strict understanding that this was for his information alone since this data might subsequently be produced in evidence, the numerous references in MARTELLI's 1962 diary to presumed R.Vs. at Astrid Park and Alena Park on the outskirts of Brussels. Before the opening of the case I had a discussion with Mr. Cussen and Mr. Jeremy Hutchinson on venue. I was told by Jeremy Hutchinson that it would suit him very much better if the case was tried at the Old Bailey rather than at the Chelmsford Assizes. Mr. Cussen also said that he had been in touch with the Solicitor-General who again would much prefer the case to be tried at the Old Bailey. It was agreed at this discussion that Jeremy Hutchinson would make an application for the case to be tried at the Old Bailey and that Mr. Cussen would merely say that the Solicitor-General would also prefer the trial to be at the Old Bailey. We mentioned this fact to the Clerk of the Court who rang Mr. Boyd, the Clerk of the Central Criminal Court, who agreed that the case should be taken there. Application was duly made and the case will now go to the Old Bailey and not to the

The Hearing took place from 10.30 a.m. - 4.20 p.m. First Day.

3. The Crown was represented by Mr. Edward Cussen, Treasury Counsel, and by Mr. MacDermott of the Director of Public Prosecutions' Office, instructed by the D.P.P. The Defence was represented by Mr. Jeremy Hutchinson, Q.C., with whom was Mr. Geoffrey Leach of Counsel, instructed by Messrs. Theodore Goddard & Co.

- 4. At the outset of the Hearing Mr. Jeremy Hutchinson made an application for the Hearing to be in private pursuant to the powers conferred upon the Court under the Magistrates' Courts Act. had had previous indication given to us by Jeremy Hutchinson that he was going to make such an application. Edward Cussen and I considered that the line the Crown should take was that we should tell the Court on security grounds there was no need to hold the case in camera, though it might be necessary to go into camera for certain parts of the case, and that Counsel should tell this to the Court and tell the Court that it was a matter for their decision. This was the line Mr. Cussen took and the Magistrates, after conferring, ruled that the case should be heard in open court.
 - 5. Mr. Cussen then made his opening speech for the Crown which is adequately reported in The Times to-day. During the course of this opening speech the Defence objected to the Crown referring in their opening speech to what MARTELLI had said in answer to questions put to him by STRATTON. It became quite clear therefrom that it was the intention of the Defence to challenge the admissibility of MARTELLI's statement. This objection put Mr. Cussen in a difficulty. He had to get all the spy material exhibited; at the same time he couldn't mention what MARTELLI said or what questions STRATTON put to him. He got round this difficulty excellently in his opening speech which went on without further interruption.
 - The first witness was Chief Inspector STRATTON of Special Branch. He started giving his evidence strictly in line with his statement and STRATTON in fact gave evidence much in line with the first three pages of his statement. When he started to give evidence of what MARTELLI said to him, being along the lines of the last two paragraphs of Page 3 of his statement, the Defence objected and asked leave of the Court at this point to put certain questions to Chief Inspector STRATTON, to which they desired to have answers prior to making a submission to the Court.

/questions ...

questions put by the Defence to STRATTON in this context were to establish that STRATTON had given instructions to Detective Sergeant TAYLOR to detain NARTELLI on his arrival at the Airport. By establishing this fact from STRATTON they established, as STRATTON admitted, that MARTELLI was in legal custody from the moment he arrived at Southend Airport at 12.30 p.m. on the 26th April. The Defence next obtained answers from STRATTON to the effect that at 9.15 on the evening of the 26th April if MARTELLI had asked to be allowed to leave the Airport, STRATTON would not have permitted him to do so, and further that if he had asked such a question and STRATTON had decided to detain him he would not at this point have thought it necessary to caution him and would have continued, he said, to ask him questions. It was apparent from STRATTON's evidence and from the Crown's opening that at this time STRATTON was in personal possession of the spy material which had been seized under the search warrants. Further STRATTON admitted that the statement under caution contained substantially the same material as the material he had obtained from MARTELLI by questioning earlier without caution.

- 7. Jeremy Hutchinson then submitted:-
 - (i) That all the answers given by MARTELLI to STRATTON prior to him being cautioned were inadmissible, and
 - (ii) That the statement was also inadmissible in that it contained substantially the same material as STRATTON had already obtained by the questioning of MARTELLI.
- 8. The Defence referred to the Judges' Rules which provide when a person is in legal custody he can only be questioned after caution and he submitted that STRATTON had completely violated the Judges' Rules in this respect and therefore the statement itself was inadmissible as well as the statements made by MARTELLI prior to the caution being administered.
- 9. Mr. Cussen replying for the Crown submitted that whilst it might be argued that the statements made by MARTELLI to STRATTON prior to cautioning were inadmissible, once the caution had been administered, as it had been prior to the statement being made, the statement itself was admissible.
- 10. The Bench ruled:-
 - (i) That all statements made by MARTELLI to STRATTON prior to caution were inadmissible, and
 - (ii) That the statement made after caution was admissible,

but the Bench said that they realized that this was a matter which had to be settled by the Assize Court and they directed therefore that no mention should be made of the contents of the statement by the Crown or by Chief Inspector STRATTON. The statement was, however, put in and forms part of the depositions. This is of course necessary in order that the Trial Judge can be apprised of the full facts prior to hearing the submissions at the Court of Assize on this point.

/11. It is

- 11. It is as well to have on record that at the resumed interview which STRATTON had with MARTELLI at 9.15 p.m. on the 26th April, prior to cautioning MARTELLI STRATTON had produced to him:-
 - (i) The leather cigarette-case containing the packet of cigarettes in which were concealed the one-time pads.
 - (ii) The entry in the diary containing the 'box'.
 - (111) The entry in the diary containing the address of KARPEKOV.
 - (iv) The entry in the diary containing photographic data.
 - (v) The receipt for the Exakta camera.

STRATTON also showed to him the shoe with the hollow heel and in addition all the entries in the diary dealing with the meeting places and he did not caution him until he had obtained MARTELLI's explanations to all these questions. This was at approximately 11.30 p.m.

- 12. It seems clear to me, therefore, that the decision of the Court must be to the effect that the statement is inadmissible. MARTELLI was at all times in custody and to question him without caution was acting in direct contravention of the Judges' Rules. Though this is not recorded in the note at 5a, I at that meeting made it clear that in my view, in view of the special circumstances of this case, all that STRATTON should do would be to caution him and ask him for an explanation of his possession of these spy articles and I do not think the Director of Public Prosecutions would dissent from my recollection of this interview.
- 13. From this point onwards Mr. Cussen in his examination of STRATTON had to get the various articles exhibited by him taking care not to ask STRATTON what he said to MARTELLI or what MARTELLI said to him. This Cussen did excellently and in the course of his evidence STRATTON exhibited:-
- (1) The manilla envelope. This was made exhibit 1 and is no. 1 in the Album of Photos.
- (2) The Birmingham University diary for 1961 was made exhibit 2.
- (3) The leather cigarette-case containing the Pall Mall cigarettes was made exhibit 3 and is no. 2 in the Album of Photos.
- (4) The black rexine covered pocket notebook was made exhibit 4.
- (5) The brown calfskin wallet was made exhibit 5.
- (6) The blue covered Birmingham University diary for 1963 was made exhibit 6.
- (7) The two one-time pads were made exhibits 7 and 8 respectively and are shown in the Album of Photographs as being nos. 3, 4 and 5.
- (8) The entry in the 1961 diary for the 6th-9th October, 1960, containing the 'box' is referred to in the Album as photograph 6.

- (13) The entry in the 1961 diary under date 29th December, 1961 INT etc. is shown as photo. no. 9 in the Album of Photos.
- (14) The entry in the green covered 1961 diary showing 'Kings Road, Wimbledon' is shown as photo. no. 11 in the Album of Photos.
- (15) The entry relating to Alpine Blue is shown as photo. no. 12 in the Album of Photos.
- (16) The entry containing the diagram and the wording 'Nee Greenway' is photo. no. 13 in the Album of Photos.
- (17) The small sketch map found loose in the front of the black rexine covered notebook was made exhibit 11 and is photo. no. 20 in the Album of Photos.
- (18) Exhibit 12 is two photographs of Nikolai KARPEKOV.
- (19) MARTELLI's statement was made exhibit 13.
- (20) The right-hand shoe found in his house was made exhibit 14.
- (21) The two shoes are shown in photographs 18 and 19 in the Album of Photos.
- (22) The Birmingham University diary for 1962 was made exhibit 15.
- (23) The blue covered 'Dataday' diary for 1962 was made exhibit 16.

14. STRATTON continued his evidence along the lines of his statement with the exception that he did not specify what questions he put to MARTELLI or what answers MARTELLI gave to his questions. Matters proceeded satisfactorily until he stated that KARPEKOV resided at Flat 6, 16 Airlie Gardens and was known to him, a Special Branch officer, to be a Russian Intelligence Officer. Objection was taken by the Defence to this answer on the grounds that it was not the best evidence. STRATTON admitted that he had never met KARPEKOV. The answer was accordingly disallowed. At this point we had not established the Crown's point that KARPEKOV resided at Flat 6, 16 Airlie Gardens. On this objection being taken, I consulted with Mr. Cussen and we decided that the fact that KARPEKOV resided at this address must be proved that afternoon. I instructed Detective Inspector WILSON to get on to the Yard and find out who the landlord was of the flats and if possible call either the landlord or the caretaker who would have personal knowledge that KARPEKOV resided at Flat 6, 16 Airlie Gardens. This the Yard did and the Yard arranged for

/George

George Gordon COVENTRY, the caretaker of the flats at 16 Airlie Gardens to come to Southend. He arrived at 4 p.m. and gave evidence to the effect that 16 Airlie Gardens was a block of flats; that he was the resident caretaker there, taking up his job in January 1960 and that he was still the caretaker there. He was shown a photograph of KARPEKOV and he identified the tenant of Flat 6, 16 Airlie Gardens, from this photograph as being KARPEKOV. He said that in the course of his duties he took up to him letters, parcels and papers, and that he had delivered to him copies of Pravda, Izvestia, and Communist papers and photographs. This witness established therefore that KARPEKOV was the tenant of Flat 6, 16 Airlie Gardens. It remained to be established that KARPEKOV had held an official position at the Russian Embassy in London and that he was known to be an Intelligence Officer. In view of this ruling by the Court that STRATTON could not give this sort of evidence, it was decided by Mr. Cussen not to put to him any questions about the Russian diplomat AGRAFENIN in Brussels. The evidence of COVENTRY concluded the hearing for the day.

- 15. After the close of the Court I had a conference with Mr. Cussen and Mr. MacDermott at which it was decided:-
 - (i) That the Foreign Office must be asked to prove that KARPEKOV had an official position at the Russian Embassy in London and AGRAFENIN had an official position with the Russian Embassy in Brussels. Mr. MacDermott said he would take steps to secure the Foreign Office evidence.
 - (ii) That the Security Service must put an officer in the box to prove that KARPEKOV was known to them to be a Russian Intelligence Officer. I pointed out the Security Service only knew this fact by reason of the fact that KARPEKOV was known to us to be one of the controlling officers of VASSALL and that therefore the best evidence on this point must inevitably come from VASSALL himself, and if I put my officer in the box he would be subject to cross-examination and his answer would be disallowed in precisely the same way as STRATTON's evidence had been disallowed. MacDermott said he would discuss the matter with his Director in the morning and would then get in touch with me.

In discussion with LA on Tuesday, 14th May, the following position was established with regard to certain specific considerations involved in the presentation of the case against MARTELLI.

1: Witnesses and Statements

a) Mr. Smith of A.2.B.

Mr. Smith would restrict his statement to the form in which it at present appears in Stratton's dossier. It had been considered that he should extend this statement to include a reference to the chemical formula which appears at the back of MARTELLI's diary for 1961. This formula, according to Messrs. Hedger and Catling, is for an intensifying developer also known as a physical or acid developer. This, as opposed to the ordinary chemical or alkaline developer, is used in the photographic trade for intensifying a negative which for a number of measons, but particularly under exposure, is rather poor. It could quite easily be used by an amateur but only if he were an advanced photographer. The indications we have are that MARTELLI is not a skilled photographer. See T/C material at Serial 305A and the prints of the roll of film found in MARTELLI's locker at Birmingham University.) Smith is prepared to give testimony on this point if the Prosecution requires it at a subsequent stage.

Atomic Energy Authority Officials.

Mr. Stratton and Mr. Wilson took statements from Roger Lees, Wilson, the Librarian at Harwell, and Martin Fishenden, the Harwell classification expert, on the evening of Monday, 13th May. These statements were intended to be used in relation to MARTELLI's request for material to the library at Harwell on 1st October 1962. Because Fishenden and Lees felt it would be extremely difficult to maintain against cross-examination that this request necessarily implied a request for classified information, it was decided on the morning of Tuesday, 14th May, by Counsel (Mr. Cussen) and the D.P.P. that A.E.A. evidence on this point would not be called and the statements they had made would not be used.

The suggestion had also been put to LA sometime previously that it might be worth taking a statement from NIBLETT, the Head of MARTELLI's Group at Aldermaston. (See Note for File of 6.5.63. paragraphs 28 to 31.) This line is not to be pursued.

2: References to AGRAFENIN.

It was decided at the Conference in Chambers on the afternoon of 13th May that Stratton in his statement would refer to the presence of AGRAFENIN's name in MARTELLI's 1963 diary and would say that it was within his knowledge that AGRAFENIN was the name of the Third Secretary in the Soviet Embassy in Brussels. The D.P.P. and Mr. Cussen had decided that because it was not possible to say definitely that AGRAFENIN was an Intelligence Officer, it was best not to make any reference to his possible intelligence functions. It was also decided that reference would not, at this stage at any rate, be made to the fact that KARPEKOV was met by AGRAFENIN when he arrived in Brussels on the 26th April 1962 and that KARPEKOV gave AGRAFENIN's address as his own address during his stay in Brussels. This was decided because, to present this evidence, it would be necessary to call a Belgian official.

The expense, inconvenience and the probable difficulty of obtaining Belgian co-operation might be considerable and were thought to outweigh the advantages the evidence might bring.

3: References to the recognition code in MARTELLI's diary.

I had pointed out that Stratton's report and statement did not refer to the fact that KARPEKOV was absent from the U.K. at the time when MARTELLI entered in his diary the recognition signal ("Where is Charles Place" - "Do you mean the Art Gallery"). To establish KARPEKOV's absence from the U.K. it would be necessary to call the best evidence, i.e. the Immigration Officer or Officers who booked KARPEKOV in and out of the U.K. The prosecution apparently wish to avoid complicating the case by too much evidence and too many witnesses and felt that they could dispense with this particular piece of evidence.

4: References to Eton Avenue/Pinkham Way and New Southgate and Friern Barnet Station.

These references occur at the back of MARTELLI's 1963 diary. In his statement and his report Stratton lumped all three addresses together, relating them to a previous R.V. entry in the diary concerning Southgate tube station, interpreting Eton Avenue as Eton House and made no reference to the fact that in MARTELLI'S A to Z gazetteer which was in his possession at the time of his arrest, the Eton Avenue/Finchley Road/Winchester Road locality was ringed. These points were discussed at the Conference in Chambers. The distinction of the three putative R.Vs. was accepted but it was decided that the prosecution would dispense with evidence relating to the A to Z gazetteer. This was partly to avoid introducing further complexity into the evidence and partly to avoid emphasising too much the R.V. aspect of MARTELLI's activities.

5: MARTELLII's Bank Statement

The D.P.P. has obtained a court order which he intended to serve on the London Head Office of Lloyds Bank. He had not done this by Tuesday, 14th May. There are two explanations for the inaction in this sphere:-

- (i) Stratton understood from Chief Inspector Wilde of Birmingham Special Branch that MARTELLII's account at the University of Birmingham branch of Lloyds contained no significant entry, and records no payments in cash higher than one of £50. I did not tell Stratton of the evidence but I did say that our evidence from MARTELLI himself suggested that Wilde may have been mistaken.
- (ii) The prosecution is not anxious to produce financial evidence which shows that MARTELLI had been in receipt of a substantial salary for some time.

The spelling of the word 'CENTR' and 'RESTORANT' was pointed out by LA at the Conference in Chambers. It was suggested that this spelling was more characteristic of a Russian than MARTELLI.

7: The reference in the diaries for 1961, 1962 and 1963 to numerous R.Vs.

Only those R.Vs. mentioned in Stratton's report and statement (a copy of which is at the front of the main file) will be referred to at the hearing at Southend. LA has asked that he should be provided with a list of all those entries in the diaries which appear to relate to R.Vs. in this country and in Belgium.

U.I.S.E. SECRET. 7th May, 1963. 307a. MARTELLI CASE. ENQUIRIES CONDUCTED IN BRUSSELS from 1 - 3rd May, 1963. The Head of the EURATOM Security Office in Italy (U.I.S.E.), acting on orders received from the Head of the Service in his capacity of National Security Authority, visited Brussels from 1-3rd May, accompanied by an officer of the C.S., where they both had talks with M. van der Valk (a Dutch national, employed by EURATOM as Head of the EURATOM Security Office), relating to the position of Professor G. MARTELLI, who was recently arrested in Great Britain on a charge of being implicated in an alleged case of espionage. From these lengthy talks the following facts have emerged: Professor Giuseppe MARTELLI, Assistant in the Department 1. of Physics at the University of Pisa, went in 1958 to the University of Birmingham (Great Britain) where he occupied the post of Lecturer in Nuclear Physics. Two versions of the motives which induced MARTELLI to leave Italy in 1958 and go to Birmingham, have been given: a) He came to Great Britain because he wished to continue his studies in a place where he would certainly have better facilities for doing so, and because the remuneration he would receive in Britain would be much higher than what he would receive in Italy; b) He came to Britain as the result of a previously formed intention to gain entry into the British nuclear physics field and supply information to a foreign Power. In the course of his work in Bermingham, as time went on he succeeded (by the use of tact and through his professional ability) in gaining the good will of British scientists engaged in research on nuclear fusion at the Laboratory of

- 2 -

Nuclear Physics attached to Birmingham University; the result was that as the British thought very highly indeed of his professional ability, they did not delay in holding out to him the possibility of collaborating in their researches, to which the considered that his help would give a fresh impetus.

MARTELLI took advantage of the esteem in which he was held by British scientists, and applied for a post with the EURATOM Organisation in Brussels.

His professional abilities, which were already known in scientific circles in EURATOM, and principally the trust reposed in him by the British, facilitated his admission, which took place on 1st April, 1962.

When MARTELLI presented his application for employment with EURATOM, the latter requested the Italian Ministry of Internal Affairs to let them have an informatory memo about him. This was supplied.

In the first part of this memo MARTELLI's political views were not clearly established - it was merely stated that he had left wing sympathies; therefore the EURATOM Commission did not consider this a valid reason for refusing his application for employment.

However, the attention of the EURATOM Department concerned (van der Valk) was drawn to the second part of this memo, which contained adverse information (from the political and ideological points of view) on MARTELLI's wife, Maria VICICH, a Russian by origin, from whom he had been legally separated by a Decree promulgated by the Tribunal at Pisa, dated 11th July, 1960.

In view of this, the Security Office of EURATOM (Brussels) considered it necessary to request the U.I.S.E. to conduct background enquiries about MARTELLI, in accordance with the

EURA-SS Security procedure, although he did not have access to secret information within EURATOM. A thorough enquiry is at present being carried out by the Italians. Various explanations were requested from van der Valk, with the object of clarifying MARTELLI's position and ascertaining how he succeeded in becoming an employee of EURATOM. From the confidential statements made by van der Valk it appears that MARTELLI's admission was put forward and supported entirely by the British, who valued his professional abilities and took this way of showing their interest in him and their wish that he should collaborate with them in their researches. The support of the British was therefore an effective credential when MARTELLI applied to Brussels. Following his acceptance by EURATOM on 1st April, 1962, 3. MARTELLI became associated as a physicist with the nuclear fusion project carried on by the Department directed by the Italian Dr. Donato PALUMBO, with whom he worked for 52 months. There were strong ties of friendship between MARTELLI and Dr. PALUMBO. In November 1962 MARTELLI was sent to the Establishment at Culham (England) at the request of the British. 4. According to the conclusions reached by van der Valk following his talks in London on 30th April, 1963, MARTELLI, while he was working at Culham, made many journeys for purposes of work or personal interest to the Establishments at Harwell, Aldermaston and Great Malvern. These places (in which old friends of MARTELLI were working) are all a short distance from Culham, and all contain Sections carrying out varying amounts

- 4 of secret research. The work at Harwell is 100% secret; at Aldermaston it is 50% secret, and at Great Malvern (Worcs) it is 25% secret (Radar Research Centre - Secret). During his journeys MARTELLI was accompanied by Miss Pamela ROTHWELL, whom he knew at Birmingham University, where she carried out space research, and who later became his mistress. If, as may be supposed, MARTELLI made his visits to these places for purposes of espionage, the possibility referred to by van der Valk should not be excluded - that the legal separation from VICICH was merely carried out as a more effective cover for his illitit activities, as the information collected by him could have been sent to Pisa to his wife for forwarding to an unknown destination. If this is so (since for the present no other collaborators are known) the possibility should not be excluded that MARTELLI has been the organising and operational brain of an international spy network of unknown proportions. This supposition gains strength by the possibility that MARTELLI may have chosen EURATOM in Brussels as a centre of operations because (apart from being the meeting point for intellectuals from every European country including those behind the Iron Curtain) Brussels is also a staging post and a centre of air communications for all these countries, including East Berlin. As stated, MARTELLI was arrested on 26th April, 1963 at 5. London (Southend) Airport on his return from his journey to Italy. According to information supplied by van der Valk, on the 4th April, 1963 MARTELLI went to spend the Easter holidays in Pisa on a visit to his family wife and family (although he is legally separated from his wife).

- 5 -On his return journey he travelled back by air through Greece and Jugoslavia; this appears to be a somewhat peculiar itinerary. On his arrest, according to information supplied to van der Valk by the British Security Service, he was in possession of proofs of his guilt, or, to be exact: "equipment showing him to be a spy". When his car, which is of foreign make, reached Britain on the car ferry from Europe, British Counter-espionage Agents took it apart piece by piece and made an extremely thorough search, but found nothing. For the purposes of this enquiry it was considered 6. Extraorded to necessary to find out what salary MARTELLI received in Britain. . It has been possible to establish that he received from EURATOM, including various allowances, a monthly salary in of S Obt of pounds sterling equivalent to 35,000 Belgian francs (this corresponds to 429,800 Italian lire). On this subject, van der Valk informed us that he had learned from the Belgian National Bank (by extremely confidential means and under bank confidence) that this Bank has been receiving monthly from MARTELLI by cheque the entire amount stated above, with instructions to forward it to Signora Maria VICICH at Pisa (MARTELLI's wife). It is supposed 130,000 live therefore that the necessary money to live in Britain at a level suitable to his position and his activities (various tourist journeys, hos own car, etc.) may have been supplied to him either by his mistress, Pamela ROTHWELL, or by an unknown source. The following information is given about some of MARTELLI's 7. friends, and about the possible activities of Italian nationals who may be connected with this case: a) Prof. Bruno TALLINI (so far not well known to us), already working

- 6 before MARTELLI's arrival (in the same year 1958) for the British Nuclear Organisation as a lecturer at Birmingham University, where MARTELLI went later; he has now been for about a month (at his own request) at Saclay sur Seine (Paris), in which area there is a nuclear establishment. The British Security Service is interested in TALLINI No but up to the evening of the 3rd May, 1963, he has not been detained or interrogated by any branch of the French police. This physicist has very close ties of friendship with MARTELLI, and the possibility cannot be excluded that it was through TALLINI that MARTELLI went to Birmingham University. b) Prof. PARKINSON, a British national, Head of the Radar Research Establishment (Secret) at Great Malvern (Worcs. G.B.), a great friend of Prof. MARTELLI, who has often stayed with him during the many journeys which he made from Culham to Great Malvern. c) Dr. Donato PALUMBO, born at Salaparuta (Trapani) on 16th July, 1921. Head of the Nuclear Fusion Project Section at EURATOM in Brussels; he is an intimate friend of MARTELLI. He is at the moment under surveillance by the British Security Service, who are interested in him in connection with their inquiries about the MARTELLI case, and who have requested van der Valk to supply them with more detailed information about him. PALUMBO is in possession of a N.O. EURA/SS issued on 29.11.1960. However, since there have been queries about him, further enquiries were made on 7th January, 1961, but the result of these was inconclusive. Dr. PALUMBO is not very popular among the members of the Italian circle in EURATOM, although he appears to be a man of sufficient discretion and professionally capable.

PALUMBO appeared to be sincerely grieved, indeed dismayed, by what has happened to MARTELLI. During the course of a meeting which he had on the afternoon of the /the information 2nd May with van der Valk in Brussels he let slip/that he would as soon as possible given in his resignation to EURATOM.

PALUMBO has protected MARTELLI on all occasions, and has shown himself to be deeply attached to him. PALUMBO is suspected of pro-Communist sympathies.

d) <u>Dr. Enzo PIRONIO</u>, born 1st September, 1921 at Artegna.

Deputy Head of the EURATOM Security Office at Brussels. In possession of (Clearance Certificate) N.O. EURA/SS issued on 16.12.1961.

At this point it should be explained that van der Valk, as Head of the Security Office, gives authorisations to members of EURATOM to make international telephone calls. This enables him to keep a check for security purposes on such telephone conversations.

Towards the end of last April, PIRONIO telephoned from Brussels to Rome during office hours and asked to speak to the Head of the "REI" Office of Sifar. The latter did not speak to him.

When this matter was raised, van der Valk stated that he had never authorised this telephone call.

In this connection it may be stated that the Head of the "REI" Office has never been in contact with PIRONIO, either personally or through his work, and that there was no reason for him to talk to PIRONIO on the telephone.

This matter was intentionally brought up in the course of our talks, as described, in order to see if it would lead to something which might throw light on the relations by tween PIRONIO and MARTELLI, without hurting the feelings of

van der Valk, since PIRONIO is Deputy Head of the Security Office.

The information which we obtained as a result of this was of particular interest, as a number of admissions were made by van der Valk, which among other things showed that a close friendship exists between PIRONIO and MARTELLI.

Van der Valk informed us that on the evening of Friday, 26th April, 1963 (the day of MARTELLI's arrest) two of his colleagues came to his office to give him details of what had happened. Suddenly, without warning, PIRONIO burst into his office, and without waiting to be addressed, and not knowing what they were talking about, stated with an air of superiority that he knew what had pappened; he went on to say that this had all happened because van der Valk had consistently refused to listen to his repeated warnings about MARTELLI's loyalty, and added that he had always tried to put van der Valk on his guard against MARTELLI.

Van der Valk has categorically denied ever having had conversations with PIRONIO about MARTELLI.

This therefore gives rise to the supposition that PIRONIO was trying to forestall questions about his relations with MARTELLI by speaking ill of him, and at the same time attempting to put himself in a favourable light by assuming to himself non-existent merits.

Van der Valk, in confirmation of statement about the strange and contradictory behaviour of PIRONIO in this delicate matter, said that PIRONIO, when asked on another occasion by the Chief of Staff (?) of the President of the Community to draw up an informatory memo about MARTELLI, submitted a memo giving known facts of a general nature, chosen to put MARTELLI in an entirely favourable light.

- 12 -In spite of this van der Valk has firmly maintained his dicision, and consequently the desired posting of NEGRO has not been effected. It should be stated that the U.I.S.E. has not yet been requested to give NEGRO a security clearance. f) Prof. Edoardo AMALDI, born at Carpeneto (Piacenza) in 1898. Attached to the Research and Teaching Division of the EURATOM Commission. He does not hold a N.O. EURA. Prof. AMALDI, known for his undiscriminating choice of colleagues, among which even Communists are numbered, is a friend of MARTELLI. Raniero VANNI d'ARCHIRAFI, born at Geneva (Switzerland) on 7th July, 1931, resident in Brussels (an Italian citizen). He is an official of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Secretary to the Representative to the E.E.C. and E.A.E.C. He is attaché to the diplomatic representative to the EURATOM Community (Ambassador VENTURINI). When MARTELLI was arrested, VANNI d'ARCHIRAFI behaved very strangely. In fact, when the information reached Brussels that the British had found on MARTELLI's person equipment showing him to be a spy, VANNI d'ARCHIRAFI's attitude made it appear that he already knew what the contents of the communication would be. VANNI d'ARCHIRAFI is an intimate friend of MARTELLI. 8. Axixthexinformationxgiven When the delicacy of the duties carried out at some time by each of these individuals is taken into account, all the information given above appears to bear directly on the MARTELLI case, if only because it is clearly negative and counter-productive. This is recommended so that Italian nationals may be carefully screened for the suitability or otherwise for employment by the Commission, and in order to avoid repercussions in the future.

This procedure is not laid down in the regulations for engaging personnel for EURATOM, but the MARTELLI case supplies ample justification of its necessity.

The Head of the EURATOM Security Office, van der Valk, has recognised the need for this procedure and fully supports our proposal.

He has in fact agreed to review the position of the Italian nationals employed with EURATOM (though this may take time), using the method of direct contact which has been proposed to him.

For information, it is stated that recently, following urgent requests from every State which is a member of EURATOM, the French Government has finally agreed to instruct their Minister of Internal Affairs to supply the informative memo requested by EURATOM when engaging personnel; in the past the French have persistently refused to supply information about

their nationals, thus creating a disparity among the member states of BURATOM in the procedure for engaging personnel.

Van der Valk has also agreed to supply the U.I.S.E. as soon as possible with a list of all the Italians who are working in different European and non-European countries in Nuclear Establishments, stating whether or not they have been screened.

10. These meetings with van der Valk were held in an atmosphere of full understanding and loyal collaboration.

Every precaution was taken to safeguard the delicate nature and the secrecy of the matters under discussion.

In the first telephone conversation held on the arrival in Brussels of the Italian representatives, the Head of the EURATOM Security Service fully agreed on the necessity for all these talks to be held in a secret place free from any possibility of leakage of information.

Finally, it should be stated that van der Valk, the Head of the EURATOM Security Service in Brussels, emphasized repeatedly that all the information which he supplied about the MARTELLI case was given in a spirit of loyal and friendly co-operation with the Italian Security Office; therefore he did not hesitate to give many particulars of an extremely confidential nature, which he made known only because he trusted the Italians. He also stated that he would be very glad to supply direct to the Head of the EURATOM Security Office in Italy any further information which the matter might want in the future, as he was anxious to maintain this atmosphere of loyal co-operation, with the aim of improving the security of the EURATOM Community.

15 -ATTACHED. 20th April, 1962. EUI - 50499. MARTELLI Giuseppe, son of Achille (d.) and of DI SANDRI BONTEMPELLI Anna Maria; born at Pistoia on 16.5.1923, and resident at Via Gramsci, 3. Pisa; at present in Birmingham (Great Britain); this man is of good conduct and has not served any prison sentence. In University circles in Rome and Pisa(where he has worked as an Assistant and as a Fellow) on many occasions he gave indications of holding advanced political ideas, and wax considered to have leanings towards the Left; however, nothing definite emerged from enquiries made in order to discover whether he was a member of any particular Party. It does not appear that he has ever been directly engaged in political activities or propaganda. In Pisa in March, 1955, he was one of the few Professors at the University to sign the Appeal in favour of banning atomic and thermo-nuclear weapons, sponsored by the National Committee of Partisans for Peace (Communist affiliation). On 11.7.1960, by Decree of the Tribunal at Pisa, MARTELLI obtained a legal separation from his wife VICICH Maria, daughter of Massimo (d.) and of LISKA Olga; born at Harog, Pamir, U.S.S.R. on 26.1.1919, residing at Pisa. VICICH gives proof of having open sympathies with the Communist Party, and she goes regularly to the Provincial Headquarters of the Union of Italian Women (Communist inspired) where she takes part in organisational meetings. In the Summer of 1957, as a Delegate for the Pisa Communist Party, she attended the VIth World Festival of Communist Youth, held in Moscow.

Guiseppe Enrico Gilberto MARTELLI

Following several months investigation by D.
Branch, MARTELLI was detained on his arrival at Southend Airport at 12.25 p.m. on 26th April. After being questioned and making a statement he was charged that "on a date between 23rd September, 1960, and 4th April, 1963, (he) did commit an act preparatory to the commission of an offence contrary to Section I (i)(c) of the Official Secrets Act 1911 contrary to Section 7 of the Official Secrets Act 1920."

MARTELLI is an Italian national born at Pistoia on 16th May, 1923. He is a nuclear physicist specialising in the field of plasma physics and is employed and paid by Euratom. Since November 1962 he has been attached to the

MARTELLI is an Italian national born at Pistoia on 16th May, 1923. He is a nuclear physicist specialising in the field of plasma physics and is employed and paid by Euratom. Since November 1962 he has been attached to the Culham Laboratories of U.K.A.E.A. His own work and that of the Culham establishment as a whole is completely unclassified. The Laboratories are intended to be the centre of a free exchange of information on the peaceful uses of atomic energy developed from nuclear fusion and indeed it is intended that Soviet scientists should be attached there. MARTELLI is separated from his Italian wife and has been living with a British space physicist, Pamela ROTHWELL, known as Mrs. MARTELLI, who has been his mistress since 1953, at Abingdon near Culham. She is at present engaged on unclassified contract work for Birmingham University. She is believed to be unconscious of MARTELLI's espionage role.

After a nuclear physics research career at the Universities of Rome and Pisa, and in Germany, MARTELLI first came to reside in the U.K. in November 1956, taking up a research fellowship at Birmingham University. He resigned to join Euratom in Brussels in April 1962.

A series of reports began to reach us in 1958 alleging Communist sympathies on MARTELLI's part from 1950 to 1955. They included a report that in 1955 he and his wife had been members of the Italian Communist Party. No evidence of Communist sympathies of more recent date was available up to the time of his arrest. However as a result of a search carried out, under warrant, certain items of spy equipment were found, some of which were similar to those which came to light in the LONSDALE - HOUGHTON - KROGER case.

As the case is still sub judice no further details can yet be given.
