

Meetings

: MARTELLI met officers or agents of the R.I.S. in Europe on the following and probably other, unknown, dates: 1956 in Genova, August or September 1961 in Vienna. April and December 1962 in Brussels, and April 1963 in Brussels.

He said that at his U.K. meetings he and his controller would walk for about a mile to a restaurant for about a mile to a restaurant for lunch. KARPEKOV always came alone but ALEXANDER II always had a shadow. An entry in MARTELLI's diary (under 21.9.60.) reads "last Saturday 11 oc Abercorne Rd" (i.e. Abercorn Road, N.W.7.). The date or dates to which this refers are uncertain; it may be a reminder for a permanent Reserve R.V. In February 1963 MARTELLI was given instructions for disposing of his pads if need be. He was to post a travel leaflet about Wales, with which he had been provided, to D. SWANNE, 21/23 Pembridge Villas, W.11. (an exclusively Russian address). The following Saturday he was to go to a car park near a station (possibly Swiss Cottage) and the presence there of a car with a white cross on its boot would show that his leaflet had been received. He would then place the pads in a cavity in the fence lining a foot path near New Southgate and Friern Barnet Station. If he wanted to make contact he was to send a leaflet about Scotland and he would then be met at 14.00 the following Saturday at Abercorn Road, N.W. 7. He may also have had R.V.s in 1963 in Eton Avenue,

N.W.3., and Pinkham Way, N.11.

Specific Meetings

: (as nearly as they can be identified): 1.60: Summoned by KARPEKOV by telephone. Met outside Baron's Court Underground Station and walked to a Chinese Restaurant. 8 or 9.60: Summoned by an illegibly signed letter he assumed to be from the Russians to meet at 12 noon on a Saturday at a pub in Harrow (not located). ALEXANDER I turned up and, MARTELLI alleges, threatened the grant of a visa to Mrs. MARTELLI to take their children to Russia. (KARPEKOV's address was in MARTELLI's diary under 23.9.60. (Tuesday)).

26.9.60 (?) (Mon) : Wimbledon entered in MARTELLI's diary and scribbled out; remainder of entry totally illegible.

11.60 : Meeting with ALEXANDER I

3.61 : Meeting with ALEXANDER I and KARPEKOV at same Harrow pub.

5.61 : KARPEKOV, possibly at Wimbledon (see 16.12.61 below)

10.61 : KARPEKOV, possibly at Wimbledon. MARTELLI thinks that at this meeting he was given R.V.s at Greenway, Southgate, and at Sandymount Avenue, Stanmore. He does not admit having attended either.

16.12.61 (Sat) : "OKing's Road, Wimbledon" in MARTELLII's diary for this date.

10.2.62 (Sat) : "Greenway, Southgate St." in MARTELLI's diary for this date.

3 or 4.62 : KARPEKOV

19 or 26.5.62 : 12.00; possibly St. Stephens Road, Ealing (Sat) Broadway; KARPEKOV

2.63 : probably Abercorn Road, N.W.7., Alexander II; (prob. 23.2.63. R.V. in Brussels arranged. (Sat))

"few days later": A stranger waited for MARTELLI by his car at a pub between Aldermaston and Culham. When he left the car at Streatley he left the emergency arrangements mentioned above.

28.2.63 (Thurs): 08.50; Police sighted MARTELLI at Aylesbury with a stranger in the car. This is not thought to be an R.I.S. contact.

1.4.63 (Mon) : O8.50; Police sighted MARTELLI on the Bath Road (A.4.) approaching Slough from the West alone.

> C9.00; on Sussex Place (A.4.) leaving Slough to the East with a passenger in the back apparently hiding behind a newspaper. Possibly this was an R.I.S. contact but there is no confirmation.

For your own information, we do not feel that MARTELLII has told the full truth about his relations with the R.I.S. We believe that he has not done so because he actively assisted it. Whilst I think it would be wrong to say this in so many words to the Barbados Special Branch, you could perhaps imply our continued interest in MARTELLI by asking them to let us know whether he comes to their notice in a security context. As you will see, we have no indication of Communist activity on his part since he arrived in the U.K. In view of the reports of Communist activity when in Italy it is conceivable that he might meddle in local politics, but in view of his admitted associations with the Russian Intelligence Service (albeit, as he claimed, under pressure) it is doubtful that he would relish getting deeply involved. 2. I am sending copies of this correspondence to our S.L.O. in Trinidad. I think it would be right for him to pass this information to the Special Branch in Barbados in the course of his normal liaison rather than for the High Commissioner to speak to the Prime Minister. Chargonia Televisia Born: 15.5.23, Italy Nationality: Italian. In 1950 and 1951 it was alleged by two sources of unknown meliability that MARWALL, at that time in Italy, was a Communist. Since 1954 he has lived in the United Kingdon, spart from two breaks of approximately a year and of five months, and he has not come to notice as having taken part in Communist activities or having expressed Communict views. In 1956 he and Pamels Holen ROTESTAL, also known as Mrs. HARTELLI, were reported to hold "Leftict views". At his trial in 1963 HARTELLI stated that he had mover had any association or sympathy with Communism. MARTINLI was arrested on 27th April and brought to trial on 2nd July 1963. He was charged on nine counts under the Official Secrete Acts, manely that he did acts preparatory to communicating information to another person for a purpose prejudicial to the interest of the State. He was found not guilty. The main evidence was based on HARPHALI's possession of "one time" cypher pade in a cigarotte concealment device, notes of meeting places, the address of a Soviet Intelligence Officer and notes relating to rendervous and mecagnition eignals. MARTHAL admitted to having had connections with the Emecian Intelligence Service since early 1960. He claimed that pressure had been brought to bear on him to co-operate with the Russian Intelligence Service and that it was his intention to play them along until such time as he had accumulated sufficient evidence to denounce the Passions and thereby to free himself from their threats. De claimed that he had never transmitted messages to the Sussian Intelligence Service and that he had never received any money from them. At the time of his arrest MARWILLI was employed by Russton. No worked at an Atomic Unercy establishment in the United Kingdom and had no secone to elsewified information. 25th April 1966.

H.C., Barbados, has reported to Commonwealth Office that Guiseppe MARTELIX is in country. Requests background. Copy our reply will not reach you before your visit to Barbados. Gist as follows.

- 2. MARTELLI excepted 1963 when on unclassified work at Atomic Energy establishment. Based on possession of spy trappings, charged under 0.S.A., vis acts preparatory to communicating information to foreign power. Admitted connection with R.I.S. but claimed it was under pressure and intended to expose. Acquitted. - 3. For your own information. We do not believe MATSLIX was frank about R.I.S. connections. In discussion with Special Branch you could imply some scepticism of his defence.

He said that the range staff consists of a lieutenant colonel. 30 soldiers and 50 civilians: their job is to work the safety radars etc.; there is nothing classified about this. If A.E.A., Ministry of Technology or a List X firm wishes to use the range they approach H.Q.R.A. to book it but the user remains responsible for the security of its equipment and personnel. Commandant had complete responsibility for safety precautions but none for the security of users' equipment. I thanked Vickers for this information which showed that there was nothing wrong in MARTELLI and ROTHWELL visiting South Uist without N.V. clearance provided that A.E.A. did not have them there on classified work.

The interview lasted from 10.45 a.m. to 1.40 p.m. PETRAVIC had not been told the purpose of the interview; he did not, however, express any great surprise and greeted me in a friendly manner. I told PETRAVIC I wished to go into certain aspects of what he had told me on the previous occasion in greater detail. 28. PETRAVIC's reference to MARTELLI gave me the opportunity to ask him about their relations with each other. PETRAVIC said that during the period 1954/57 he had got to know MARTELLI in a casual sort of way. MARTELLI was at that time on the teaching staff of Birmingham University although PETRAVIC had not known what work he was doing. They sometimes met at lunchtime and on one occasion PETRAVIC went to MARTELLI's flat to listen to music. MARTELLI was at that time very lonely as his (first) wife was in Italy. 29. I asked PETRAVIC for his impressions of MARTELLI. He answered with an expressive shrug of the shoulders that he was a 'typical Italian', talkative, temperamental, unreliable; almost a caricature of an Italian. He was however very intelligent and well read. He appeared to like life in England and have a deep appreciation of the English way of life. 30. PETRAVIC said that he had never had any dealings with MARTELL in his work nor had he ever met in MARTELLI's company any Iron Curtain nationals. He had not had much in common with MARTELLI and their friendship had not been close but he could fairly say that they had been on terms of occasional friendly acquaintance. 31. I asked whether Gioietta had known MARTELLI. PETRAVIC smiled and said that MARTELLI used to try and get off with Gioietta and and was rather put out when Rioletta preferred to go out with him (i.e. PETRAVIC). 32. PETRAVIC did not keep in touch with MARTELLI when he was in Yugoslavia in 1958/61. When the PETRAVICs returned to Birmingham in 1961, MARTELLI often used to come round to pour out his troubles which were both familiar and professional. He was worried about his children in Italy and over a disappointment which he had suffered at the hands of Professor MOON who had given him to understand that he would be promoted and then decided otherwise. During that time the PETRAVICS went to MARTELLI's once and MARTELLI came to them once although they used fairly frequently to meet in the University. 33. When the PETRAVICs went to Culham they did from time to time see MARTHILI in the laboratory and on the occasion of his visit to Greece which preceded his arrest MARTELLI had asked the PETRAVICE whether he could bring anything back from Zagreb for them. They had said 'No' in the first instance but subsequently decided that they would like their record player turntable. They accordingly asked PETRAVIC's mother to give it to MARTEILI when he passed through Zagreb on his way back to the U.K. from Greece. She had put the turntable in a small case together with a bag of herbal tea of which PETRAVIC was fond. This had caused the PETRAVICs some embarrassment when MARTELLI was arrested as the turntable was retained by the Authorities and not returned for sometime. Although their consciences were clear they could not help being anxious lest they should be brought into the MARTELLI case. 34. PETRAVIC said that he had seen MARTELLI once or twice since the trial. Immediately after the trial when he (i.e. PETRAVIC) was recovering his turntable he met MARTELLI who appeared to be pretty badly shaken by the events although he put a good face on it. # LEAVE GRANTED TO SERVE WRITS ON NEWSPAPERMEN ABROAD

MARTELLI V. SULZBERGER AND OTHERS.

Before the MASTER OF THE ROLLS, LORD JUSTICE SALMON and LORD JUSTICE WINN.

Justice Salmon and Lord Justice Winn.

Leave granted to the plaintiff, Dr. Gius ppe Martelli, of the University of Sussex, to serve writs out of the jurisdiction on four individual foreign defendants, the other of a libellous newspaper article, the executive editor of the newspaper, the general manager of its international edition published in Paris, and the managing editor of that edition, was confirmed. The Court, however, emphasized that the decision did not mean that in every case where a foreign newspaper published a libel it would be proper to serve all such individuals, but held that in the circumstances of this case it was justified.

Their Lordships dismissed an interlo-

held that in the circumstances of this case it was justified.

Their Lordships dismissed an interlocutory appeal by four individual defendants to an action for damages for admitted libel brought by Dr. Martelli from the refusal of Mr, Justice James in chambers on January 25 to set aside orders of Master Ritchie giving leave to serve them out of the jurisdiction under Order 11, rule 1, of the Rules of the Supreme Court.

Mr. Michael Eastham, Q.C., and Mr. Conrad Dehn for the personal defendants; Mr. Andrew Bateson for Dr. Martelli.

The Master of the Rolls said that on November 21, 1965, the New York Times published the following: "The period since World War II has been gaudy with spies, forgeries and fakes. Indeed, some spies have been widely publicized—like Coionel Rudolf Abel, traded for U-2 pilot Gary Powers; Lonsdale; Ivan Egorov, a Soviet official in the U.N.; Giuseppe Martelli, an Italian who spied for Moscow in hollowheeled shoes; Burgess, Maclean and Philby, who skipped to Russia when their cover wore thin."

Next day the same words appeared in the New York Times International Edition. Each of the newspapers circulated in many countries, including England.

Dr. Martelli had been tried two years before on charges under the Official Secrets Act and acquitted. When that was brought to the notice of the newspapers, they published a correction and apology on December 7, 1965, to Dr. Martelli "for the inadvertent and inaccurate inclusion of his name in a list of spies"

name in a list of spies"

Dr. Martelli was minded to bring an action in England for damages; the only issue could be how much damages should

action in England for damages; the only issue could be how much damages should be awarded.

Then there was a question of who should be sued and how they should be served. Dr. Martelli's advisers asked for leave to serve writs out of the jurisdiction on Mr. Cyrus L. Sulzberger, who was named as the author of the article; Mr. Thomas Catledge, the executive editor of the New York Times itself; the New York Times Sales Incorporated, which was a subsidiary of the New York Times Company and the company responsible for publication of the New York Times International Edition in Paris; Mr. Zoltan J. Havas, the general manager of the international edition; and Mr. Thomas Daffron, managing editor of the international edition.

Dr. Martelli's advisers sent the writ for the defendant company by registered post to rooms, in Printing House Square, where there was a London bureau of the New York Times. They alleged that that would be service on the defendant company and that it was carrying on business there. That was denied to be proper service because it was said that the company did not carry

was denied to be proper service because it was said that the company did not carry on business there and had not got a place of business in England. The dispute whether that was proper service on the defendant company had not been resolved.

Dr. Martelli's advisers then applied to Master Ritchie for leave to serve the four personal defendants out of the jurisdiction, one ground being that in Order 11, rule 1 (j), that the action was properly brought against a person duly served within the jurisdiction, so that the four persons were "proper parties" thereto.

The other ground in subparagraph (h) was that the action was founded on a tort committed within the jurisdiction. It was said that there was a good arguable case that the four individuals committed a tort within the jurisdiction.

As his Lordship understood the authorities, the author who wrote an article for a newspaper was himself liable for the publication because he authorized it in the paper, and there was also a good arguable case that the editor and general manager were parties to the tort, even if they did not read through the paper themselves. So the jurisdiction was established and rule 1 (h) operated. (h) operated.

### NO INJUSTICE

But there was still the question whether, as a matter of discretion, the Court should allow service out of the jurisdiction. Both parties had made errors. On Dr. Martelli's side the plain and simple course, since he was complaining of the libel in the New York Times itself, was to issue a writ against the New York Times, which was a company and certainly appeared to carry on against the New York Times, which was a company and certainly appeared to carry on business at Printing House Square and which ought to have registered particulars with the Board of Trade under the Companies Act, 1948. He could then have brought in the defendant company as a "proper party" to the proceedings. Those two companies were the only defendants necessary in an action where the only necessary in an action where the only question was damages.

On the other hand, since all the defendants were represented by the same solicitors, the plain and simple course for the defendant company was to say: "We the defendant company was to say: "We are ready to accept service of this writ, so don't bother the personal defendants." But they did not take that course.

All those mistakes having been made in a case where the only question was how

much damages, his Lordship doubted whether it would be necessary for any of the four personal defendants to come to this country. But in view of the history of the case he did not see the slightest injustice in letting it go on as it now was, with the discretion of the Judge having been exercised to give leave to serve the four out of the jurisdiction. The appeal should be dismissed.

Lord Justice Salmon, concurring, did not want anything he said to be understood to mean that whenever a libel was published by a foreign newspaper it was a proper exercise of the discretion to allow the author, editor, and manager to be joined as parties, in addition to the paper itself. But he emphasized that in this case the defendant company, which edited, published, and distributed the international edition, had, as they were perfectly entitled to do, refused to accept service through their London solicitors; and when Dr. Martelli attempted to effect service at the New York Times Bureau at Printing House Square, the point was taken—no doubt a perfectly good point—that although the bureau was the place where the parent company carried on business, the defendant company was only a subsidiary, separate from the parent company, and did not carry on business here.

That company might have instructed its London solicitors to accept service. Foreign newspapers which did not carry on business here, but against which there was a perfectly proper maintainable action, instructed solicitors in London every day to accept service on their behalf. But the company was entitled, if it wished, to put Dr. Martelli to all the trouble and expense entailed in effecting service out of the jurisdiction. Where that course was taken, it did put the company and those they employed in a great difficulty. If the company had instructed their solicitors to accept service in this country, his Lordship was not sure that he would have formed the same view on the correctness of the Judge's exercise of the discretion in relation to the four individual defendants as that which he had now formed.

Lord Justice Winn, also concurring in the result, said that the one good thing that had come out of a lamentable matter so far was, his Lordship sincerely hoped, that it would come to the knowledge of the Registrar of Companies how the American newspaper companies were flouting the provisions of the Companies Act, 1948, from section 406 onwards, and that someone would think it right to consider whether or not the penalty imposed by section 414 should be enforced, namely, that if any overseas company failed to comply with those provisions of the Act, the company and every officer or agent who knowingly and wilfully authorized or permitted the default "shall be liable to a fine not exceeding £50 or, in the case of a continuing offence, £5 for every day during which the default continues".

It was fantastic that there should be such negligence and flouting of statutory provisions of that kind by such companies.

Leave to appeal to the House of Lords was refused.



In discussion with me today the S. of S. agreed that on the information at present available about Martelli's loyalty it would not be right to grant naturalisation. He would not, however, think it necessary to regard this decision as forever excluding naturalisation and, as a matter of presentation, would like us to give some hint of this in turning down the application. If the letter can be so expressed it may help to discourage Martelli from creating a public fuss about the decision.

The S. of S. is aware that in all probability we shall not be much better informed about Martelli's outlook in security or other respects after the lapse of two or three years than we are now. But plainly it is possible that some piece of hard evidence will come to notice, either of the Security Service or of the police: which would enable us either to reaffirm the refusal with confidence or to adopt a different view.

In view of my conversation with Mr. Simkins recently, I am sending a copy of this minute for his records.

Giuseppe MARTELLI, who was found not guilty of charges under the Official Secrets Acts at the Old Bailey in 1963, has applied for naturalisation. We have put a note on the naturalisation file. This note does not set out in full the grounds for our suspicions of MARTELLI, nor attempt an assessment of the consequences to security of a decision to grant naturalisation.

3. When MARTELLI was initially interrogated by Special Branch on his arrest, the replies he gave and the statement he made and signed were false. He did not repeat the falsehoods at the Old Bailey, but instead produced a story which admitted all the prosecution evidence with which he had been acquainted and also embraced such (further evidence as the prosecution had derived from an examination of his possessions.

with the RIS since early 1960. His defence was that he was being blackmailed by the RIS on the grounds of his association with Pamela ROTHWELL, his commonlaw wife, and of the alleged desire of his Russian born Italian wife, from whom he was legally separated in July 1960, to return to the Soviet Union with their children to whom he was much attached. The RIS, he alleged, offered to withhold his wife's visa in return for his cooperation. MARTELLI claimed that he "played them along" in the hope that he would eventually acquire enough evidence of their intentions and methods to denounce them and to nullify the threat to his wife and children. He therefore gave the appearance of falling in with the RIS's wishes, met in clandestine circumstances no less than four controllers in the United Kingdom and in Brussels, and other members of the RIS in Vienna, and allowed the Russians to equip him with cipher material and instructions for the use of microdots. He claimed that he had never used or been asked to use this equipment. He asserted that over a period of three years he had never been asked for information except occasional questions of no significance, and that he had never received any money from the RIS.

5. None of the evidence which it was possible to put forward in court disproves the story MARTELLI told at the Old Bailey in any material particular. Nevertheless, there are matterswhich lead the Security Service to conclude that he has not told the full truth about his relations with the RIS, and has not done so because he actively assisted it.

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MARTELLI was arrested on 27 April and brought to trial at the Old Bailey on 2nd July, 1963, on an indictment containing nine counts under the Official Secrets Acts. The charges were that he did acts preparatory to communicating to another person for a purpose prejudicial to the safety or interest of the State information calculated to be or which might be or was intended to be useful to an enemy by keeping available for use:-

- (i) Notes of a conversion table for enciphering and a one-time pad
- (ii) Notes of meeting places
- (iii) Photographic data for photographing documents
- (iv) The address of a foreign agent
  - (v) Notes as to a method of identifying himself to a stranger
- (vi) Shoes with a receptable for containing articles or documents
- (vii) Notes of a conversion table for enciphering
- (viii) Notes of a meeting place
  - (ix) Photographic data for photographing documents.

The first six offences were alleged to have been committed between 23rd September 1960 and 4th April 1963, and the last three on 26th April 1963.

2. Evidence was laid before the court relating to data and apparatus found on MARTELLI's person and at his office at the time of his arrest, which indicated that he was equipped to act as a spy for the Russian Intelligence Service (RIS). There was no direct evidence of any meeting between MARTELLI and representatives of the RIS., nor of his communication to the RIS of any information whatsoever.

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6. After his accuittel, MARTELLI was twice interviewed by Security Service Officers. On each occasion he endeavoured to give the impression of wishing to do all in his power to assist the authorities, but in fact the interviews provided no fresh information of value.
